Plans Almost Complete For 77th Old Settlers Reunion

Reunion preparations were fast approaching a climax this week, as Manager James Cryer said most details were complete for the 77th edition of the homecoming.

The traditional parade kicks off activities next Wednesday, July 31, at 5:30 p.m., and will be followed by a Pony Express Race, popular feature of the Reunion, Billy Doty is in charge of the race, and anticipates at least four teams being entered.

Following the Wednesday parade, the traditional Miss Reunion Contest will feature attraction under the pavillion, and Mrs. Bruce Slaughter, chairman, has signed up 24 contestants.

Thursday night has been set aside for an amateur-talent contest, with J. T. Butler of Carlton in charge. An added attraction to the Thursday night program will be an appearance of the Stroud Sisters of Dublin, popular singing group who appeared at the Reunion three years ago. Butler said that entries were coming in at a rapid pace, and prospects for a good program were bright.

Friday night, the Dublin Jaycee Playboys, a string band, will be featured at the park. The Stroud Sisters will also make an appearance on this program, plus possible other features of entertainment.

Final night of the four-day celebration, Saturday, will feature the traditional Old Fiddlers Contest. The contest annually draws a large entry, and this year will be no exception, with several contestants already entered. Drawings for valuable merchandise will also be held Saturday night.

The Reunion, billed as the oldest homecoming event in the state, annually draws huge crowds during the four-day run, and another large gathering is expected this year.

Judge J. C. Barrow will officially kick off activities Wednesday afternoon with his welcoming address.

Carlton Man Aboard USS Los Angeles

Harold T. Thompson, Chief Machinists Mate, USN, son of Mr. Z. T. Thompson of Carlton, is serving aboard the heavy cruiser USS Los Angeles which recently returned from a 7-month cruise with the Seventh Fleet in the Far East.

Ports of call during her deployment included Yokosuka, Yokohama, Koike, Sasebo, Kagoshima, Fukuoka, Nagasaki and Shimoda, Japan; Chin Hae, Korea; Subic Bay, Philippines; Okinawa; and Hong Kong.

The Los Angeles won awards for battle-readiness of her operations, gunnery and engineering departments during the cruise. She scored near-perfect in shore bombardment exercises and also took part in joint operations with the English Navy.

At Nagasaki, Japan, Los Angeles crewmen were invited to participate in the city's "Port Opening Festival." They spent three days there, welcoming 20,000 visitors aboard the ship.

The Los Angeles was one of two U.S. ships invited to take part in the "Black Ship Festival" at Shimoda, Japan. The celebration marks the arrival 110 years ago of Commodore Perry and his squadron of black ships. This mission opened trade and diplomatic relations between America and Japan.

A veteran ship, Los Angeles has given 18 years service to the Navy and is slated for decommissioning in the near future. This successful cruise with the Seventh Fleet adds a proud final chapter to her record.

Boyd S. Greenway, Prominent Rancher, Dies Suddenly at Home

Boyd S. Greenway, 55, Erath County farmer and rancher, died last Thursday morning at his home in Stephenville after suffering a heart attack.

Born Feb. 2, 1908 in Alexander, he was the son of Jim Greenway and the late Mrs. Greenway. He attended school and part of high school at Alexander and graduated from Stephenville High School where he was a star athlete.

He was married to Faye Lovelless in February of 1933, and they are parents of two daughters, both of whom survive, Mr. Greenway had lived in Stephenville for the past eight years, moving there from Valley Mills where he had extensive farm and ranch holdings. The Greenways were residents of Hico in the early 1940's and Mrs. Greenway was a teacher in the local school.

Funeral services were held last Friday afternoon at the First Baptist Church in Stephenville, with Rev. Emil Becker officiating.

Surviving are his widow; two daughters, Sue and Lu Ann of the home; his father, Jim Greenway of Stephenville; one sister, Mrs. Jack Hailey of Cisco; one brother, Jimmy Greenway of Irving; also two half-brothers, W. O. Greenway of Dublin and Virgil Greenway of Fort Worth.

Greenway was a member of one of the pioneer families of Erath County, and had one of the most progressive farm and ranch operations in Black Stump Valley.

LOWER ACCIDENT RATE— Farm Safety Week Launches 12-Month Campaign

State and national observance of 21-27 of Farm Safety Week launches a 12-month campaign to lower the rural accident rate in Texas according to Texas Farm Safety Council President Hoover of Waco.

Hoover said the program would concentrate on the prevention of accidents and falls with the theme: "Prevention plus Correction equals Protection."

The special week has been officially proclaimed in documents issued by President Kennedy and Governor John Connally. Connally urged Texans to become more safety conscious. Proclamation noted that each year accidents cause more than \$1 billion in property losses from fires have

Accident Report For First 6 Months Given By Sgt. A. A. Eggen

Stephenville, July 24.—Sgt. A. A. Eggen, Supervisor of the Texas Highway Patrol in the Stephenville area, has released the rural accident summary for the first 6 months of 1963.

The area is composed of Comanche, Erath, Hamilton, Hood, Johnson and Somervell counties. The Highway Patrol in the area investigated a total of 257 rural traffic crashes during the 6-month period. As a result of these accidents, three persons were killed, 167 injured, and the combined property damage amounted to \$135,402.00.

For the same period of 1962 the Stephenville Area reported a total of 270 rural traffic crashes resulting in death to 10 persons, injury to 136 people, and the combined property damage amounted to \$193,667.00.

"We are proud of the reduction in the number of persons killed this year," Sgt. Eggen said, "but only increased efforts to obey the traffic law on the part of all motorists can keep this tragic toll down."

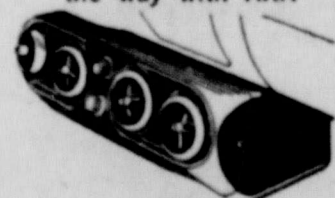

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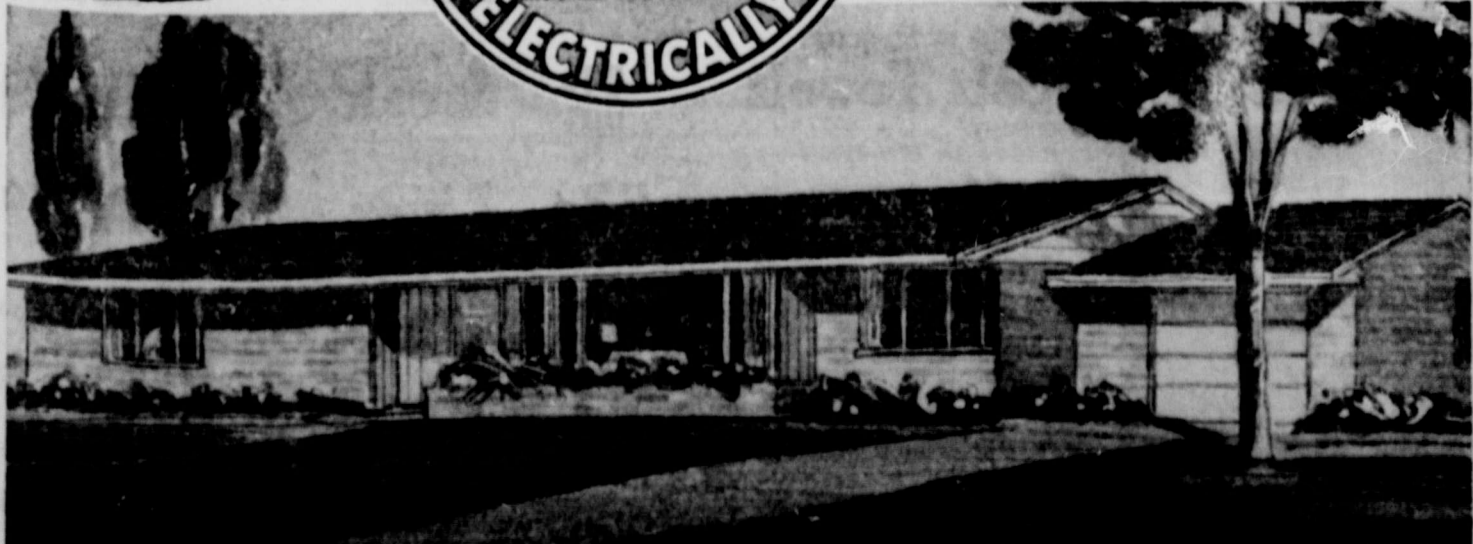

As It Looks From Here

British Guiana, lying between Venezuela and Dutch Guiana and bordered on the South by Brazil, could easily become the second Communist dominated regime in the Western Hemisphere.

At the present time, this territory on the Northeast of South America, is under British control so far as its defense and external affairs are concerned, but the country is scheduled for independence.

The Prime Minister of British Guiana is Cheddi Jagan, an East Indian of the same race as about 50 percent of the population. There is evidence that he is regarding the economy of the Country with the Soviet Bloc. It is

known that cement, flour and petroleum products are coming in in quantities from the Soviet Union in exchange for rice, which is taken to Cuba and exchanged mainly for sugar.

Jagan said publicly only a short time ago that "The first Socialist State in the Hemisphere was Cuba; the first in South America will be the Republic of Guiana." He is known to be a leftist and a long time associate of Communists. His wife, Janet, a native of Chicago, was a known Communist before losing her United States citizenship by having voted in a Guianan election. She is as much a leader in the country as is her husband and holds the of-

ficial post of Minister of Home Affairs.

Should Guiana receive its complete independence from the British, it is believed that Jagan would institute a complete dictatorship and place his wife in control of police, and that Jagan himself would take complete control of the labor force.

The opposition is led by Forbes Burnham, a fiery leader of the Negro population, which constitutes about 33 percent. Incidentally, the remaining population is 12 percent mixed, 2 percent Portuguese and 1 percent Asiatic.

Those informed on the subject believe that the conflicts within British Guiana are not nearly so much in the basis of ideology as they are between the races. This difference is compounded by the fact that the East Indians are Hindus and Moslems and live mainly in the rural areas, while the Negroes are Christian and live mostly in the cities.

The fear is that the British will pull out which they very much want to do, and wash their hands of a political and economic liability as soon as possible. The British, it seems, feel that the best they can do is leave behind a government with constitutional restrictions sufficient to contain the Communism.

The United States, on the other hand, is fearful that the British will leave too soon and that the Communists will move in the vacuum.

Like Castro at the early stages of his take-over, Jagan does not admit to being an out and out Communist, but it is plain he is enmeshed already in the Soviet Bloc of nations.

Two situations would probably exist when and if the British grant full independence and move out. Either Jagan would immediately take over as a dictator or under the semblance of constitutional government hold elections which would place him in power under what would appear to be Democratic process. Either of these results would definitely be adverse to the United States and all of Latin America.

Even if the English should be willing to take the risk of throwing Jagan out, safety is not guaranteed simply by such a delay. The Indian population is growing at a much faster rate than the more conservative Negro majority.

Therefore, our policy should be to insist that the British suspend the Guianan constitution and put off final independence until after an election could be held, which

Highlights and Sidelights

Governor John Connally says Texas is making a lot of progress on civil rights without demonstrations and disturbances. He urged Texans to avoid the trouble which is plaguing other states.

Roy Evans, secretary of Texas State AFL-CIO indicated mass demonstrations are needed in lower Rio Grande Valley to improve working conditions of Mexican workers. Connally commented such statements are irresponsible and inflammatory.

Governor also rejected labor's appeal for a special session of the Legislature to abolish right to work law and enact state minimum wage, saying he saw "no need, emergency or desirability" for such a session.

Evans said labor's traditional role is to try to inflame people against injustice and he intends to keep on trying to do that.

Quick Change

From one of the unpaid boss jobs to a \$16,500 a year assistance-ship is the story of Dr. J. B. Copeland of San Antonio.

When the Legislature created the new job of deputy commissioner of the Health Department, Dr. Copeland resigned as chairman of the State Board of Health to accept the job of deputy commissioner. He had been Board Chairman for the past ten years.

Gov. Connally named Dr. N. L. Barker of Paris to replace Dr. Copeland. He reappointed Dr. Elmer Baum of Austin and named Dr. John M. Smith of San Antonio and I. D. Flores of Floresville, a pharmacist, to the Board of Health.

Loans

Frank Miskell of Austin, who headed up the Texas Legislature's studies on the loan shark problem, will be the administrator of the new law which regulates licensed lenders.

Miskell was chosen by the State Finance Commission to be the first Regulatory Loan Commissioner. He will assume his new duties on August 23.

Dry and Wet

Texas is spotted with drought and flood points.

Texas Water Commission found that reservoirs declined a little in June. They wound up the month 76 percent full, so there's room to store more floods when and if they come.

In general, Northeast Texas reservoirs are full, while those in South Texas are shrinking.

Roads

Highway construction is one thing dry weather helps.

State Highway Engineer DeWitt C. Greer reported that contractors on state-federal projects completed \$24,973,319 worth of work during June.

But there's plenty yet to do. They hold contracts which total \$382,872,803 and another \$25,000,000 worth of contracts will be issued this week.

Do Fence Them In

Texas Highway Department has endorsed the idea of building "median rails" on busy urban expressways.

Rails—heavy duty fences which

keep traffic from careening into opposite lanes—have been or will be installed on expressways around Houston, Fort Worth and Austin.

Also under development by highway engineers is a woven-wire mesh fence—similar to backyard chain-link jobs—to reduce headlight glare and to prevent pedestrians from crossing the freeways.

Oil Hold Ups

Despite recommendations by several major oil buying firms that Texas production be cut in August, the Railroad Commission held the line.

Production will continue at the July rat of 28.5 percent of capability of the wells. Independents praised the action.

Higher Education

Texas Committee on Education Beyond the High School has selected one of its members as paid executive director.

He is Dr. A. B. Martin, president of Anarillo Junior College. He will coordinate all staff work for the big study.

Committee has one year to finish its study and report to the Governor and Legislature.

Sadler Active

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler continues to be much in the news.

Sadler disagreed with Governor Connally and Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr on seriousness of a state-federal dispute or reclaimed lands in the tidelands; swapped hot wires with ex-Sen. Bob Baker after Baker accused him of impeding Padre Island seashore project; and insisted that Carr get Supreme Court concurrence on Carr's ruling that a new law reorganizing the School Land Board is valid.

State School

Dr. James Turman, Director of the Texas Youth Council, defended his council's action in either firing—or retiring—Superintendent O. F. Perry of Gatesville State School.

Jerry and his supporters claim too much interference from Austin, too little discipline of boys. Youth Council denies this, contends policy differences caused the dismissal.

M. B. Kendrick was named to replace Perry.

Short Snorts

Texas Game and Fish Commission, Department of Public Welfare, Board of Plumbing Examiners, Board of Professional Engineers, Board of Pardons and Paroles, Department of Agriculture, Department of Banking, and Building Commission are moving into the new John H. Reagan State Office Building.

Rep. Robert H. Hughes of Dallas will resign from the Legislature on September 1 to accept appointment as domestic relations court judge in Dallas.

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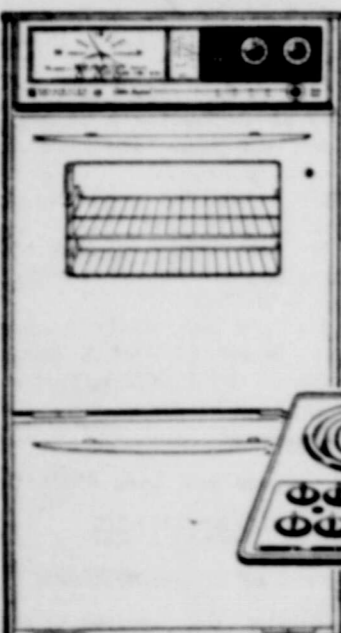
