For a period of say, the past 40 years, Hico has produced many outstanding contributions to society and one of the natives who has been quite successful is Judge G. Hughes of Austin.

Judge Hughes is Associate Justice of the Court of Civil Appeals, 3rd District, and readers will find that his mother, the late Jennie C. Hughes, was returned to Hico two weeks ago for burial. She was the widow of a pioneer Presbyterian minister who had a church here for many years.

I know some of you have been to the Gulf Coast and seen these smaller pelicans. These are a cousin to the White Pelican but are protected by law. These do come this far inland sometime, but mostly are found from the coast to South America. These are commonly called the Brown Pelican. These two species are the only ones found in Texas.

Now that the water is getting warm there will be many of you water skiers. I would like to ask you to have respect for the many fishermen you are sure to see on the lakes, and be extra careful. Let's try to get by this summer without a drowning or bad accident.

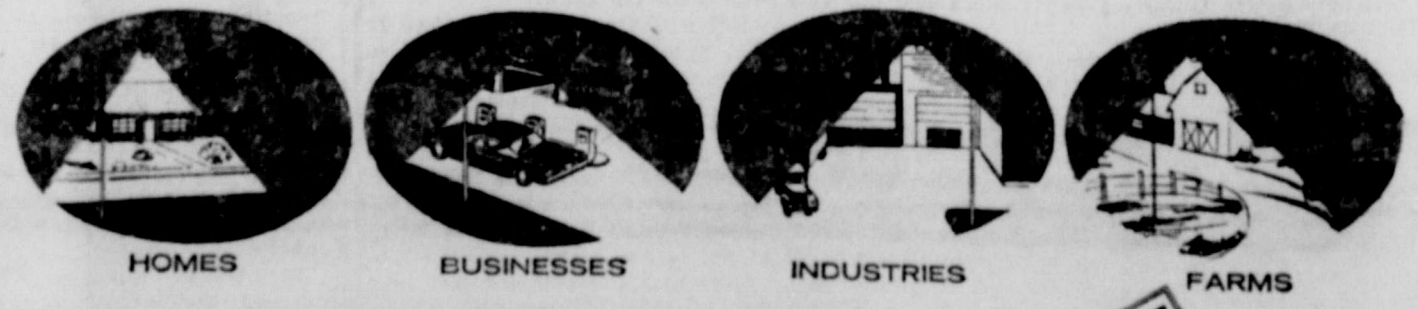

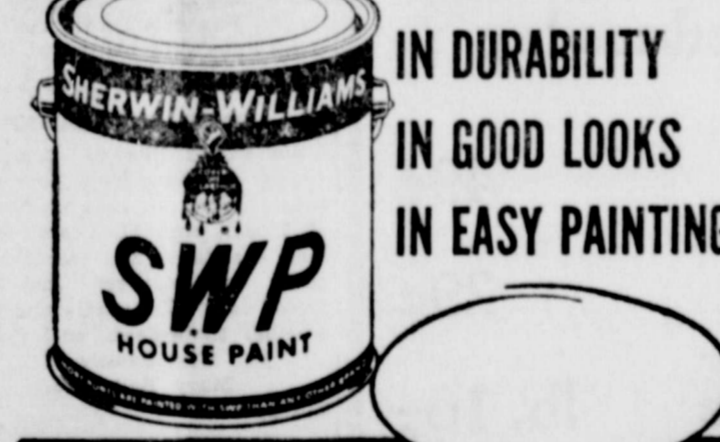

On the Home Range

By JEAN HENRY Home Demonstration Agent

Mrs. Edgar Bradley of the Fairy Home Demonstration Club wasted no time putting to use what she learned in the drapery workshop. She has made lined cotton drapes for her kitchen. They are very pretty, lined in green to accent the green in the stripes.

If you're thinking of buying a new blanket during the spring sales, here's some information that may prove useful.

Textile researchers at the Minnesota Agricultural Experiment Station, who recently tested blankets composed entirely or in part of wool, acrylic, rayon or nylon fibers, found that blankets made of just one fiber were generally better than those made of fiber blends.

All wool blankets ranked highest in warmth. After repeated launderings, wool blankets retained their thickness better than any of the other fibers.

The rayon blends were soft and fluffy when new, but reacted poorly to laundering and were highly flammable.

Washing in an automatic washer, the researchers found, was satisfactory for all blanket types if the recommended washing procedures were followed.

It won't be long until you will be wanting to store some of your blankets for the summer season. I have an excellent booklet in my office, "Home Care of Woolen

Blankets" which gives you suggestions on laundering, drying, and storing the blanket. It also tells how to care for electric blankets. So come by and pick one up or call and I will mail it to you.

Nothing improves the appearance of a house more than a fresh coat of paint. But, you can overdo it.

Specialists in the USDA's Forest Service, who know woods and wood finishes, say it's not good to paint a house too frequently.

When the house was built, it probably got 3 coats of paint. This will see it through at least 4 years. After that, add only 1 coat of paint every four or five years, or two coats not oftener than every 6 years.

Too much paint can only spell trouble for the homeowner—and possibly costly removal by blowtorch or paint and varnish remover.

THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN—

Highlights and Sidelights

A complete overhaul of the election code is due. Senate already has passed a bill correcting scores of errors in the old law, which was overhauled in haste in 1951. House members amended the bill to eliminate the "agent form" of paying poll taxes. Instead, prospective voters would have to go to the courthouse or get a deputy tax collector to certify qualification to vote.

House also refused to require county tax assessors to name civic workers as deputies.

Progress is slow on the proposals to abolish the poll tax as a prerequisite to voting.

Senators passed a proposed constitutional amendment to let the people say whether they want to keep the poll tax. But after some delay, a House committee put it in subcommittee.

Meanwhile, the national constitutional amendment to outlaw the poll tax in election of President, Vice President, Senators and Congressmen has been ratified by 30 states. When eight more ratify it, use of the poll tax in Texas would be out the window.

Sen. Abraham Kazen Jr. of Laredo envisions the possibility that the 1964 election could be held with state officers elected by poll tax holders, federal officials by everybody.

Shortest Session?

A modern day record for short legislative sessions may be set if Lt. Gov. Preston Smith and Speaker Byron Tunnell can get legislators to wind up their business by May 7.

A May 7 adjournment has been filed. But the Constitution would allow them to work until May 27 if they can't finish by the 7th.

Both houses have been making fast progress on "local and uncontented bill" days.

Big Bills Pending

Length of the legislative session hinges on the three biggest issues

yet unsettled.

One is the House-passed tax bill to provide \$32,000,000 to finance Gov. John B. Connally's higher education, tourist and industry-catching programs.

Then there's the appropriation bill, which is being worked out in conference committee headed by Sen. Grady Hazlewood of Amarillo and Rep. Bill Heatly of Paducah. It allocates the funds to each agency for spending during the next two years.

And there is the loan regulation bill, which Speaker Tunnell and Gov. Connally consider a "must." It may be in trouble since the Senate bill, which mustered a bare majority, was changed considerably by a House subcommittee.

Rural Development Act.

Rep. Joe Cannon of Mexia told the House State Affairs Committee that Texas' rural counties are in "tremendous trouble" and need help from the state.

Cannon appeared on behalf of his bill, co-sponsored by Rep. H. G. Wells of Tulla, which would apply to nine-tenths of the counties in Texas. Specifically those with less than 45,000 population.

Bill would require State Comptroller to compile a list of low-population counties and set up a rural development fund. It would be built up through a refund of two per cent of all taxes collected by these counties.

Rural development fund would provide about \$2,000,000 annually that could be spent to lure industries to counties that lack money to advertise their attractions.

Reps. J. Collier Adams of Lubbock, Ben Jarvis of Tyler and Donald K. Shipley of Houston are on the subcommittees studying the bill.

Code of Ethics

Tighter rules over the private business activities of state officials has been the talk of the Capitol since William J. Murray Jr. resigned from the Railroad Commission. Murray said he made more than \$1,000,000 in oil deals while regulating that industry.

Reps. Bob Eckhardt of Houston, James Nugent of Kerrville and Travis Peeler of Corpus Christi introduced a bill to outlaw investments by state officials in the fields which they regulate. Old Code of Ethics law, passed in 1957, merely called on them to disclose any such interests.

Rep. John Allen of Longview, chairman of the House State Affairs Committee, named a subcommittee to go over the bill—to tighten up the tightening up. He indicated that he will try to

bring the bill out for House action quickly.

Bill would prohibit legislators from appearing for pay before state boards and commissions prior to which are the lifeblood of state agencies.

Drop-Outs Deadly

Some startling facts about the high school drop-out problem have been revealed by the Texas State Teachers Association. They stated that "drop-outs face a dead end in a world where education and its skills in the employment field are becoming a necessity."

Victor Sumner of the Texas Education Agency predicted that in the next five years about a third of a million young Texans will leave high school between ninth grade and graduation.

He estimated this fatal step would cost these youngsters nearly \$75,000,000,000 in lifetime income.

"People in the employment field tell me that the hard core of unemployment now is composed of drop-outs from 20 to 30 years of age," Sumner stated.

House Bills

Victoria Rep. Dick Cory's bill authorizing district judges to provide juror's meals in the jury room, rather than dismiss them, is ready for Governor Connally's signature.

House endorsed a bill to require school boards to advertise for competitive bids on purchases totaling \$1,000 or more.

Kerrville Rep. Jim Nugent gained approval of his bill to set up strict supervision by the Secretary of State for charity fund-raising organizations which solicit \$10,000 or more a year.

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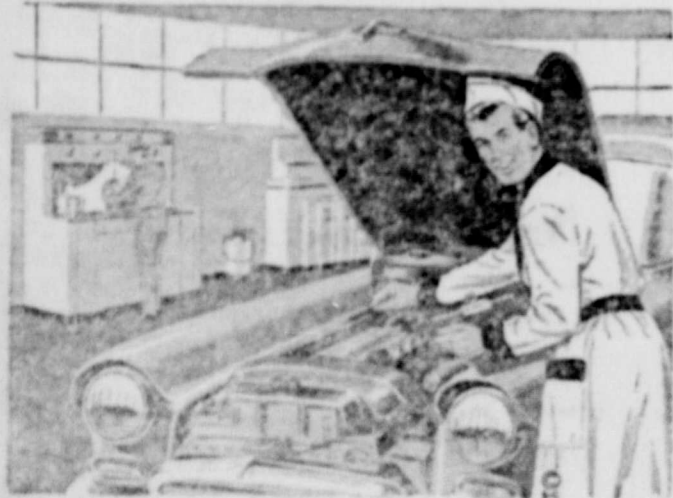

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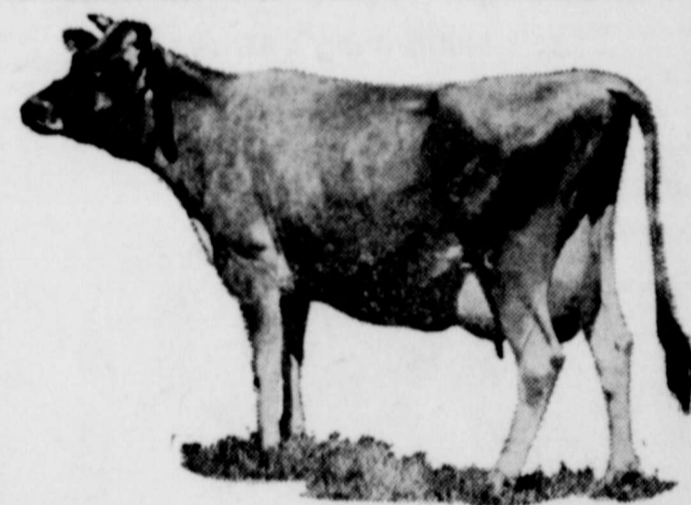

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CURRENT WASHINGTON

TAX HEARINGS
The hearings on the President's tax recommendations are concluded. Many of the pros and cons were presented. All witnesses agreed on the basic need for a tax cut but few approved the built in tax hikes which the administration has termed "structural reforms."

The President and his Secretary recognized no relationship between Federal spending and tax revenue. On the contrary, the entire program was based on the premise of planned deficit. Lip service was paid to the ideas of fiscal integrity and government self discipline, but no realistic approach to the problem of reduction of government spending was advanced by government spokesmen. Budget Director Gordon provided a measure of comic relief by referring to the "tight" or "strait" budget of \$122.5 billion. This is a hike of \$20 billion over the budget inherited by Kennedy when he took office.

The President's goal of (1) economic growth; (2) freeing of investment funds; (3) curing unemployment; and (4) increasing consumer purchasing power were, according to the witnesses at the hearings, contradicted by the tax recommendations. In their eyes, the results would be (1) impeded growth; (2) less fluid investment funds; (3) increases unemployment in industry after industry; and (4) a drop in consumer purchasing power.

Secretary of the Treasury Dillon threatened a Presidential veto if the reforms did not accompany the rate changes. The President promptly contradicted this, agreeing to postpone reforms consideration. The President warned that failure to accept his recommendations could result in a possible recession. Witnesses repudiated this threat, saying that acceptance of his recommendations could aid in bringing on a recession. Some even went so far as to say that the recommendations showed an appalling lack of knowledge of the industries involved. Generally, there was agreement that high tax rates intensified the tax inequities involved; the recommendations would result in a shift of the present tax burden from the lower to the middle income groups. Some areas of disagreement were: (1) disallowing the first 5% of itemized deductions for individual income tax computations; (2) taxing as ordinary income (instead of capital gains) (a) lump sum pension distribution, (b) real estate gains, (c) stock option when exercised, (d) sale of timber; (3) changes in the depletion allowance on mineral resources; (4) capital gain treatment of assets at time of death or gift, (treating both as though a sale).

The constant misrepresentations and contradictions, as well as the evident ignorance of the basic facts pertaining to the subject, make it virtually impossible to predict with any certainty what will come out of the legislative debates. We can certainly look for more changes and more proposals.

As a nation, we are fast spending ourselves into the poorhouse, dissipating the stored-up wealth of several generations. It is long past time that we recognized the immorality of a mental condition where everyone judges all things from the selfish point of view. Unless we soon stop the headlong plunge down the road to national bankruptcy, we stand every chance of witnessing the death of our Republic during this generation.
