ranged from 11 to 15 inches, and the very wet snow was still falling.

Hico merchants all but closed up shop as no traffic was moving and only the hardiest were out. Biggest demand from those who did venture out was for coffee, rubber boots and bread.

Traffic through town was at a standstill, with most roads leading into town impassible. Cars and trucks in ditches, blocking highways, and in other ways caused one of the greatest congestions in years. Stalled autos was the rule rather than the exception.

Most hazardous road in the area was Highway 281 South to Hamilton, which was reported completely closed. Other highways were open, but little travel was noticed. Loaded trucks lined the highway in town, choosing to stay put rather than attempt to start up the hills leading out of Hico. Remarkably, no serious accidents had been reported in the area Thursday noon.

There was a bright note to the general bad conditions, however. Utility firms were experiencing no difficulty at mid-day. Ollie Davis, Community Public Service manager, said that they had had no trouble with power lines and didn't anticipate any under present conditions. The same was true with Gulf States Telephone Co., and Fonzy Williamson, manager, said the only trouble spot was overloading facilities, which might delay some calls. Billy Doty, Lone Star Gas manager, was not available for comment, but gas pressure appeared to be holding up.

Temperature here Thursday morning was hovering around the 30-degree mark, but a low of 15 degrees was forecast for that night which could bring on more problems for the area. The heavy snowfall followed low temperatures of tour and five degrees on Monday and Tuesday. Due to the extremely cold ground conditions, most of the snow has stayed on the ground.

Many, many businesses, individuals and services have suffered extreme hardships. Two funerals were scheduled Thursday afternoon, both were delayed. Two downtown grocery stores were open to take care of people's needs, but were doing little business. First National Bank was closed for all practical purpose, and department stores were selling nothing but boots. Service stations were doing business as usual, and all wrecker services were kept on constant duty freeing stalled autos, etc.

Some concern was expressed over the heavy build-up of snow on flat roofs in town, but none had collapsed from the weight Thursday afternoon.

Mail trucks from Waco had not arrived in Hico at 1 p.m., but postal employees were on duty here. Two carriers made an attempt to make their rounds.

Livestock was suffering, particularly cattle and other animals that did not have cover. Attempts were being made to "hay" the animals, but with little success. Some expressed concern that livestock losses could predominate throughout the area.

All in all, the weather picture was far from bright, with conditions expected to be even worse Friday.




