Official Table of Food Point Values

No. 1—Effective March 1, 1943

Pursuant to Ration Order Number 13

Table of Food Point Values with columns for Weight (0 to 16 lbs) and Point Values for various food categories including Fruits and Fruit Juices, Vegetables and Vegetable Juices, and Other Processed Foods.

THE FOLLOWING ITEMS ARE NOT INCLUDED: Canned Fruits, Jams—Jellies, Potato Salad, Chili con Carne, Olives, Preserves, Fruit Cakes, Pickles, Relishes, Fruit Fillings, Frozen Fruits in containers over 10 pounds, Frozen Vegetables in containers over 10 pounds, Fruit Juices in containers over one gallon, Meat Sews containing some Vegetable, Paste Products—such as Spaghetti, Macaroni, Noodles, whether or not they are packed with added Vegetable Sauce, Vegetable Juices in containers over one gallon, By-products of fruits or vegetables such as soy bean oil, soy bean meal, fruit and vegetable dyes, and similar products.

INSTRUCTIONS.—To find the Point Value of an item: 1. Find out the net weight of the contents (from the label, if any). 2. In the line across the top of the chart, showing the weight in ounces and pounds, find the column in which this weight belongs. 3. Find the item in the listing of items in the column to the left. 4. The POINT VALUE of the item appears on the same line as the item and in the column listing the correct weight. All Point Values must be determined by weights. If no weight is marked on the item, the item must be weighed. In finding the Point Value of a container where contents are given in fluid ounces, consider the fluid ounce to be the same as the metric weight ounce. One pint is one pound; one quart is two pounds.

The Point Value of any item weighing over four (4) pounds shall be arrived at by multiplying the number of pounds of that item by the Point Value per pound of that item as given in the "Per Pound" column. Fractions of a pound should be figured in quarter-pounds. Fractions of a quarter-pound should be figured to the next higher quarter-pound. Thus, an item weighing 4 pounds 3 ounces would be considered as weighing 4 pounds 12 ounces for the purpose of getting the Point Value of the item.

Increased Dairy Production Aim Of FSA Program

To help halt the slaughter of good milk cows and potential dairy producing animals the Farm Security Administration announces the inauguration of a new program in Texas, designed to maintain essential dairy production levels in the state.

Details of the plan, called the Dairy Animal Conservation Program, were received here by Raleigh C. Middleton, county supervisor for the FSA.

The plan provides that Mr. Middleton has authority to purchase milk cows, heifers and heifer calves from farmers who contemplate liquidating their herds or surplus parts of their herds. These animals will be resold to farmers who have the facilities to keep them in essential production.

"This new war-time function," said Mr. Middleton, "provides for the government purchase of dairy animals from farmers, who because of inadequate supplies of feed, labor or other facilities, have been sending their animals to slaughter. The government is not competing with commercial buyers but is trying to keep dairy animals on local farms by reselling them to farmers in the vicinity who do have the facilities to care for them."

The supervisor explained that in the event local dairymen or farmers cannot take on the additional animals, they will be sold to individuals in other parts of the state. He said only healthy dairy cows or potential producing animals will be saved from slaughter.

Dairymen or farmers in this area who may be compelled to market surplus animals or those individuals who wish to purchase surplus animals are asked to contact the FSA supervisor at his office in the County Court House in Farwell.

## CHDA NOTES

Bangs Disease is taking a pretty heavy toll of profits in our cattle industry in Parmer County. There are two factors which must be considered to arrive at the seriousness of this disease. The first and most important is the danger of using milk from cows which have bangs disease. The same organism which causes Bangs also causes undulant fever. If you have ever seen a case of this fever or if you have had a case of it in your family I don't need to tell you how serious it is. If you haven't then just talk to your doctor the next time you see him and he can tell you some things which will make you want to be very careful about the milk you use.

The second important factor in regard to Bangs is that herds infected with Bangs produce a

very small number of calves. This is causing us to lose valuable replacements in our dairy industry and our only means of profit in our beef industry.

Bangs is a disease which causes a cow to lose her calf just a few months before the calf is due. Of course, these mechanical injury or other means than Bangs, but too often we are inclined to think that when we lose a calf it is not Bangs. This is simply wishful thinking and is very unsound in practice. Any time a cow loses a calf she should be suspected of Bangs and tested immediately if she is not already on test.

There are two methods of eliminating Bangs from our herds. The oldest method is test and sell reactors. Of course this is a costly method but after all if you have Bangs you want to know about it and if the test reveals reactors you certainly don't want to keep them in the herd since there are a definite source of spreading the disease and are a danger to those who use the milk. The second method is calfhood vaccination of all the heifers when 4 to 8 months of age. This vaccination, when properly done, is from 90 to 98 percent effective. Vaccination is not only costly and since the degree of effectiveness is so high I can hardly see why everyone is not vaccinating. I believe that a combination of testing and vaccination is the best solution to the problem until we have our herds completely cleaned up and all cows not now vaccinated replaced with vaccinated heifers.

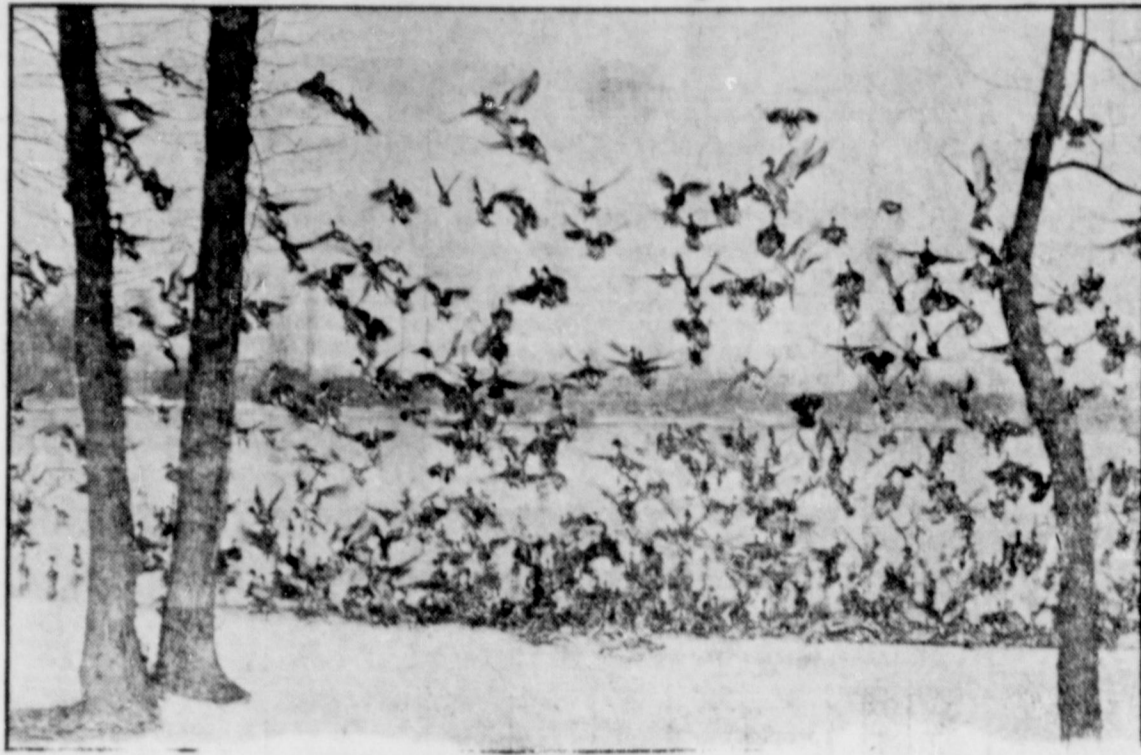

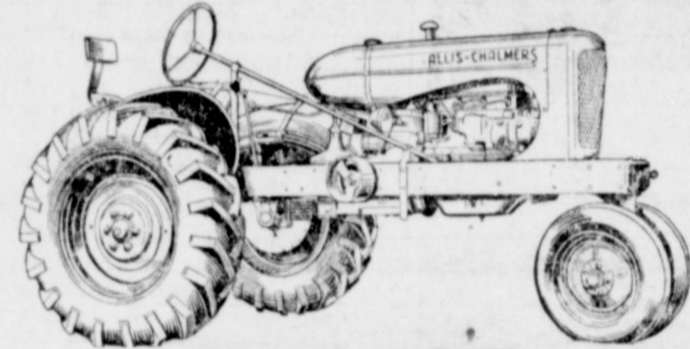

### Small Farmers Aid Increased Food Production

More than a third of the nation's increase in milk production in 1942 came from 463,941 farms of Farm Security Administration borrowers, the Department of Agriculture reported today.

In terms of the nation's total increase, milk topped the list of production by these borrowers, according to results of a survey of their production. Farm Security Administration, on the basis of its survey, reported that these families, constituting 7.6 percent of the 6,097,000 farm operators listed by the 1940 census, increased their milk production by 1,419,000,000 pounds or 36 per cent of the total increase for the nation. This was a 20 per cent increase over their 1941 production, compared to a three per cent increase made by all farmers. All of this increase may not have been, of course, a net increase since some of the cows purchased in 1942 by FSA borrowers would have been milked by their original owners.

Significant increases by Farm Security borrowers also were shown for other war-needed food

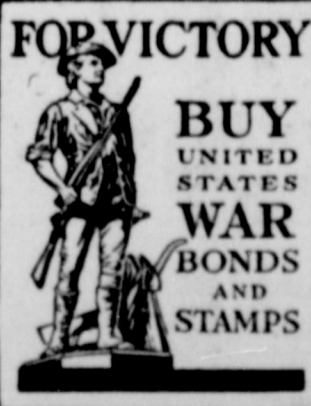

Chicopee Falls, Mass., Feb. 14, 1943.

Dear Uncle John:  
How is everybody? I guess you thought I was never going to write. We have been in quarantine for measles nearly ever since I got here. First it was in the 359th, then in this squadron. It was finally lifted last Friday. The 360th is my permanent Squadron, (I think). The whole squadron may move to a new location soon, but hereafter I won't move unless the whole squadron does. I got the copies of the Star OK, as the 359th is not far from here and I go down there for mail call as well as at this squadron. Most of my mail comes there, but soon I should be getting it all here. I saw Charles Reeve

before I left Chantus. He was instructing on the "A" shift in instruments and I was on the "C" shift, so I did not get to talk to him as much as I would have liked to. He came to the school a little before 6 a. m. and the "C" shift had to leave about 6:00. It was sure good to see him anyway. He left there before I did. He went to Yale, I believe. We have sure had a lot of snow since I have been here, and ever so often it rains and freezes over everything, and Boy! is it ever slick! Well, I am not doing anything much, as we do not have our planes yet. So there is not much to write about. I'll sign off for this time and hope to hear from you when you get time.

Camp Beale, Calif., Feb. 13, 1943.

Dear Mr. White:

The other day I heard that a very close friend and pal of mine and of the rest of the boys here that knew him, was killed in action. He was one of those fighting Marines who died fighting for his country, and I and his other friends here wish to convey our deepest regrets to Mr. and Mrs. Willis Parker and family and to many other friends and loved ones. Well, so far the five that joined the 13th are still together. Four of us are in "C" company. Guy Lette strayed off one day and "B" company grabbed him. It's really swell for all of us to go together. God help those Japs when the Friona gang goes to the front line, because they are really going to be in need of assistance. It's going to look like the Fourth of July on Coney

Island, with us supplying the fireworks. Well, Mr. White, I'd better stop and get ready for a very honorable job that starts early in the morning. (K-P). Did I say "honorable", well?

There are several of the boys from Friona here—Scott Kirkpatrick, Frank Truitt, Volley Hodges, Obie Malone, James Watkins and myself. We have been here. We have never been able to see Frank yet. It sure is great to be with a bunch of boys from home. We have an old-time get-together every once in a while, and talk of Friona and the folks we knew there. We saw a letter from one of our old boy friends—Albert Davis—and it was the first news we had heard of him since he left the States. We are hoping that he will have the Japs and the Germans whipped soon and all of the boys can return home to their friends and loved ones. So, until we return, keep the home fires burning.

## A Word to Our Overseas Boys

It has been a pleasure for the manager and publishers of the Friona Star to place all our local boys who are in any branch of the armed service, on our mailing list. It has also been the pleasure of the local manager to receive their letters and to pass them on to the boys themselves and to all the other readers of the Star. Thus, what we are about to say, is considered as bad news for us as well as for our boys.

War regulations were adopted some weeks ago which prevented individual civilians from sending copies of newspapers and magazines to these "overseas" boys, but the publishers were still allowed to do so. It seems that these restrictions have since been made more stringent, to the extent that publishers are not now allowed to mail copies to these boys. Regular paid subscriptions may still be sent overseas, but the request for such subscriptions must come from the service man himself.

As the manager of the Star understands these regulations and restrictions, the publishers may still send the paper to the service men who are still within the borders of the United States, and only the "overseas" men are eliminated from the

subscription rolls. Unless further restrictions and regulations are adopted we will continue to send the paper to service men in this country.

We feel that our action in sending the Star FREE to these service men should be sufficient evidence that this is no action on OUR part to make a "money-grab" of the matter, as we started the free subscription program solely on our own initiative and have never been asked by anyone to do so, and nothing has been further from our mind than to use it as a scheme to make money from our service men.
