CONGRESS PASSES RELIEF MEASURE

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.— Final legislative action was taken today by congress on the administration bill appropriating \$100,000,000 requested by President Wilson for European famine relief.. The conferees' report was adopted by both Senate and House without debate and the measure now goes to the President for approval.

There was no debate in either house, Senator Townsend of Michigan, one of the chief opponents, aunounced that i view of the overwhelming mapority by which the Senare had pased the measure, he thought further opposition would be foolish. It provides America's contribution to a lund which will be administered by Herbert Hoover.

Use of the money is authorized for relief of people in Europea and the near east, outside of Germany. German Austria, Hungary, Bulgaria and Turkey at the descretion of President Wilson and provision is made for in-cluding Armenians, Syrians, Greek and other Christian and Jewish populations of Asia Minor, among those

to receive relief.
