

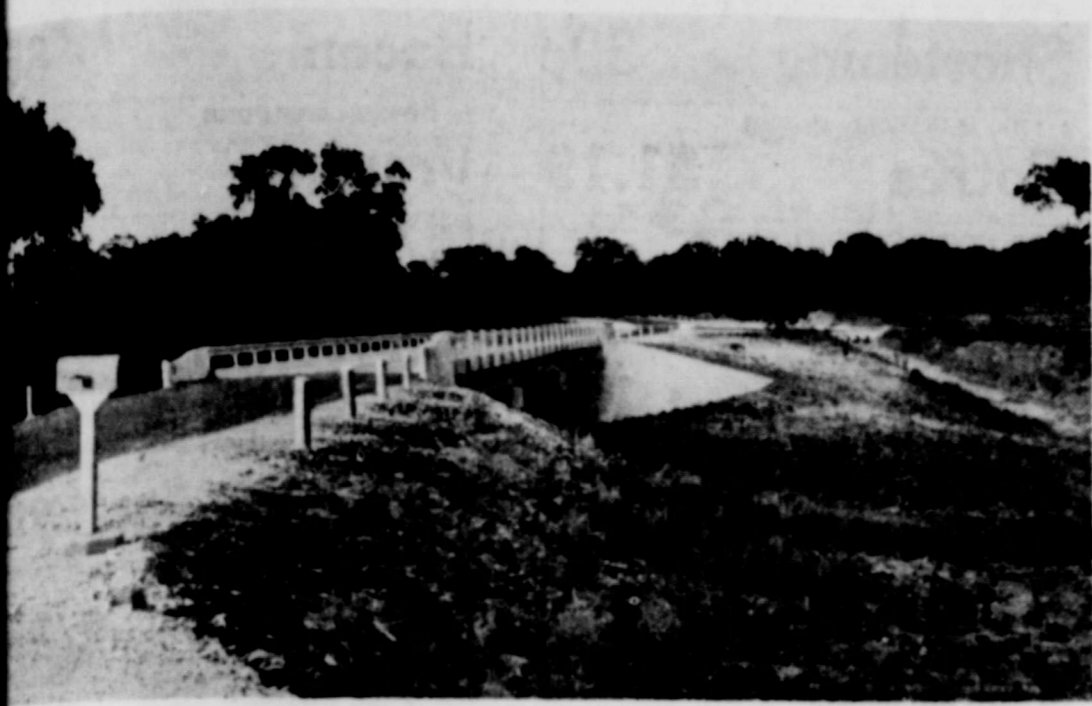

### 3,628 HOUSING UNITS LISTED IN HAMILTON COUNTY CENSUS REPORT

The 1960 Census of Housing counted 3,628 housing units in Hamilton County. The Census Bureau released the following figures:

Of these units 2,212 were in sound condition with all plumbing; 3,077 were occupied; 2,300 were occupied by owners.

Average value of the owner-occupied places was \$5,300. 777 were occupied by renters, and \$40 was the median gross rent of rented places. 2,603 houses had hot and cold running water, and 3,024 had flush toilets, with 3,012 having bathtub or shower. 60 units had basements, and 17 were trailer homes.

Voters over the state will trek to the polls Saturday to finish what was started last month when they nominated candidates to oppose each other in the June 2nd Democratic primary.

A short ballot faces local voters with only 9 names appearing. The odd number came about when Ben Sudderth of Comanche withdrew from his race with J. P. Word of Meridian for the 12th District Senatorial post.

Only issue facing local voters with a direct bearing on area politics is the State Legislative race where Bill Shannon of Erath County and Travis McClinton of Coryell County oppose each other. McClinton led the ticket in the first primary by some 100 votes. Shannon has served two terms in the legislature, and McClinton is seeking his first tenure of office.

Other races which voters will decide on are:

Governor: John Connally and Don Yarborough.

Lt. Governor: Preston Smith and James Turman.

Attorney General: Waggoner Carr and Tom Reavley.

Little interest has been shown in the election locally, and a light vote is expected. Only 327 votes were cast in the first primary, and speculations are that the top figure will be no more than 150 in Saturday's balloting.

A. A. Brown will preside over the election which will be held at City Hall.

### Little League Schedule Changed

First game of the Little League season, which was scheduled for Tuesday night of this week, was postponed due to conflict at Meridian.

The schedule has been rearranged due to other conflicts, and Manager Jerry Lackey said this week that the first game for the Hico squad would be played at Irredell Tuesday night, June 5, beginning at 8 o'clock.

The revised schedule will be published at a later date.

### 'GET YOUR GOAT' DRIVE ON BY BAPTIST CO. ASSOCIATION

"Get Your Goat" is the theme being carried out by the Hamilton Coryell and Bosque Baptist Brotherhood Associations in their effort to secure 225 real live goats to put on the Buckner Boys Ranch near Burnet.

The drive started in May, and will continue thru June. Hamilton County has a quota of 75 goats.

Richmond Herrington of Hico and Leon Wren of Hamilton are leading the local effort. M. O. Cheek of Waco is in charge of the Central Texas project to secure a total of 500 goats to be placed on the ranch.

"This is not a drive for money, but for goats," Mr. Cheek said. He added that if anyone wanted to give \$8.00, the amount would be counted as one goat.

The project is or a worthy cause and anyone in this area who would like to give a goat to the ranch is urged to contact Mr. Herrington at the earliest possible time.

### June 8th Last Day For Turkey Growers To File Certification

Turkey growers are reminded that June 8 is the last date they may file certification of turkeys marketed in 1961. To be eligible to vote, certification must be filed, or mailed to the County ASCS office by June 8. Voting will be at the County ASCS office from June 8 to June 22. All producers who file certification will be permitted to vote.

Certification of turkeys marketed in 1961 forms have been mailed to all known turkey growers. If you marketed turkeys in 1961 and have not received a form you may obtain one upon request.

## Dedication of New Duffau Bridge Held Last Thursday

(Contributed)  
 "Farm to market roads just don't happen," R. W. Crook of Fort Worth, assistant district highway engineer declared in a talk late Thursday afternoon at the dedication of the new bridge across Big Duffau Creek a half mile north of Duffau on the new farm to market road which has been completed from Johnsville to Duffau. Crook said approximately \$250,000 has been spent of FM roads to connect Duffau with main highways. One reason Erath County has 161 miles of FM roads, more than any other county in this nine-county highway district, is because citizens of the county have never been bashful about furnishing right of way for the roads, Crook commented.

The highway engineer also pointed out that after the roads are built they have to be maintained. He had words of praise for Joe Derrick, maintenance superintendent in the Stephenville office and his workers. Crook said approximately \$300,000 per year is spent by the maintenance department in maintaining roads in the county.

J. W. Clements presided at the dedication meeting. Frank Stipe of Duffau welcomed the visitors at the dedication. Stipe pointed out that with completion of the Johnsville-Duffau road there are now three FM arteries leading out of Duffau.

Brad Thompson, president of the Stephenville Chamber of Commerce said construction of the new road represents a look toward the future so that those coming after will have a better place in which to live. Thompson said the Stephenville C of C is pledged to

support the entire area and not just Stephenville. He also called attention to the work done by W. N. Brown as chairman of the C.C. highway committee.

County Judge Lanelle Harbin declared the new road represents another step forward in the progress of the county. She said the new farm road could not have been built without the full cooperation of citizens of the Duffau area.

County Commissioner Roy Falin, in whose precinct the road is located, expressed appreciation for the C.C. other members of the commissioners court and to the highway department personnel for the roles they played in helping get the road built.

Clements then introduced Geo. Black, resident engineer in the Stephenville office. Black pointed out that many were involved in getting the new road built. He said that initial planning started two years ago when Thomas Hooks started drawing plans for the road. Black introduced A. M. Gibson of Fort Worth, district highway construction engineer.

A highway department truck bed served as a speakers stand. Among those seated on the stand in addition to those on the program were County Commissions Drew Mauldin and W. W. LaBaume. The Erath County Electric Coop furnished the speaker system. Mr. Clements also expressed appreciation to Mrs. Stanley Roach and Postmistress Davis for their cooperation on helping with the program. Refreshments were served by Stephenville National Guard Unit.

Approximately 200 persons were present for the dedication program.

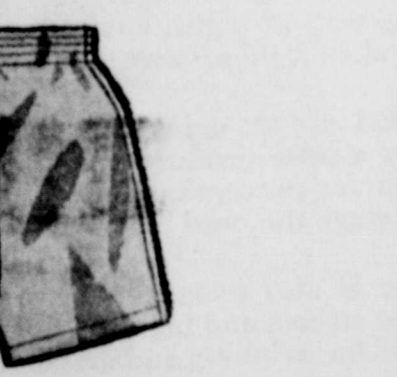

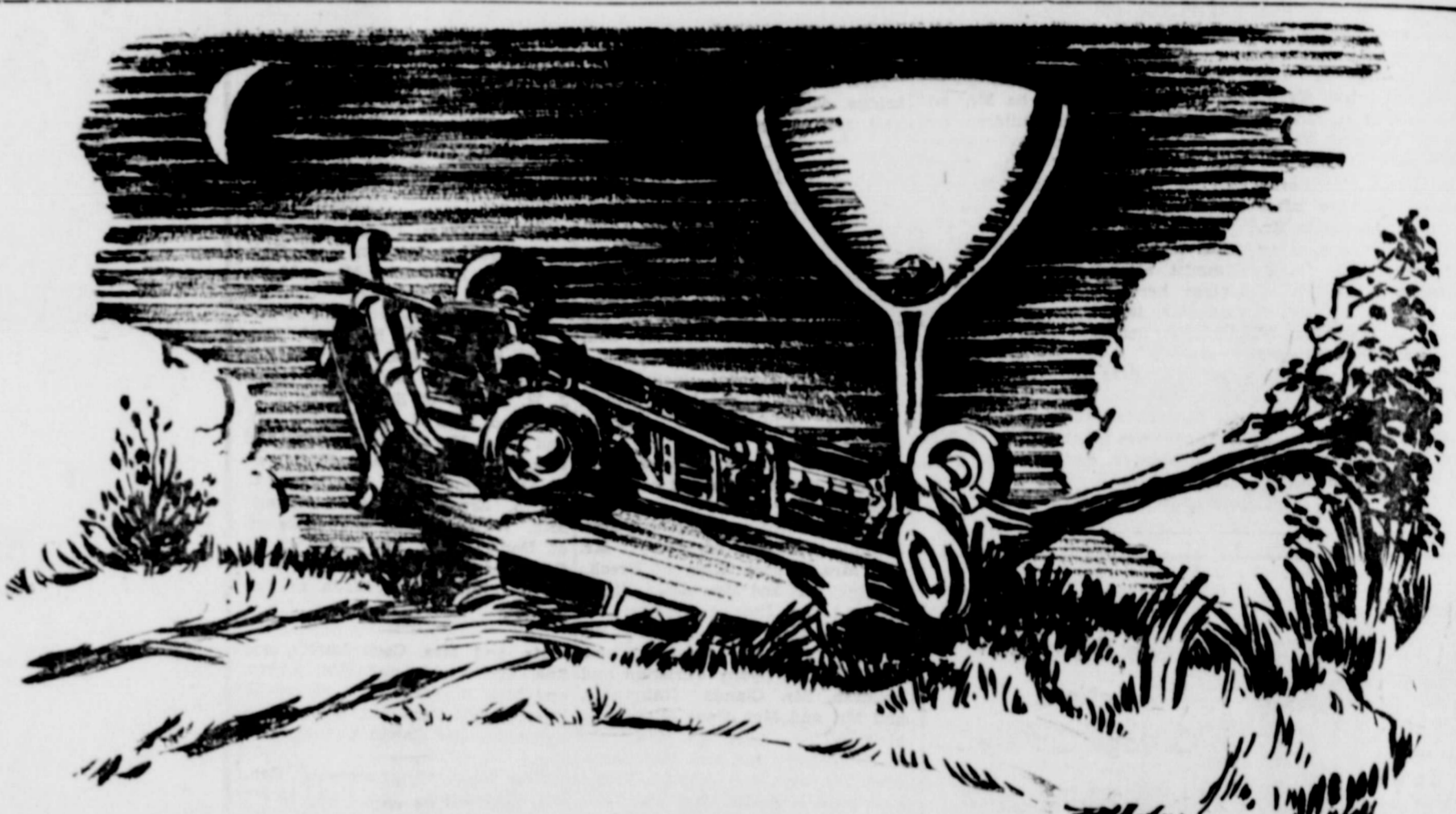

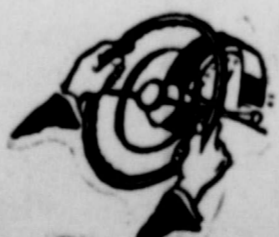

More than a million dollars! That was the cost last year of removing litter from highway rights of way. Vandalism of signs and other highway property cost another \$450,000. The Texas Highway Department urges Texans this year to help keep the state's "front yards" clean by disposing of travel trash in the proper receptacles.

**Two Million Spent to Clear Texas Highways of Litter**

Almost two million dollars—funds that could have built 72 miles of farm to market roads or 24 miles of two-lane primary highways—had to be spent by the Texas Highway Department to remove litter from the highways and repair vandalism damage last year.

This is much like a man throwing trash in his own yard and then paying someone to pick it up, for Texas motorists are covering the "front yards" of their state with a trail of trash and then "footing the bill" to have it cleaned up. Last year the Highway Department had to spend \$1,244,000 to remove this unsightly and unsanitary mess from the roadsides.

In addition, sign vandalism accounted for another \$385,900. Other vandalism totaled \$70,000 bringing the total for litter removal and vandalism to \$1,799,900.

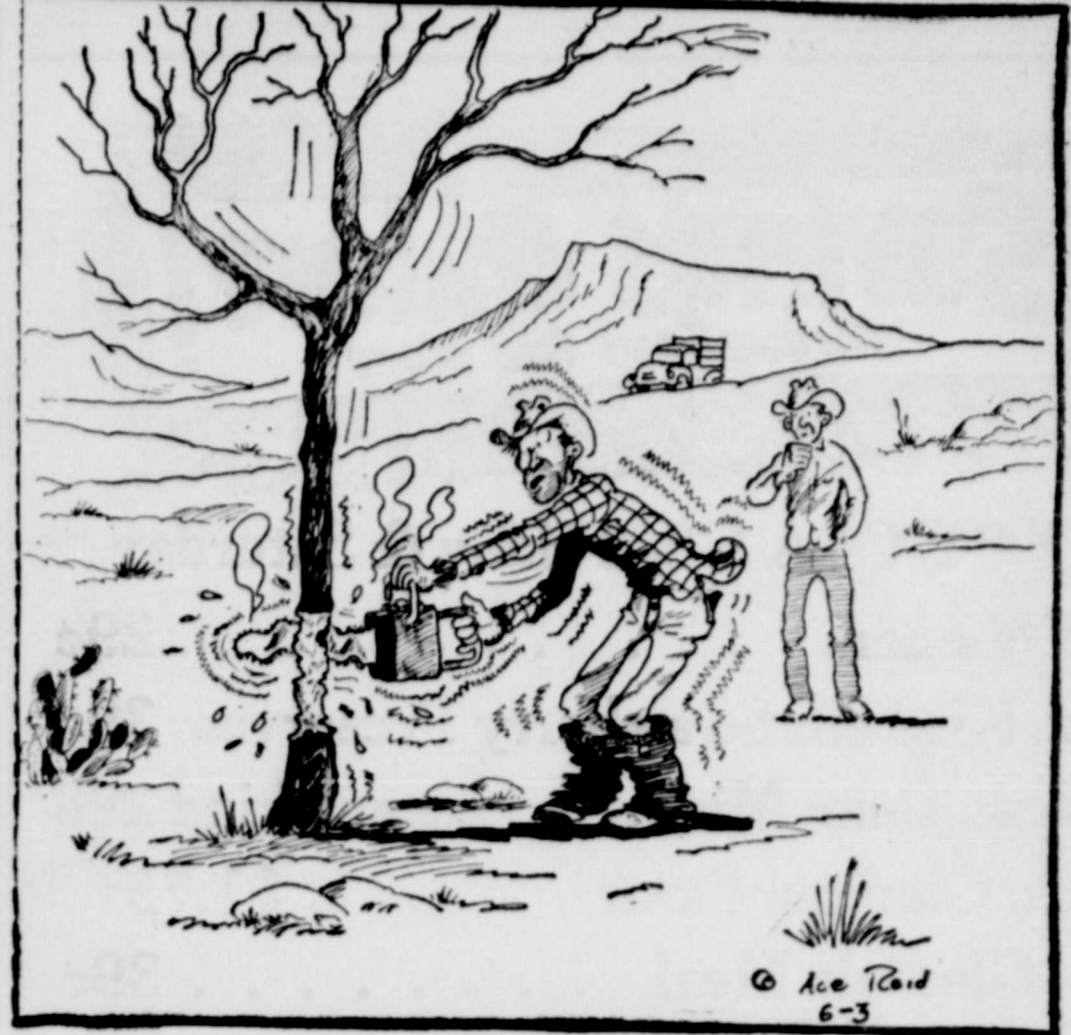
Vandalism, according to the Highway Department classification, covers such items as damaging and destroying signs and sign supports, marking on structures, and damaging safety rest areas (roadside parks). Litter includes beer cans, watermelon rinds, bottles, wrappers, newspapers, milk cartons and cigarette packages.

The litter problem is more or less localized to certain sections of highways along the more heavily traveled routes and the urban areas. It is believed that people are more likely to throw trash from their cars when they travel the same route every day. Also, roads leading from "wet" counties to "dry" counties come under heavy bombardment of cans and bottles.

At the present time, well traveled federal and state highways are cleaned about three or four times a year, farm to market roads once or twice a year. Freeways in the urban areas require much more mowing and cleaning.

Highway engineers are constantly seeking new methods or machines that will help remove the mess from highways, but so far the
