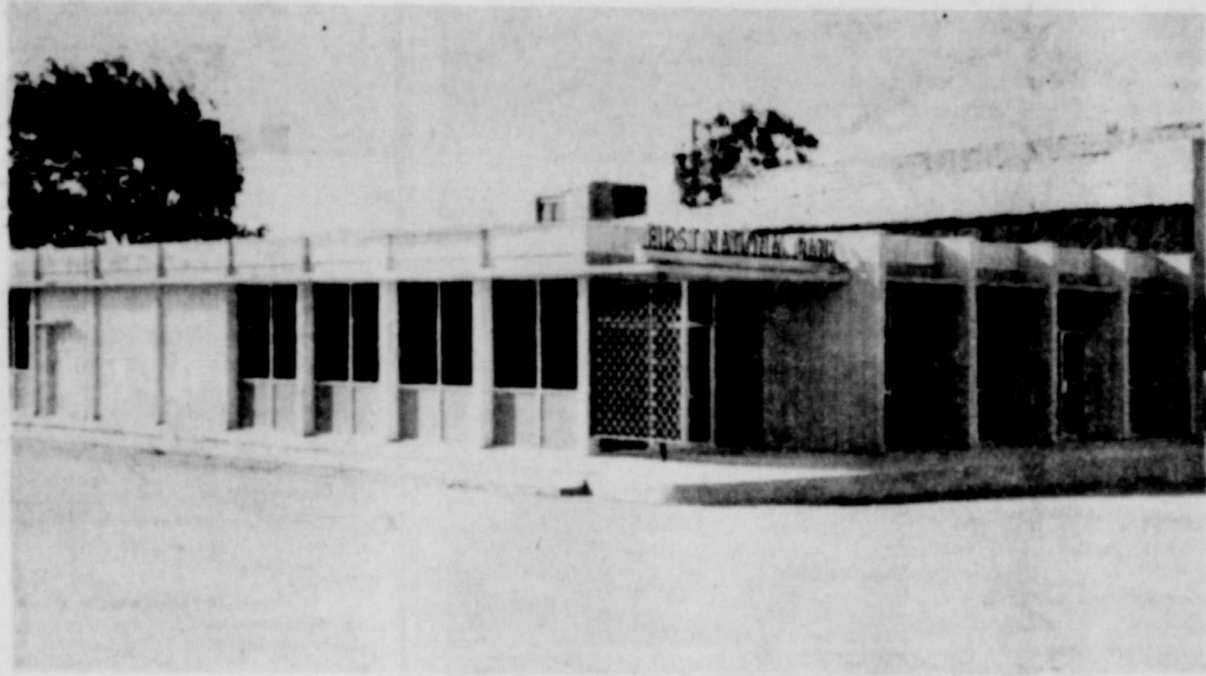

WE'VE MOVED!

First National Bank, News Review, Open In New Quarters Monday



NEW BANK—Ultra-modern in every respect, the First National Bank building was opened for business Monday of this week. The new bank quarters contains more than 3400 square feet of floor space, including the new modern Petsick Insurance Agency.

Two moves during the past week put two of Hico's oldest business establishments in new quarters, culminating over two years of planning for both institutions.

First National Bank completed moving operations Saturday night to their new ultra-modern facilities located up the street on the corner of Main and Highway 6.

The Hico News Review, oldest business establishment in Hico, completed moving Saturday to its new quarters across from Howard Drug and H&B Grocery, also on main street.

Also included in the move to new quarters was Petsick Insurance Agency, which is now in new facilities adjoining the new bank building.

The bank, newspaper and insurance agency opened for business in new quarters Monday morning.

Planning for the new bank facilities began several years ago, but only this year did the plans shape up to a point where construction was begun. Contract for the new building was awarded early in the year, with construction starting shortly afterwards. W. H. Barsh of Waco was contractor for the building, with Biehelmer and Calamet as architects.

The air-conditioned building contains 3,450 square feet of floor space and is constructed of white brick. One of the features of the new building is a directors room which will also be available as a com-

munity room for meetings, etc.

Work on the new bank actually started around January 1 of this year, with the contract calling for 130 working days. The building was accepted two weeks ago from the contractor.

The new News Review building contains 2300 square feet of floor space and construction was started in April. Boyd McClure was contractor. Of tile and brick, the plant features a lobby, two offices, and is air conditioned and dust proof.

The new plant is located on the lot which formerly was a part of the Russell Estate.

Odis Petsick is president of First National, and Mr. and Mrs. E. V. Meador are publishers of the News Review.

Doty stressed the fact that the booth sales was a Civic Club project, with proceeds going for the betterment of the community.

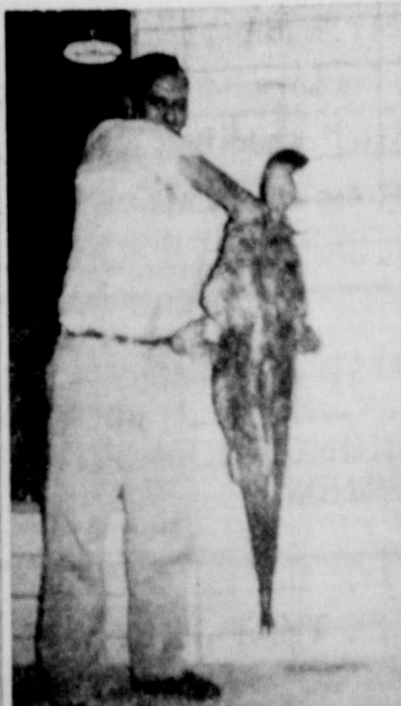

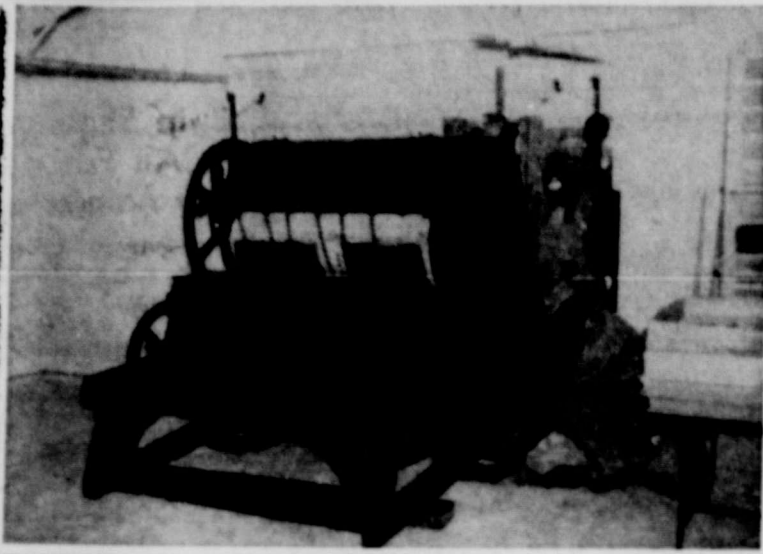
