FARMER'S SIDE OH HIGH COST

Matter Is Discussed in Senate Today by Republican Senator of Kansas.

FAULTY DISTRIBUTION IS BLAMED FOR CONDITION

Declares Farmers Are Selling Their Products at Loss on Declining Market.

WASHINGTON. Oct. 22.—The farmers' side of the high cost of living question was presented to the Senate today by Senator Capper, Republican, of Kansas, who declared that, while farmers are selling their products at a loss in declining markets, the consumers are paying rising prices.

Faulty distribution was blamed largely for this "remarkable spectacle" and the senator urged a number of remedies to increase production. He deplored the numerous industrial strikes and the small representation given agriculture in the industrial conference.

"In our efforts be get rid of the high cost of living disease," said Mr. Capper, "I fear we are in great danger of dying of the remedy. As a lesult of Washington's effort to reduce high prices by breaking down entirely the cost of food, we have the remarkable spectacle of a rise of one per cent in the cost of living, coincident with market drops that are putting livestock raisers out of business and causing serious losses to other producers."

A Berlin dispatch quoted the Russian paper Prisyw as saying an official communique from General Yudentch declared he had reached the city proper from the south and that street fighting was going on in the outskirts.

CHARGE OF EMBASSY TITLE OF AMERICAN AT GERMAN CAPITAL

WSAHINGTON, Oct. 22.—Charge of embassy will be the rank of the first American diplomatic representation to Germany after the ratification of the peace treaty for not a cufficient time has clapsed to test the workings of the treaty and the soirit in which the present government of Germany undertakes to carry out its provisions will the representative give place to a fully accredited ambassador. DECLINE OF 2000 BARRELS

JAKEHAMON, TEX., Oct. 22.—An other dull week in most of the oil fields of this section of Texas resulted from heavy wagon roads and difficult hauling for materials. Production in Stephens county fell off the last week about 2,000 barrels. In the vicinity of the Parks pool and in each direction from the new railroad town of Frankell, eleven miles north of Ranger the activity has been marked by progress in drilling and by a number of new locations. Between Frankell and Caddo there is great activity and the prospect is that the pool will be connected up with the drilling of a few more wells to the oil sand.
