Tongates See Super Bowl At Pasadena

At least two couples in the Friona area attended the Super Bowl last weekend in Pasadena, California.

Joe and Billie Tongate, and Jason and Jill Grimsley were among the 98,374 fans who watched the Dallas Cowboys manhandle the Buffalo Bills, 52-17, and bring the pro football title back to the state of Texas, where most folks feel it "rightly belongs."

Tongate, a Cowboy fan for the past 30 years, says the trip to watch the Cowboys perform in the NFL's post-season classic was "The chance of a lifetime."

Tongate's sister, Ginger Perkins, who lives in Beverly Hills, California, just "down the road" from the Rose Bowl, site of the game, secured tickets for him and his wife, and was responsible for the longtime Friona resident getting to see his first Super Bowl game in person.

"She called me before the Cowboys played the Forty-Niners in San Francisco, and tried to get us to come out for that game. She could have gotten tickets for it, but we decided against it. When Dallas beat San Francisco, she wouldn't take 'no' for an answer," Tongate said.

Perkins had one line available for tickets, but lost it when her company offered them to Japanese businessmen. So, she managed to buy four tickets at a silent auction.

"She wouldn't tell us how much they cost her. All we had to do was fly out there," said Tongate, assistant manager at Friona Wheat Growers.

Tongate said the sister is about as big a "sports nut" as he is, having season tickets to the Los Angeles Raider games, and is also a season-ticket holder for a hockey team. She is associated with Fox Studios in Burbank.

Tongate said he was impressed with the view of the field at the Rose Bowl.

"Our tickets indicated that we would be on about the 30-yard line. But the seats are placed in at an angle. I thought we were about even with the seven-yard line, but you could see the entire field. We could see scoring at both ends of the field," he said.

Making their plans to go on a fairly last-minute basis, the Tongates got a flight to Los Angeles from Lubbock on Saturday evening. The first return flight available didn't come up until noon Pacific time on Tuesday. "And everyone on the flight had been to the Super Bowl game," Tongate said.

The Tongates said that virtually everyone at the game had on either their Dallas Cowboys or Buffalo Bills T-Shirts and caps, so it was not difficult to tell which team a person was rooting for.

Although the ladies attending many sporting events go to show off their clothes, Mrs. Tongate said that cowboy boots, T-shirts and Levis were more the order of the day for the 1993 Super Bowl.

Billie is vice president at Friona Texas Federal Credit Union.

They were able to sleep late on Sunday morning, having stayed with Joe's sister, and then the foursome left for the game at about 11 a.m., arriving just over an hour later. "We took a picnic lunch, and ate just before the game," they said.

A man and his young son were sitting next to Tongate, and on the first big play by Dallas, the youngster jumped up and accidentally knocked Tongate's glasses off.

"He apologized, and the father apologized and thoroughly scolded the son. We got to visiting, and learned that they were from Mexico City, and watch the Cowboys every week on television. He (the father) knew about as many of the Dallas players by name as I did," Tongate said.

Before the game was over, the visitors from south of the border unfolded a sign that read "Mexico for the Cowboys!"

Tongate said that for a crowd that large, the spectators were

amazingly well-behaved. They heard on the news that 25 to 30 people were arrested for disorderly conduct, etc., but they saw none of them, and their relative indicated that was fewer arrests than might happen at a regular Los Angeles game.

The Friona Cowboy fan said that once the Cowboys got the lead in the first quarter, he felt good about the game's outcome, and the team just "turned up the tempo" as the game went along.

While leaving the stadium, Tongate said a lady backing the Bills said: "What I didn't like was: every time Dallas got the ball, they scored, and every time Buffalo got the ball, Dallas scored."

The Buffalo fans were in remarkably good spirits, for the big loss, they said.

Tongate had seen the Cowboys play several games in Dallas, but this was the first time to see them in a Super Bowl. "And for them to win like they did, just made everything perfect," he said.

Billie said the play that would stand out in her memory was when defensive lineman Leon Lett ran 60 yards with a recovered fumble, only to have the ball knocked out of his hand before he crossed the goal-line.

C.S. Hart, whose ranch is some 28 miles northwest of Friona, last week sold a drove of 700 calves, which he delivered to the local stock pens Sunday afternoon.

55 YRS. AGO--FEB. 11, 1938

The proprietors of our two local hardware stores, J.A. Blackwell and J.W. Parr, spent the early part of the week in Amarillo in attendance at the Panhandle Hardware and Implement Dealer's Convention. Mr. Blackwell, who has served during the past year as vice president of the organization, was chosen as president for the ensuing year.

50 YRS. AGO--FEB. 5, 1943

Squaws Take 2-0 Record Into Friday Battle Vs Dimmitt

The F.H.S. Squaws began the second half of district play just like they did the first half--with wins over Littlefield and Tulia. This time around, the games were on the road. The team scored a 61-44 win at Littlefield last Friday, then ran up a 13-point lead at Tulia on Tuesday, holding on for a 60-55 win.

The Tuesday win ran Friona's season record to 19-7. The Squaws are 2-0 for the second half of district, after finishing in a three-way tie for first in the first half with Dimmitt and Muleshoe at 4-1.

At Littlefield, the Squaws grabbed a 17-10 first quarter lead after Tena Willard opened with three baskets and Renee Martin hit a three-pointer.

Friona was nursing a 24-22 halftime lead and stretched that to 40-33 after three quarters.

Then, the team hit 13 of 18 free throw opportunities (72.2 per cent) during the final quarter to put the game on ice, outscoring their hosts, 21-11.

Tena Willard had a pair of baskets and hit four of six from the line in the final quarter, finishing with 20 points to pace all scorers. Angela Belcher scored 14, Renee Downey and Renee Martin 12 each.

At Tulia on Tuesday, the Squaws were shooting the ball extremely well. Tena Willard scored on four jump shots in the opening quarter, and Miss Downey zapped a pair of three-point baskets plus a lay-up. Her jumper from the top of the circle gave Friona a 16-11 lead with 1:11 left in the opening quarter.

The Squaws went for a final shot, but Miss Willard's attempt bounced off the rim with five seconds left.

The Willard twins--Tena and Gena--scored within a minute of clock time to give Friona a 20-11 lead, their longest of the first half.

However, big Leigh Dalluge scored on three layups, and Tami Altman of the Lady Hornets completed her team's 10-point unanswered spurt, to give Tulia a 21-20 lead 3:32 before halftime.

Tena Willard broke open under the basket for a layup and a 50-40 score, and Miss Belcher's follow shot with 5:33 left in the game kept Friona up by ten, 52-42.

Having spent time on the bench with four fouls, Miss Downey came in to nail her fifth three-pointer of the night, giving Friona its longest lead at 57-44, with 3:58 to play. Keri Reeb equalled that lead, sinking a hook shot with 2:01 left in the game, 59-46.

At this point, the Hornets had a finishing kick, outscoring Friona 9-1 in the final two minutes, but it came too late.

Chiefs Fall To 'Cats, Hornets

The Chieftain basketballers fell to Littlefield last Friday night, 66-53, and then dropped an 86-70 decision to Tulia on Tuesday. Both games were played on the road.

Tuesday's game was significant in that the Chieftains stayed right with the first-half champion Hornets, trailing by only 59-54 after three quarters. This, in spite of the fact that high scorer Kyle Potts was at home sick. Potts scored 24 points when the teams met here January 15, when the Hornets eked out a 63-62 win.

"They hung in there. I thought Brian (Herring), Chris (Hanna) and Kit (Preston) did a good job taking the ball to the basket, with Potts out," said Coach Kevin Cooper.

Herring's backdoor layup gave Friona the first lead at 2-0. Hanna's jump shot gave the Chiefs a 4-2 lead.

Terron Talley's layup made it 6-4, Friona, with 4:37 left in the opening quarter. Hanna scored again for an 8-all tie after Tulia captured the lead. Hanna, Cory Hamilton and Blair Burney hit seven of eight free throws in the first quarter, which Tulia led, 23-18.

But the Hornets' superior height continued to wear the team down.

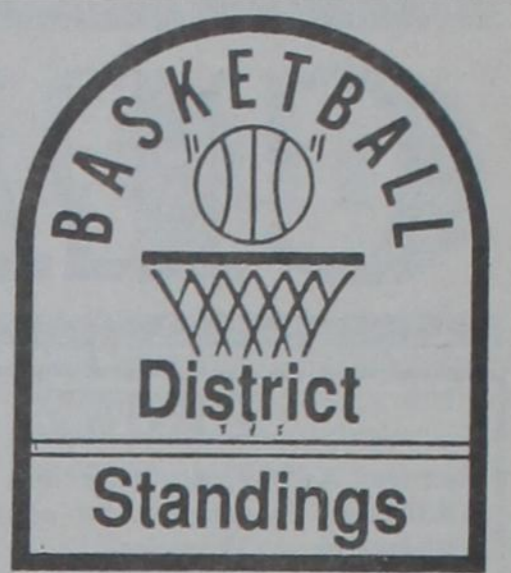
The team had a terrible start at Littlefield last Friday, getting behind 18-6 in the first quarter, and never could recover.

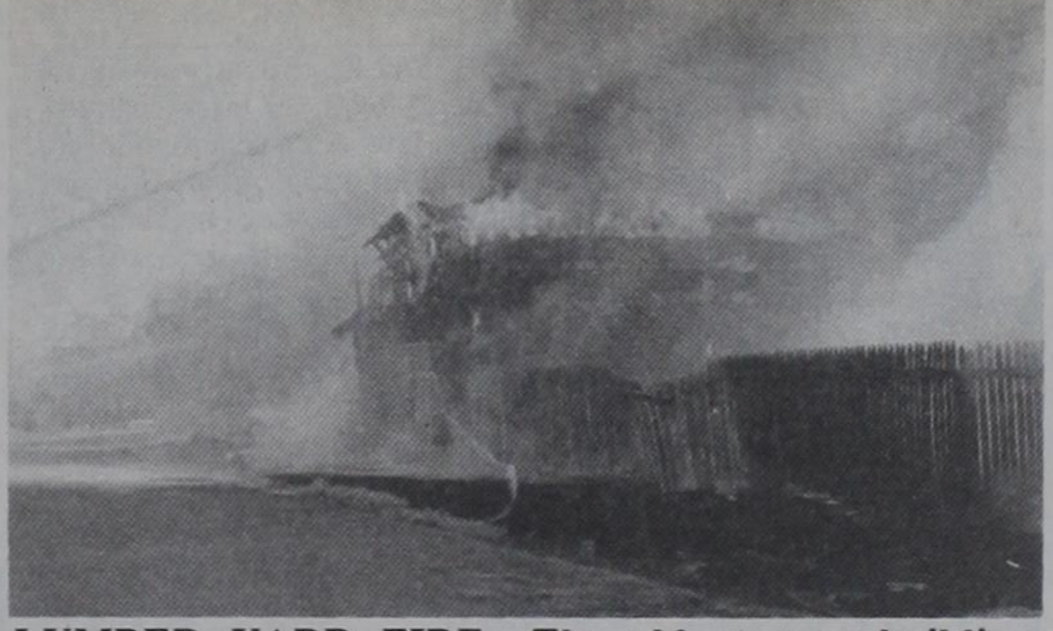

Screening For Older Drivers

When older drivers have auto accidents, the reason is often what they can--or can't--see. A recent study found that older drivers with a restricted useful field of vision (UFOV) are three to four times more likely to have auto accidents--and 15 times more likely to have accidents in intersections.

The UFOV is the visual space in which a person can respond quickly to visual stimuli, such as an oncoming car. Researchers measured the subjects' UFOV with a visual attention analyzer, a computerized instrument that tests how fast the person sees something and reacts to it. The screening accurately identified risk and non-risk drivers in nearly 85 percent of cases.

Interesting result: many of the subjects who had "failed" the UFOV test had no record of reported accidents. Researchers suggest that older drivers with vision problems modify their driving habits, avoiding heavy traffic, night driving and such.

Recipes Using Grapefruit

One of my most fond Christmas morning memories is of the huge bags of grapefruit that Santa Claus left beside the tree every year. We would eat grapefruit for weeks, it seemed.

I still enjoy a fresh and tangy grapefruit sprinkled with just a touch of sugar. Of course, even as children, we learned that the prized grapefruit were Texas Rudy Reds.

The red grapefruit originated in Texas. Today, there are several varieties of Texas red grapefruit, including the Rio Star and the Ruby-Sweet.

Grapefruit are nutritious and low in calories. A typical red grapefruit has 37 calories, and each half provides 78 per cent of the U.S. Recommended Daily Allowance of Vitamin C. Grapefruit also is a good source of Vitamin A, potassium and dietary fiber.

When measuring grapefruit, keep in mind that one medium grapefruit equals 2/3 cup juice, 1 cup bite-sized pieces, 10-12 sections, or 3-4 tablespoons grated peel. To get the most juice from a grapefruit, let it come to room temperature and roll it gently before squeezing.

To section a grapefruit, cut off the ends of the grapefruit with a sharp, thin-bladed knife. Place the fruit flat side down and cut away the peel from top to bottom along the curve of the fruit. Remove all the white pulp. Cut down along one section to the center. Then, turn the knife sideways to loosen the section and lift out. Other sections will be easy to remove.

Texas grapefruit are available from October through mid-May. When buying grapefruit, look for well-shaped, heavy fruit that is springy to the touch. Avoid grapefruit which is soft or discolored at the end.

Although fresh grapefruit eaten with a serrated spoon for breakfast is probably the most popular method of eating the citrus fruit, grapefruit can be used in a variety of recipes and can be eaten hot as dessert. Try the following recipes:

BROILED GRAPEFRUIT

1 grapefruit
Brown sugar
Butter or margarine, softened
Cut grapefruit in half. Cut sections from membrane, leaving them in place. Sprinkle each half with a little brown sugar and dot with butter. Broil for 10 minutes or until golden brown and heated through.

CITRUS SALAD WITH GRAPEFRUIT DRESSING

3 cups torn spinach leaves
3 cups torn leaf lettuce
3 cups torn iceberg lettuce
1 grapefruit, peeled and sectioned
2 oranges, peeled and sectioned
1 avocado, peeled and sliced
1/2 cup sliced celery
1/2 cup sliced green pepper
1/4 cup slivered almonds, toasted

Combine spinach and lettuce in a large bowl, and toss lightly. Arrange remaining ingredients over greens. Top with Grapefruit Dressing (see following recipe).

GRAPEFRUIT DRESSING

1 (.75-ounce) package Italian salad dressing mix
2/3 cup vegetable oil, divided
1-1/2 teaspoon grated grapefruit rind
1/2 cup grapefruit juice

Combine salad dressing mix and 1/3 cup oil in a jar. Cover tightly and shake vigorously. Add remaining 1/3 cup oil and remaining ingredients. Cover tightly and shake vigorously. Refrigerate.

GRAPEFRUIT CHEESECAKE

1-9 inch crumb crust
2/3 cup low-fat cottage cheese

1 cup nonfat lemon yogurt
2 teaspoons fresh lemon juice
3 tablespoons sugar
1-1/2 cups freshly squeezed grapefruit juice
2 envelopes unflavored gelatin
1/2 cup water
1 grapefruit

Prepare the crust and chill until ready to use. Blend the cottage cheese and yogurt in a blender or food processor until very smooth. Add the lemon juice, sugar and grapefruit juice; blend again until well mixed. In a small saucepan, sprinkle the gelatin over the water and let it stand until softened, about 1 minute. Stir over low heat until gelatin is completely dissolved, about 5 minutes. Remove from heat and let cool to lukewarm. Add the gelatin mixture to the cheese mixture and mix well. Chill until thickened. Beat with a rotary beater or electric mixer for 1 minute. Pour into the crumb crust and chill until firm. Separate a peeled grapefruit into sections and remove the membrane. After the cheesecake is firm, arrange the grapefruit sections in an attractive pattern on the top. Sprinkle with additional crumbs.

MINT-GRAPEFRUIT SORBET

2/3 cup sugar
2-3 large pink grapefruit, peeled and sections, membranes removed, divided
5 tablespoons white creme de menthe
1/4 cup water
Mint leaves, for garnish

Combine the sugar, grapefruit, creme de menthe and water in the bowl of a food processor or blender and puree until smooth. Let mixture stand for 30 minutes. Pour the puree into a shallow glass dish and place it in the freezer for 12-24 hours or until frozen solid. Transfer the frozen fruit mixture to the food processor and process on a

pulse setting until it is smooth. Return the mixture to the dish and re-freeze for 1 to 1-1/2 hours. Remove the dish from the freezer and let stand at room temperature for about 10 minutes before serving to allow it to soften slightly. Scoop out small balls and serve in bowls with a grapefruit section and a sprig of mint leaves. Makes 8 servings.

GRAPEFRUIT PIE

1 cup sugar
2 tablespoons cornstarch
1-3/4 cup water
Pinch of salt
1-3 ounce package strawberry gelatin

Cook sugar, cornstarch, water and salt until thick and clear. Add gelatin and stir until mixture begins to set. Remove membrane from grapefruit sections, drain sections in a strainer and cut into small pieces.

Add grapefruit to gelatin mixture. Pour mixture into pastry shell and top with whipped cream. Chill until ready to serve.

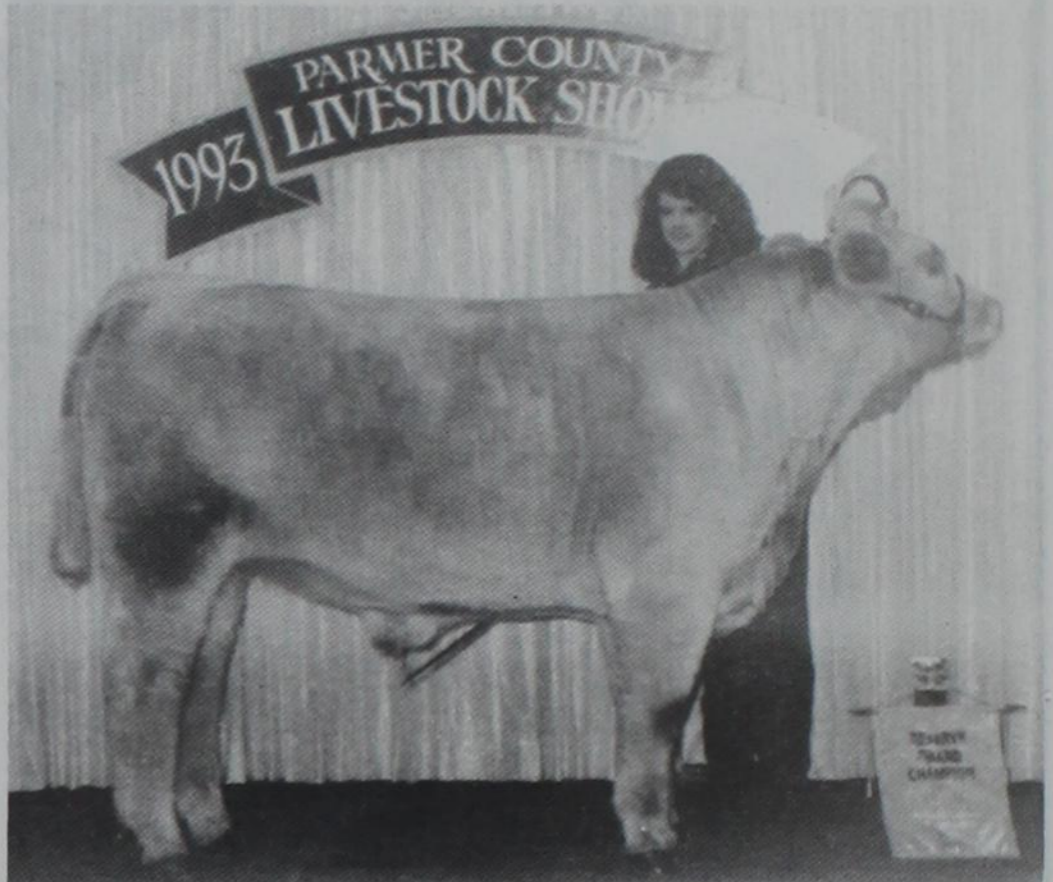

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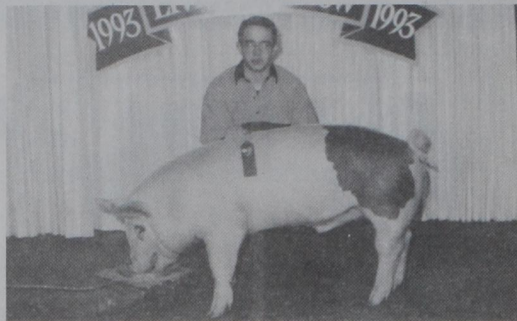

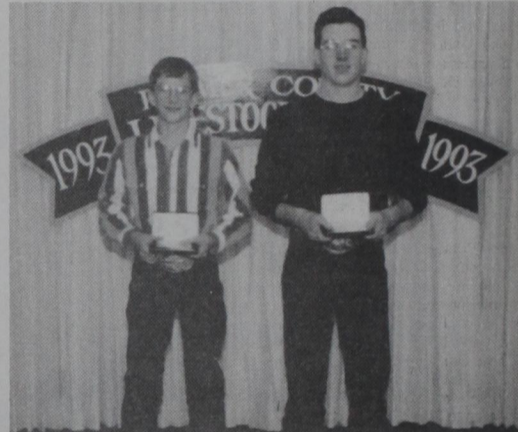

I vividly remember the anticipation we felt each fall and spring when we knew the catalogs would soon show up in our mail boxes.

Not only did we enjoy looking at them and ordering necessities from them, we made good use of them in many other ways. For family use, many of them found their way to the outhouse as soon as they were out of date.

This reminds me of a joke I heard many years ago. It went like this: An uneducated man wrote a letter reading, "Dear Sears-Roebuck, please send me some toilet paper."

Soon he received this reply, "Look on page 1001 of our current catalog and send us a number for the merchandise you need and we will send it to you."

His final letter read: "Dear Sears-Roebuck, if I had your catalog, I wouldn't need your toilet paper."

In addition to selecting toys from them for Santa to bring, many children spent hours playing with paper dolls which had been cut from the pages.

In fact, I don't remember that my older sister and I ever had any other kind of paper dolls, except plain ones we made. However, I do remember that our younger sisters had factory-made ones.

Another way they were used to a good advantage was by making risers for young children to sit upon at the table. A fall or summer catalog--one of the large ones--was very often covered with used denim, bed ticking or other substantial material for purpose.

Then, too, many times the pages served as guides for pioneer homemakers who were piecing quilts. By sewing scraps of fabric onto a square or other selected shape, they were able to make uniform blocks. After the blocks had been pieced and stripped together, the paper was easily torn off.

It is kind of sad to know that children of the future will never have the opportunity to look through a Sears catalog unless they go to a museum.

More and more individuals are retiring earlier today through forced retirement or individual choice. When this occurs, the new retiree who has participated in a qualified retirement plan typically has the option to choose a guaranteed monthly income in the form of an annuity or a lump-sum distribution of the entire retirement account balance. What to do?

Because of the various tax consequences associated with retirement distributions, anyone facing retirement should consult a qualified tax professional before committing to either choice. Once a selection is made, it is generally irreversible.

Annuity distributions appeal to some retirees because of the guaranteed income. Lump-sum distributions, however, are probably the more popular option.

A lump-sum distribution is the payment of the entire balance of your retirement account in a single calendar year. Once you receive the distribution, you may either keep the money and do nothing (in which case taxes are due on the entire amount) or defer taxes by rolling part or all of the proceeds into an Individual Retirement Account (IRA). The rollover must

take place within 60 days of the date the distribution is received.

Beginning January 1, 1993, lump-sum distributions will be transferable directly to an IRA rather than the recipient having to take receipt of the distribution. In addition, employees who wish to take receipt of their lump sum as opposed to directly transferring it to another IRA qualified plan, must have at least five years of participation in the plan to do so. Finally, lump-sum distributions received after January 1, 1993, will be assessed a 20 per cent withholding tax if the distribution is paid directly to the individual. We will address these distribution changes in more detail after the first of the year.

Because taxes are eventually due on retirement funds as money is withdrawn, some retirees elect to pay the taxes all at once and be done with it. There is possible special tax treatment associated with this choice, but the distribution must satisfy several criteria. Before making any decision to pay all taxes up front, talk to a knowledgeable tax professional and understand the consequences and your options.

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
