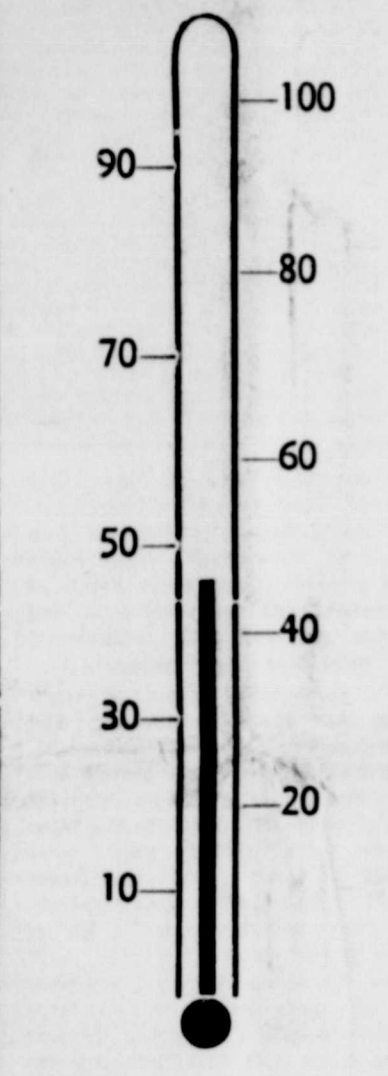

Five Area Youths to 'Scramble' At Houston Stock Show

Four area FFA Chapter members and one 4-H Club member have been selected to participate in the Calf Scramble, feature of the annual Houston Fat Stock Show.

The FFA members, Danny Jenkins and Aodis Land of Hico, David Chapman of Carlton, and David Gleason of Fair, will scramble at 7:45 p.m. Friday, February 28. The 4-H member, Dennis Polk, will scramble February 21.

The Houston show's calf scramble will again qualify as the world's greatest when the first of a series of 19 contests takes place in the Sam Houston Coliseum, beginning Feb. 19.

When the Houston show held its first scramble in 1942, twenty-four calves were awarded. It was not dreamed that the project would result in putting some 4000 boys into the cattle business in the next 22 years.

The calf scramble contests became so popular with the rodeo audiences that for the past 15

years, there has been a contest included as an event of each of the 19 performances.

During the course of one season, 400 boys now scramble for 200 calves. Half of the calf certificates are given to boys interested in dairy cattle and other half to those who prefer beef cattle.

When the calf scramble contestant wins, his work has just begun. With his cash certificate he purchases the best animal he can find. He must then care for the calf, furnish monthly records to the Houston Livestock Show and his sponsor, and return his animal to the show the next year.

As a result of the scramble contests, nearly a million and a half dollars in livestock, cash and prizes have been put into the hands of Texas youth, giving them a substantial start in business.

Dates for the Houston show are February 19 through March 1. It will open with the traditional downtown parade beginning at 10 a.m.

A rush during the last three days before deadline for paying poll tax was sufficient to assure Hamilton County a representable voting strength for 1964.

A total of 2368 paid poll tax, and 19 exemptions were issued, for a total of 2467, the figure being the third highest in the past 12 years. Only in 1953, when 2546 polls were paid, and 1955 when a whopping 2612 people paid for their voting privilege, was the number greater. The all-time low came in 1962, when 1,325 were paid.

Local deputies Mary Scott and Buddy Randals exceeded all previous records for poll tax sales in Hico. They sold a total of 207, which are above the number sold by the tax collector during her regular visits to Hico.

HOLDERS of poll tax receipts and exemptions will get full value from their \$1.75 this year. They can start exercising their rights on April 4 in the annual school election, and follow on Tuesday with the city election.

First major balloting is Saturday, May 2, when Hamilton Countians will elect a tax collector, a judge, county attorney, sheriff, and two commissioners. More than one candidate is entered in each of the races with the exception of tax collector.

In the judge's race, four men are in the running, including G. W. Hurley, who is presently serving the unexpired term of the late W. E. Tate; Herman W. Standifer; James H. Soules; and Jess Reeves. Election is for the remaining two years of a four-year term.

Two candidates are in the sheriff race, Woody Young (incumbent) and Ed Bulman. Incumbent H. B. Gordon and John F. O'Neal are vying for the county attorney post; Fred Rainwater, incumbent, and R. W. Hancock are making the race for commissioner of precinct 3; and six candidates are racing for the post of commissioner of precinct 1.

Other elections of interest to Hico voters are the State Representative race, where Travis McClinton is seeking a second term in the House. He picked up a last-minute opponent when Robert C. Catey of Alexander filed with the county Democratic Chairmen before the deadline.

State Senator J. P. Word of Meridian is unopposed for a second term.

Omar Burleson of Anson is seeking re-election to the House of Representatives from the 17th district of Texas, and Max Carrier of Roby filed last week as a candidate for the office.

Closer to home, Judge Truman E. Roberts, and District Attorney Byron McClellan are unopposed in their bids for re-election. They are seeking their first full terms of office. Judge Roberts was appointed to fill the unexpired term of the late H. W. Allen, and Mr. McClellan was named to fill Judge Roberts' position as District Attorney.

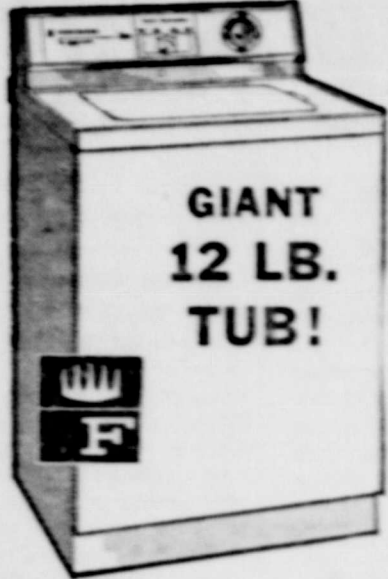

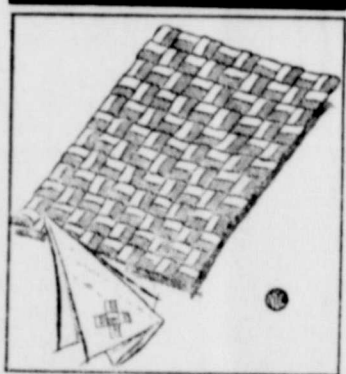

THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN—

Highlights and Sidelights

A controversial section of the new Texas Regulatory Loan Act, passed last year after 36 years of legislative wrangling on loan control, has been declared unconstitutional.

District Judge Herman Jones of Austin held invalid the provision that at least 51 percent of stock in lending firms operating in Texas must be owned by Texans.

Jones emphasized this was the only section of the 1963 act affected by his ruling in a suit brought by three out-of-state firms.

The companies whose subsidiaries operate in at least eight Texas cities charged the in-state ownership requirement violated state and federal due process and equal protection guarantees.

American Investment Company, a Delaware Corporation; Industrial Finance and Thrift Corporation of Louisiana; and Consolidated Credit Company of Charlotte, N. C., joined by a number of other out-of-state firms, instigated the suit.

Their subsidiaries operate in Houston, Dallas, San Antonio, Ft. Worth, El Paso, Waco, Texarkana and Arlington.

Regulatory Loan Commissioner Frank Miskell refused licenses to them.

Tourist Plan Unveiled

A pilot plan designed to bring more foreign visitors to Texas was announced by Governor Connally.

Sen. Walter Richter of Gonzales, the governor's representative, and Walter Meyer of San Antonio, who originated the plan, took off for Germany Sunday to test the program.

They hope to encourage 40 or 50 German citizens to make a 16-day red carpet tour of Texas' leading cities and historic spots from October 13 through November 2.

Texas Tourist Development Agency is sponsoring the projected program in cooperation with Chambers of Commerce and interested private citizens. No public funds are involved.

The tourists, of course, will pay their own way, although some will benefit from hospitality in Texas homes. First visitors will get special low plane fare and at-cost prices all around.

It is hoped the initial visit by the Germans will establish guidelines for continuing long-range program to boost travel in Texas by globe-trotters from other lands.

Firm Probe Urged

Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr has called on State Banking Commissioner J. M. Falkner to continue investigation of a collapsed California money order firm, American Security Currency Limited, which was doing business in 317 Texas grocery and drug stores.

Thousands of Texans reportedly were caught with worthless paper on their hands when the firm went into bankruptcy. Carr recommends getting all facts on its history and status plus full details of an alleged sale of accounts to another company also licensed by the commission.

Connally in Circulation

Governor Connally returned to duty at his office in the Capitol last week, for the first time since he was wounded in Dallas on November 22 by the assassin of President Kennedy.

Connally announced a traveling and speaking schedule which included visits to UPI and AP managing editors' conventions here; a Boy Scout report ceremony in the Capitol; Abilene's B-32 day celebration on February 15; the Laredo Washington Birthday festival on Feb. 22; the Paper Industry Salesmen's Association meeting in New York on Feb. 25; dedication of the New York World's Fair Texas Exhibit on Feb. 26; and probably a visit with President Johnson in Washington on the way back to Texas.

Diversion Payment

Agri-Com. John C. White says Texas farmers should not count on a cotton land diversion payment plan, as has been rumored.

White says Texas farmers should go ahead and release their unwanted cotton allotments back to their local ASC committees so the permits can be re-assigned to other parts of the state. He urged cotton growers to protect their future allotments by releasing unused permits before the February 4 deadline, as in past years.

Short Snorts

"The Eyes of Texas" now is public property. The University of Texas' copyright expired on January 30, and couldn't be renewed.

Traffic death toll for 1963 was 2,793, largest in history by far, according to the Department of Public Safety. Figure is an increase of 282 over 1962.

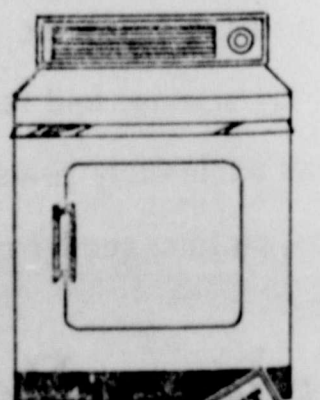

WASHINGTON—

As It Looks From Here

By OMAR BURLESON, M.C.

At intervals all through our history we have had some sort of problem with countries of Central and South America. As these nations to our south have progressed, difficulties with them have been less frequent but more serious when trouble did arise.

Cuba is the prime example. Events have now moved the number one problem to Panama.

The United States actually created Panama as a nation. She became an independent republic in 1903. Before that time it was part of Columbia, and in that year the U. S. signed a treaty with Columbia, giving the U.S. rights to build a canal across the Isthmus. Columbia did not ratify the treaty. Panamanians revolted and set up their own republic. Almost immediately a treaty was signed with the United States, selling the rights to build a canal and operate it in perpetuity in return for the payment of \$10 million in cash and one-fourth million per year thereafter.

We also agreed to guarantee Panama's independence, and at that time our guarantee was absolutely necessary for it to survive. It took United States' gunboats to prevent Columbia from taking back the territory. In 1911 the United States paid Columbia \$25 million to recognize Panama. In addition, we paid France \$40 million for all rights of a French company, to which Columbia had previously granted the right to build a canal.

After 60 years, our government still lacks about half-billion in recovered cost. Only in recent years has the Canal actually shown a net profit. The United States Government now pays the Panaman-

ian Government \$1,930,000 per year as a sort of rental on the Canal, which was voluntarily raised in 1955 from 0430,000. This is in addition to interest, operation cost and maintenance.

Although economic problems underlie some of the present difficulties, the political factors are really at the root of the argument. Responsible Panamanian officials know that they must have the United States in the Canal Zone for their own economic survival, but at the same time, it is politically popular to oppose us. The Country is poor and much of it undeveloped. It operates on a trade deficit, and despite indirect benefits from the Canal, totaling between \$50 million and \$60 million annually, their public debt is \$100 million and their per capita income is less than \$420.

This is the background against the Communist agitators, trained in Cuba, have helped foment trouble, which has resulted in the severance of relations between the United States and Panama.

The sub-committee on inter-American affairs, of which I am a member, strongly recommended against yielding to these demands in August of 1960, and warned that one demand would lead to another. Responsible officials are political prisoners of themselves and know their economic life depends on the Canal but anything less than the United States giving it up entirely will not satisfy the radical element.

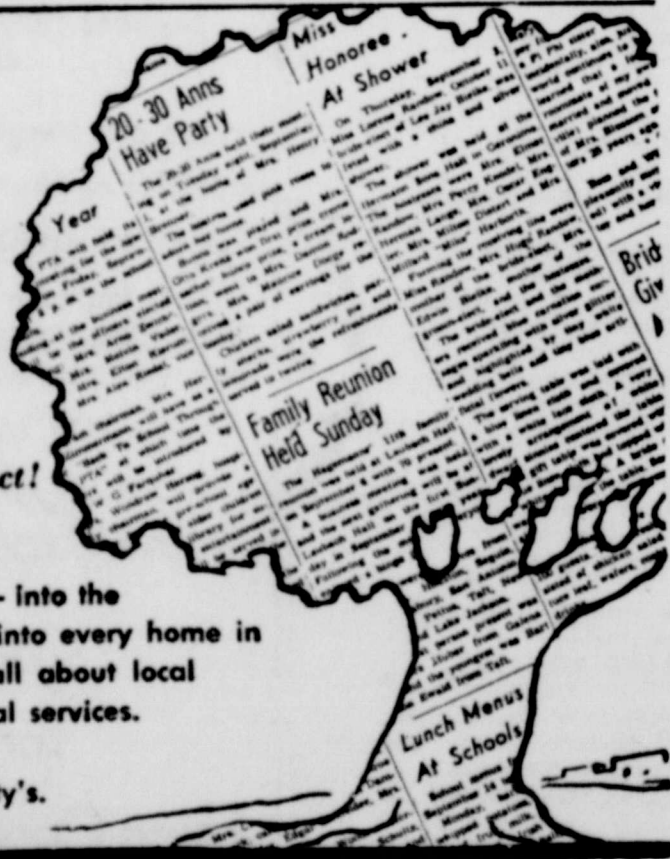
