

TREMENDOUS APPLAUSE **GREETS PRESIDENT AS HE DELIVERS MESSAGE**

The Associated Press.

Washington, Dec. 4 .- Declaration of war with Austria Hungary was recommended to congress today by President Wilson.

Immediate war with Turkey and Bulgaria, Germany's other allies, the president told congress he did not believe necessary at this time because they do not yet stand in the direct path of necessary action.

Immediate war against Austria, even though she be only Germany's vassal and not her own mistress, the president declared was necessary because the central powers must be considered as one and because the war can be conducted successfully in no other way

Giving plain warning, however, that he would not hesitate to ask for declaration of war on Turkey and Bulgaria when he considered it necessary, the president said:

"We shall go wherever the necessities of this war carry us, but it seems to me that we should go only where the immediate and practical considerations lead us and not heed any others."
