O. R. Williams first called this cern. plant to my attention about three weeks ago. Since that time I've seen the invader growing almost everywhere, especially in lawns. The name of this plant is Henbit.

There are three treatments used ot kill Henbit. One is to use Endothal as a spray and another is to use a weed killer containing 2, 4-D. Both these chemicals are dangerous because you might also kill your ornamentals.

The treatment which I recommend is Ammonium Nitrate applied as a solution. This will serve two purposes. It kills the Henbit and fertilizes the lawn at the

same time. Dissolve one pound of ammonium nitrate per gallon of water. Apply the solution broadcast with a sprinkler can or sprayer at the rate of four gallons per 1,000 square feet. Allow the solution to settle a few minutes and strain it, if it is to be applied with a sprayer. It is best to use a sprinkler can, because the solution is corrosive and will eventually ruin a sprayer. Apply the solution evenly over the lawn and avoid spot treatments since the nitrogen will cause green spots that are difficult to eliminate. Mow the plants closely 3 to 4 days before treat-

ment. This same solution of ammonium nitrate is effective in killing Burclover and other clovers in

After the summer lawn grasses come out the best control for weeds is a vigorous turf, Weeds and weedy grasses usually are not a problem when a well adapted lawngrass is properly established, fertilized, mowed and watered. A thin, weak stand of grass will be invaded by weeds. Killing weeds with chemicals will not keep them out unless followed by lawn man-

Backpack is an exercise to test the amphibious capabilities and readiness of the forces of the Seventh Fleet and the Nationalist Chinese Navy. The exercise, with over 40,000 men and 140 units participating, will culminate in an amphibitious assault on beaches of southern Taiwan, and will demonstrate the effectiveness of the United States Seventh Fleet to rapidly move a significant combat force to a troubled area in order

to assist an ally. Prior to the assault, aircraft of the Seventh Fleet will soften beach defenses. In addition, support ships will conduct anti-submarine warfare exercises and the area surrounding the beachhead will be cleared of any obstructions and mines.

"Backpack" is similar to those exercises conducted periodically by units of the Seventh Fleet with SEATO and other allied nations in the Far East to improve their proficiency in coordinated amphibitious warfare operations and to maintain working relationships with allied nations.
