Good or Bad---Here Text of Fourteen Constitutional Amendments

Following is a complete list of Constitutional Amendments which will appear on the ballot in the general election. They are in the order and in the text they will appear on the ballot. Underneath each amendment is a brief explanatory paragraph relative to the purpose and effect of the amendment.

Amendment No. I

Authorizing political subdivisions to provide insurance for all employees.

FOR OR AGAINST: The constitutional amendment providing for all employees of all political subdivisions.

Constitution presently permits counties and other political subdivisions to obtain Workman's Compensation Insurance coverage for appointed employees. This amendment would permit this insurance coverage to be extended to elected officials of the county division.

Amendment No. II

For Dependent Persons.

FOR OR AGAINST: The Constitutional Amendment raising the minimum use of state funds to assist aged, needy blind, and children from forty-seven dollars to fifty-two million.

This resolution increases the constitutional limitation on total state funds from 47 million to 52 million annually. This fund is to be used for the aged, needy and needy children of the state.

Amendment No. III

Continuity of state and local governmental operations in event of enemy attack.

FOR OR AGAINST: The Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution permitting the creation of political subdivisions in Ochiltree, Hansford and Hopkins counties, each district to be coterminous with the limits of such counties.

Section 22 provides for and permits the Legislature to create home districts in the above-named counties. The Legislature already passed such enabling legislation for Ochiltree, Hansford, and Hopkins counties. The resolution provides for the creation of the district and authorizes the levy of a tax per \$100 valuation, on the basis of the participation of qualified voters.

Amendment No. IV

Authorizing the water development board to purchase storage facilities.

FOR OR AGAINST: The amendment to Article III of the Constitution of Texas by adding a new section to be known as section providing for a state project of acquiring conservation facilities in reservoirs.

The resolution proposes to add to the Constitution authority of the Board and the Legislature to enact laws permitting the Water Development Board to purchase storage facilities already authorized for the purpose of acquiring storage facilities and to contract with other agencies of government and the United States for purchase of such facilities. It also limits the authority in the following respects: 1. The amount of bonds authorized to be issued should not exceed \$200 million. 2. The Board could sell such bonds at a price not less than the street cost to the Board; 3. Proceeds from any sale or lease must be utilized to retire principal and interest on outstanding bonds, and any excess over the amount of principal and interest could be utilized for the purchase and acquisition of storage facilities.

Amendment No. V

For Dependent Persons.

FOR OR AGAINST: The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to create home districts and prescribing limitations upon the powers of such

districts.

HJR 51 is a separate constitutional amendment which provides that the Legislature may create such districts composed of one or more counties or any part of one or more counties with the same powers in each to purchase, construct, renew and repair buildings, for improvement, for equipping them, and also provides further that the tax not exceed \$.75 per \$100 valuation. This resolution would apparently put an end to the need of a new resolution on the subject of hospital districts each time a county desired to create a district, and places general authority in the Legislature for the formation of hospital districts in any given area.

Amendment No. VI

Pension programs for elected and appointed officers.

FOR OR AGAINST: The Constitutional Amendment authorizing retirement, disability and death benefits for elected and appointed officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for 12 years or more.

This resolution permits counties and any other political subdivision of the State to provide for and administer retirement funds for both elected and appointed officers and employees. The amendment would require a legislative enactment and majority approval of the voters of the subdivision and require that any participant have at least 12 years service, and that the county may not contribute more than five percent of the compensation paid to any participant.

Amendment No. VII

Continuity of state and local governmental operations in event of enemy attack.

FOR OR AGAINST: The Constitutional Amendment empowering the Legislature to insure continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack by providing for the prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public office, except members of the Legislature, the incumbents of which may become unavailable.

The resolution provides a new Section 62 to Article 3 of the Constitution to permit the Legislature to provide for "prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public office." It excepts from its provisions the replacement of members of the Legislature and provides that the State Bill of Rights would not in any manner be suspended.

Amendment No. VIII

Aid to Permanently and totally disabled.

FOR OR AGAINST: The Constitutional Amendment to establish a ceiling of two million, five hundred thousand dollars per year on the amount that may be paid out of state funds for assistance payments to the totally and permanently disabled.

This resolution increases the present ceiling of \$1.5 million on to persons between the ages of 18 and 65 years who are permanently and totally disabled to \$2.5 million annually.

Presently the Department of Public Welfare makes an average grant of \$54 monthly to totally and permanently disabled persons under a definition which requires that to qualify a person must be bedfast or chairfast, and in the case of mental disability, must require maximum supervision. Under the present \$1.5 million annual ceiling the \$54 monthly grant will probably be reduced by the time the Legislature meets in 1963. The amendment would permit the Legislature to appropriate sufficient monies to pay the full amount of the grants during subsequent years.

Amendment No. IX

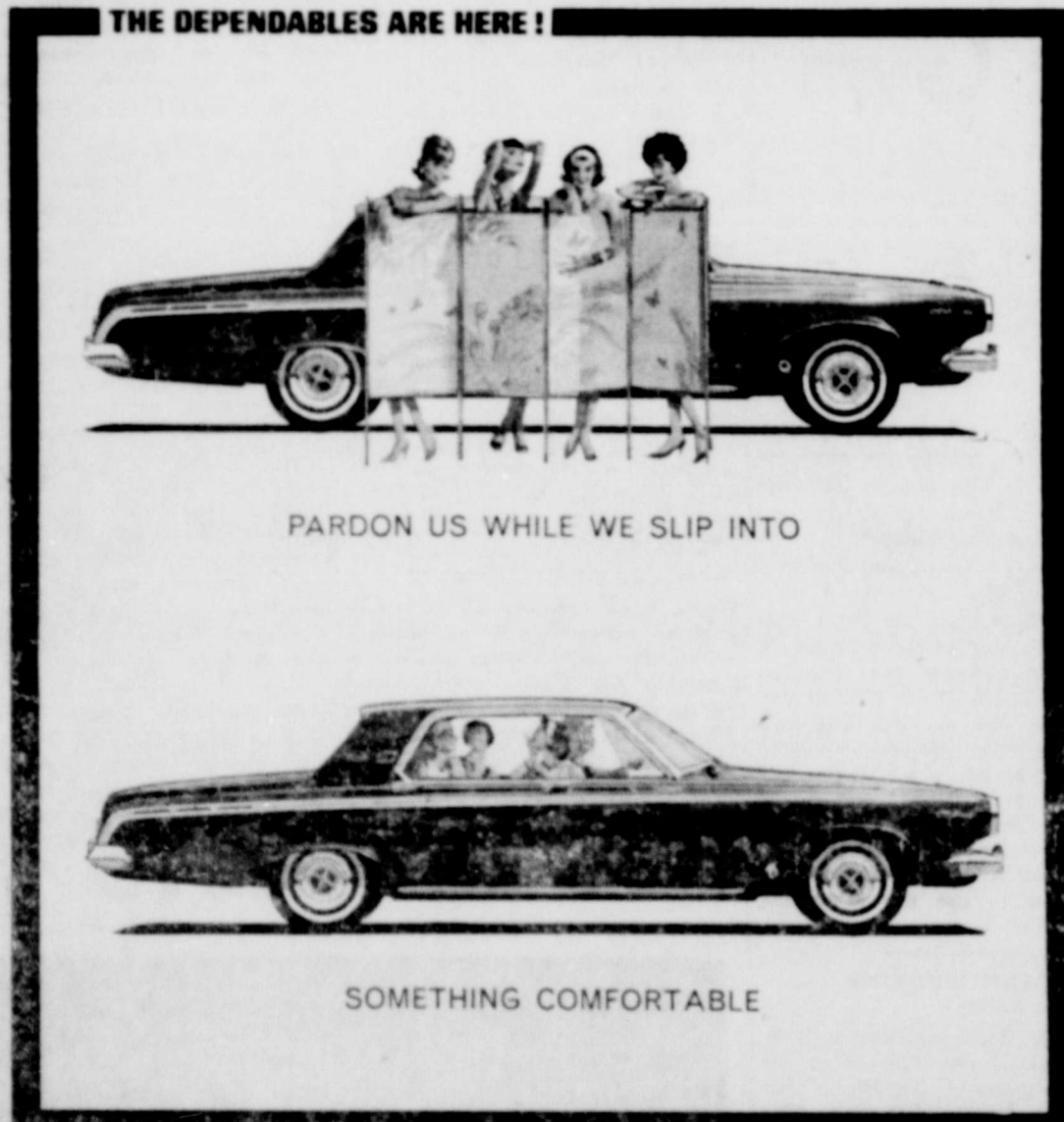

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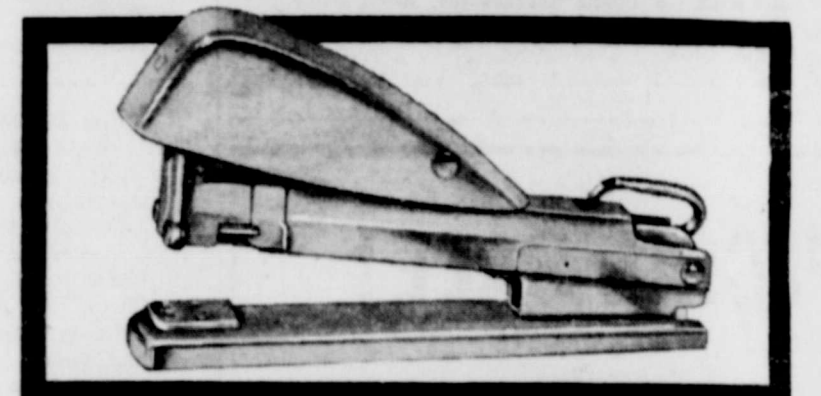

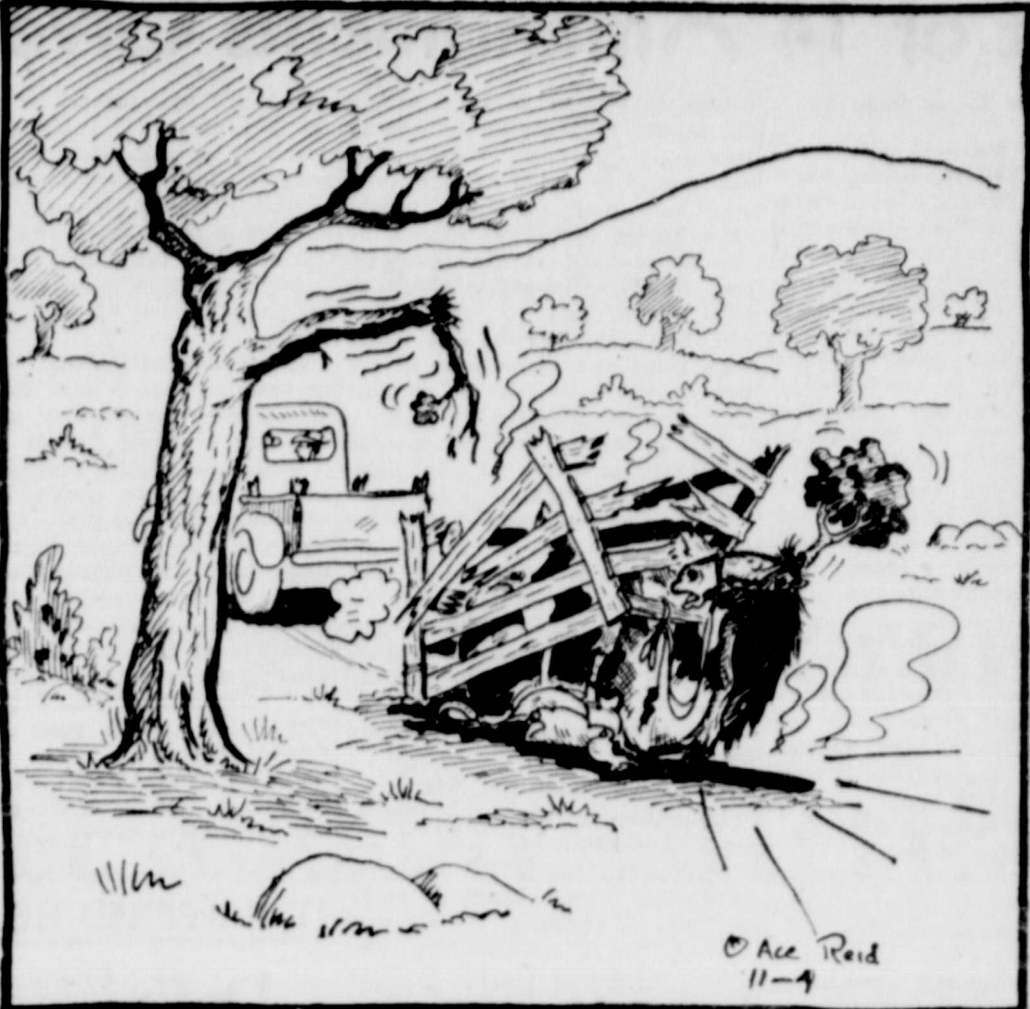

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Text of 14 Amendments Given

(Continued From Page 1)

Amendment No. I
 Constitutional Amendment authorizing the construction, equipping, maintenance and financing of a home for the aged in Titus County and for permitting the Legislature to authorize the creation of two hospital districts in Brazoria County, one of which is to include all or part of the West Columbia, Brazoria and Damon Independent School Districts, and the other coterminous with the Sweeny Independent School District, also providing for a possible consolidation of the two by qualified voters of such districts, and providing for all necessary construction, equipping, maintaining, and financing if authorized.

HJR 70 provides for the creation of two separate hospital districts in Brazoria County and the enabling legislation for these districts has already been enacted. The authorization levy in Brazoria County districts is \$25 per \$100 valuation of taxable property.

Amendment No. X

State employees serving in consulting capacities to other agencies of the government.

FOR OR AGAINST: The Constitutional Amendment permitting state employees to serve as a consultant or on an advisory committee, or as a member of a public school board provided they are not members of the teaching profession, with a state agency, or any political subdivision thereof, or the federal government, if approved by administrative head or governing board of such employee and there is no conflict of interest.

Section 33 of Article 16 of the Constitution provides that no person may receive compensation from the state who holds any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this state or the United States, excepting from the limitation membership in the various components of the organized armed forces of the United States. The resolution proposes to add to the exception a provision that state employees may serve in an advisory capacity or be appointed to serve as a consultant or on an advisory committee, or as a member of a public school board provided they are not members of the teaching profession—with the approval of the administrative head of the State Department or Agency—in which such employee is employed and provided there is no conflict of interests.

Amendment No. XI

Resale of unsold lands belonging to the veteran's land fund.

FOR OR AGAINST: The Am-

endment to section 49-B of Article III of the Constitution by adding thereto a provision authorizing the resale of lands of the veterans land fund remaining unsold after having been first offered for sale to veterans, to such purchasers, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as are now provided by law, or as may hereafter be provided by law.

This resolution does not change the basic provision of the Veteran's Land Program in any respect, excepting that it provides for the resale of the unsold repossessed lands which have first been offered to veterans and remain unsold. The resolution provides that any resale must conform to the Rules and Regulations as are now provided by law or as hereafter may be provided by law.

Amendment No. XII

Delegation of zoning powers to certain counties.

FOR OR AGAINST: The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to delegate limited zoning powers to any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof.

The resolution would permit the Legislature to authorize counties bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof, to regulate and restrict the speed, parking, and travel of motor vehicles on beaches available to the public by virtue of public rights and the littering of such beaches. The resolution specifically states that it would not increase the rights of any riparian or littoral land owner.

Apparently the amendment is proposed for the regulation of traffic on public beaches for the protection of the general public who seeks to use those beaches.

Amendment No. XIII

Dallas County School District Financing.

FOR OR AGAINST: The amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of Texas by adding thereto Section 3-B providing that taxes or bonds previously voted in any independent school district, the major portion of which is in Dallas County, shall not be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by any change in boundaries and authorizing the continuance of the levy of taxes after such change without further election.

This resolution proposes an addition to Article VII of the Constitution which would provide, in substance, that school taxes voted and bonds voted, but unissued,

would not be canceled or invalidated because of a change in boundary of such district; authorizing the levy of taxes after such boundary change without further election in the district, and excepting from its provisions the situation where there is an annexation or consolidation of whole districts.

This amendment would be purely local in nature and would facilitate an annexation of adjacent areas to a school district in that it would not require repeated elections on the same subject because of boundary changes. It would, however, still require that where there is a consolidation of two whole districts there would be an election to approve the joint assumption of the bonded indebtedness of the respective districts.

Amendment No. XIV

De Nova Appeals from Administrative Agencies.

FOR OR AGAINST: The Constitutional Amendment granting the Legislature power to provide

for Trials DeNovo on all appeals from actions, rulings, or decisions of administrative or executive agencies of government.

The resolution provides that the Legislature may enact legislation requiring that any appeal taken from any administrative agency may be "de novo" as that term is understood in appeals from Justice to County Courts in Texas. This is not a self-enacting amendment as it depends on subsequent legislative action.

The nature of the problem involved is substantially this—most of the administrative agencies of the state today are vested with the authority of the "first forum" on matters under agency jurisdiction. Included in that power is the responsibility of finding facts and applying the law to those facts. A party to a hearing may appeal to the appropriate court; however, in most agencies when that appeal is taken, the court is bound to proceed on the facts as found by the agency if there is "substantial evidence" to support such finding of fact. For all practical purposes this leaves the court with the customary appellate jurisdiction of the application of the law to facts already determined. The argument of the opponents of the resolution is basically that administrative agencies deal with a narrow field of a complicated economy; that experts would be better equipped to ascertain facts surrounding a controversy that limited field; and that appeal "de novo" would make the agency ineffective to perform its regulatory function.

IT HAPPENED HERE OR NEAR—

Definition of a Calendar

Even small kids know what a calendar is. It is a pretty picture on a big cardboard with a bunch of small leaves attached to its bottom, one of which tears off once a month, which the bank sends to you every new year. Or, maybe it is a big bunch of paper sheets with figures all over them that says something about Wine or Cardui or Black Draught. The drug store gives you that one, and ma likes it best because the figures on it are big and she does not have to have her glasses to read it.

Well, maybe that is what the kids will tell you, but the dictionary will tell you something else. For example: "A system of determining the beginnings, length, and divisions of a year." But you ask, where does the word come from and what does it mean? And you just don't know, eh? I wonder what per cent of our people do know. Throughout my years I have continually relied on the calendar, content to trust it, and cut my programs by it without bothering to answer the question above mentioned.

We get the word from the Romans. They had a lot to do with perfecting the calendar, although they inherited most of it from other peoples. The word "kalends" came from the Greeks. The Romans changed it "calends." The "calends" were the first days of the weeks. So a calendar was a chart that showed all the weeks and months of the year so everybody would know where in the year he was. "Calendar," the weeks and months of the year in an orderly arrangement.

Now a calendar shows days, weeks, months, and the four seasonal divisions of the year. "Day" is of Saxon origin and was originally spelled "daeg." "Week" is also Saxon and was once spelled "wicu." And always meant a period of seven days. And "month" was "mona" in the Roman language and became "month" in Saxon. And was always one-twelfth of a year. It was also allied to "moon." Fact is "mona" means "moon" in the Roman tongue. Then the word "year" is of Saxon origin and was once spelled "gear."

From all these words, day, week, month, year, and how they have come to us, it is plain that our calendar in its present form is from our Saxon forebears, and they borrowed a lot of it from Greeks and Romans and other ancients, put all together so we can know where we are in the passage of time.

The fact that "month" comes from "mona", the word for month, indicates how the ancients, all rural peoples, relied on the moon. American Indians used to speak of a period of time as so many moons. Which gives evidence that all pioneer peoples have relied on the moon as affording a way to count the passage of time. No wonder so many superstitions are connected with the moon. Why, many of you readers when you were sparking a girl, or a girl was being sparked, would not look at the moon over your left shoulder lest it wreck the courtship.

How did we get the names of the months? And how comes it that "September" means seventh month, and in reality it is the ninth month? The same question occurs about October, November, and December, which means eighth, ninth and tenth, when they are the tenth and eleventh and twelfth. Well, the Roman year began with March. August was the sixth month, so the 7th was September. The names of the months originated with the Romans, but Saxons adopted them

in their time measurements. But the Saxons put the beginning of the year back two months, yet kept all the month names. January was named by the Romans for Janus, a Roman god of beginnings and endings, two-faced, looking backward and forward. February was named for a period of purification from the Latin word "Februa." March was named for Mars, the Roman god of war. "April" means in the Roman tongue second, and it was the second month in the Roman year. May does not seem to have any meaning other than third, being the third month. June was named for a famous Roman family named "Junius." But July got its name from Julius Caesar, one of the founders of the Roman Empire. August was named for Augustus Caesar. The Saxons did not attempt any improvement in the matter of month names.

Now the names of the days of the week: Sunday, the day of the sun. Tuesday, Tiw's day, Saxon god of war. "Tiw" was pronounced Tue. Wednesday was named for Woden, perhaps the greatest of the Anglo-Saxon gods. Thursday was Thor's day, another outstanding god of the Saxons. Friday was Frigg's day, and she was the wife of Woden. Saturday was named for Saturn likewise a Saxon god.

Four have names of gods, two of heavenly bodies, one for a female. I wonder if that is why women make so much of Friday as a day for their meetings, and is a carryover from Saxon times.

Finally, the names of the seasons. Winter is a Saxon word, probably invented at the time the calendar was perfected. It may have something to do with the wind. Spring became the second season because in that period plants spring up from the earth. Summer is from a Saxon word spelled "sumor," a time of growth. Autumn is from Old French and means a period of maturity. This name was the only variation Saxon origin. Our common substitution of "fall" for autumn is also from Saxon usage, and is doubtless because of falling leaves and fruits and of the stems and stalks of all annual plants.
