The move-in houses which are being brought to Friona by various developers should fill a void, offering lower and middle-priced housing which has been lacking. This was a big need.

The 18-unit apartment project to be built north of Friona High School bids to also be a big help in alleviating the housing shortage in Friona. It will give the city additional much-needed apartments.

Then, this week we have the announcements of not one or two but three non-residential projects for the city; a new church building for the Congregational Church, a new home at a new location for White Auto, and a veterinary clinic.

The growth which was promised by the location of Missouri Beef Packers is beginning to materialize. The growth has been slowly coming to pass, and seems about to level off as a steady process.

Three File For City Positions

NEW BUILDING SET

Congregational Church Reveals Building Plans

Friona's Union Congregational Church announced plans this week for a new church building to be built east of St. Theresa's Catholic Church on 17th Street.

The building will be built on land donated to the church by Orma Flippin, a member, Phillips Construction Co. of Amarillo is the general contractor. Cost of the building is estimated at \$77,000.

Rev. Paul Mohr, pastor,

pointed out that the building would be of modern design and fully air conditioned. Dick Coneway of Houston designed the building. Coneway is the son of another church member, Mrs. O.F. Lange.

The church building will be of brick veneer construction. The sanctuary will measure 60 by 40 feet, and will seat approximately 200 people. A 90 by 38 educational facility will join the sanctuary at the

rear, and will be designed so that the rear of the sanctuary will have folding doors opening into the fellowship hall, enabling an expansion of the sanctuary capacity when needed.

Also included in the 90x38 part of the building will be classrooms, the pastor's study and a kitchen, in addition to the fellowship hall, which itself measures 20 x 60 feet.

The church's present plans are to sign the contract on Thursday with Bill Phillips, contractor. Construction is to begin within a month, and the church plans a groundbreaking service on Easter Sunday. "We plan to occupy the new church building by January of 1970, and perhaps prior to this," said Rev. Mohr.

A covered walkway on both sides of the main part of the church will add to its appearance and also will be useful in times of inclement weather. The church sanctuary and fellowship hall will feature paneled walls. The sanctuary will have an open beam ceiling.

The Union Congregational Church is Friona's oldest church, and is the original church in the city, serving as the city's only church for many years. Its present building was constructed in 1922. It was built after a fire destroyed the original building, which was built in 1908.

Members of the church will do some volunteer work during the building program, such as painting the educational portion, and some floor work.

The members of the executive building committee are Dr. Robert Alexander, O.F. Langer, Mrs. John F. White and the pastor, Rev. Mohr. The building program has been under consideration for some time.

The church's present building will be offered for sale, according to Rev. Mohr. Any party interested should contact him or a member of the executive building committee.

The new location is outside the city limits at the present time.

"We regret having to build outside the city limits, since the church has been a part of the city so many years. However, we hope someday that the property will be annexed," stated Rev. Mohr.

At the present time, the property located between the church and the present city limits is not a part of the city, and it would have to be annexed before the church property could come in.

Rev. Mohr has been pastor of the church since December 1963.

Work Begins On Project

Preliminary work has begun toward the construction of 18 apartment units on 10th Street west of Green Avenue by the Medlock Corp. of Lubbock. The location is just north of the high school property.

The apartments will be two-bedroom, and will be all-electric from the standpoint of utilities. Construction is expected to take three months, according to a spokesman for the Medlock Corp.

The facing and gables will be of western cedar and antique brick. The apartments will be six triplexes. They will feature off-street parking.

Friona Merchants Honor Frazier

John Frazier, parts department manager for Farmer County Implement Company, was honored with the monthly "most courteous employee" award at the meeting of the Friona Association of Retail Merchants last Thursday.

Charles Allen, vice president of Friona State Bank, spoke to the group on the history of bank credit cards, which are becoming more and more popular in the state and

nation. "We will see the day of computer banking, where you won't have to use cash or checks," Allen remarked.

Bank credit cards came about as a result of branch banking, which is permitted in several states, Allen pointed out. California's Bank of America began the BankAmericard, and had it in operation on a statewide basis by 1959.

In 1963, there were as many as 200 different kinds of bank credit cards. At the present time, there are two major cards, Allen said, the BankAmericard and Presto-Charge, which soon is to be merged with Master-Charge. The credit card approach benefits the merchant in that it gives him instant cash at the bank without sending out bills, Allen explained. The participating merchant is usually charged five per cent for this service, plus a small monthly rental on the card machine.

Texas is among the states licensed to use the BankAmericard, and some neighboring cities have adopted the program.

The group discussed the possibility of holding some type of community-wide promotion, although nothing definite was decided upon.

White Auto Plans New Friona Store

Leland Hutson, local White Auto Store owner, and R. L. Fleming, contractor, announced this week that Fleming will build a new building for the White store, at 11th and Prospect streets.

The location is on U.S. Highway 60, at the spot where the Helpy-Selfy Laundry formerly was located. This building was torn down recently.

The new building for White's will be 140 feet by 50 feet, and will be located toward the rear of the 140x150 foot lot, leaving ample parking space

on the front part of the lot.

The building will be of metal construction with brick front. Some 30 feet of the building will be reserved for the company's service department, which will feature a three-bay service area. Construction on the new building is to begin in the near future, and is to be completed by June.

Hutson, who has been the owner of the local White's Auto for the past five years, says that he believes the additional space will enable him to better serve the people of the Friona area.

"We will have much more display space and will be able to give better service," Hutson said. He indicated that the company probably would expand its line of furniture upon getting into its new quarters.

Investigate 10 Wrecks In Month

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 10 accidents on rural highways in Farmer County during the month of January according to Sergeant W. E. Wells, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in seven persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$7,525.00.

In comparing the rural traffic deaths of January, 1969, to January, 1968 of the 60 counties which comprise the Lubbock DPS Region there was a 37 per cent increase in deaths.

The veteran Patrol Supervisor stated, "If January is a representation of the next 11 months in Texas, traffic accidents will claim 3,900 lives in 1969, an all-time high."

The Sergeant also issued a reminder that April 15 is the deadline for obtaining the 1969 inspection sticker of all motor vehicles registered in Texas.

Pause And Reflect

For the greater part of two years this space has been used to advocate an appreciation of our homeland.

These feeble, amateurish efforts have attempted to stress not only the physical beauty and the wealth of natural resources we possess but have tried to point out the advantages of our democratic free enterprise system and to demonstrate its worth.

The effectiveness or influence of these few lines will probably be much like a very small pebble dropped into the great pool of time, a faint splash, and ripples that will never reach the shore.

Still the writer has derived some satisfaction in the knowledge that his voice has been added to those thousands of others who love their country and who are unwilling to remain silent while their birthright is stolen.

These vociferous ones have not escaped the penchant for labeling that is prevalent today.

Tags such as "ultra-conservative," "far right", "square", and "flagwavers" have been applied but so far they have neither dented the armor of conviction nor dulled the edge of the verbal sword.

Presently these voices constitute a mere whisper in the whirlwind of current events; however if our elected officials are as smart as we hope they are, they will heed the whisper of discontent before it becomes a shout of rebellion.

And more rebellion is exactly what we do not need!

Surely those who occupy the seats of the mighty realize this and may be depended upon to bring a modicum of reason to such problems as our ridiculous tax structure and to the frivolous spending performed in the name of sweet charity.

History recounts many instances wherein it became necessary for the people to call a halt to practices that worked against the public good.

It was in 1215 that the Barons of England called King John's hand at Runnymede, and out of that first Great Charter (Magna Carta) grew much of our present form of law. Early in America's national life she fought a war for independence and later lived through the horrors of a civil war.

Two world wars, Korea, and now Vietnam have taken their toll of lives and dollars.

How have we survived?

One reason is that in the aforementioned struggles the enemy was clearly defined.

Now we face a far greater foe.

The insidious infiltration of communism has progressed at such a steady pace as to be almost unrecognizable even when it erupts on college campuses.

Now our high schools and elementary schools are targets!

I have no desire to "heat a dead horse" - I refer you to the series of articles in the Amarillo News - excerpts from J. Edgar Hoover's new book on the subject, and Robert Botts' articles exposing the real forces behind the campus rioting.

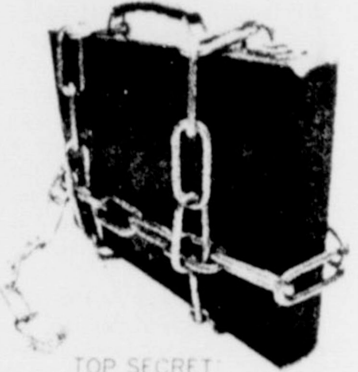
The former Friona star

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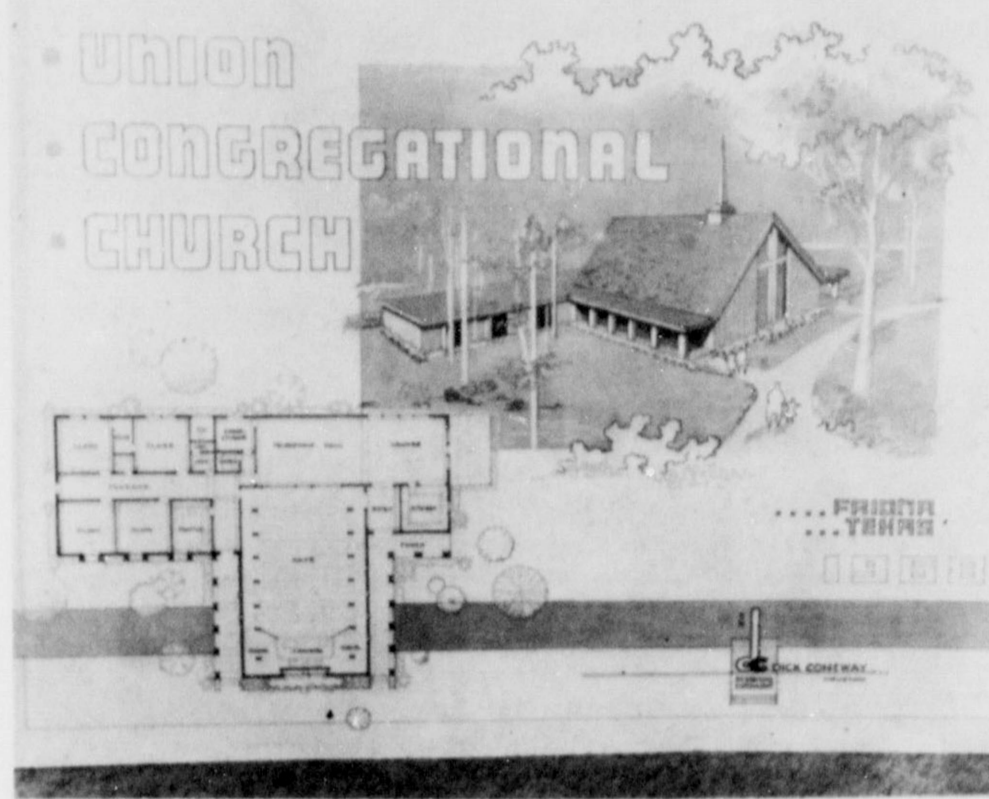

For most profitable use of herbicides, careful attention should be given to planting method. Results of Texas A&M University, Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Lubbock, have shown that planting on top of the bed improves stands and minimizes replanting. After light showers, fewer weeds emerge in cotton planted on top of the bed than in cotton in the furrow. Cotton planted on top of the bed can be treated with directed sprays and flame much earlier and sooner than cotton down in the furrow.

Chemicals can be used pre-plant, pre-emergence or post-emergence to control weeds in cotton. The following weed control recommendations are made by Dr. Allen Wiese and Dudley Smith in their latest research report entitled "Weed Control in Cotton in the Panhandle and South Plains."

PREPLANT HERBICIDES
Use of preplant herbicides is most profitable on fields where severe weed problems exist and hoeing costs have been high. Best results have been obtained when herbicides are applied to dry flat soil prior to bedding for pre-irrigation. Within 4 hours after application and before bedding, herbicides must be incorporated 2 to 4 inches deep. This is best accomplished with a tandem disk. Care should be taken not to list deeper than incorporation or middles will become weedy prior to planting. Cotton should be planted on top of the bed or in a shallow furrow to avoid moving herbicides to the middles, thus leaving the cotton row unprotected.

Successful preplant application of herbicides can be made to bands on beds with power incorporators just prior to pre-irrigation. If herbicides are not incorporated deeply, planting must be done on top of the bed without removing soil. Weed emergence in cotton during the summer after application of preplant herbicides indicates that the herbicide has decomposed.

HERBICIDES THAT CAN BE USED PREPLANT ARE AS FOLLOWS:
1. DACTHAL - This herbicide is used on many vegetables and is safe to use where vegetables follow cotton. APPLICATION RATES OF ACTIVE INGREDIENT ARE 4, 6 and 8 lb/A ON COARSE, MEDIUM AND FINE TEXTURED SOILS.

2. PLANAVIN - It will control volunteer sorghum, weedy grasses, and common broadleaf weeds. RATES OF ACTIVE INGREDIENT FOR COARSE, MEDIUM AND FINE TEXTURED SOIL ARE 1/2, 3/4 and 1 lb/A.

3. TREFLAN - This herbicide is used also for soybeans, castors, and many vegetables. It is very effective against volunteer sorghum, weedy grasses, and common broadleaf weeds. APPLICATION RATES FOR COARSE, MEDIUM AND FINE TEXTURED SOILS ARE 3/8, 1/2 and 3/4 lb/A. Use slightly higher rates if full season weed control is desired. Do not plant sorghum until May 15, the year following Treflan application at the above rates.

Pre-emergence herbicides have consistently reduced hoeing and can be used profitably on fields where hoeing costs usually exceed \$3.00 per acre. In order to minimize cost, pre-emergence herbicides can be applied in 10-inch bands over the cotton rows before emergence. On 40-inch rows this treatment requires 1/4 as much herbicide as a broadcast application. Pre-emergence treatments will not control deep germinating weeds unless heavy rains leach herbicides deeply into the soil. Effectiveness of pre-emergence herbicides can be markedly enhanced by sprinkler irrigation immediately after application. Shallow incorporation with mechanical devices

Improves the effectiveness of certain herbicides. HERBICIDES THAT CAN BE USED PRE-EMERGENCE ARE AS FOLLOWS:

1. CAPAROL 80W - Soil incorporation is not advised. SUGGESTED RATES OF APPLICATION ARE 1, 1-1/2 and 1-1/2 /A for COARSE, MEDIUM AND FINE TEXTURED SOILS.

2. COTORAN - Use only on medium and fine textured soil. RATES OF ACTIVE INGREDIENT FOR MEDIUM AND FINE TEXTURED SOIL ARE 1.5 and 2.0 lb./A. Do not replant crop in treated soil. Weed control is very good with this herbicide but injury will occur on sandy, loamy sand and fine sandy loam soil.

3. DACTHAL - (Same as for preplant application.)
4. HERBAN - It can be used pre-emergence or with light soil incorporation. Sorghum can be planted the year of application if cotton fails. APPLICATION RATES ARE 1.0, 1.5 and 2.0 lb./A ACTIVE INGREDIENT ON COARSE, MEDIUM AND FINE TEXTURED SOILS. Do not use on loamy sand or sandy soils.

5. KARMEX DL and KARMEX DUROX - Light incorporation of diuron is beneficial. RATES OF DUROX ARE 0.5, 0.8 and 1.0 lb./A FOR COARSE, MEDIUM AND FINE TEXTURED SOILS. Do not use on sandy soil.

6. LASSO - This new herbicide will probably be labeled for cotton, peanuts, corn and soybeans in 1969. Research results since 1966 indicate that this pre-emergence herbicide will give outstanding control of carelessweed (pigweed) and good control of most annual grasses common to West Texas. Rate of active ingredient to use varies from 1 to 1-1/2 pounds per treated acre, depending upon soil type. Shallow incorporation may improve weed control.

7. PLANVIN - Must be incorporated to about planting depth with a power incorporator just prior to planting with a surface planter. Rates are the same as for preplant application.

8. TREFLAN - Must be mixed on top of the bed to about planting depth with a power incorporator just prior
