## QUICK KITCHEN TOWELS

Make pretty towels by adding simple applique. Hem plain cotton bag on all sides. Cut strip of bias tape eight to ten inches long, fold in half and curve to modernistic fish shape. Steam press to retain shape. Sew rick rack "seaweed" to towel, cutting pieces odd lengths. Whip "fish" over longest piece of rick rack. Use zig zag machine stitch or embroider eye.

## On the Home Range

I spent a profitable week at Tangleton last week attending the Clothing Workshop conducted by Fannie Brown Eaton, Clothing Specialist of the Texas Extension Service. The fresh new silhouettes for spring and summer make you want to get out the sewing machine, don't they?

Crisply tailored skimming lines team with vivid colors to make this an exceptionally exciting fashion season. Certainly you can save on your clothing dollar by making part of your own and your families' clothes. Don't make unnecessary mistakes. Select the right interfacing, lining or underlining at the same time you buy your fabric and pattern. And like any other job working with the proper equipment is a must.

Modern interfacings, linings or underlinings are made with fashion needs in mind. The material you use depends upon the weight of your fabric and the effect you wish to achieve. Be sure you read labels on both garment fabric and interfacing fabrics to see if the two fabrics will work together. A stated residual shrinkage as low as one percent on one, compared

to three percent on the other, could possibly cause trouble when your garment is washed or dry cleaned.

Have you used the newer method of applying zippers? Putting the last step of your zipper in by hand, if the fabric lends itself to it, adds that professional look to your garment the same as the machine made buttonhole. And once the skill is developed it takes only a few minutes more to do so.

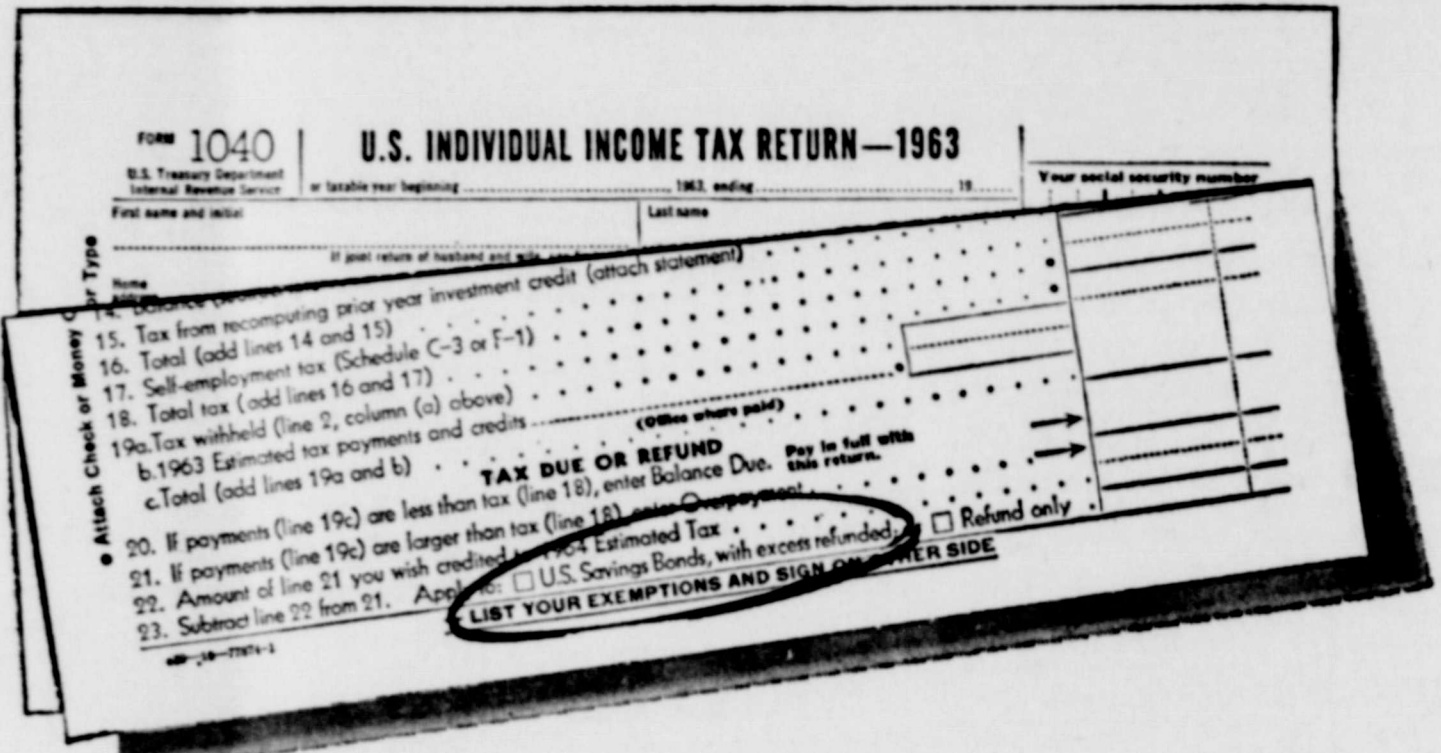

Game Warden Reports

Landowners in Bosque County who obtained doe deer permits last season are reminded that these permits or permit stubs were to be returned to the Parks and Wildlife Department before February 1, 1964.

A total of 1,827 permits were issued to 403 landowners in the county and covered a total of 231,082 acres. As of Feb. 1 68 landowners had failed to return their permits.

It is important that the permits be returned so that the kill can be determined. Those who have not already done so are asked to cooperate by returning the permits to their local warden as soon as possible.

As you can see about one-sixth of the folks who picked up doe permits failed to return them on or by the deadline. Please check your records and if you have not returned yours do so as soon as possible.

White bass fishing has been slow to start this year. I think this is probably caused by the low condition of the river. For those of you that have not been over to the river this year it is way down. If you put in at Kimbell Bend Bridge you could go as far up as

John Roach's Camp then you would have to wade if you wanted to go any farther.

I checked some waders at Bee Rock Friday and only saw about a dozen whites. They were fishing with jigs behind bubbles or floats. These fish were not very big, the largest weighing about a pound.

The black bass are beginning to bite in some ponds and lakes around the county. One fellow from Meridian caught a nice string of blacks at Meridian State Park last week. He said these were caught in the shallow end of the lake on minnows. The blacks will start spawning as soon as the water reaches about 69 degrees. This is a good time to fish for these, because they are very aggressive during this time and will strike at almost anything that comes near.

I know many of you have seen deer that have not shed their antlers, and probably wonder why. The biologist tells me that when

deer are in good physical condition that they sometimes will carry them until as late as March before they shed.

Let's start the coming fishing season off by being extra careful when we are around water. A person that does not wear a life preserver while in a boat or around deep water may not be around next year to start off the summer on water.

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

There have been a large number of calls to the Extension Service office this week requesting information on the control of the little dark green weeds with purple flowers.

O. R. Williams first called this plant to my attention about three weeks ago. Since that time I've seen the invader growing almost everywhere, especially in lawns. The name of this plant is Henbit. There are three treatments used to kill Henbit. One is to use Endogal as a spray and another is to use a weed killer containing 2, 4-D. Both these chemicals are dangerous because you might also kill your ornamentals.

The treatment which I recommend is Ammonium Nitrate applied as a solution. This will serve two purposes. It kills the Henbit and fertilizes the lawn at the same time.

Dissolve one pound of ammonium nitrate per gallon of water. Apply the solution broadcast with a sprinkler can or sprayer at the rate of four gallons per 1,000 square feet. Allow the solution to settle a few minutes and strain it, if it is to be applied with a sprayer. It is best to use a sprinkler can, because the solution is corrosive and will eventually ruin a sprayer. Apply the solution evenly over the lawn and avoid spot treatments since the nitrogen will cause green spots that are difficult to eliminate. Mow the plants closely 3 to 4 days before treatment.

This same solution of ammonium nitrate is effective in killing Burclover and other clovers in the lawn. After the summer lawn grasses come out the best control for weeds is a vigorous turf. Weeds and weedy grasses usually are not a problem when a well adapted lawngrass is properly established, fertilized, mowed and watered. A thin, weak stand of grass will be invaded by weeds. Killing weeds with chemicals will not keep them out unless followed by lawn maintenance.

agement practices that encourage the grass to grow vigorously enough to compete with the weeds. Details on lawn grass adaptation and its proper establishment and management are given in Bulletin B-203, "Home Lawns."

Home owners in Hamilton County who have oak trees in their yards or around the farmstead should be on the lookout for outbreaks of caterpillars again this year. Outbreaks of the forest tent caterpillar are again a strong possibility for this spring. The worst outbreaks for the past three years have occurred in Central Texas where considerable defoliation of oak trees has caused much concern.

The larvae begin to make their appearance during late March and April and feed on the leaves of oak trees for a 4-6 week period or until the reach maturity.

Because the leaf eaters can best be controlled when they are small, start watching your oak trees about mid-March for signs of the emerging larvae. If and when they are present in sufficient numbers to warrant control measures, insecticides should be applied.

I will try to keep you informed when the young caterpillars first appear.

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
