## HAPPENED HERE OR NEAR—

### Heroism of Missionary Told in Digest Story

All are hero worshippers in degree. Maybe "hero" is too strong a word, but I do greatly admire a hero in any form. The manifestation of heroism occurs. And especially the heroism is manifested by a man in any environment different from that in which he was reared. The November issue of Read-Digest is the story of an Indian woman in a wild heath-land of Indians that certainly has the heroism of the highest order. Her husband with a small party of missionaries went to the district in the extreme east-slope of the Andes Mountains in Ecuador to work among the Indians who had been successfully approached by any civilized people of any nationality. The man's name was Dr. The Aucas killed him and party before they ever succeeded in contacting them. They all from America, some from the Gerat Lakes. Elizabeth Elliott, the wife of the missionary, after considering the situation, and after much prayer, decided to remain there to make an effort to contact the wild tribe that she had accompanied, and left her tiny baby girl in the wilds of America. Elliott worked in another of Indians who were friendly to the Quichuas. In the village in which she worked was an Auca woman who had left her husband to live with the Quichuas. Elliott made friends with the Auca and undertook to learn the Auca language from her. It was a very difficult task, but Mrs. Elliott was a determined soul and had herself diligently until she had a working knowledge of the strange dialect. Finally she was able to converse in the Auca tongue and her way to a community of Auca, and by her use of their language she made friends with the folk. When the Aucas learned that she was the wife of a man they had killed, they put her in her and became friendly. The little girl appealed to the In-

dians too and the little girl became a pal of the Indian children. The little girl's name was Valerie. In all my reading of heroes and heroic doings I have never read anything quite so brave as what Mrs. Elliott did, and is still doing. She is winning the wild horde that had always been regarded as too savage to be won by any means. You ought to read the story in the magazine if you like stories of wonderful daring and hardihood. Mrs. Elliott's motives are certainly worthy of examination. She might easily have been embittered by the murder of her husband and hastened back to civilized America. No doubt but most women would have. But she had gone out as a missionary as a matter of profound conviction. As she prayed for Divine direction in her deep sorrow, she had a definite answer to her prayers. The Lord impressed her to forgive the wild savages and in spite of the danger to seek to win them to God. She is a woman of conviction and believes that obedience to God is the most important thing in life. She obeyed Divine directions, and conscious of the dangers involved for both her and Valerie, went, and after an early cold rejection was taken to the hearts of the Aucas and many of them responded to her spiritual teachings and leadership. What a victory for the Kingdom of God. We can all take heart afresh and trust God to keep us when we resolutely obey Him. The Aucas go naked the year round, but yet are very careful to discretely move about and act morally in the sight of all others. Little Valerie became a favorite with the Auca children and adults, and like the tribesmen moved about totally divested of clothes, and thought nothing of it. Auca houses have no walls—only roofs. All that goes on among the dwellers in the houses is continually seen at all hours except when darkness hides all. It was difficult for Mrs. Elliott to adapt herself to this sort of thing, but she did and refused to let it make her unhappy. But she has never adopted living naked as the Aucas do.

## Type II Polio Vaccine Will Not Be Given In Hico

Type II Sabin Oral Polio Vaccine, slated to be given here the next two Sundays, November 18 and 25, will not be carried out according to Dr. H. C. Dayton, in charge of administering the vaccine locally. The program, sponsored locally by Hico Civic Club in cooperation with the Tri-County Medical Society, has been postponed indefinitely according to Dr. Dayton. Reason given for the cancellation was that the cost would be prohibitive since the Fort Worth Medical Society had decided not to give the vaccine there. People will re-

member that the Tri-County Medical Society had purchased the vaccine through the Fort Worth Chapter, thus reducing the cost about one-fourth. More than 3,000 Hico and area people took the Type I vaccine in August when it was administered here. Type III was scheduled to be given in September, but was cancelled due to adverse publicity about the program. Dr. Dayton said that it was possible that the vaccine would be offered in Hico at a later date, and that residents would be informed of future dates set aside for the vaccine.

## Game Warden Reports

I would like to thank each one of you for your fine cooperation in issuing of the doe or antlerless deer permits. We have at this time issued about 1100 permits for Bosque County. Most of these were issued at the time set aside. However we do still have some permits for the folks that were not able to come by on those days. If you would contact Joe Stevens or myself we would be glad to help you. I want to take this last opportunity before the deer season opens to remind you that if you are leasing your land for hunting you should have a shooting preserve license. I will have these licenses with me at all times, so if you need one just let me know. Our quail season will be a little different this year. It will open December 1 and run through Jan. 27. We had some late hatch-offs on our young quail this year and feel this will give the young more time to mature. Our records show that in the Possum Kingdom Regulatory Area we have a 12 percent increase over last year in the quail crop. So Mr. Bird Hunter we should have a good quail season this year. Goose season is now open. It opened October 31 and will run through January 13. I have seen a few geese in the area the last 3 weeks. They are in their migration at this time so you may find them on ponds in the county. However you will also find some ducks with them. So remember, duck season does not open until December 6. Please remember to be extra careful with your gun. A good rule to follow is always treat every gun

## Highway Patrol Releases Summary of Area Accidents

Stephenville, Nov. 13—Sgt. A. A. Eggen, Supervisor of the Texas Highway Patrol in the Stephenville area released the district's rural accident summary for the month of October. The Highway Patrol in the six-county area investigated a total of 50 rural traffic crashes during the month. As a result of these 50 crashes 3 people were killed, 42 injured, and the combined property damage amounted to \$42,200. For the first 10 months of 1962 the district's traffic record shows a total of 445 rural crashes resulting in death to 22 people, injury to 252, and a combined property damage of \$360,550.00. For the same period of 1961, the Stephenville Area reported a total of 431 traffic crashes resulting in death to 19 people, injury to 242, and a combined property damage of \$239,989.00.

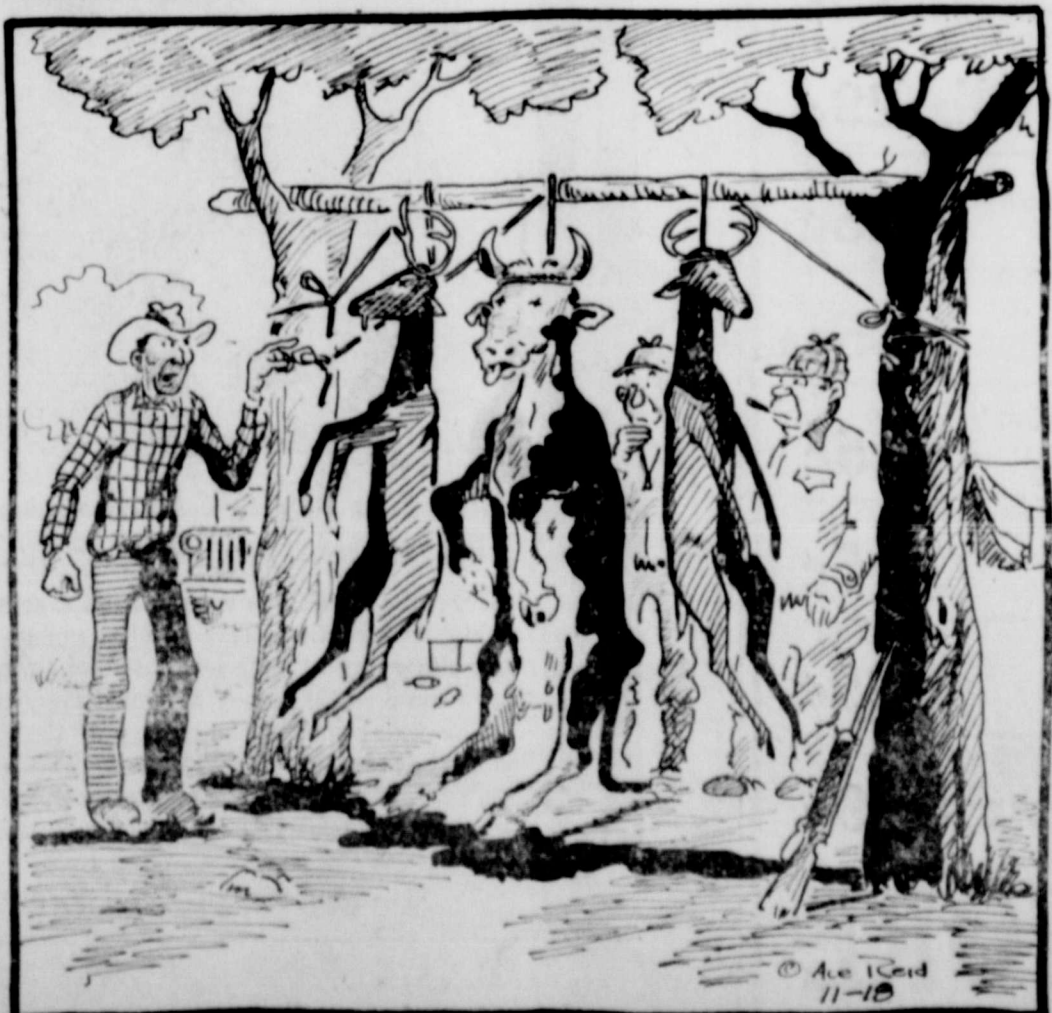
## Judy's Crowds Keg Leaders With Second Shut-Out

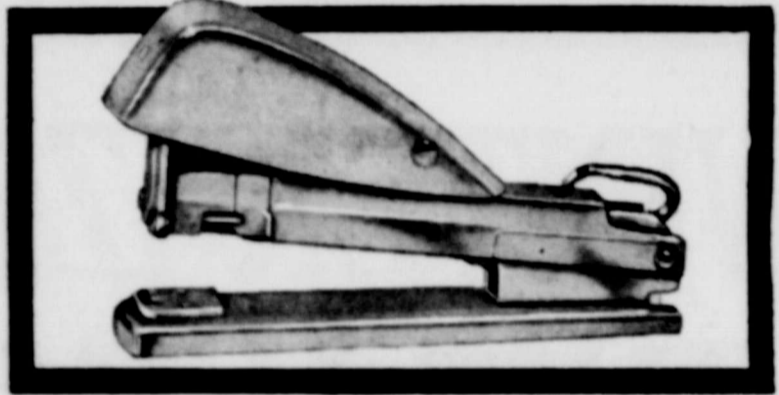

Lincolns Relate Interesting Experiences During Recent Tour of European Countries

(Ed Note: The following is an account of a recent European tour by Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Lincoln, and is being published in the interest of readers).

We flew to New York City Oct. 5, leaving Dallas at 9 a.m. and left New York that night at 9:30 for Rome. The sun came up at 3 a.m.

We met Dr. and Mrs. H. V. Hedges at the Burghese Art Gallery and at St. Peter's in Vatican City where we saw and heard the Pope bless the people. We left the Hedges here as each had a tour scheduled.

Our tour included the Catacombs and other places we missed two years ago. At night we took a long carriage ride to see the Coliseum lighted with candles. Had a good close-up view of the Capital Building, the Old Forum and Hadrian's Villa and Tivoli Gardens. Caught a plane to Cairo and arrived at night. The "Sita Tour" began here. There were about 28 people on this tour, and all from the east and middle west except ourselves.

We spent a week in Cairo, up and down the Nile and in the desert. We flew to Luxor, 400 miles from Cairo to see the Temple of Karnak. Took a moonlight sail in a "falucca" on the Nile.

At Cairo we went on a camel safari to the Pyramids of Giza; saw the Sphinx lighted at night in an animated dramatic story history which was most impressive and worth a trip to Egypt.

We spent a night in an Arabian tent near the pyramids with dinner music and entertainment. There was even an Arabian dancing horse. There is a saying like this: "Time is afraid of the Pyramids. The Pyramids are afraid of nothing." We rode in a procession that met Nasser and ate in the New Shepherd's Hotel with a group of African dignitaries.

While visiting ex-King Farouque's Palace the guide asked me to play a tune on the Queen's piano. Glad I could accommodate.

From Cairo we flew to Beirut, Lebanon on the Mediterranean, the early home of the Phoenician fishermen and boat builders. From Beirut we drove to Byblos, The Cedars, Baalback, Temple of Jupiter, Damascus and the "Street Called Straight." Flew to Jerusalem where we toured for several days seeing the Judean Hills and Biblical places of interest. Jerusalem is a divided city like Berlin. We flew over the Sea of Galilee then later came to it by car. Went into the old Palace of Pilate and saw the ruins of Solomon's Temple. We went to the Garden of Gethsemane; saw the Mt. of Olives and the Fields of Ruth and Boaz. We stood on the place where the Cross stood and saw the Rock on which Abraham was to sacrifice Isaac, waded in the Dead Sea, and washed our hands in the Jordan River.

Leaving Jordan we carried our bags across "No Man's Land," guarded by soldiers, into Israel. Went to Tiberias, and saw the Sea again (Galilee), the Gideon Mt. where Gideon fought against the Midianites. Our next stops were at the Sea, Nazareth, Capernaum, Mt. Carmel, the Carpenter's Shop and work bench; Mary's Well, and place where Christ lived most of his life.

We left Jordan via Haifa, the port of Tel Aviv and traveled through the Plains of Sharon to ancient Caesarea. We took a plane at Lod and landed at Nicosia, Cyprus. Flew over Turkey and landed at Istanbul. The Hilton Istanbul overlooks the Bosphorus Sea and we could see across into Asia. Went sailing on the Bosphorus around the Golden Horn. Visited the Mosque of Saint Sofia and the Blue Mosque which gets its name from the overall blue tile mosaics inside the Mosque.

Turkey's flag is red with a yellow crescent moon and yellow star which means "As long as the moon and the stars are in the sky, Turkey will remain free and independent."

Most of the people here are Moslems. We saw them kneeling for prayer, facing the East toward Mecca. The Prayer Caller says, "There is but One God and Allah is His Prophet. Come to Prayer." Another will call "Allah is Great. Come to Prayer. Come to Prayer." Our girl guide has been an exchange student in the USA. She said their religion did not believe they were the only ones going to Heaven but that any devout Christian in any church would be accepted.

We saw a Russian ship in the Straits of the Dardanelles coming in from the Black Sea. Constantinople is built on both sides of the European and Asiatic continents, Bulgaria and Yugoslavia are very near here.

From Istanbul we flew to Athens, Greece. The chief attraction there was the Acropolis including the Parthenon. (We climbed another thousand steps here). Musical outdoor programs are held here. Saw where Jackie Kennedy was here attending a performance.

Took pictures of the Changing of the Guard in front of the Royal Palace. Drove to Delphi, Climbed another thousand steps over the Amphitheater, the Temple of Apollo and ancient Theater grounds. Musical performances are held in the open during summer. Maria Callas sang here. We drank from the Castilian Spring named after the sweetheart of Apollo.

Came back to Piraeus harbor at Athens, and got on boat to make tour to some Grecian Islands in the Mediterranean Sea for three days. The Island of Mykonos was also visited by Miss Kennedy. We saw her hotel.

Aur Sita Tour ended here. The crowd broke up, each going to some other place. We took a plane to Madrid where we spent three days touring notable places in Spain and Portugal. Flew home from Portugal (Lisbon) about 7 hours actual flying time to New York. The plane flew at an altitude between 28,000 and 33,000 feet at a speed of about 600 mph.

We were so thankful to arrive home safely.

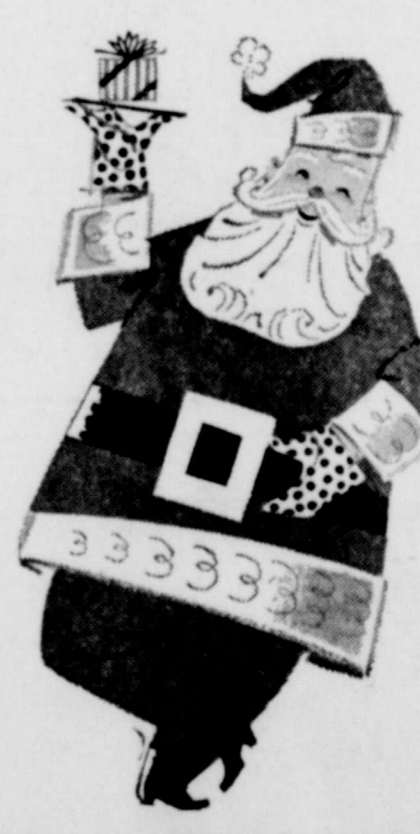

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By E. B. LAWRENCE

The Army Worm has let up a lot the last week or so. However, there is still danger for those fields that are near pasture lands. Worms are still in these pastures and there is a chance that the worms might leave the pasture and move into fields of small grains. I'd suggest that one keep inspecting fields that are near pastures. Colder weather is about all that will stop the worms.

We have been having some light frost over the county and I notice some second growth grain sorghum and young Johnson grass that has been burned some. Second growth grain sorghum and young tender Johnson grass that has been killed by frost can be dangerous for grazing livestock. The young plants will develop more of the poison than will old plants. There is no way of telling if these have poison in them or not. It is advisable to hold off grazing these until they have cured out well. The above will hold true for Sudan grass also.

Jeff Perry, on his place some three miles north of Hamilton has a very good start of Coastal Bermuda grass he got set out on the place this spring. It made a very good growth considering the dry weather. Jeff also has a plot of about one fourth an acre that he set to the grass about four or five years ago. He has fertilized this plot this year and it sure has turned out the grass, about three times as much as where he did not fertilize. From this plot he is digging his own sprigs for sprigging the rest of his fields.

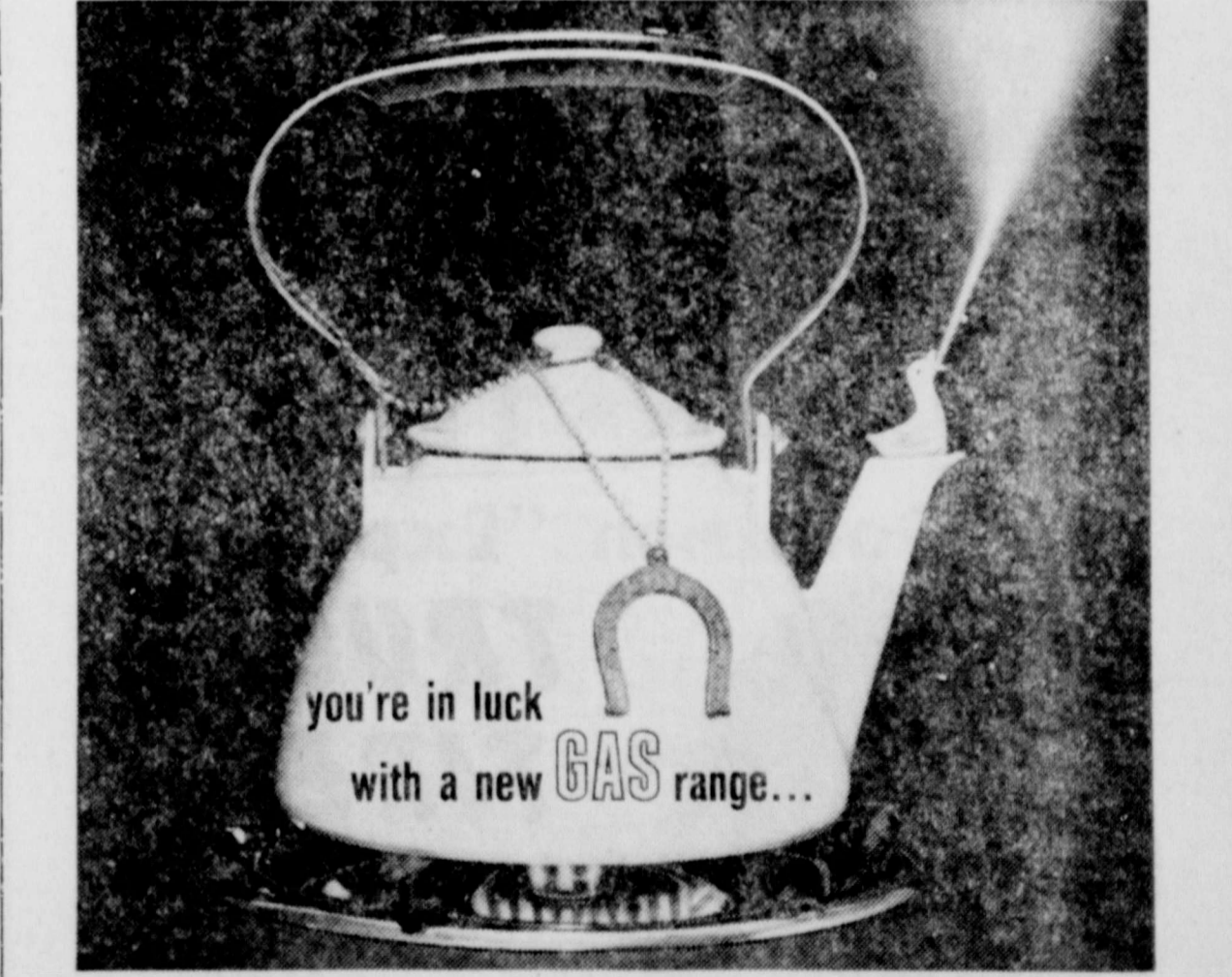
