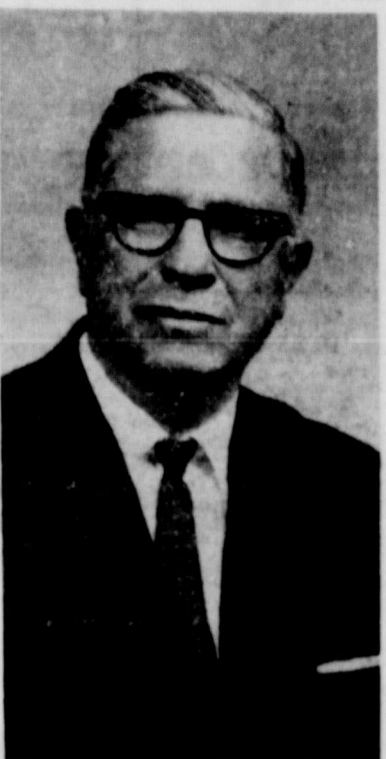
Linda Grissom showed a Holstein heifer which stood 15th and classified red.

Large Entry Expected for 17th Annual Stock Show

Former Resident, Rankin Jones, Buried Monday at Stephenville

Funeral services for Rankin Jones, former Hico resident, were held Monday morning at 10 o'clock in Stephenville. Rev. Charles Brock officiating. Mr. Jones passed away Sunday morning in Stephenville Hospital where he had been a patient a short time.

A native of Limestone County, Mr. Jones was born Sept. 25, 1886, and had lived in Stephenville the past five years, moving there from Hico.

Survivors include his widow; a daughter, Mrs. Kyle Archie of Stephenville; and two sisters.

Several from here attended the services.

Hico's annual stock show, one of the most popular livestock events in the Central Texas area, will get underway at 9 a. m. Friday at City Park.

With cooperative weather, officials are expecting one of the largest entry lists in recent years for the 17th annual event. Harold Walker, local FFA Chapter Advisor, sponsors of the show, said early this week that 250 advance entries had been received, and the list should top the 300 mark by show time.

General rules of the show remain the same for this year's event. Prize money has been increased in some divisions, and the addition of Reserve Champion Rosettes has been made in all classifications. A total of \$510.00 in prize money will be distributed among winners.

Poultry division of the show has been discontinued as unpractical on a project show basis.

Judging will get underway at 9 a. m. with the swine division. Goats will take the spotlight at 10:30, followed by the sheep division at 11 a. m.

Dairy judging will start at 1:30, and the beef division will wind up activities at 3 o'clock. Dog division, a popular part of the show, will also be judged at 3 o'clock.

Joel Hillin, dairy specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Dairy Science at Texas A & M will judge dairy classes.

Livestock will be judged by Edwin Dubose, Livestock and Animal Husbandry Department, Texas A & M. Dog judge will be named later.

The FFA Chapter will operate a concession stand during the show, serving food, coffee and cold drinks, and local people are invited to have lunch at the show grounds.

Two showmanship awards will again be presented to exhibitors, the traditional Howard Drug award which goes to a local FFA Chapter member, and the Erath County Electric Coop Award, which all exhibitors are eligible.

Here is an example. What is an "Ant?" He is an insect, you reply, and you are right. But he has two other names. "Pisuire" is one, and "Emmet" is the other. But I did not know those last two names until I encountered them in a crossword puzzle. Then I looked them up in the dictionary, and found them.

Essays were submitted to the contest by Lynn Malone, James Randalls, and M. I. Knudson Jr.

Students who did not work on the Civil War projects made posters and wrote themes on other phases of their heritage that interested them.

The following theme by Kay Jackson is typical of many of those prepared:

I BELIEVE—

I believe from the very depths of my heart that America is the most wonderful place on the face of the earth in which to live. America is not bound by oceans or seas, but by the Almighty, who first gave us this land.

I believe that for every free American in this world today there must have been three or four men responsible for it. Men, with the forces of nature battling against them, the burden of a new land staring them in the faces,

and pangs of failure running through their bodies, founded this America. Their increasing determination and intestinal fortitude led them to cultivate our nation, bring forth the yield, and begin again to cultivate more and more new territories.

I believe that the founders of our land must have openly welcomed the challenge of a new world. It is hard to imagine how our lives would be affected if these freedoms were suddenly snatched from us.

I believe that the people of America have so much to be thankful for. In America there is always the driving desire for improvement. These ambitions have made America what it is today. America will always grow and prosper as long as these forces exist.

I believe the main and most important reason for the greatness of America should be attributed to the fact that she is a Christian nation. SCREWORM REPORT

Reports from the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program sound good. There has not been a case of screwworms in the entire Southwest in 1964. In 1963 on this date ten cases had been reported and in 1962 113 cases had been reported by March 1.

Dr. C. B. Cathey, Chairman of the Hamilton County Screwworm Eradication Program, reminds all livestock owners that the fight is not over. If producers are not on their guard, one or two cases could go undetected and cause a heavy infestation. Producers should be aware that until the barrier is fully established and proved 100 percent effective, they must continue to inspect their animals, treat cuts, scratches and infestations and report cases promptly to eradication workers.

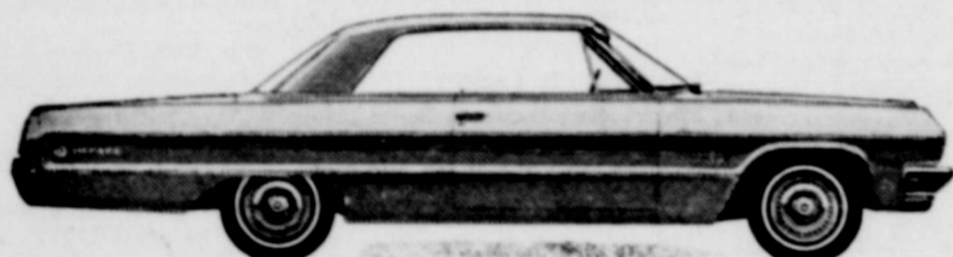

Billy Marvin Porterfield has been a victim of measles or chickenpox the past week.

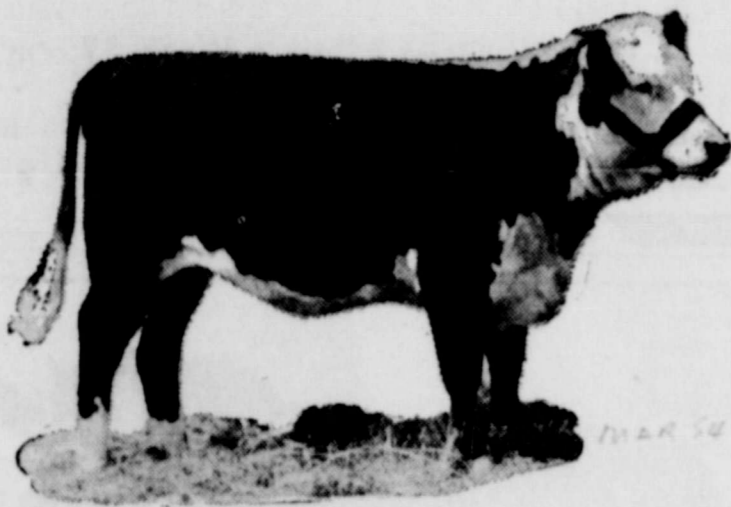
