DONLEY HOME DESTROYED

Rash of Fires Keep Local Department on The Run

An early morning blaze destroyed the home of Sgt. and Mrs. W. B. Donley near Hico early Sunday. Firemen answered the call around 1:15 p.m., but the blaze was too far advanced. A few furnishings were saved, but majority of the furniture was destroyed. Cause of the fire is unknown. The Donley family, who reside in Huntsville where the sergeant is stationed, were not in Hico at the time of the fire. The alarm was sounded again

at 6:15 a.m. when the smoldering embers started blazing at the residence. **Grass Fire at Ratliffs** Local firemen were called again Sunday morning at 9 o'clock to extinguish a grass fire at the home of Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Ratliff. The fire was extinguished before serious damage was caused to outbuildings. **200 Acres Burn Off** Firemen were called last Thursday to the ranch owned by Mrs. C. L. Woodward, known as the Copeiland Ranch in the Falls Creek community, to fight a grass fire that destroyed approximately 200 acres of grassland before it was brought under control. They were called to the ranch again Saturday to extinguish another grass fire.

The 76th Annual Old Settlers Reunion will be officially kicked off Wednesday afternoon at 6 o'clock with the traditional parade signaling the start of the oldest homecoming event in the state. Prior to the parade riders from the Hamilton Sheriffs Posse, the Meridian, Granbury and Hico Riding clubs will engage in a Pony Express race starting at 3 p.m. Two teams will line up on either side of Highways 220 and 6, and each rider will compete for one-half mile to a finishing point at the City Limits. The teams will race eight miles for the \$25 prize. The Pony Express ride was inaugurated three years ago when members of the Hamilton Posse rode the 20 miles from that city bringing greetings from the County seat to Hico citizens. Kenneth Southall has been named Parade Marshal by Reunion Manager Billy Doty. Entries will form on north main street as early as possible. The parade route will continue down main to railroad, back up the street and past the nursing home. The route was planned in order that residents of the home might have an opportunity to view the entries. Parade prize money has not been announced by Doty, but premiums similar to last year's will be presented to winners. Last year a total of \$130.00 was given away. Judge J. C. Barrow will act as master of ceremonies for the parade, and will give the traditional welcome address. Following the parade activities will get under way at City Park at 8:15 p.m. with the fifth annual Miss Reunion contest. Nineteen hopefuls are entered in the beauty pageant. Other activities Wednesday night will include awarding of parade prizes, plus added entertainment. Western music will be features of the free entertainment both Thursday and Friday nights, and the Old Fiddlers contest will wind up activities Saturday night. All entertainment will begin approximately at 8:15 p.m. A feature of this year's display area will be a joint Navy and Marine Corp exhibit. Carnival attraction this year is by Don Franklin Shows of San Antonio, formerly Big State Shows who played here last year.

1931 People Trek Through SOS Lines

The sign at the city limits reads "Hico, Population 1020." That sign is certainly not indicative of the cooperative power of Hico and this area as 1931 people streamed through the line Sunday to take the new Sabine Oral Polio Vaccine. The figure far outstripped all expectations, and was a gratifying sight as people, young and old, formed a steady line at the school cafeteria during the 12 noon to 7 p.m. hours. The program, sponsored locally by the Hico Civic Club, in cooperation with the Tri-County Medical Society, was also carried out at Stephenville, Dublin, DeLeon, and Glen Rose. Population-wise, Hico had the greatest percentage of the day. Breakdown on the towns part-

icipating was given unofficially as follows: Hico ... 1931 Dublin ... 2882 DeLeon ... 1155 Stephenville ... 5248 Dr. B. C. Dayton, who was in charge of local administration, gave the following breakdown on age bracketing of those who took the vaccine: Age 1 and under, 29 Age 1-5, 183 Age 6-14, 351 Age 15-19, 160 Age 20-39, 382 Age 40 and over, 826 In the four participating towns named above a total of 11,216 doses of the vaccine was administered. The sponsoring organizations had purchased 14,000 doses and were hopeful of administering at least

two-thirds of that amount. The vaccine was administered free with contributions accepted if people desired to help offset the actual cost of the serum. The vaccine cost about 25c per dose. The vaccine will be administered again this Sunday, August 5, from 12 noon until 7 p.m. at the school cafeteria. Leaders and supporters of the drive urge all persons in this area who failed to take the vaccine last week, to make a special effort to do so this Sunday. N.R. Correspondent Has Seen Many Changes At Fairy During Last 58 Years

Since we are having to send in an early newsletter this week and news items may be scarce we will take this opportunity to give a short history of the little village town of Fairy as we saw it some 58 years ago, having lived in sight of our little town only three-fourths mile away since 1904.

We have seen many changes take place and often think of the good old days we enjoyed back in those years. In 1904 Fairy could boast of two good general merchandise stores, one operated by Sid Jenkins and his uncle Tom Phelps. The other by the late John G. Fort. Later the Fort store was owned by Nona Leeth of Hico and later an interest sold to M. E. Parks of Fairy and the store was known as Leeth & Parks. Later Mr. Leeth sold out to Mr. Parks and moved to Hico. For a time the store was known as Parks Bros. when C. C. Parks bought half interest in the store. Then came the two sons of the M. E. Parks, Audie and Elzie who purchased an interest in the business as their uncle had sold his interest. Then the store was known as M. E. Parks & Sons.

In 1951 the father passed away and the boys continued to operate the store as Parks Bros. The store was twice destroyed by fire. The last time it was not rebuilt and we lost the main link of our town in this loss.

Thriving Little City
Back in those early days we had two drug stores, the Dr. S. W. Young and another operated by the late S. H. (Sam) Cooper.

We could boast a hotel, operated by the late Mr. and Mrs. D. L. Trimmer and her sister, Miss Sallie Morgan. Another sister, who also made her home at the Trimmer Hotel was Mrs. Wright, who also operated a millinery shop in Fairy.

We had a barber shop, and at one time there were two, operated first by the late Frank Spencer. Others were Gerald Licett, Jim Jacobs, Herman Sills and probably others. We had a confectionery operated by the late Tom Wilson, later by Charlie (Skeet) Hackett, Bill McGlothlin, Ed Allison and Otto Jordan. There was a post office with the following postmasters, A. P. Rainey, W. E. Goynes, Ed Allison. Mr. Goynes served the longest term.

Doctors Traveled in Buggies
We could boast of three doctors in our little town, who were Dr. S. W. Young, Dr. O. J. Colwick and a Dr. Cowan. These were the horse and buggy days. We can still picture in our mind the pair of gray horses Dr. Colwick drove. Then we had a good blacksmith shop and we believe for a short while there were two. These were operated by A. J. Basham, Anderson White, Hovey Blakley, Jeff Newman and probably others. We had four churches, Baptist, Methodist, Church of Christ and Presbyterian. The Presbyterian Church burned some time during the early thirties we believe. Members that were here at that time later moved away or worshipped at the Methodist Church.

Bucket & Dipper Used
Then we had our three room, two story school building. The upper floor was the auditorium in later years. The upper floor was removed and an extra room built on the ground level. We had three teachers and the public open tabernacle, or one of the churches, was used for all public gatherings until the new building was built in 1930. We had no school water system as we have now and school boys carried the water in open buckets on a stick from the public well owned by our father, the late W. T. Newman. Those buckets sat on a bench with an old-time dipper to the bucket. Many are the times we have gone thirsty rather than drink from these buckets, as the little fellows and some times the larger ones would drink only a few swallows from the dipper full of water and back the rest went. Coal or wood was used for fuel, mostly coal. There was no lunch room and pupils living out too far to go home for lunch brought their lunch in mostly the old tin lunch pail. Pupils sat around the building to eat when the weather permitted. Oh those big biscuits of mothers (and they didn't come in a can) with a slice of that good country cured ham or bacon and a piece of fried pie made with those home grown canned or dried peaches and maybe a piece of candy or fresh fruit. There were no buses in those days and many of

the pupils walked a distance of three or more miles, or maybe some would ride horseback or come in a cart or buggy. The Jones boys, Alsa and Elmer and Robert Foster, all of the Lanham community rode horses a distance of 8 miles to attend Fairy school. At that time the late Prof. Ben Randalls was their teacher and also ours, and bless his memory. He was one of the best in our school days. We can still visualize him as he stood before the class trying to make clear to us the subjects in discussion.

Early Roads Impassible

All roads were just dirt roads. Later gravel was put in some of the places which were almost impassible in bad weather. Also there were branches and creeks with no bridges and if it came a flood and you were caught on the other side you just had to wait until the creek ran down. Since we live here near what is called Sycamore Creek we remember one night during a meeting when it came an awful rain and all the members who lived south of this creek stayed in our home the remainder of the night. We had beds and pallets all over the house. Many times our late husband and sons would rig up a team, or in later years, get out the tractor to pull some one out of a mud hole and we had a good one here near our home. Later came the school bus and all bus roads were graveled, but oh, that dust. Then in 1947 surveying began for the 1602 Farm Road which was completed in 1948. This reached from Hico to Highway 22

at Lanham and was later extended to Jonesboro. Then about 1952 or 1953 the 219 Farm Road was completed from Fairy to Cranfills Gap and 1961 the 219 road was extended on to Olin where it made connections with the west end of the road to Dublin.

In the 1930s, we believe around 1938, the late Prof. Will Horsley, who was superintendent of our school at that time, worked hard to secure electricity for our town. Now most homes have electricity. So our little village town can boast of good roads, school and churches. A service station and store, and people who love this little place even though we are now few in number.

Back in 1904 there were few graves in the cemetery. Since that time there has been two additions of ground, and we now have more than 500 graves. So you can see where some of our population has gone. However many of those gone on lived their allotted three score and ten years.

Since has come the tractor, farm control programs which have cut down on the need of farm laborers, therefore our younger men and families have gone elsewhere to seek employment. The cities have claimed most of them.

However seems this scribe never found time. We had very little illness in those days and most minor cases were taken care of at home by the mother.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 25 proposing an Amendment to Section 60 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas to authorize all counties and other political subdivisions of this State to provide insurance for all employees; providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

Section 1. That Section 60 of Article III of the State Constitution be amended to read as follows: "Section 60. The Legislature shall have the power to enact laws to provide insurance for all employees and other political subdivisions of this State to provide insurance for all employees; providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof."

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 60 of Article III of the State Constitution be amended to read as follows: "Section 60. The Legislature shall have the power to enact laws to provide insurance for all employees and other political subdivisions of this State to provide insurance for all employees; providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 22 proposing an amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding a new Section thereto to be known and designated as Section 11, providing for the creation of hospital districts in Ochiltree, Castro, Hansford and Hopkins Counties, each district to be coextensive with the limits of such county, authorizing the levying and rates of taxes; providing for the acquisition of land and properties for hospital uses, as well as the maintenance and operation of the same; and authorizing the issuance of tax bonds for the purpose of the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of improvements; and further providing that any existing Act shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended by adding thereto a new Section to read as follows: "Section 11. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of hospital districts in Ochiltree, Castro, Hansford and Hopkins Counties, each district to be coextensive with the limits of such county. If any such district is created, it may be authorized to levy a tax not to exceed Seventy-five Cents (75¢) on the One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property within the district; provided, however, no tax may be levied until approved by a majority vote of the participating resident qualified property-taxpaying voters who have duly rendered their property for taxation. The maximum rate of tax may be changed at subsequent elections so long as obligations are not impaired, and not to exceed the maximum limit of Seventy-five Cents (75¢) per One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation."

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 51 proposing an Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new Section to be known and designated as Section 9, which shall read as follows: "Section 9. The Legislature may by law provide for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of hospital districts composed of one or more counties or all or any part of one or more counties with power to issue bonds for the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of buildings and improvements and equipping same, for hospital purposes; providing for the transfer to the hospital district of the title to any land, buildings, improvements and equipment located wholly within the district which may be jointly or separately owned by any city, town or county; providing that any district so created shall assume full responsibility for providing medical and hospital care for its needy inhabitants and assume the outstanding indebtedness incurred by cities, towns and counties for hospital purposes prior to the creation of the district, if same are located wholly within its boundaries, and a pro rata portion of such indebtedness based upon the then last approved tax assessment rolls of the included cities, towns and counties if less

than all the territory thereof is included within the district boundaries; providing that after its creation no other municipality or political subdivision shall have the power to levy taxes or issue bonds or other obligations for hospital purposes or for providing medical care within the boundaries of the district; providing for the levy of annual taxes at a rate not to exceed seventy-five cents (75¢) on the one hundred dollar valuation of all taxable property within such district for the purpose of meeting the requirements of the district's bonds, the indebtedness assumed by it and its maintenance and operating expense; providing that such district shall not be created or such tax authorized unless approved by a majority of the qualified property-taxpaying electors thereof voting at an election called for the purpose and providing further that the support and maintenance of the district's hospital system shall never become a charge against or obligation of the State of Texas nor shall any direct appropriation be made by the Legislature for the construction, maintenance or improvement of any of the facilities of such district. "Provided, however, that no district shall be created except by act of the Legislature and then only after thirty (30) days' public notice to the district affected; and in no event may the Legislature provide for a district to be created without the affirmative vote of a majority of the taxing voters in the district concerned."

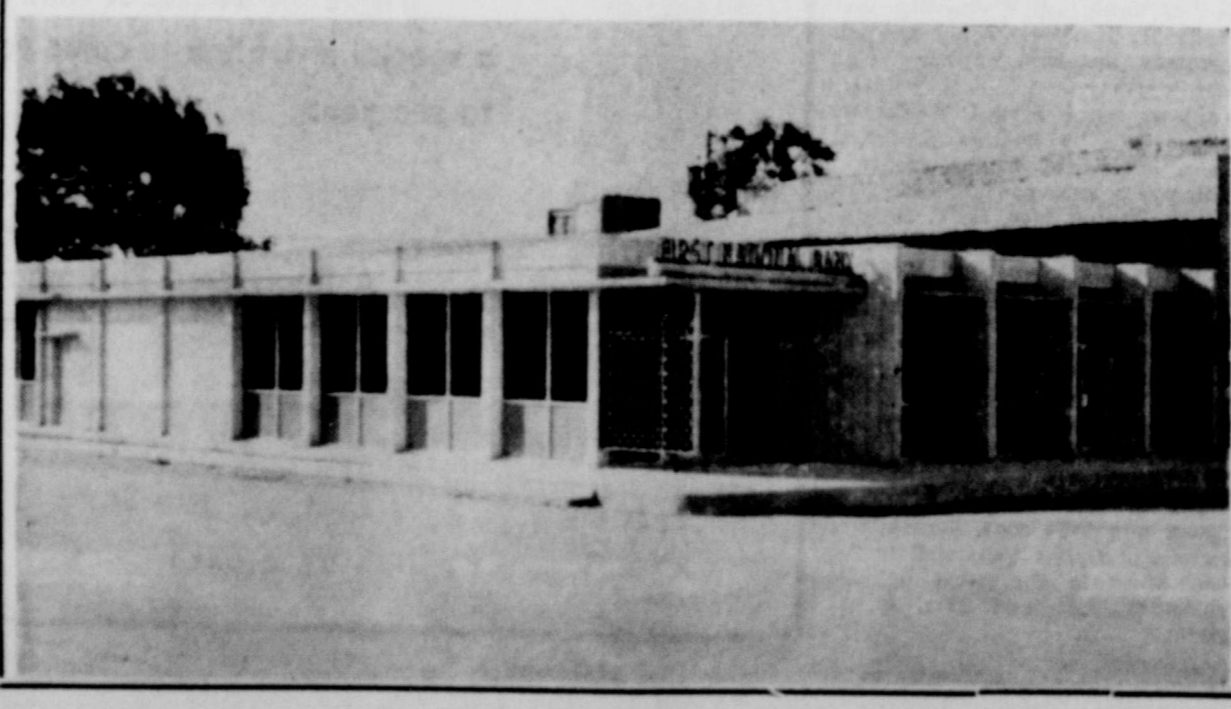

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 26 proposing an Amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas...

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended by adding thereto the following:

"The foregoing notwithstanding, any lands in the Veterans Land Fund which have been first offered for sale to veterans and which have not been sold may be resold to such purchasers, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as are now provided by law, or as may hereafter be provided by law."

"This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 22 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to authorize the Legislature to provide for trial de novo on all appeals to the courts from actions, rulings or decisions of administrative agencies and executive departments of the State of Texas or any of its political subdivisions.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That the Constitution of Texas be and same is hereby amended by the addition to Article II of a new Section to be known as Section 2, said new Section 2 to read as follows:

"Section 2. Notwithstanding any other provision of the Constitution, the Legislature shall have the power, by general law, to provide for trials de novo on all appeals from actions, rulings, or decisions of administrative or executive agencies of government."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment granting the Legislature power to provide for trials de novo on all appeals from actions, rulings, or decisions of administrative or executive agencies of government."

If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the times cast therein are for such amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

Sec. 2. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for such election and this amendment shall be held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 28 proposing an Amendment to Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas...

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

"(b) Each county and any other political subdivision of this State shall have the right and the Legislature may enact appropriate regulatory laws to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for its elected and appointive officers and employees; provided same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters voting in such election of the county or other political subdivision. No person shall qualify for benefits unless he shall have served in such capacity for at least twelve (12) years, except for persons otherwise qualified prior to the effective date of this Amendment. The amount contributed by

county to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the county and State.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors in this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, of which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing retirement, disability, and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12) years or more."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing retirement, disability, and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12) years or more."

Sec. 3. Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such legislation shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character.

Sec. 4. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for such election and the Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of the State.
