## HERE IN HICO

Approximately 30 dairies in the Hico area receive in excess of \$1 million dollars annually from the sale of their products, which makes this phase of local business a major factor in the economy of this community.

June is being observed as Dairy Month throughout the nation, and farmers in this area are participating in the program through the Central West Texas Milk Producers Association which most farmers here are members.

If you have never visited a dairy farm, then sometime during this special observance make a point to do so. Dairying has been the foundation of the economy of not only farmers here, but to businesses and individuals as well. Dairymen will welcome your visit to your convenience, and will give you a first-hand story of their operation. We join other businesses in saluting Hico's most progressive industry.

Ever since I can remember, the News Review has published a weekly column of school activities entitled "The Mirror." Often I wondered when the name was adopted, and recently Mrs. S. Check Sr. shed some light on the subject.

Mrs. Check is in possession of the first issue of The Mirror, dated October 18, 1922, which was a publication within itself. The 4-page broadsheet of that date was Volume I, Number 1, and was complete with advertising from local merchants. It was chock full of school news. Published every second Wednesday of the month, Editor in Chief The Mirror was Margaret Minnie, who wrote in her introductory column: "We have named the paper the Mirror because we want to reflect everything that happens in our school, and those who read it will know our school by its own reflector."

Other members of the staff of the first publication were: Esther Eiden, associate editor in chief; Charles Smith, business manager; Fred Goad, assistant manager; Louise Driskell, circulation manager; Arietta Shaffer, society editor; Trueman Moore, athletic editor; Dr. J. Cole, associate athletic editor; Louise Cheney, senior editor; Lon Burden, junior editor; Truman Calladay, sophomore editor; Harold Hudson, freshman editor; and Ed Burnett, advisor.

The paper was interesting, and it is nice to know when and where the Mirror originated.

Not too much interest has been shown in the Old Hico Foundation from the standpoint of contributions and this week Mettie Rodgers, member of the County Historical Society, made a plea to residents to contribute a small amount to the fund so that work can be started. Miss Rodgers said that if 50 people would contribute \$1.00 each, sufficient money would be on hand to finish the project.

Approximately \$275 is needed and total in the fund this week was in the neighborhood of \$140. The program is worthy of our consideration, and if you have an extra dollar, the foundation would certainly put it to good use.

No word has been received here of an official drop of sterile flies from the Southwest Animal Health Center to combat the screwworm problem, but evidence of such a drop in this area was brought to light this week.

John Golightly found a carton on his ranch that was used to make such a drop from the air. The carton of sterile flies was apparently dropped sometime since Thursday's rains as it showed no signs of being out in the weather.

Discovery of the carton is a good indication that the program is working successfully throughout the state, as we have heard of no confirmed reports of actual screwworm cases in this area.

## NEWS REVIEW SUBSCRIPTION RATES TO ADVANCE

The News Review is regretfully announcing an increase in subscription rates this week, to go into effect Monday, June 17.

The increase became necessary due to continued increases in publication costs and postage.

New rates will be as follows: Hamilton, Erath and Bosque counties, \$2.55 per year. Outside those three counties, \$3.06 per year. Out of state, \$3.50 per year. Last increase in subscription prices was seven years ago, and only two increases have been made in the last 23 years. While the management has made every effort to keep rates as low as possible, prices of paper, ink, and postage have continued upward until the increase was made necessary.

Advance notice of the increase is being given so that subscribers may take advantage of the old rates between now and June 17.

## Dairy Herds 'Pampered' For Maximum Productivity

Today's dairy farmer produces on his farm a raw material which is processed in dairy plants before it is sold to consumers. The more raw material produced by the dairy farmer for consumers near and far, the better the milk picture will be for him.

Breeding and feeding, plus good care of the cows, will usually determine the amount of milk produced. The better the breeding for production a cow has, the better she must be fed to produce at her full capacity.

Good breeding must be made effective through a program of proper feeding. It is a waste of the dairyman's time, effort and money to pour feed into cows that are not going to produce enough milk regardless of how much feed they receive. For every unit of feed used, there should be a measurable return in milk.

### Hamilton-Coryell SCD Entered In Goodyear Contest

The Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation District has entered the 17th Annual Goodyear competition to select the nation's top 52 conservation districts, according to O. C. King, district chairman.

Activities of the district will be weighed against the performance of other districts in the state in determining the outstanding district in the event.

Key agricultural leaders will serve as judges and will select the state winner. Soil conservation efforts from May 1, 1963 through December 31, 1963 will be considered.

Grand award for the 52 districts selected nationally will be an expense paid work-study trip to Arizona in December 1964 for one member of the district governing body and the outstanding farmer-cooperator in each winning district. The 104 men selected will be guests at Goodyear Farms, a 14,000 acre general farm operation near Phoenix.

Hamilton-Coryell district has taken part in competition in the past and was named first place winner in region five by the Fort Worth Press in their "Save the Soil and Save Texas" contests in 1962-63. District supervisors are Carl King, Paul Hinson, Mack Riley, Marshall King and Gene Pruitt.

King said the district's outstanding cooperators will be selected from among the 1600 farm operators enrolled in the district program. Nationally about 1,800,000 farmers in 2,900 districts will be eligible for the grand award trip.

Keeping fit isn't merely doing daily pushups and drinking sauerkraut juice. A well balanced diet plays a major role in physical fitness. Add to this a sensible program of exercise all through life and moderation in all things.

Bud Wilkinson, head of the President's Council on Youth Fitness, urges Americans to get themselves into sound exercise program and follow good eating habits. "Our surveys have shown," he said, "that malnourishment is not limited to low income groups. A large percentage were from the high income groups, mainly because the children were satisfied with soft drinks and sandwiches."

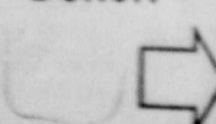
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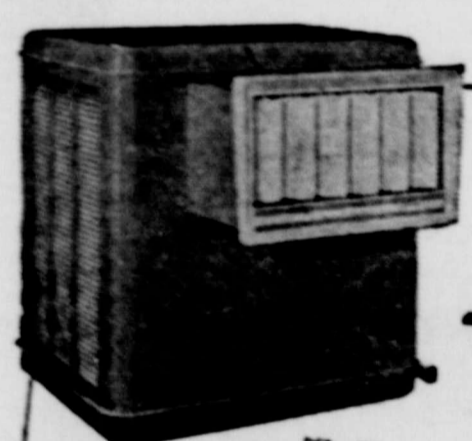

ed out grills, reflects the heat and absorbs drippings.

In 1962 the average number of milk cows is estimated at 17,088,000. This is five million fewer milk cows than in 1950, but the average milk production per cow has increased from 5,314 pounds to 7,370 pounds in the 12-year period.

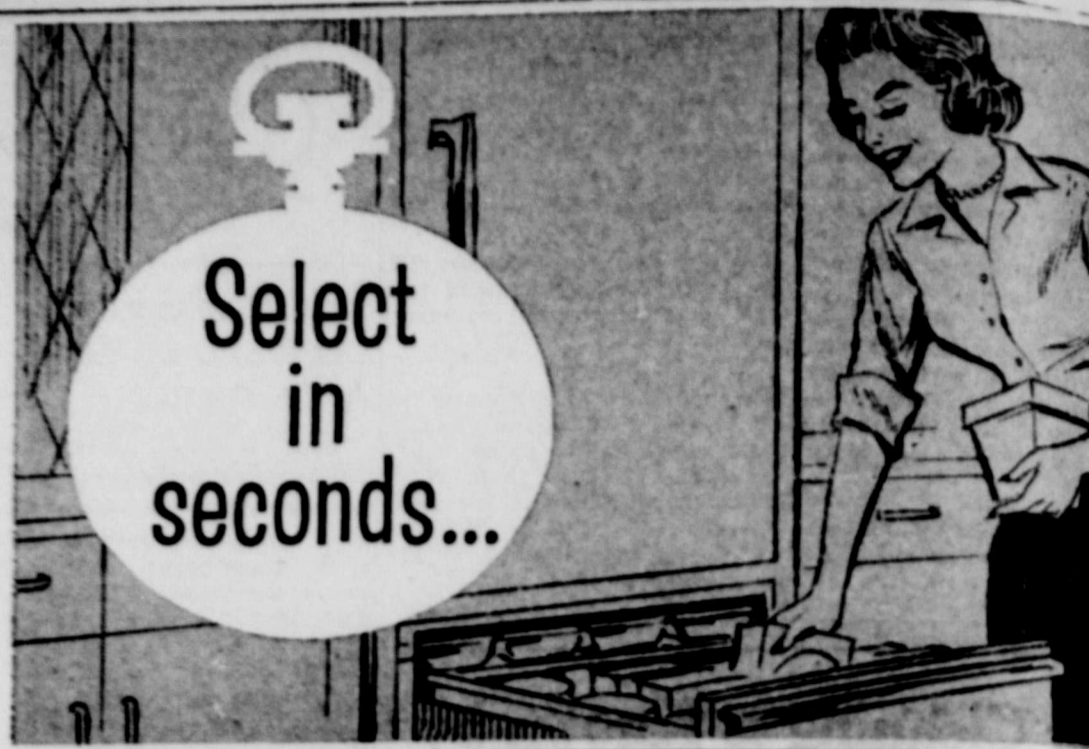

### Milk Goes to Consumer by Modern Distribution System

From the time milk leaves the cow until it is delivered to the housewife either to her back porch or to her cart at the grocery store, milk is under constant refrigeration.

The milk flows from the cow through stainless steel pipes to a refrigerated storage tank in the dairy barn. This milk is promptly cooled to 60 degrees or below until it is transported by refrigerated tank truck to the processor.

During production and delivery, the milk is under refrigeration. This assures the consumer of a quality dairy product and also enables dairies to transport milk the great distances safely.

The quality control of Grade A milk is greatly aided by refrigeration. In addition, however, the sanitary quality of milk depends chiefly upon the effectiveness of a farm sanitation program. This program is effective only when a close working relationship exists between the field sanitarian and the milk producer.

It is the function of the field sanitarian to see that the basic fundamentals of producing milk of superior quality are followed.

The cows should be clean and healthy.

They should be milked in clean surroundings.

All utensils with which milk comes in contact with must be approved construction and properly cleaned and sanitized.

It has been established that systematic routine laboratory testing is essential to the success of a quality-control program. The widespread use of refrigeration is a basic part of any quality control program to assure consumers of the finest dairy products.

Keeping a daily supply of dairy foods in the nation's stores, restaurants and homes requires the services of more than two million people.

### COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

Let's not forget that this month is National Dairy Month. And I wonder if any of you have bought that extra package of ice cream, or have started drinking sweet milk, or have you made plans to visit one of the dairies in your community?

Peaches and other fruits are beginning to ripen now and this would be a good time to get out the ice cream freezer and make up a good batch of ice cream with your favorite fruit mixed in.

About six weeks or so ago we had a real seige of caterpillars that took all the leaves off many of the oaks and other trees. Well, the bag worms are here and in a short time we will have some trouble with them on arbovitae if we don't do something about it. The bag worms are just making their appearance and it is while they are small and young that they are easiest to kill. But if one waits until they have just about stripped the trees, or cedars or arbovitae, they are going to be hard to kill. Too, it is hard on plants when all the leaves are eaten off.

The bag worm can easily be controlled now by spraying with a solution of Malathion, Sevin, or lead arsenate, or Toxaphene. Here are the amounts to use in one gallon of water for a spray solution:

Malathion: 2 tablespoons; Sevin: 50 per cent 2 tablespoons; Sevin 80 percent, one and three fourths tablespoons; Toxaphene, 60 percent emulsion concentrate, 1 tablespoon; lead arsenate, 2 tablespoons. Either one of these will give good control and for safety I'd suggest Malathion or Sevin.

When bag worms get some size on them they sure do make good fish bait especially if you want to catch a good mess of perch. Just gather a paper sack full and light out for the creek or lake, skin a worm on the hook and it won't be long before you've got a real mess of fish.

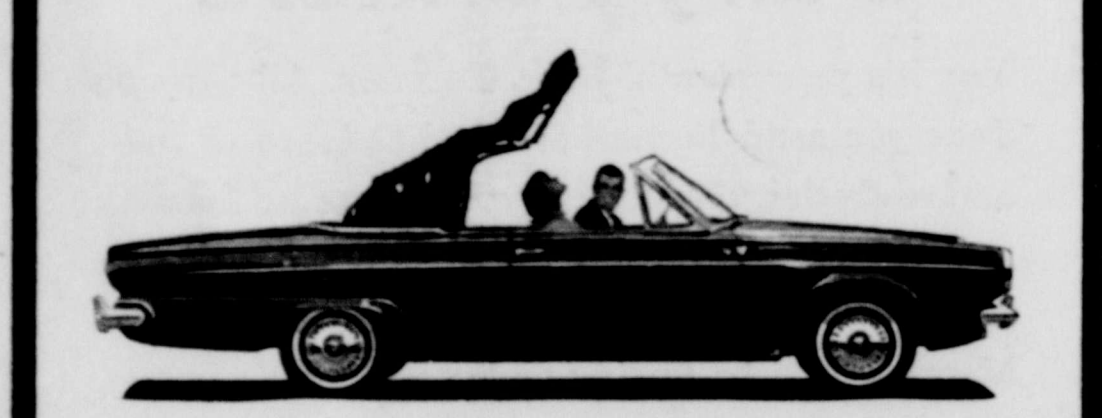
