Clinton Defeats Shanon for State Representative Post

McClinton of Oglesby led a 1500 vote margin over Shanon of Stephenville in Saturday's second primary for the post of State Representative, 53rd District.

McClinton, the darkhorse candidate at the beginning of the campaign early this year, came out victorious over three other candidates in the two primaries. He led the first primary balloting.

He is the first representative to be elected from Coryell County since the late Earl Huddleston, D., so from Oglesby, resigned several years ago.

In the Hico box voters favored McClinton 160 to 45.

Hico voters also favored John Connally in the governor's race; Preston Smith for Lt. Governor; Waggoner Carr for Attorney General; and Joe Pool as Congressman-at-Large.

A total of 205 votes were cast in the election, presided over by A. A. Brown.

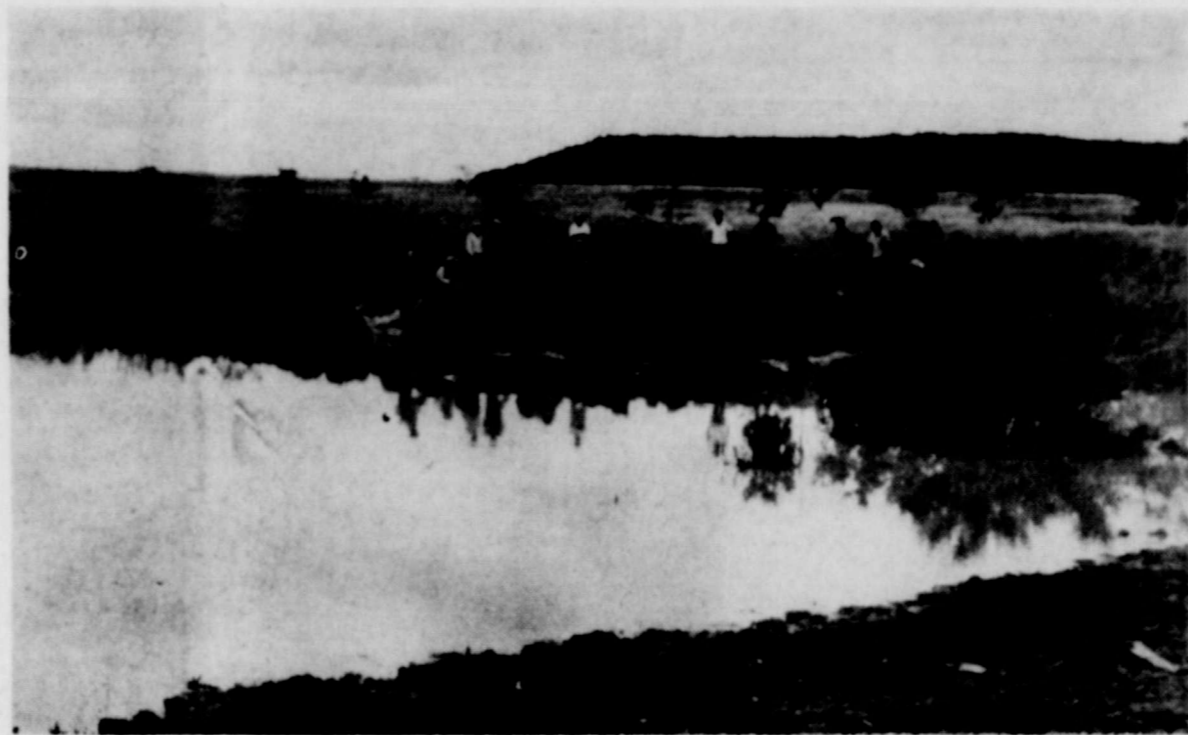
Riding Club Meeting Set Here Saturday Night

Navy Commander Killed When Jet Crashes Here

Commander was killed in the latest crash.

Lt. Commander Warren L. Hoagland, a veteran of 20 years Naval service, was killed last Friday night near Hico when his jet plane crashed eight miles south of Hico.

Site of the crash was on the Bill Boyd Ranch, only a few hundred yards from the site of a private plane crash on May 1, 1958 that took the lives of three occupants.

The Navy jet plowed into the ground on the bank of a stock pond, carving a crater 39 feet wide and about 12 feet deep. The craft exploded and burned upon impact.

First on the scene after the crash was Virgil Parker, who resides about a mile and a half south of the crash site. He saw the flames shooting high into the air, and, accompanied by Ernest McCoy, who lives about half a mile down the road from the scene, they discovered the wreckage. McCoy had discovered the wreckage of the light plane which crashed four years ago.

Sheriff Wood Young was notified, and he in turn notified Air Force officials at James Connally AFB, Waco. A team of investigators from that base arrived on the scene about 1 a.m. Saturday morning and made preliminary investigations.

A Navy investigation team from Grand Prairie NAS arrived in Hico later Saturday and took charge of salvage operations.

Wreckage from the Navy jet was strewn over a 200-yard area in the Boyd pasture. The stock pond was drained by the investigators looking for parts of the plane which might lead to some clue of what happened to cause the crash.

Lt. Commander Hoagland was on a routine cross-country training flight from his base at Jacksonville, Florida. Destination was Yuma, Arizona. He had fueled the plane at Shreveport, La., shortly before the crash.

Investigators continued to probe into the wreckage area through Tuesday of this week.

Hundreds of people converged on the scene Friday night and Saturday. Spectators were turned back late Saturday, and no one except those on official business were permitted at the scene.

Dairy Farmers Promote Their Own Products

Today's dairy farmer does more than just milk his cows. He is a businessman with a large capital investment, a marketing expert, and active participant in cooperative ventures related to his livelihood, and a voluntary contributor to his own promotional service, the American Dairy Association.

Many years ago the dairyman realized his responsibility for his milk didn't end at the creamery. He knew he must have a profitable market for his product, and that milk would meet severe product competition in the supermarket. In 1940, the American Dairy Association was formed to "speak up" for milk and milk products in the market places of the nation on behalf of the dairy farmer.

The American Dairy Association is a farmer-financed, farmer-controlled program existing solely for the purpose of expanding the sales of all dairy foods through a promotional program of non-brand advertising, trade publicity, merchandising, public relations and research.

The rapid growth of the Association in its relatively short history is the best testimonial to the success of the idea. The dairy farmers own association, which began operating with six member states, now includes 49 states in its membership.

The goal of the Association is to improve dairy food sales by serving as an effective "Voice of the Dairy Farmers in the Market Places of America," reminding the nation's consumers of the tremendous nutritional bargains available to them when they buy dairy foods.

Today's dairy farmer does much more than just milk his cows. Dairy farmers in the Hico area are this month observing the 26th anniversary of June Dairy Month. No special programs are planned, but any of the 40 odd operations in this area would welcome visitors during this period.

Dairy Foods Are June's Best Buys For Food Shoppers

June Dairy Month is celebrating its 26th anniversary this month. The purpose of the popular yearly event is to salute the dairy industry of America. June Dairy Month is also geared to awaken the American people to the need for using dairy products for proper nutrition and diet habits.

Last year 17 and a half million cows on over a million dairy farms produced nearly 57 billion quarts of milk. The June Dairy Month celebration coincides with the busiest season in dairying, when milk production is at its peak in many parts of the country.

Every American consumed the equivalent of over 640 pounds of milk in all forms last year.

Studies of consumer food expenditures showed that for the 19 cents of the "market basket dollar" that Americans spent on milk and milk products, the American family obtained 23 to 26 percent of their calories, 40 to 45 percent of their protein, 75 to 84 percent of their calcium 59 to 76 percent of

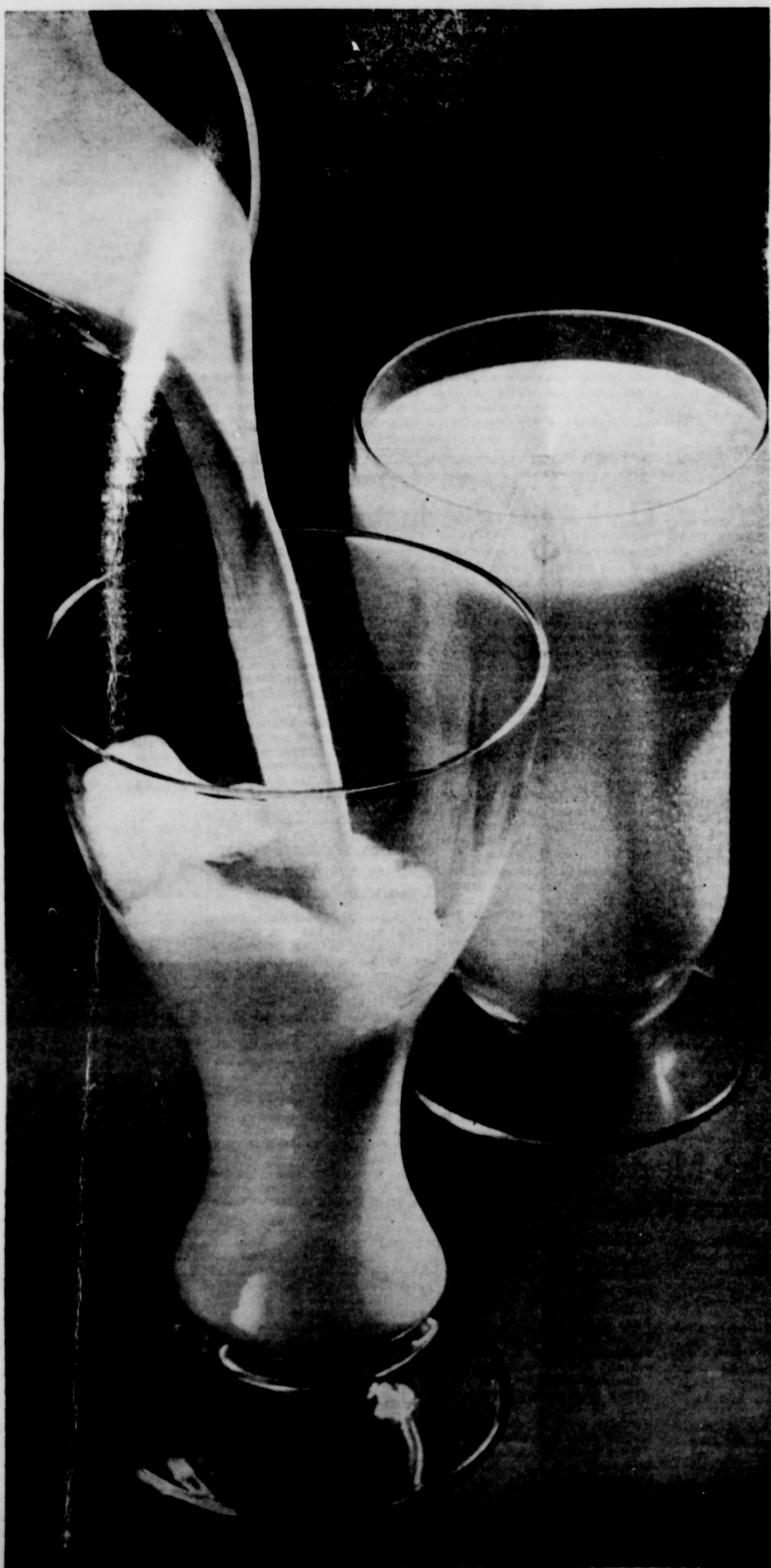
their riboflavin, 35 to 39 percent of the Vitamin A, 18 to 19 percent of their thiamine and 5 to 6 percent of their iron and niacin.

"I have long been convinced that milk is an important part of good health," commented President Kennedy at the Milk and Dairy Conference held in Washington last January. "This has led me to believe that milk should be served at the White House meal from now on. And I expect that all of us will benefit from it."

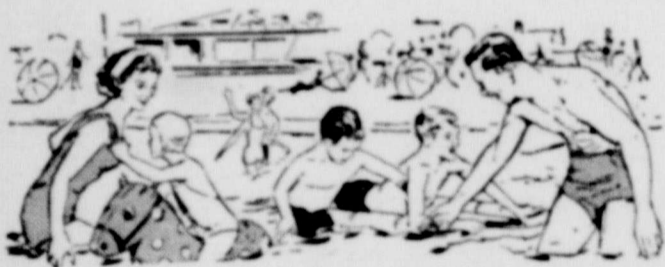

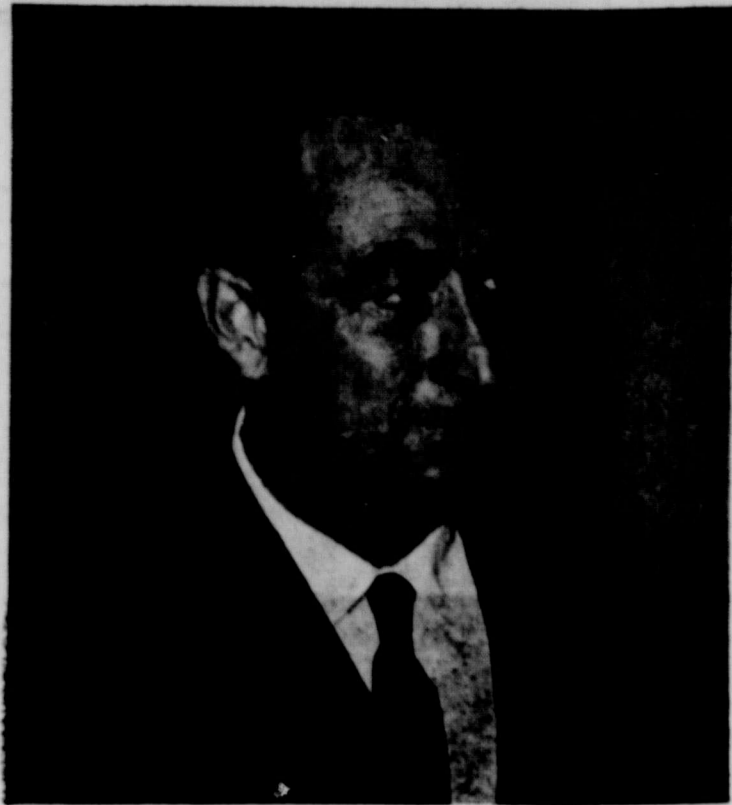

Milk Products Provide 28% of Food Supply

Milk and foods made from milk including butter, supplied approximately 28 percent of the total American food supply in 1960, according to a spokesman for the United States Department of Agriculture.

This estimate was based on the retail weight of all foods. The USDA figures that each American can eat an average of 1,488 pounds of food. Dairy products provided more of the total food supply than any other category.

In 1960, the estimates indicate, per capita consumption of milk in all forms except butter—as milk, ice cream, cheese, evaporated milk, nonfat dry milk—was 414 pounds on a product weight basis.

The government estimates that each American in 1960 consumed about 8.2 pounds of cheese, 18.4 pounds of ice cream and 6.2 pounds of nonfat dry milk. Fluid milk and cream consumption per person in 1960 is estimated at 342 pounds per person (about 159

quarts). Evaporated milk was 11.5 pounds per person and cottage cheese was over 5 pounds in 1960.

USDA estimates indicate also that the 28 percent of the total food supplied by dairy products took only about 19 cents out of each food dollar in 1960. The total "market basket" cost in 1960 was figured at \$1,051.70. This is based on the retail cost of average quantities of farm foods purchased per urban wage earner and clerical worker family in 1962, calculated from retail prices collected by the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

The dairy products cost this family, on the average, \$199.57. The dairy products in the American diet are also a nutritional bargain with milk and milk products being the primary source of such essential nutrients as calcium and riboflavin. Milk also supplies a major share—26 per cent—of the high quality animal protein in the American diet, as well as Vitamins A and D and other B vitamins.

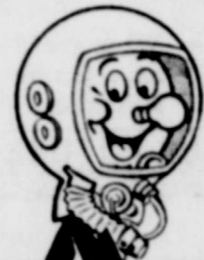
