## Theatre Opening Set Next Thurs.

Hico Theatre, closed for the past few months, will re-open next Thursday night, June 20, under an experienced management headed by Miss Annie Coleman.

Miss Coleman, who moved here last fall from Abilene to open Hico Specialty Shop, has many years experience in theatre operation, including three years here in the late 1940's when she owned and operated the local movie house. She has operated Metro Theatre in Abilene since leaving Hico.

The theatre building is currently undergoing a complete renovation, including fresh paint, re-spacing of seats, new carpets, and a general clean-up. The June 20th date was tentative at mid-week, contingent on completion of the work, but Miss Coleman anticipated the opening at that time.

The new operator, in revealing her plans to re-open the show, said "Hico can still be a good theatre town, and we intend to make it one. We want the business to be an entertainment facility not only for the young people, but for the adults as well, and it is with these thoughts in mind that we are attempting the endeavor."

Scheduling has not been completed as yet, but Miss Coleman said that she hoped to keep the show open about four days a week to start. Days will probably be Thursday, Friday, Saturday, Sunday afternoon, and possibly Monday.

For the men, Glenn Ross was high with a big 205-558, followed by Watt Ross 546, Steve Parks 542,

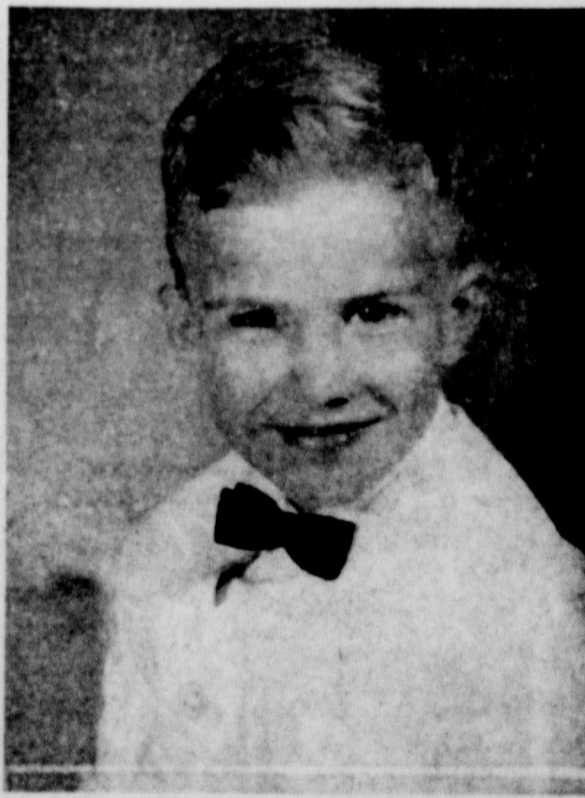
Euck Meador 497, and Rusty Robertson 478.

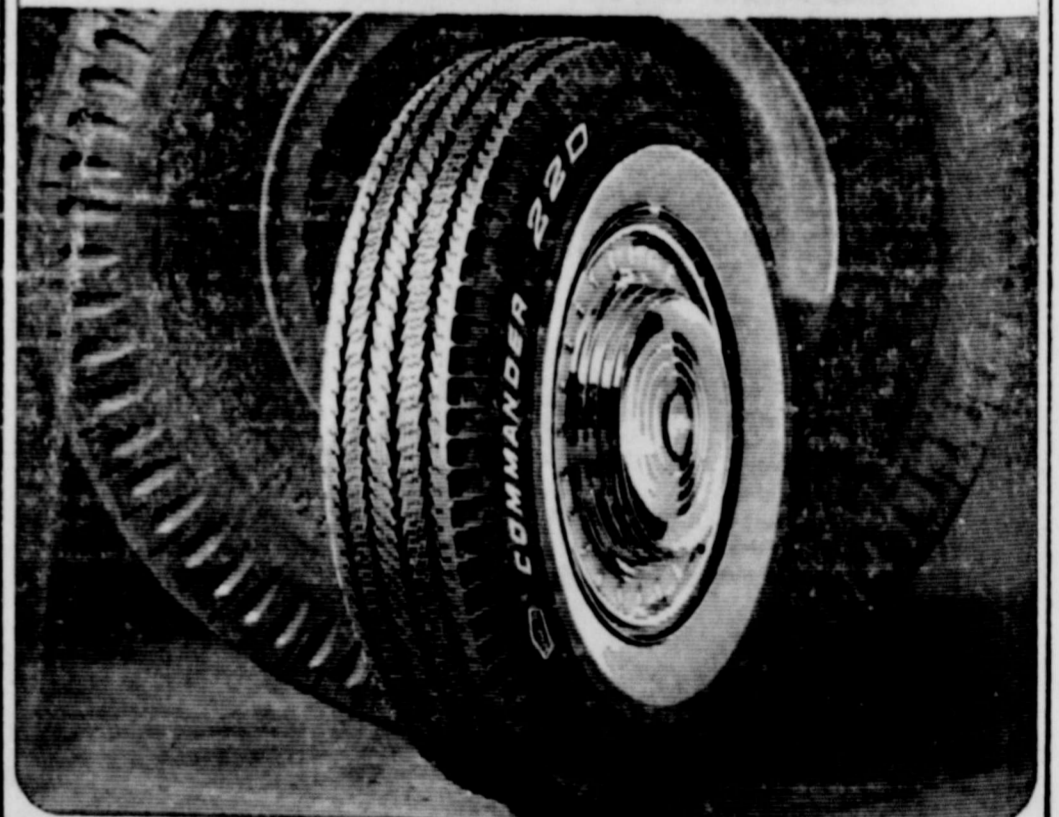
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# FAIRY

# Ten Food Products Come from Dairyland



**MILK**—Great changes have taken place in processing and distributing milk since the days of the Pilgrims. Milk today is pasteurized, often homogenized or fortified with vitamin D, and sealed in sanitary containers.

**BUTTER**—No other food is more important to the cook who takes pride in the flavor of her creations. No other spread can match butter's ability to bring out the best in foods, especially in hot vegetables and baked foods. Butter is churned from cream, and one pound of butter represents roughly the amount of cream contained in 10 quarts of milk.



**CHEESE**—Among the most popular cheeses available today are Cheddar, generally known as "American," Swiss, Gouda, Edam, Cream cheese, Brick, and Blue. Other favorites are Provolone, Mozzarella, Parmesan and Romano, which originated in Italy; and Camembert and Neufchatel, originally from France.



**ICE CREAM**, according to historians, is more of a perfection than a creation. It grew out of flavored ices which were favorites of the nobility. American confectioners specialized in the making of ice cream prior to the signing of the Declaration of Independence. Favorite flavors today are vanilla, chocolate, neapolitan and strawberry.



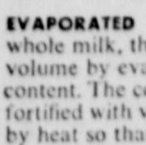
**COTTAGE CHEESE** is one of the most popular of dairy products. It is economical, low in calories, and a good source of protein. It comes in two varieties: creamed, containing a small amount of fresh dairy cream, and dry. Either type is available as large curd or small curd, determined by the size into which the curd is cut before it is cooked.



**FRESH SOUR CREAM**—In pre-pasteurization days, sour cream was cream which had soured. Now, fresh sour cream is produced by adding selected cultures to cream which has been pasteurized and homogenized. Modern fresh sour cream has a different and more pleasing flavor and texture than its early ancestor.



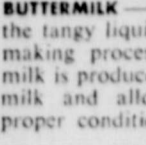
**CREAM** is made from whole milk by means of a separator which divides the whole milk into cream and skim milk. Whipping cream is used for flavor and appearance and coffee cream brings out the finest flavor in coffee. Half and half, a combination product, neither cream nor milk, is especially good for cereals or in fruit dishes.



**EVAPORATED MILK** is produced by pasteurizing whole milk, then concentrating it to half its original volume by evaporation of part of the natural water content. The concentrated milk is then homogenized, fortified with vitamin D, sealed in cans and sterilized by heat so that it keeps without refrigeration.



**NONFAT DRY MILK** is produced by removing fat and water from fresh liquid milk. It is readily soluble in water and contains all the protein, calcium and carbohydrate values of fresh whole milk. Nonfat Dry Milk is widely used in making today's fine breads.



**BUTTERMILK**—Old fashioned buttermilk used to be the tangy liquid left in the churn when the butter-making process was completed. Modern buttermilk is produced by adding a "culture" to skimmed milk and allowing the milk to "ripen" under proper conditions.

## THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN—

### Highlights and Sidelights

Texas Research League, a non-profit government study organization that does many administration studies at the request of the state, has issued a report on its year-long probe of the Railroad Commission. Many of its recommendations on agency management and oil and gas conservation already are being programmed.

One scheduled change involves the staffing and management of Railroad Commission district offices. Commission now has 12 such offices. Responsibilities with respect to wells and staff members are so varied that the League believes the system unfairly imbalanced.

District 8 in Midland, for example, has approximately four times as many wells as District 4 in Corpus Christi, but each office is staffed with only four engineers. Wichita Falls has more than twice as many wells as Houston but two less field men.

Four field men watch over 62,148 operating wells in the Midland district, yet 21 men oversee 26,036 wells in the Kilgore area.

League's answer to the problem is to redistribute and cut the districts from 12 to 10.

The huge Midland district would be divided into three areas with new offices at Lubbock and Fort Stockton.

## June Dairy Month Honors Nature's Most Perfect Food

June is the month which honors nature's most nearly perfect food—milk. And it is a time when there is an abundance of the health giving food, says Shannon Carpenter, area dairy specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The story of dairying in this country is closely tied to progress. The settlers at Jamestown and later pioneers depended on the dairy cow for much nourishment just as people do today in all fifty states.

The dairy cow is a marvelous machine that takes grain and grass and makes it into the milk. Milk not only gives energy but is an excellent way to curb the appetites of weight watchers, says the specialist.

Housewives get a bargain in dairy products. The food nutrients that they furnish for about 20 cents would cost 43 cents if supplied by other sources. The dairy products consumed by the average family contains about 25-26 percent of the calories 40-45 percent of the protein, 75.84 percent of the calcium, and 35-39 percent of the vitamin A they need.

Dairying is well adapted to Texas because of its many rolling hills, shade trees, good water supply, and ideal soil and climate for the production of dairy feed. Its many good pastures are one of the essentials of dairy production, says Carpenter.

The dairy industry is the only agricultural endeavor that is carried on in every state and thus forms one of the mainstays of the nation's agriculture. Dairying brings a regular pay check to the community and dairy dollars flow into all channels of trade, says Carpenter.

The specialist urges you to use more dairy products, especially during June Dairy Month. He reminds that you never outgrow the need for milk, nature's most near-perfect food.

board appointments. These 15 citizens named will take the place of just one man—Attorney General Waggoner Carr.

Switch was made possible by a bill, supported by the attorney general, which passed during the recent legislative session. End result will be to peel down the pile of ex officio jobs, which have burdened attorneys general in the past, and give Carr more time for his main job as the state's head lawyer.

**Good News**  
Although state and federal animal health officials reported that 72 Texas counties are now tagged "screwworm infested" the report was good news said Dr. R. G. Garrett, executive director of the Texas Animal Health Commission. Garrett said that 333 samples confirmed as screwworms in the March 31-April 27 period represented a decrease of 95 to 98 percent in the number of cases in years before the screwworm eradication project went into effect. "We're real happy with the success of the program," Dr. Garrett

said. "We hope to be completely successful in wiping out the screw worm by the end of the three-year program." He said livestock producers were responsible for the stamping out of the costly pest in at least two ways: Through their \$3,000,000 contributions and through excellent cooperation in reporting cases and sending samples.

It's strictly a producers' program—initiated by livestock producers and wholeheartedly supported by producers.

**States Rights Bills in Air**  
The 58th Legislature passed two proposed states rights amendments to the U.S. Constitution. But both are a long way from changing the law of the land.

One would make it simple for the states to initiate other amendments to the constitution; the other would prevent federal courts from ruling on states restricting as population shifts occur.

To make the grade, both would have to be adopted by 34 states. So far, only 11 have approved the first proposal, and 12 have affirmed the second.

### Screwworm Eradication Receives Increased Momentum

The fight to eradicate the bothersome screwworm from the Southwest is receiving increased momentum as the plant in which sexually sterile screwworm flies are reared is being modified to facilitate production of more than 130 million flies per week.

Officials of the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program announced that the increase in sterile flies should be available by mid-July. The additional flies will be used to combat isolated screwworm outbreaks outside of the area where the insect can normally survive winter temperatures, as well as to eliminate native flies in the southern parts of Texas and New Mexico which comprise the overwintering area.

No increase in building space is required in order to expand production officials stated. Some modifications of existing equipment are necessary and an increase in personnel and cost of production and distribution is expected.

The plant near Mission was completed in June 1962 and was designed to produce an average of 50 million flies per week with a top production of 75 million. As a result of experimentation that developed many improvements in fly-rearing techniques, more than 100 million flies have been produced each week for several months with little change in original plant and equipment.

The announcement that the "fly factory" is to be modified comes at a time when Southwestern farmers and ranchers are experiencing less than 10 percent as many screwworm infestations as last year. Since January 1, 1963, about 1,200 screwworm cases have been reported in the eradication area composed of Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Louisiana, in contrast with more than 9,500 cases reported for the same period in 1962.

Despite the marked decrease in infestations officials have warn-

ed that livestock producers cannot afford to relax their vigilance. Stockmen should continue to look for wounds infested with larvae and immediately report infestations by collecting larvae samples from wounds and sending them to the Mission laboratory or taking them to the local county agent.
