

### One-year spending unsound

Two of the state's leaders Heatly contends that the oneare holding firm for a two-year appropriations bill-a stand which is synonymous with fiscal if a two-year bill had been responsibility.

The backers of the two-year bill are Gov. Preston Smith and Rep. W.S. Heatly, the powerful bill has been made because it chairman of the House Appropriations Committee. They stand on principle and in the long run to cover the spending plans of their position would probably save the taxpayers money.

The principle has its roots in the state Constitution which provides for biennial sessions of the legislature. Thus to meet this requirement, there has to be an appropriation bill covering two years.

In 1967, the legislature passed a spending bill for only one year, at Gov. John Connally's suggestion, and then he called the legislature into "emergency" session in 1968 to appropriate and tax for the remaining year

Creating such an emergency by only passing a one-year bill violates the spirit, if not the Gov. Smith has said. Rep.

year bill cost the taxpayers at least \$35 million more than passed in 1967.

The proposal for a one-year appears that taxes will have to be raised about \$300 million the legislature and some members would rather not raise tax-

The legislators have the responsibility to provide the revenues for their spending plans just as the governor must present a tax plan to cover his budger proposals. The governor presented a tax plan to the legislature which would raise an estimated \$260 million in new revenue. If the lawmakers don't like Gov. Smith's proposals, they should come up with their alternatives, but oneyear spending is not the proper


concept of government. And if we let them know that we are fed up with certain programs and sloppy procedures and that their re-election may hang in the balance - then we may see a return to common

destructive funnel clouds in the immediate area, we have had a new method of detecting tornadoes called to our attention.

The "Weller System" of tornado detection uses your home television screen, and according to reports, it is a very reliable method.

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Since this might someday save someone's life, we think it worthwhile to print:

"A Des Moines, lowa, electronics researcher has come up with a way to use an ordinary television set to give the best, advance warning of an approaching tornado.

"Newton Weller, the discoverer, says his system can tell usual and startling test last you whether a thunderstorm is just another storm or if it contains a deadly tornado funnel. It can tell you whether to stay in bed or hunt cover.

"All you have to do is to turn on your set, switch to Ch. 13, use the brightness contro! to . turn the screen black, and then move the d.a! to Ch. 2.

"Under these conditions, the set will pick up the electrical impulses of nearby lightning strokes and record them on the screen as bright horizontal flashes.

"The intensity and frequency of the flashes are indication of how severe the storm is. But as long as the screen shows only flashes, a storm is not a tor-

"A tornado has its own specific type of lightning discharge and shows up on the screen as continuous bright light.

"Thus, when the screen is bright all over, it's time to Friona. head for shelter.'




