

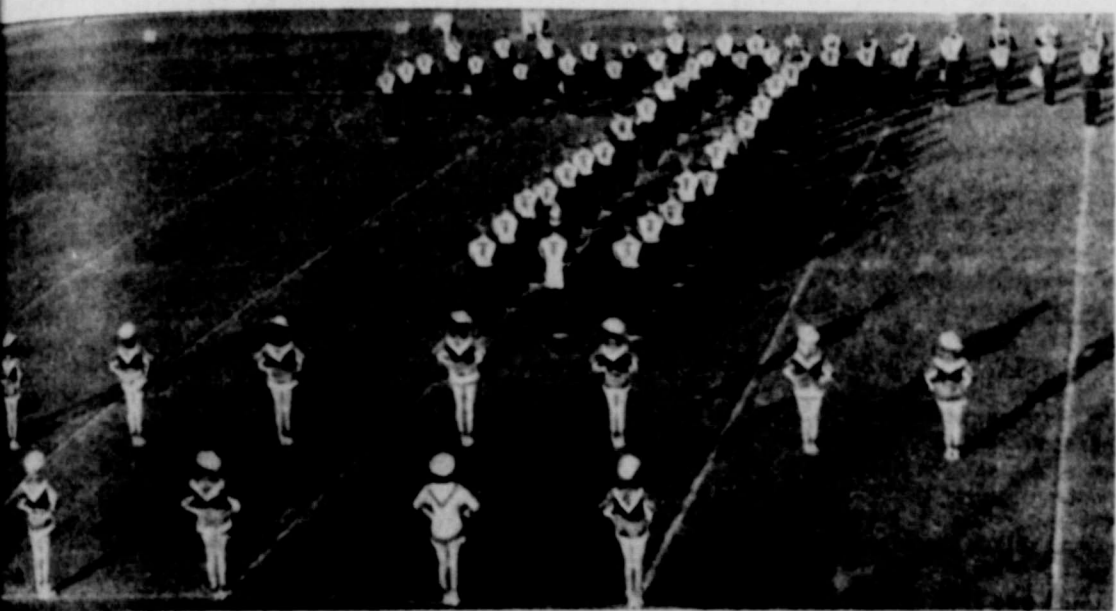

Federal Land Bank Reduces Interest Rates to Borrowers

The Federal Land Bank of Houston has announced that effective January 1, 1963, it will reduce temporarily to 5 percent the interest rate on all outstanding loans which presently bear a rate in excess of 5 percent. The contract rate on new loans will continue to be 5 1/2 percent but interest on loans closed on and after Dec. 1, 1962, will be billed temporarily at five percent until further notice by the bank.

In making the announcement, Hal Weatherford, president of the bank, said that of its \$260 million in loans outstanding more than \$100 million bear contract rates in excess of five percent and that the savings to Texas farmers and ranchers by this action will be more than half a million dollars in the year 1963 alone. Weatherford said this is the fourth time the bank has voluntarily reduced the interest on its outstanding loans.

The Houston bank makes long-term farm and ranch loans thru 73 Federal Land Bank Associations throughout Texas.

The one serving this area is the Federal Land Bank Association of Stephenville.

THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN—

Highlights and Sidelights

After a four-year test, Texas' May-June primary election set-up may be on its way out.

A cursory check of legislators at a recent gathering here found strong support, particularly among the big city members who had Republican opponents, for a voter registration law during its public hearings in the senate chamber.

Growth of the Republican party in Texas means that Democrats now face hard campaigns, in many districts, in the fall months in addition to the strenuous spring campaigns. Many legislators are talking seriously about moving the primaries to August and September. This, so voters won't have to be whipped up to voting moods twice in a year.

There is some strong resistance to returning to the old way, however.

Sen. Abraham Kazen Jr. of Laredo, a member of the special

election law revision committee, said a change like this would require a complicated revision of the code that would be almost impossible to accomplish during a regular session.

Poll Tax Controversy

The Texas Election Study Committee heard many divergent opinions on the requirements for a voter registration law during its public hearings in the senate chamber.

Main point of discussion was whether or not a literacy test should be required if the poll tax system is abolished.

League of Women Voters, represented by Mrs. Maurice H. Brown of Waco did not approve of a literacy test. Mrs. Brown said her group recommended a uniform registration plan for all voters, and offered the committee a draft of a bill which calls for permanent registration.

Several witnesses, including Isaac Satterfield of Marshall, a member of the State Democratic Executive Committee, advocated a literacy test.

Senator Kazen spoke out against it. He said since no literacy test is now required, he saw no reason why it should be necessary. "The only reason for a literacy test is to keep someone from voting," Kazen retorted.

Livestock Equal People

Texas has as many head of livestock as it does people. According to an estimate by the Texas Animal Health Commission the livestock population is 10,000,000. State Health Department estimated that the people population reached 10,000,000 last summer.

Crime Climb Slight

Major crime in Texas was way below the five percent nationwide increase for the first nine months of 1962, according to an FBI report. A survey of crime in 12 representative cities showed an increase of only 0.29 percent over the same period last year.

Report is a tabulation of murders and non-negligent homicides, forcible rapes, robberies, aggravated assaults, burglaries, larceny over \$50 and auto thefts.

Total major crimes in 12 Texas cities amounted to 49,747 offenses for the first nine months of 1962, compared to 59,599 for the same period of 1961.

The FBI warned merchants to be alerted to the shoplifting trend as the Christmas shopping season progresses. They also cautioned shoppers against leaving packages unattended in unlocked cars or in plain view in locked cars.

Tax Proposals

The Texas Commission on State and Local Tax Policy recommended that the state abandon the ad valorem tax as a source of revenue in 1968.

The state property tax, which once was a primary source of income, now comprises only four percent of the state's total tax take.

Commission stated that under the current system of assessment the tax is "so patently inequitable that there can be no reasonable argument for retaining it as a part of the state's revenue system without substantial change."

Transition Governor

A suite of rooms in Austin's Driskill Hotel has become the seat of "transition government" for Governor-elect John Connally.

He works four days a week in a suite which, appropriately, is titled the Caucus Room.

In his office, just six blocks from the Governor's office which he will take over on January 15, is a staff of 15 persons.

Connally's administrative assistant, Bill Fowler, says their pres-

William C. Long, general chairman of the Austin Inaugural Committee emphasized that all inaugural functions will be open to all Texans without admission tickets.

Battle Sure

The issue of drawing new boundaries for Texas' legislature and congressional districts appears headed for star billing when the lawmakers convene in January.

In an associated Press poll of Texas lawmakers, 71 percent who replied said they thought redistricting would be in the top 10 issues of the session.

Thirty-seven percent said it would be one of the top five controversies.

Christmas Tree Fire Safety Tips Given By Underwriters

More than 50 million American families—Hicoans included—in the next few days will be buying Christmas trees and decorating them for the holiday season. Unless care is taken, this happy symbol of the holiday season can bring tragedy, warns the National Board of Fire Underwriters. These suggestions are offered by the Board to keep your Christmas tree firesafe: 1. When you buy a Christmas tree, choose one which appears fresh. Before you buy the tree, run your hand over the needles to make sure they are firmly attached. If needles fall when brushed, the tree is dry and you should select another one. 2. When you get the tree home, keep it outdoors until you are ready to decorate it. You can keep it fresh by standing it in a pail of water. 3. You should wait until just before Christmas before setting up the tree. 4. You should place the tree in the coolest part of the room, away from radiators, heaters and the fireplace. This will keep the tree from drying, and reduce the chance of fire. 5. Your Christmas tree stand should be of the type equipped with a water container in which the trunk can rest. Fresh trees will "drink" a sizeable amount of water, and you should fill the water container daily. 6. Only flameproof decorations should be used on the tree—those made of glass, metal or fire-resistant material. 7. Use only electric lights to illuminate the tree and be sure to check light strings before placing them on the branches. Those with frayed wires should be thrown away. If you buy a new set, select a type that bears the Underwriters Laboratories label. 8. The switch controlling the tree lights should be some distance from the tree. 9. Electric trains—part of Christmas in many homes—should be set up away from the tree. Sparks from toy trains could be fire hazards. 10. Lights on Christmas trees always should be turned off when everyone is away from home. 11. Check the tree frequently for dryness. In particular, check tree needles near lights. If they have started to turn brittle, change the position of the lights. 12. When needles become so dry they start falling off, take the tree down at once and put it outdoors. 13. When Christmas presents are opened, the gift wrappings you intend to keep should be folded and put away. Other paper, ribbon, and boxes should be gathered up and thrown away promptly. 14. Even if the tree still appears to be fresh, take it down the day after New Year. 15. Merry Safe Christmas!
