## Sabin Oral Vaccine Program Postponed Until Later Date

Dr. B. C. Dayton, who is in charge of administering the Sabin Oral Polio Vaccine here, said this week that the Type III vaccine would definitely not be given here until full approval was received from the Tarrant-Dallas Medical societies.

The vaccine was scheduled to be administered here last Sunday, and was cancelled after a controversy arose on the safety of the vaccine. The

program in this area was carried out in cooperation with the Fort Worth, Dallas chapters of the medical society.

The Tarrant County medical group was meeting this week to definitely decide on whether or not the Type III program would be carried out, or by-passed in favor of the Type II serum at this time.

Further information will be given as soon as the details are received.

## Tigers Roll Past Perrin 21-0 For Second Win of Season

In a reversal of form from their first game, the Hico Tigers stayed on the ground for three touchdowns last Friday night to defeat Perrin 21-0 in the home-opener for the locals.

And it was perhaps best that the ground game was going, for Perrin had the locals scouted so well that Quarterback Don Jernigan was able only to complete one pass during the night, that a five-yarder. He attempted seven, however several of the tosses were to the mark, but receivers dropped the ball. Perrin threw a two and a three man defense around ace snagger Larry Erick, and he went for naught for the first time in several games.

The Tiger defense was perhaps the best feature of the game, never allowing the visitors a serious scoring threat. Defensive tactics also paid off with the final Tiger touchdown.

New faces showed up in the scoring column this week, as Bill Rutledge, Alan Solsbery and Butch Knudson came up with TDs. Knudson, a guard, counted the last marker after blocking a Perrin punt.

The first Tiger touchdown came on their first possession, going 56 yards in seven plays, Bill Rutledge blasted the last four yards to the goal. On a fake kick at the tempt for the conversion, Larry

Erick set sail around left end for the two-point marker. The scoring came midway of the first period.

The second touchdown came on the Tigers' second possession. The drive moved 70 yards in 9 plays, with Alan Solsbery the workhorse in the drive. Jernigan also called the little halfback's number for the scoring blast, and the call paid off with a slick 8-yard run for the tally. A masterful bit of faking on the part of Jernigan let Solsbery slide in untouched. Jernigan faked beautifully to Fullback Mike Lowe, drew the ball back and handed off to Solsbery running to the opposite side of the line. Lowe took his bumps from half the Perrin team, and Solsbery was in for the TD. The conversion attempt was no good, and the Tigers had a 14.0 lead at intermission.

The third and final scoring effort of the night found Butch Knudson blitzing in to block a Perrin punt. Knudson gathered in the ball on a dead run, and scampered 12 yards unharmed for the marker, his first in three years as a team member. Larry Erick was successful in kicking the conversion, and the Tigers owned the game 21-0.

Two other scoring chances by the locals fell short, once at the nine yard line, and at the end of the game at the 14.

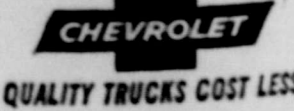

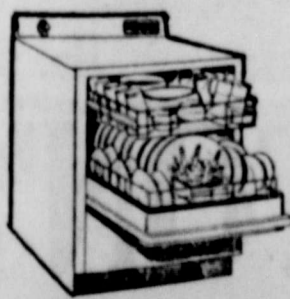

**Most Unforgettable Characters**

What makes this world great? Of course you can answer that question in many ways. Its vast area makes one part great, while influence on the peoples of the world makes another part as great or greater. But when you have given all the answers that offer themselves, one can reply—It is people, men and women, that count above all else. As one's years increase he thinks of the great souls whom he has known, that acted upon his own life and had great influence. Here are some of them who have had my admiration and affection and confidence, and influenced me.

There was Prof. Rickard. I was his pastor for some years, and though he lived 15 miles away from our church, he came when he could and stayed with us at the parsonage. We had so many good talks as he sat in a place of honor among us and discussed many matters. He was a man of experience and learning and travel, and having spent the major part of his life in school rooms had a vast fund of wisdom.

When we knew him first, he lived in a small two room house in the outer fringe of a village, Novice. He first saw life in Virginia, then gravitated to West Virginia where he taught his first school. Later he was in Kentucky, and from there he migrated to Arkansas, and finally landed in Texas. In all those areas he taught. And never was his teaching in anything but a one-room rural school.

He was a rugged personality, absolutely honest, liberal, affectionate, never afraid of anybody or anything, deeply spiritual, participating in all affairs that lift life. I shall never forget the dear man, nor cease to be grateful for having known and associated with him.

Then there was Uncle Raleigh Sims. He lived at Five Points, just a rural community, but he had served the county in many ways. His wife of age comparable to his own was likewise such a gracious soul. When we were in their home, nothing was too good for them to do for us. He and she were members of the first church I ever served, a green, untutored boy, trying by experimentation to find the right ways in my all-important office; that is, it was all important to me, Uncle Raleigh and Aunt Laura would come to church and sit patiently and say "Amen" when it was appropriate, and all the audience could feel the warmth of their personalities.

They had a daughter, Juanita. She was the first Juanita I ever met, though I have met quite a number since, and all were good and gracious women. When I first met Juanita I thought her name ought to begin with a "W", having never had any experience with Spanish names.

Then there was Aunt Peenie, a Tennessean, advanced in years, who lived near us in the village.

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

**COW POKES**

"This place shore outta be a National Park... ain't no trees or mountains or nothin' clutterin' up the scenery."

Those in charge of the screw-worm control program state that sending in samples for positive identification is the key to success of the entire program. I realize that you are busy and have much to do and that most are working short-handed, so do this: keep account of the number of cases you have over a week, take one sample each week and mail in this sample. State on the form the number of cases you have had through the week. This kind of report will be of much help and will be appreciated.

Around the last of January and the first of February, Dan Bottlinger of Aleman put down around 100 pounds of 16-20-0 fertilizer to the acre. He put this in the middle and bedded back on it before planting. Around the first to 10 of April he planted his milo on these beds. Dan reported the other day that when he harvested the milo he made an extra 392 pounds of maize per acre on the fertilized land. Last year the field had maize on it.

It is not a bad idea to be looking for the fall army worm. It is just a little early but they might be found in pastures before long. Early control measures when applied give much better results than waiting for the worms to get larger. Folks in town might be watching for them to show up on lawns. Often the adult moths will lay eggs on the sides and eaves of homes, as the moths are attracted by light.

—ERL—

This month is a good time to make the fall application of fertilizer to the lawn. About 20 lbs. of 16-20-0 per 1,000 square feet should be ample.

### THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN—

## Highlights and Sidelights

By VERN SANFORD

A campaign to pass the water conservation amendment on which Texans will vote this November (No. 4 on the ballot) got under way at a meeting of the Statewide Water Committee in Austin. Committee is composed of just about everybody who is interested in water conservation and development.

Proposed amendment would permit the State Water Development Board to acquire storage space in reservoirs built either by local or Federal agencies and conserve storm and flood waters for beneficial uses.

Gov. Price Daniel addressed the meeting and thanked the committee for its "dedicated efforts" in promoting Texas' water program.

The Statewide committee urged its members to back the amendment and approved the Water Commission's proposed budget. It also commended Governor Daniel for his "courageous, bold and

dynamic leadership" in bringing about "the greatest and most comprehensive water resources conservation and development program in the history of Texas."

Ben Carpenter of Dallas was named chairman of the finance committee for the conservation amendment.

#### Traffic Safety Week

Governor Daniel expressed "deep concern over the dangerous upward trend in traffic deaths among Texas high school and college students" as he proclaimed September 17-21 as fifth annual Texas School Traffic Safety Week.

He noted, however, that the 25 Texas traffic deaths in the 3-day Labor Day holiday were the second lowest total since 1951.

#### Exports

Texans can start thinking of themselves as exporters in big style.

Nobody had counted it up before, but not the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research finds that Texas is exporting to foreign countries \$837,000,000 worth of manufactured products, \$446,000,000 of agricultural products and \$31,000,000 of other products, mainly sulphur, salt, tallow and fishery products.

Petroleum exports came to \$177,000,000 and chemicals to \$247,000,000—showing how the petrochemical industry has turned Texas' sale of oil abroad from a raw to a manufactured product.

#### Schools

The men and women who run the schools—board members and

administrators—come to Austin on September 30 for their annual conventions. They plan searching looks at the problems of schools, many of which sum up into five letters—MONEY!

Overhaul of the ad valorem tax system was proposed by a series of clinics held by schoolmen earlier this year.

Problems of textbook selection and teaching Americanism will be aired.

#### Old Folks

Board for State Hospitals and Special Schools, faced with a report that 3,000 of its patients in state mental hospitals aren't sick—but just old—will ask the Legislature to do something about it.

Reports indicate county judges are "committing" aged persons to state hospitals mainly because they and their families can't care for them.

Board suggests the State pay part of the cost of placing such persons in privately-owned nursing homes. Sons and daughters would be required to pay the balance. Problem is one of welfare, rather than psychiatry, says the Board. "We now have older persons crowding facilities that are supposed to be used for the mentally ill."

#### 1900 Hurricane Story

Gov. Price Daniel and a group of prominent Austinites got together early this month to do some reminiscing about the 1900 hurricane which destroyed Galveston. September marks the 62nd anniversary of that big and disastrous blow.

One casualty of that hurricane was the South Texas Baptist College at Waller, the school which the governor's father was attending.

Mrs. Stuart Purcell presented the Governor with a photo of the 1900 graduating class, of which M. P. Daniel was a member.

#### Bankers Fight

A new organization, Association of Texas State Chartered Banks, has been formed to fight for preservation of the dual banking system and the independence of state banks.

P. B. (Jack) Garrett, vice-chairman of the board of the Texas Bank and Trust Company of Dallas was elected president of the new association.

#### School Bus Passing

Texas Department of Public Safety says it will crack down this year on motorists who illegally pass a school bus stopped to take on or discharge children.

State law requires the driver of any vehicle to stop upon approaching from either direction any school bus which has stopped on the highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging school children.

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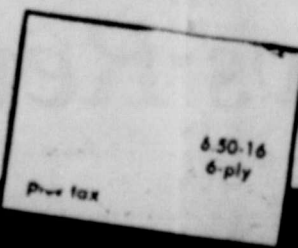
