## Type Il Polio Vaccine Will Not Be Given In Hico

Vaccine, slated to be given here the next two Sundays. November 18 and 25, will not be carried out according to Dr. B. C. Dayton, in charge of administering the vaccine locally.

The program, sponsored locally by Hico Civic Club in cooperation with the Tri-County Medical Society, has been postponed indefinitely according to Dr. Dayton.

Reason given for the cancellation was that the cost would be prohibitive since the Fort Worth Medical Society had decided not to give the vaccine there. People will re-

member that the Tri-County Medical Society had purchased the vaccine through the Fort Worth Chapter, thus reducing the cost about one-fourth.






