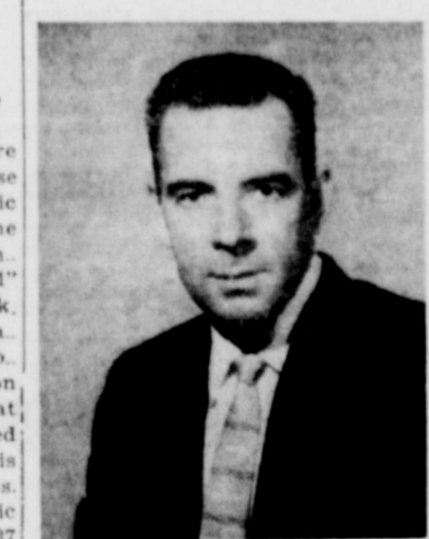

Area Rural Traffic Deaths on Uprise Compared to Last Year

Stephenville, July 11.—There has been a 50 percent increase in the number of rural traffic deaths in this area during the first six months of 1962 as compared to the same period of 1961. Sgt. A. A. Eggen said this week. Sgt. Eggen, Texas Highway Patrol Supervisor for Hamilton, Comanche, Erath, Hood, Johnson, and Somervell Counties said that he and his patrolmen investigated 247 rural traffic crashes in this area during the first six months. As a result of these 247 traffic crashes, there were 5 deaths, 137 people injured, and there was an estimated property damage of \$154,189.00. For the same period of 1961, there has been 270 traffic crashes reported, causing death to 10 persons, injury to 136 and causing an estimated property damage of \$193,667.00.

Fort Worth, July 11.—Thomas E. Pratt, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Pratt of Cleveland, Texas, will receive the Bachelor of Divinity degree from Southwestern Seminary, Pratt is pastor of First Baptist Church in Hico. Dr. James E. Coggin, pastor of Travis Avenue Baptist Church, Fort Worth, will deliver the commencement address during services beginning at 10 a.m. July 20 in Truett Auditorium. His subject will be "You, Your Gift, Your Doctrine." President Robert E. Naylor will present degrees and diplomas to approximately 115 candidates. Southwestern Seminary, the largest evangelical seminary in the world, enrolled 2067 students in 1961-62. Founded in 1908 the seminary is an agency of the Southern Baptist Convention.

5. Entries will be judged on poise, personality and beauty, with the five finalists competing in a talent division.
6. Registration fee of \$3.50 must be paid in advance to Reunion Association, and contestants will not be qualified until fee has been paid.
7. Entry fee and photograph of contestant must be turned in at the same time to Mrs. Pitts. (Photograph should not be larger than 3x5 and should be a glossy print.)
8. Judging will be by out of town judges.

Screwworm Control Program Well Underway In State

The first box of sterile screw worm flies from the new production plant at Mission came off the assembly line last week and were released over Southern Texas by Friday.

"This is a great day in the short history of the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program" Dr. G. D. Stallworth, supervising veterinarian for the Texas Animal Health Commission said. "It is second in importance only to the day when we will turn out the last box of flies that will complete the eradication program."

Sexual sterility of screwworm flies is accomplished by subjecting pupae to radiation from cobalt 60,

which emits gamma rays. Pupae are then packaged in cartons, held until they emerge as flies, and then dropped by airplane. About 3 to 5 percent of the total fly production is not sterilized and provides brood stock for continued production. The fly colony was established on Sunday, June 17 the day after formal dedication of the plant. All operations of the plant are timed to coincide with the normal life cycle of the screwworm.

"We now have a plant to produce from 50 up to 75 million sterile flies per week, the volume needed for eradication of this costly livestock pest in the Southwest," Marvin J. Bridges, executive director of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation commented.

"The increased supply of sterile flies from this plant will not only greatly strengthen the eradication effort, but also will provide flies for future tests on establishing and maintaining a barrier zone to be formed by continuously releasing sterile flies along portions of the U.S. Mexico border" Dr. S. C. Gartman, assistant veterinarian in charge, Animal Disease Eradication Division, US Department of Agriculture added.

Program officials outlined these plans for the months ahead. The temporary facilities at Kerrville will continue to produce about 23 million flies per week as production at the Mission plant is increased. The Kerrville unit will be gradually closed and personnel and equipment transferred to

Mission. Plans are for the Mission plant to build up to around 50 million flies per week within the next 2 to 3 months, the average production called for in the program budget. This will then be increased for a short period to the 75 million capacity.

This production will provide for release of sterile flies in those areas where overwintering populations must be eliminated, where cutting outbreaks threaten to spill over into an area already free of screwworms, and to maintain the artificial barrier. Flies will not be used in areas where cold weather can be expected to eliminate in a short time any threat

to a screwworm-free overwintering area.

Flies are now being released in Texas over a 60,000 square mile area below a line that runs from Del Rio northeast to Coleman, east to Comanche, and southeast to Port O'Conner, plus 7,000 sq. miles in southern New Mexico.

However, fly release will remain flexible because of unpredictable circumstances. For example, the size of the screwworm overwintering area varies with the severity of the winters. Also, shipments of infested livestock could also cause premature spring outbreaks in northern portions and require concentrated fly release for quick control.

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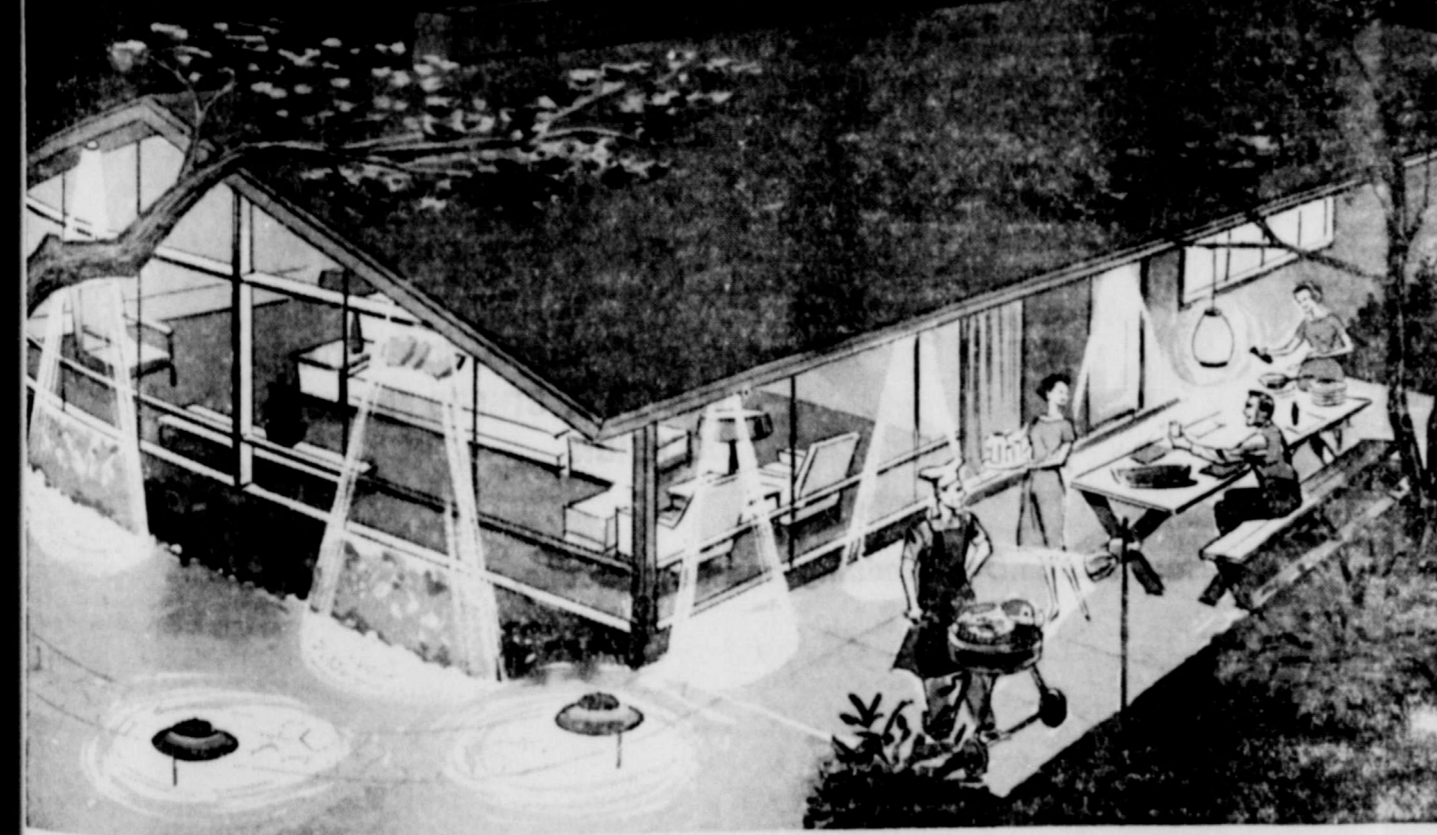

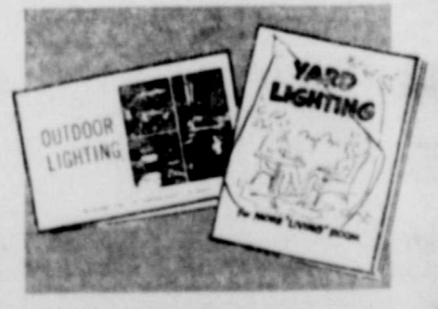

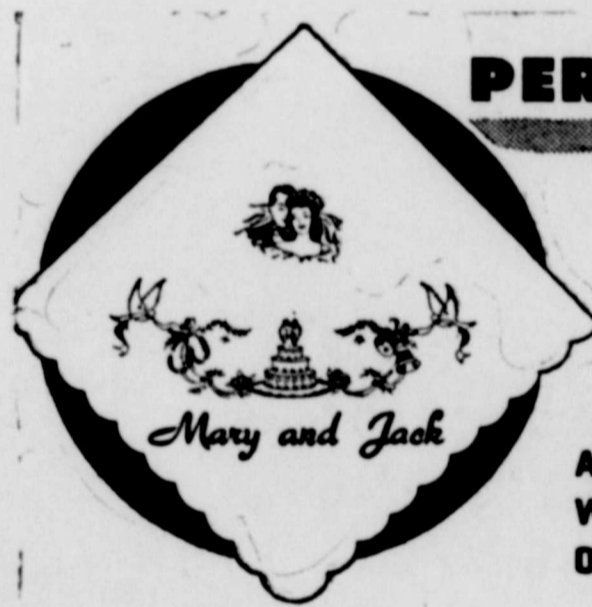

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By E. R. LAWRENCE

Next Wednesday afternoon, July 18 at 1 o'clock on the Bill Stearman ranch a few miles northeast of Fairy we will be working his cattle for this year's performance test. Ranchers and stockmen are invited to come over.

At the ranch calves will be cut from the cows, weighed, numbered and graded. After this is done, each calf will be given an adjusted weight based on an age of 205 days. With this information Bill can then tell which cows are doing the best job raising calves for him.

Bill has been doing this work for a number of years now and has some fine records on his cow herd. However he is finding out that as a rule, the same cow produces the better calves each year, and from year to year.

Stearman is also feed testing some of his bull calves for daily rate of gain. With this information he is well prepared to mate certain cows with certain bulls to arrive at a much better calf.

worm cases have increased. To eradicate this trouble, stockmen of the state are asked to continue with this cooperation.

With the new fly producing plant in operation at Mission, 75 to 100 million flies are produced each week and these are turned loose over the state.

Perhaps most of you have received through the mail a card, Form 2240, Claim for Refund of Federal Tax on Gasoline used on a farm. Those of you who filed a claim or a refund last year should have gotten one of these cards through the mail.

Now if you haven't and don't get one in a few days, come by the office and pick one up and make a claim for the refund. The refund is four cents a gallon and with most farm or ranch operators this refund can mean a sizeable return in dollars. The cards are on the desk where my typewriter is and are next to the box of screwworm sample bottles. Under the cards is another sheet that is also to be taken and filled out for your records.

According to the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, accidents are the leading killers of young people from ages 1 to 36 and rank fourth in total deaths. No purpose is served by accident losses, says the council, and most can be prevented.

Safety is no accident and the accomplishments of rural leaders and cooperating farm families and the organizations in their work to reduce accidents was cited by the council. During the past decade an 11 percent decrease in the farm resident death rate has resulted from this cooperative effort.

July 22-28 is National Farm Safety Week and the theme for the week is "Family Safety at Work and Play."

But, warns the council we still have a long way to go to give farming and ranching a safety record equal to other national industries. Until every rural resident makes safety his business our cooperative efforts must be continued they added.

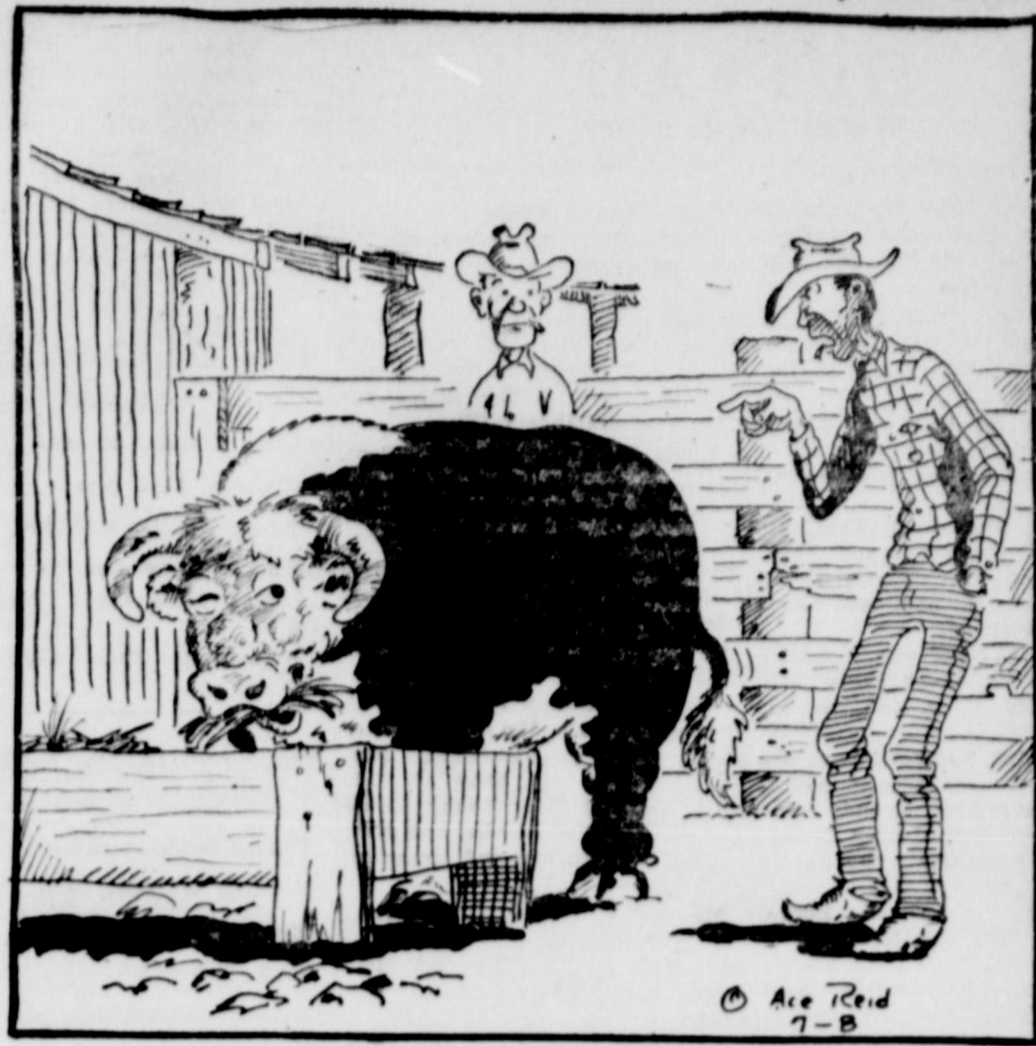
