## AT MERIDIAN—

### Shooting Preserve Licenses Will Be Issued Oct. 29-31

Game Warden Bob Rhudy of Meridian announced this week that Shooting Preserve Books for Hamilton and Bosque counties would be issued at Meridian on October 29, 30, and 31. Rhudy emphasized the fact that any land owner leasing hunting rights for a cash consideration was required to obtain the license, which costs \$5.00.

The Warden said that anyone leasing their land for hunting purposes without the license were

breaking the law, and would be subject to fine.

The deer season for Hamilton County was extended 10 days this year. Season dates are Nov. 16 through Dec. 15, inclusive, and bag limit was increased to two bucks. No doe permits will be issued in Hamilton County this year, according to Rhudy.

Bosque County season dates are Nov. 16 through Dec. 31, with a two buck limit. Doe permits will be issued in that county in designated areas.

Landowners are urged to remember the dates, and get shooting preserve books during the 3-day period.

Rhudy said that information pertaining to the quail season would be released at a later date.

### Type II Polio Vaccine to Be Given Here

Sponsors of the Sabin Oral Polio vaccine program indicated this week that Type II vaccine would be given in this area on November 18 and 25.

The program, delayed for several weeks due to the scare on the Type III serum, will be resumed under the same sponsorship as the first vaccine was given.

The program is sponsored locally by Hico Civic Club in cooperation with the Tri-County Medical Society.

Dr. B. C. Dayton, who is in charge of administering the vaccine here, said this week that the Type II serum has been declared absolutely safe by medical authorities, and would be given here on the above dates at the school cafeteria from 12 noon until 7 p.m.

### September Accident Report Released by Supervisor Eggen

Stephenville, Oct. 16.—Sgt. A. A. Eggen, Supervisor of the Texas Highway Patrol in the Stephenville Area, released the rural accident summary for the month of September.

The Highway Patrol in the area investigated a total of 41 rural traffic crashes during the month. As a result of these 41 accidents, 3 people were killed, 31 injured, and the combined property damage amounted to \$58,860.00.

For the first 9 months of 1962 the Stephenville Area's rural traffic records show a total of 395 crashes resulting in death to 19 people, injury to 220 people, and the combined property damage amounted to \$318,350.00.

For the same period of 1961, the area reported a total of 384 crashes resulting in death to 17 people, injury to 218, and the combined property damage amounted to \$219,869.00.

### County Tax Officer Will Visit Here

Mrs. Pearl Williams, county tax assessor-collector, will make an annual visit to Hico next Wednesday as a service to local taxpayers. Mrs. Williams will be at the City Hall from 8 a.m. until 2 p.m.

The tax officer will also visit Carleton next Thursday, October 25, from 8 a.m. until 12 noon.

In making the announcement, Mrs. Williams said "A three percent discount is allowed on all county taxes paid in October with the exception of Hico school taxes."

"State and county taxes for the year 1962 are now due, and statements of all property taxes on the rendered roll have been mailed. Tax statements may not reach some property owners because of recent change in ownership or because owner has not rendered to tax assessor. If you have not received your tax statement, give legal description of your property to the County Tax Office and a statement will be sent you."

### TIGERS OUT-CLASS GODLEY WITH SECOND QUARTER SCORING FLOURISH

Hico jumped on the Godley Wildcats for 19 points in the second quarter last Friday night, and went on to score a 26-0 victory over the visitors at Tiger Stadium. The win finished non-conference play for the locals, who posted a 4-2 record for the route.

The Tigers scored on their second possession of the game, getting the marker on the third play of the second quarter. The drive carried 69 yards, and the score came on a 16-yard burst by Alan Solsbery.

A fine punt return of 25 yards to the mid-field stripe by Jerry Casey set up the second touchdown. After a two-yard pickup by Don Jernigan to the 48, Casey got the call and responded with a 46-yard scamper down the right sideline to the two before being hauled in. On the next play Casey was called on again and blasted the two yards for the score.

The third Tiger marker came shortly before the half when the locals put a short punt in play at the Godley 45. The Tigers used five plays to get the score with Don Jernigan passing the last 12 yards to Larry Erick for the TD. Erick kicked the extra point, and the Tigers had a 19-0 halftime lead.

The final score of the night came at the end of the third period when Erick recovered a Godley fumble at the 39. Eight plays were used to get the marker, with Jernigan passing the last 7 yards to Erick for the score. Erick again kicked the extra point, bringing the final tally to 26-0.

The Tigers moved into Godley territory three other times in the final stanza but could never get the ball across.

Harold D. Walker, local high school agriculture advisor, last week was appointed Juvenile Probation Officer for Hico, District Judge Truman E. Roberts of Hamilton made the appointment in action taken last Friday.

The appointment came after juvenile hearings were held for 8 county youths.

Judge Roberts outlined one of the most vigorous compliance requirements ever laid down by a court for the youths to follow. Some of the requirements for the two local youths who appeared before the judge were as follows: attend school every day, report to the probation officer each day, ride in no automobiles unless accompanied by parents, and be off the streets and at home by 8 p.m. each day.

While the requirements might appear rather strict, Judge Roberts said that he had no alternative but to issue the restrictions, and said that compliance with the orders was a "must."

Probation for the Hico youths was short-lived, however, as they left school Monday. They had not been picked up Wednesday of this week.

### Life of Noted Poet Told

Noll Crowell is a woman whose life and her manifold affections years ago when she made the Poet Laureate state. She has now resided in Meridian more than a quarter century. Some outstanding poems of the state used to be read in all their issues from reading her daily that I became acquainted with her and called her my favorite.

A recent book Beatrice Crowell also a favorite writer of told many of the facts of Crowell's life in a charming way. Mrs. Crowell now lives in Meridian having removed from her state— Iowa— to our state in 1928 and was made Poet Laureate in 1931 and two years later given a degree by Baylor University. She was also named Ambassador of the Year at one

her first child, she fell ill and was an invalid for a good many years. In her concern for her husband and the extra burden falling on him because of her continued illness, she decided to utilize her poetic instincts. She felt she had to ease the financial status of her home. She must write the poems she felt welling up in her soul and offer them to publishers. So she began. Editors read her offerings and were intrigued by the music of her poems, and so published them in increasing numbers. Outstanding magazines asked for her poems, and finally publishers were happy to put her poems into whole books.

To her credit now there are 22 volumes of her poems, eight children's books, and six devotional books. Her poems run into many thousands in number. Not only America, but in England, she is a favorite poet. And likewise in every English-speaking country in the world. To date ninety thousand letters have come to the little girl who "glittered" her tiny teapot.

Mrs. Crowell now lives at 719 Lowell Street, Dallas. Her son, Dean also lives in Dallas & works for the Texas and Pacific Railroad. And another son, Reid, is an artist and poet, and likewise lives in Dallas. Her husband, Norman H. Crowell, has been dead a good many years.

Thanks to Beatrice Plumb for her dramatic story of so noble a soul.

Here is a sample of her poetic genius in these two stanzas of one of her famous poems, entitled "The Poet Prays."

The crushing of a thousand petals,  
Lord,  
Distills one drop of essence from a flower—  
Crush me, O God, if thereby my song makes  
Some tired heart walk with beauty for an hour.  
If I can bring the quick relief of tears  
To dry eyes dulled with bitterness for long—  
Gather the fragrant petals of my life  
And crush them, Lord, then help me sing my song.

### COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By E. B. LAWRENCE

The safe disposal of cotton poison and defoliant cans is a problem, because livestock and children may be endangered if they are left lying around fields or on trash piles. The safest way to dispose of these cans is to carefully clean them with kerosene or soap and water and use them as burnt oil containers or as feed buckets. They may also be crushed and buried or burnt, but don't leave them in ditches or in pastures where cattle or children may find them.

Keeping farm records and accounts is one of the more important aspects of farming, ranching or dairying. Several of the dairymen of the county keep good records on their milking herds.

One of these is C. M. Roberson of Carlton, Roberson, I believe, is the only dairymen of the county who is keeping records through the Dairy Herd Improvement Association.

In this program a tester comes to the dairy once a month and makes a complete check of the operations. Feed is weighed each time a cow is fed, milk production from each cow is weighed, and a test of the butter fat content of the milk is made. From these figures, the monthly feed bill for each cow in the herd is arrived at. Also the value of the product produced and sold is calculated. Knowing these, then the income over feed is found.

All these figures and all this figuring is arrived at by running the items through one of the new IBM machines. This is done at College Station and once a month a report is made to Roberson. From the report he can readily see what it is costing to feed each cow for the month, the amount of milk she produced and the cost of producing it. The report shows the cows that are giving the most milk and those not doing so well.

For instance here is the report of two cows, one milked 274 days and one milked 275 days. The cow milked 274 days produced a total of 15,390 pounds of milk for the period. She showed an income over feed costs of \$397. The other cow milked 275 days produced a total of 11,900 pounds of milk for the period. She showed an income over feed costs of \$296 dollars. This is a difference of \$101 for the higher producing cow. The feed cost of the high producing cow was a little higher than the low producing one but I don't have these costs.

With records like these the dairyman is able to know which cows to keep heifers from, the high producers. In Roberson's herd he has some full sisters from one of his high producing cows and each of these is also a high producer. Roberson weighs the feed each time he feeds for each cow. The amount each cow should have is arrived at from her production record. This prevents over-feeding the low producer or under-feeding the high producer.

**Book Defenders**  
The men and women who run the public schools came out in strong support of the present method of selecting textbooks in Texas.

Plan has been under attack by some witnesses at recent legislative hearings.

Texas Association of School Boards, meeting in Austin, found no fault in the system by which a textbook committee selects as many as five books for each course, and then local textbook committees decide which of the five they will use.

School board members also took no action on an Ector County proposal that central state purchasing of school buses be ended.

**College Tax Illegal?**  
Texas Supreme Court action is expected soon on a case which could upset the junior college setup in Texas.

Taxpayers' suit from Harris County contends that the Legislature had no constitutional authority to allow the levying of taxes by junior college districts.

Supreme Court has been studying the case since April. Should it agree with the taxpayers, it would take a constitutional amendment to legalize the college districts. Meanwhile, state money might be needed to keep the 32 junior colleges going until the voters have a say on the subject.

**Commission Shakeup**  
Texas Railroad Commission is under a re-organization study by the Texas Research League. Already changes in procedures are being put into effect.

Commissioners William J. Murray Jr. and Ben Ramsey named a committee of oilmen headed by James E. Russell of Abilene to advise on revision of rules and procedures which most admit had become too cumbersome and slow.
