Type II Oral Polio Vaccine to Be Given Here May 19-26

A community-wide effort to wipe out polio will be continued Sunday, May 19, when Type II Oral Polio Vaccine will be administered here. Sponsors of the program are the Civic Club, in cooperation with the Tri-County Medical Society. Two organizations are making a concentrated effort to offer the vaccine to every person in this area six weeks and up. Immunization station will be set up at the local school cafeteria Sunday, between the hours of 12 noon and 7 p.m. Volunteer workers will be supervised by a physician in the administration. The vaccine will be offered again following Sunday, May 26, at the same place and time. No charge will be made for the vaccine, but a free-will donation will be accepted to defray actual cost of the vaccine, approximately 25 per dose. Dr. E. C. Dayton emphasized the importance of each and every person taking the vaccine. He stated that safety of this type serum had never been questioned, that it was Type 3 which gained so much unfavorable publicity last fall. Type 3 has since been declared safe. The Civic Club, Medical Society and others interested in the program urge every citizen, regardless of age, to make a special effort to take the vaccine either of the next two Sundays.

Series of Talks Presented By SCS Personnel This Week

Carl King, chairman of Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation District board, said this week that O. F. Armstrong, working with the State Soil Conservation Board out of Temple was in the district this week making talks to schools and civic clubs on soil stewardship. Mr. Armstrong was at the Carlton school at 9:30 Wednesday, and Hico school at 11:20. He spoke to members of Hico Civic Club at 12:30. Thursday he was at Pottsville, and attended the Fort Worth Press Region Five Awards Banquet at Wichita Falls with the Hamilton-Coryell SCD supervisors and many others. The local district received a \$300 award at the Wichita Falls meeting for being the outstanding district in 51 central Texas counties.

Sunday, May 26, will be homecoming day at Hico First Baptist Church. The day will be celebrated by recognition of members and former members at the morning services. Following the services, dinner will be served. Dr. W. L. The building, long a landmark in Hico, was constructed in the 1880's. Recently the congregation voted to build a new building. \$89.75 in Till For Old Hico Medallion and Monument

Three sponsoring organizations were in the fold this week to conduct and carry out the project of erecting a monument and medallion in commemoration of Old Hico. Sponsoring organizations are South Hico Home Demonstration Club, Hico Review Club, and Hico Garden Club. The three organizations started the fund solicitation by donating a total of \$64.75 toward the needed amount. South Hico and the Garden Club each gave \$25, and the Review Club contributed \$14.75. Another donation came from Leonard Johnson and Lenard Weaver, who offered to contribute one-

fourth of the cost of erecting a suitable monument for the medallion. Hico Civic Club also voted to give \$25 to the fund, making the total \$89.75.

The local drive was started after the Hamilton County Historical Society nominated the site of Old Hico as one of four in the county worthy of recognition by the State Society. Miss Mettie Rodgers, member of the county organization will be assisted in carrying out the program by presidents of sponsoring organizations, plus Dr. E. C. Dayton, Civic Club president.

Proposed site of the monument is near Honey Creek bridge on the Fairy road, approximately one-quarter mile from where the original town of Hico stood. If possible the monument will be constructed from native stone that once were part of the old mill at Old Hico.

For Judy's Van Scott had 550, Mary Scott 406, Jane Hafer 382, and Judy Keller 400.

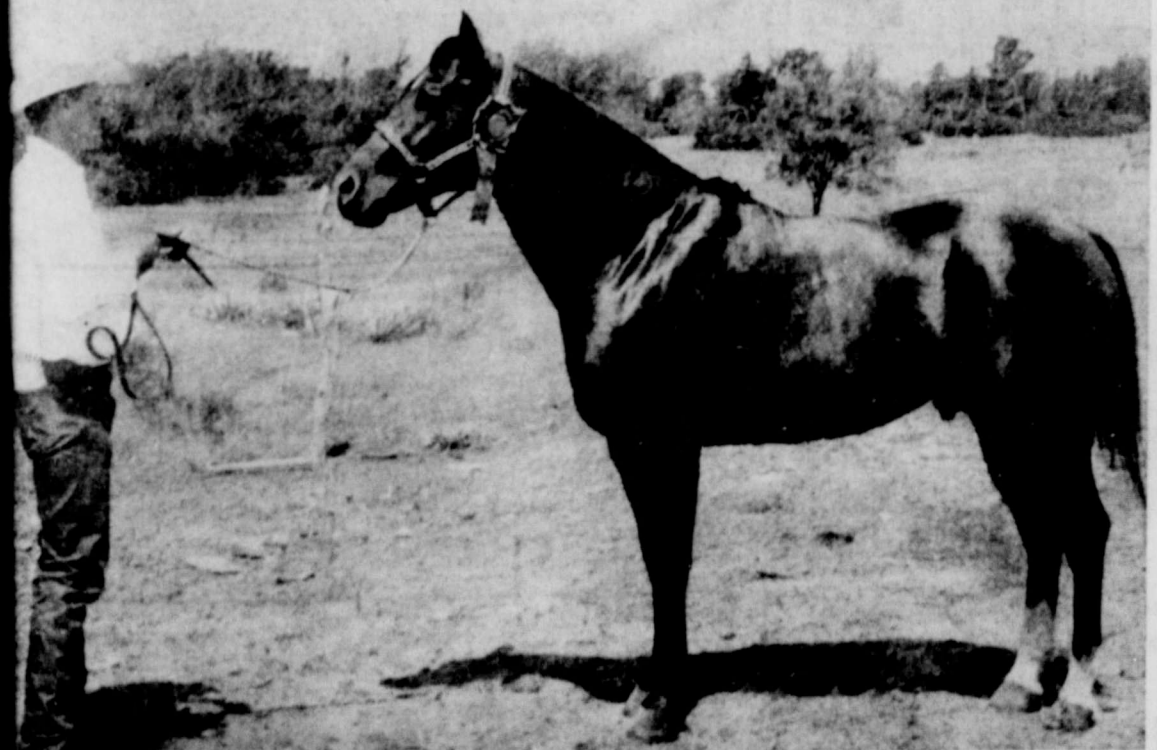

Most pins over average awards went to Bette Meador, 66 over, and Jack Goodman 31 over.

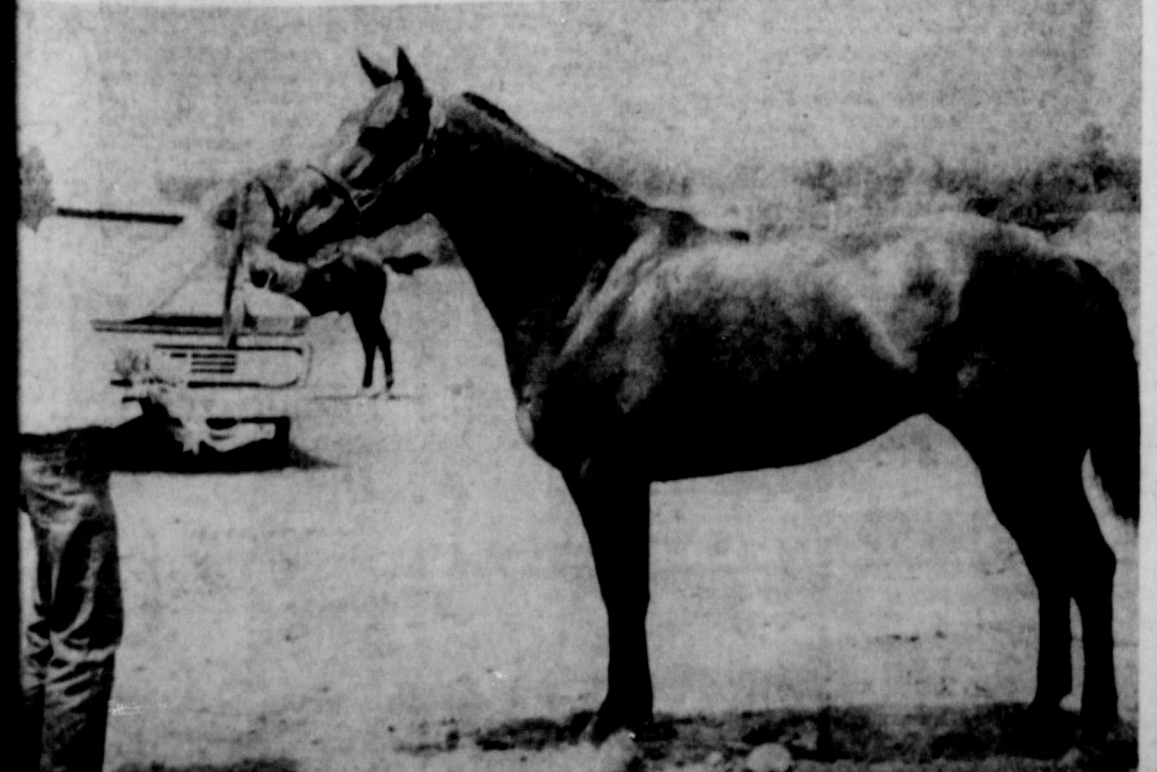

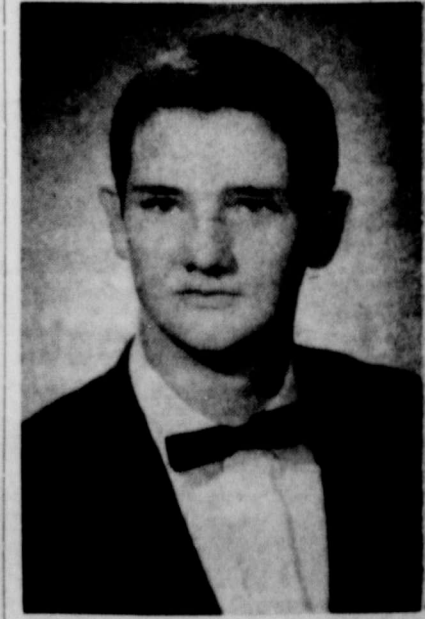

WASHINGTON— As It Looks From Here

Washington, D.C.—As individuals we have to distinguish between our needs and our wants. So should our Government.

Doubtless we need a lot of things IN this country and a lot of things FOR the country. In some places we need houses; we need arterial highways across the country; we need better educational facilities; we need more hospitals; and it is desirable we be first on the Moon.

A need is a necessity—a want is a desire, and in the meantime we are drowned in our "druthers." We need a tax cut, too, but we do not need a deficit. Particularly do we not need a planned deficit since such a theory would change a concept of fiscal responsibility which most of us have always thought more desirable than most anything else.

From what seemingly is the opinion of people all across the country, this Administration, the one before it and the one before that, could have, with wide approval insisted on reductions for expenditures and a tax cut at the same time. To increase expenditures, reduce taxes and plan a deficit, is contrary to the policy of all Administrations in the past. The new policy seems to say that the Federal Debt really does not mean much and that red ink at the bottom of balance sheets is all right.

It has been said that politics is the art of the possible. To put it another way, it is to force the possible to wait on the perfect.

There is a need to restore a trust and confidence in Government at all levels. This includes the Legislative Branch. To accomplish this, people should be able to feel the highest type of responsibility is being exercised. We will not agree on methods used, nor is judgment infallible, but fundamental aims and objectives of our Nation should also remain constant, and unchangeable. Daniel Webster said that "In this business of government, and particularly the Legislative end, what is said and done is meant to be as perceptive as possible, but never prophetic."

No one can be certain of the future, with all possible resources available for the most intelligent prognostication. Conditions have ways of changing rapidly as we move in this age. A thing may appear right today and wrong tomorrow, but the fundamentals on which our Nation was established should remain inalterable.

It took the Fabian Socialists 49 years to weaken the trust and confidence of the British in their Parliament. Supposedly it was a labor government which assured power, but actually it was the Fabians which nationalized a great part of their industry. It took Hitler only four years.

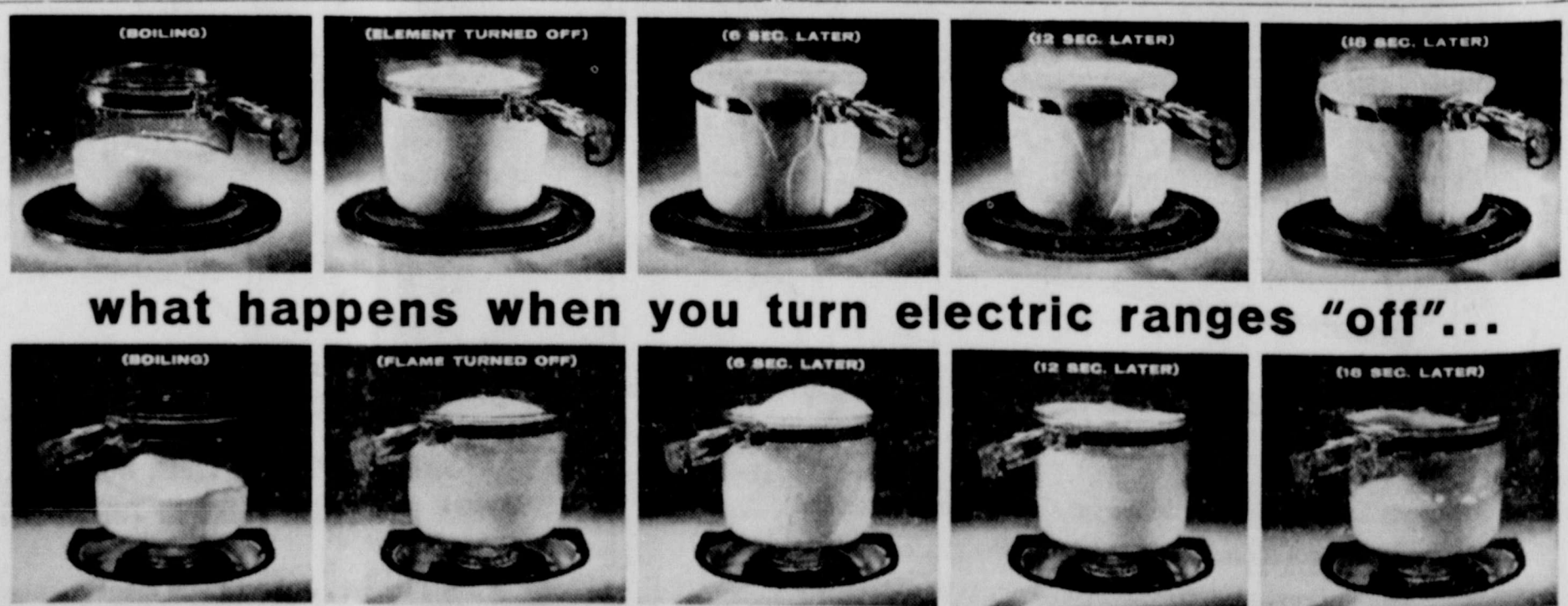

The smoke from burning poison ivy plants will also carry the toxins. To prevent contamination avoid touching it and wash any area that does come in contact with the plant. If you have poison ivy or other noxious plants on your place and you wish to control them contact your local Extension offices for the recommended control measures.

BALANCE OF PAYMENTS
One of the terms heard and read most frequently these days is "balance of payments." It occurs in discussions of tax cuts, foreign aid, the Common Market, defense spending, and many other fiscal matters.

What, exactly, is meant by the term "balance of payments"? It is the relationship between the total amount of money and goods exported from this country and the total amount of money and goods imported into this country.

Except for the year 1957, we have had a deficit in our balance of payments in every year since 1951. Last year this deficit was \$2.2 billion. This means that we lost an additional \$2.2 billion of our gold reserve.

Contrary to popular belief, the imbalance of payments has not been brought about by an imbalance in the value of our exports. The United States exports much more in goods than it imports each year.

While it is obvious that some of the expenditures being made abroad must be maintained, it is equally obvious that we must, for the sake of our financial solvency, curtail much of the spending of the product of the free enterprise system to bolster every government that puts in an appearance anywhere in the world.

Highlights and Sidelights

Gov. John B. Connally says he is giving a lot of thought to the appointment of a successor to former Railroad Commissioner William J. Murray Jr.

He says he hopes to find a replacement before the Senate adjourns on May 24, so his choice can be confirmed.

The governor stated he also is working hard on appointments to his "Committee of 25." This is a committee which will be charged with an extensive study of education beyond the high school. He has personally interviewed every candidate. Aim is to pick people who have the respect of the public and the teaching profession.

Connally Accomplishments

Governor Connally can claim a record of accomplishment with the 58th Legislature, which has carried out the following items on the list the governor laid out in his messages to the Legislature.

1. A bill authorizing the Texas Water Development Board to acquire water storage space in federal or local reservoirs is ready for Connally's signature.

2. Revision of the antiquated state Code of Criminal Procedure probably will go to a Senate-House conference committee to iron out differences.

3. Loan regulation bill is near passage.

4. A constitutional amendment removing the ceiling on welfare grants has passed the Senate and is ready for House action.

5. Padre Island National Seashore bill has been signed into law.

6. Proposed constitutional amendment repealing the poll tax passed the Senate and awaits House action. A bill to set up a registration system to replace the poll tax and a revision of the election code are close to final form in conference committees.

A tax package — mainly increases in sales taxes on cars and clothes and a year-long extension of the corporation tax—has been signed into law.

8. A Senate-passed bill limiting governors to two elected terms now awaits House action.

9. Municipal annexation bill which sets some limits on the powers of cities to annex territory, is ready for his signature.

10. Measures for creating the Texas Tourist Development Agency has been signed into law.

Both houses also have passed the bill to create a 25-member Committee to Study Education Beyond the High School; bills giving San Angelo and Pan American colleges senior status and full state support; and the Game and Fish-Park Board merger.

Women's Rights

Proposed constitutional amendment by Sen. William Moore of Bryan to give women equal property rights was passed by the Senate back in January. It was then sent to a House committee headed by Rep. Jim Cotten of Weatherford. Cotten waited until the first week of April to hold a hearing, then never named a subcommittee to consider women's rights.

Finally, an impatient House, hammered by demands from impatient women voters, instructed Cotten's committee to bring the bill out for a vote. Cotten withstood all pressures—even a full-scale committee revolt—until the House took the bill away from him and sent it to the House Insurance Committee.

Some action is promised, but there's no word as to when.

Whither Shall It Wave?

El Paso Sen. Frank Owen's bill to forbid the flying of the flag of the United Nations on or in public buildings ran into what may be a fatal delay in the House.

Delay motion came on the heels of a speech by Rep. Howard Green of Fort Worth. He said legislators have received a flood of mail favoring the Owen bill, which attacked leading Texans like former Sen. Tom Connally, former president Dwight Eisenhower and Vice President Lyndon Johnson as being "tools of the communist conspiracy."

These men will live on in memory when their detractors are "lost in the junk heap of history," Green declared. Bill's House sponsor, Rep. Walter Knapp of Amarillo, replied that "the mere fact that a dramatic fringe is supporting this bill is no reason to turn it down."

Further debate was postponed a week, which could mean indefinitely.

Holiday Confirmed

For the first time since the reconstruction era, a Negro holds a state office as a member of a major board.

Senate confirmed the appointment of the Rev. C. A. Holiday of Fort Worth to the State Board of Corrections, despite early opposition to Connally's choice.

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By E. R. LAWRENCE

Last week we found the first pecan nut casebearer eggs. This means that NOW is the time to spray your trees for this insect.

For the lower part of the county it could be a little late and for the upper part it should be about right. The ideal time to spray is when the egg hatch is at its peak.

Here is a good spray material to use, and how much: 3 pounds of 50 percent wettable Sevin powder and 2 pounds zinc sulphate in 100 gallons of water. This will kill for a period of about 7-8 days. Another good material is one and a half pints of 57 percent Malathion emulsion, 2 pounds of zinc sulphate in 100 gallons of water. Should you be able to get 80 percent Sevin, then use only 2 pounds to 100 gallons of water.

The Malathion will not kill over as long a period of time as will Sevin. It will kill for about 3-4 days. When Malathion is used, keep livestock off grazing under the trees for 7 days. When Sevin is used, remove them while spraying and when you have finished, put 'em back.

Zinc sulphate is one thing that is cheap and will pay off well when trees, pecan trees, are sprayed with it. If you have some pecan that are off color, light green, or

dead at the tips of the branches an dmaybe further back, then using zinc as a spray will prevent this. You'll be surprised what this stuff will do to a pecan tree.

Research shows that cattlemen can just about eradicate lice on cattle by always spraying them twice at 14 days apart.

Have you got some walnut timber you'd like to put to a good use? Then get some buds this winter and bud them to the Carpathian walnut. This is a walnut that looks about like the well-known English walnut. The Carpathian grows fast, is a good lawn tree and is adapted to this area. It can be budded or rafted to native walnuts and will do well when this is done.

Nurseries do not have too many young trees but they can be bought from some of them. Plantings show that it perhaps is better to purchase trees that are 8 to 10

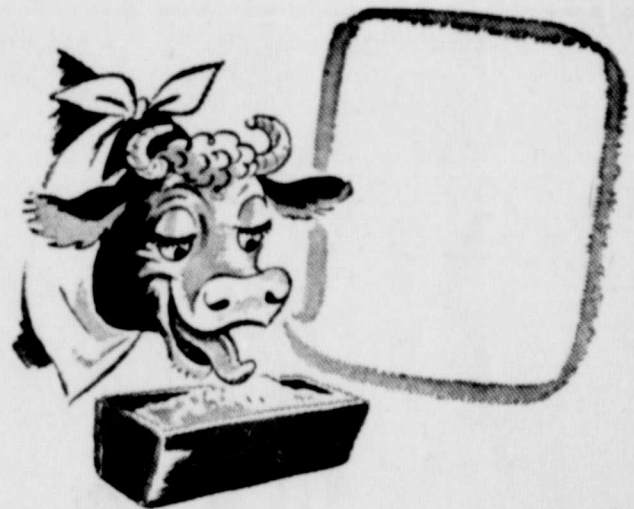
feet tall. These seem to grow off better than smaller cheaper ones.

Dick Morris, down on the Leon near Jonesboro, has one of the well cared for pecan groves in the county. Last week he was mowing the grove and believe me, it was a sight to see. He has one of the largest trees that I have ever seen.

If not the largest, it is about 3 and a half or five feet through and has a spread of little more than 100 feet. Year before last it produced 800 pounds of nuts. If he gets 20c a pound for them this would be \$160 and all this on about a third of an acre of land. Yes, pecan trees are valuable.

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Screwworm Cases Down From Same Period Last Year

Mission, May 15. — There was not yet been achieved. The nagging news this week from the officials of the screwworm eradication program and also a word of warning. They reported that the number of screwworm cases in Texas in April totaled 357 compared with 2,633 during April 1962, a very sizable drop. Also, that only 374 cases were reported during the first four months of 1963, as compared with 3,085 cases for the same period last year.

Authorities credited the combined factors of a severe insect-killing winter, heavy release of sterile flies, and good cooperation from farmers and ranches who are detecting and treating infestations for the decrease in screwworm incidence.

They warned, however, that livestockmen cannot afford to relax their vigilance because eradication

has not yet been achieved. The nagging fly population must be kept down by preventing the development and spread of screwworm flies, they said.

Livestockmen are urged to inspect their animals at least twice a week, treat wounds and infestations, collect samples from infested wounds and report cases to eradication headquarters at Mission or to the county agent or vocational agriculture teacher. Periodic spraying of livestock with Corral or Korlan is also recommended.

Producers have been noting fast action when a sample is confirmed as screwworms. In most instances, sterile flies have been dropped in the area where the infestation was found the following day after the sample was identified in Mission.

Livestock in and near the infested area are sprayed at program expense by inspectors.

Eradication workers hope to continue to treat each case promptly and thoroughly and feel this can be done as long as producers do their part in preventing any large increase in cases.

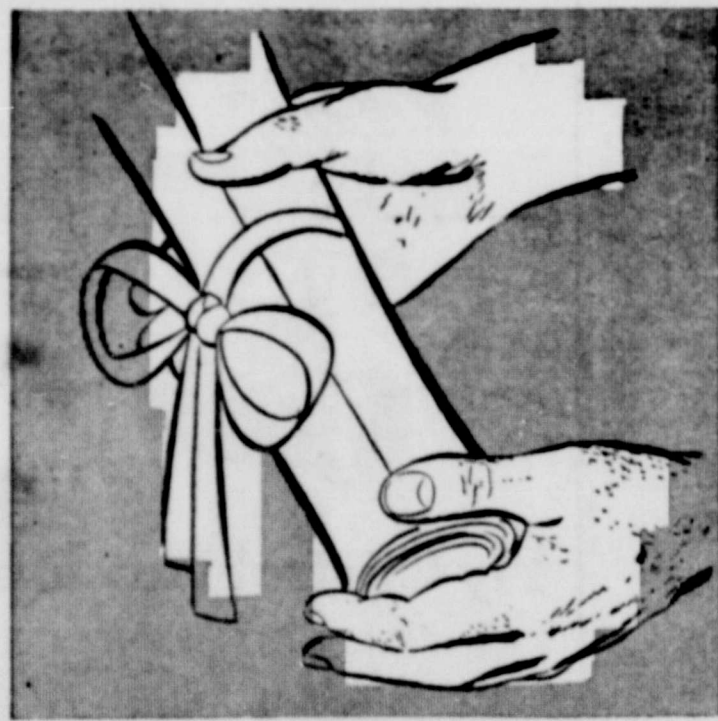
