

The statement was made that the New York Sun could be bought and this matter was discussed informally with the Texas gentlemen referred to, and as I recall, a gentleman since apopinted by Presigentleman since apopinted by Presi-dent Wilson in a high office. No Ger-man propaganda was at the bottom of the conversation and the suggestion was made the paper could be made a great factor in democratic

politics.
"I had no conference with Dr. Dernburg and if I ever met him at all I for not remember it. I discussed the matter with Herman Ridder, since dead, for a long time treasurer of the national democratic committee, and I have an indefinite recollection of meeting Mr. Viereck at a hotel. This was about five months after the

war in Europe began."


