Cold weather is coming on and this means stoves and heaters will soon be in operation. means with open flames for heating we will have the old problem of sweating walls, windows, etc. A considerable amount of moisture is given off when open flame heaters are used. When this moisture contacts a cold surface it condenses to a liquid state to the sweating one sees,

To solve this problem all gas stoves, floor furnaces, central heating systems, gas refrigerators, For the past four years, Joe dryers and water heaters should be vented. This is best done when a new home is constructed but it can be done by doing a little remodeling. Sometimes the venting can be done through an old chimney or through a closet Some condensation will still occur if an open flame heater is used,

I have a supply of a new pub lication, "Winter Temporary Pastures." This leaflet gives much information about this kind of a pasture, such as the kind of small grain for it, amount of seed to plant, how to manage the pasture for maximum grazing and other good information. -ERL




