Laura Alford Cox was born in Hico, the fourth child of the late Dr. and Mrs. J. R. Alford. She was the widow of Walter Cox who lived in Hico for several years before moving to West Texas, In February 1912, they settled in Seminole, operating a real estate and cattle commission business.

Mrs. Cox was reared in Hico and was a graduate of the public schools here. She was an active member of Hico Christian Church, as well as social activities of the town. In Feb. 1906 she was married to Mr J. W. Stovall a prominent merchant and they enjoyed an active religious and social life in Hico until his death in August 1917. She then moved to Dallas where she lived until she was married to Mr. Cox by Dr L. N. D. Wells, pastor of the East Dallas Christian Church in Feb. 1923. After a week in Dallas they went to Seminole where Mr. Cox had a home prepared. They were prominent in the religious and social life of that town for 25 years when his health failed and they moved to Dallas in 1948 for him to have treatment in the Veterans Hospital. While not in the hospital they enjoyed home life until Sept. 14, 1949 when he had to return to the hospital and passed away April 25, 1950. She has lived in Dallas since that time and was an active member of the East Dallas Christian Church, the Berean Bible Class, and the Christian Women's Fellowship.

Mrs. Cox was a member of the Rejebian Club, a past member of the United Daughters of the Confederacy, and of the Auxiliary of the Spanish War,







Tornado warnings are announcements that a tornado has been sighted and reported. Warnings tell where and when the tornado has been reported and list the names of communities toward which the tornado is moving. These warnings cover a short period of time, usually less than an hour, and are for the purpose of advising persons in the path of the storm to take immediate safety precautions.

When time permits, go to a tornado cellar, cave, or underground excavation which should have an air outlet to help equalize the air pressure. 



Now is the time to spray for small black worms, about oneeighth of an inch long, started emerging from the egg cases last weekend. They are found mostly on live oak trees. The caterpillars are easiest controlled now while they are young.

Upon emerging from the egg cases, the larvae migrate to the foliage and begin to feed. The caterpillars will mature in four to six weeks If their food supply is exhausted before they mature.
