TELL OF ALLEGED JUGO-SLAV ATTACKS ON THE ITALIANS

ROME, Wednesday, Feb. 4.—Details of alleged Jugo-Slav attacks upon Italians at Spalato and Trau are published in the newspapers here and cause further excitement over the situation in Dalmatia.

It is reported that on Dec. 27 a manifesto was posted on walls at Spalata calling a meeting in the principal square in protest against Italian "imperialism."

It is declared the commander of an American ship at Spalato did nothing to prevent the meeting which was in violation of an order issued by Admiral Niblack in February, 1917. Inflammatory speeches against Italy and the entente powers marked the meeting, it is said, Colonel Mihallovie, the Serbian commander in Spalato, being especially violent in an address.

doctors are needed.

Early last autumn the state health department, in co-operation with the United States public health service listed 72 physicians who volunteered to assist in treating influenza victims in the state. Dr. Goddard is now endeavoring to secure more volunteers for this force. The federal health service pays these doctors \$200 per month with \$3 a day and traveling expenses. They work under direc-

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 5 .- Ninety per cent of the "interventionist propaganga" carried on in the United States is the work of the American Association of Petroleum Producers," declared Joseph F. Guffey, president of the Agwi Oil Company, in a state-ment issued here yesterday. He said that the association had boycotted his company and had tried vainly to get the state department to refuse to per-mit him to charter United States shipping board tankers.

He asserted he had conferred with President Carranza and Louis Cabrera, secretary of the treasury and would leave in a few days for New York and start a campaign favoring compliance on the part of American oil men to Mexican laws. TOPEKA, Kan., Feb. 5.—"I hope and believe the order of Director General Hines, instructing railroads in giving preference and priority to bulk giving preference and priority to bulk grain shipments in the furnishing of box cars will mean very definite improvement in the Kansas situation," Gov. Henry J. Allen, said today when informed of the Hines' order.

Judge Clyde M. Reed, of the court of industrial relations, who has handled the box car shortage in Kansas, said it was his belief that this order was the direct result of the conference.

was the direct result of the conference of railroad officials held here with Governor Allen. He said that the order undoubtedly would bring much relief to Kansas farmers who have been unable to move millions of dol-lars worth of crops because of the car shortage.

AN AGREEMENT

Rate-Making Clause Modified and Anti-Strike Provision is Eliminated

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5 .- Casting aside the anti-strike provision of the aside the anti-strike provision of the Cummins bill, against which labor has leveled protests and threats, and modifying the rate making clauses of the same measures, senate and house representatives late Wednesday reached virtually a complete agreement on legislation designed to meet conditions growing out of the return of the railroads, March 1, to private control. For the anti-strike provision the joint conference committee of the two houses agreed to substitute what in effect amounts to compulsory submission of wage disputes to a federal board appointed by the President.

A number of minor differences remain to be composed but these, Senator Cummins of lowa, chairman of the senate managers, said would be worked out by himself and Chairman Esch of the house conferees. A final report on the legislation is anticipated late this week and efforts will be made to insure the bill's passage before March I.



COFFEE AND MORALE

Think back. Was there ever a time even during the most serious and crucial periods of the great war, when you were unable to have a cup of fragrant, steaming coffee for your breakfast?

Other things disappeared from the grocery shelves, but there was always coffee. Other parts of the restaurant menu were seriously curtailed, but nobody struck coffee from the list.

No matter how hard the times coffe was always on hand.

Outless hit of facetimes

hand.

Quite a bit of favoritism, wasn't it? Or was it?

We learned, during the war, how to get along without sugar in cakes and desserts; we learned that we could eat cornbread and barley mufflins in place of white bread, we learned how to cut down on meats and fats.

The Food Administration at Washington told us these things must be done and taught us how they might be done.

In addition to cereals, milk and cheese, fats and meats, the United States Food Administration must have had coffee under serious consideration.

For there were black times in 1948 when all ordinary commerce was at sixes and sevens. Unless we sent steadly every available ounce of food to the allies and our own soldiers, victory of the enemy seemed imminent. This meant that every ship not bound elsewhere on an absolutely necessary errand must be pressed into service for this direct shipment of food from the United States to France or England.

Eighty per cent of all the coffee imported into the

United States is grown in South America. From North America to South America and back is a fairly long trip and a very different voyage than straight across the ocean to France or England.

Yet there never was a time when ships were not being sent to South America for coffee. Why?

Because Mr. Hoover believed that the American people needed coffee.

Coffee trials to tone up the system when the body is

temporarily below par. It stimulates the heart action. It assists digestion.

Nothing else can so clieer up a man who awakes with a grouch or a down-in-the-mouth feeling. Nothing else makes him feel so good without any ill after-effects.

Wise wives have always known that the time to talk to a man is after the rolls and coffee, not before.

In other words, coffee is, as Mr. Hoover said when its food value was questioned, "a psychological, necessity." So you did not have, to get along without coffee during the war. At all times dealers were allowed to maintain a "visible supply" of one million and a quarter bags of coffee. This was not as much coffe as goes to make up the visible supply. But it was enough to "keep us going," enough to give each of us a cup of coffee every day.

Mr. Hoover was unwilling that the American people should have to go without coffee. He saw its direct relation to morale in war time, Mr. Hoover gave coffee its first official recognition as a necessity.
