

Fullback Larry Hodges, who Casey credited with being his outstanding back in the game, received a dislocated shoulder and is out of action.





40 YEARS AGO -- DECEMBER 6, 1929

Welfare Reform Is Badly Needed

We live in wondrous times indeed. In space achievements, in communications, in science, in industry, in chemistry, fantastic things are happening in America. But it would appear that this, the richest nation in the world, is also becoming something of a welfare wonderland.

Case in point: in San Francisco it is reported that a woman testified in court that she could not afford to pay \$118 in parking tickets on her Cadillac because her welfare checks were too low. She told the Judge that she was paying her \$133 car insurance in monthly installments from her welfare checks.

The Pampa, Texas News reports that in New York City, a woman and her six children were housed at taxpayers' expense in the Hotel President at a cost of \$2,000 per month. It seems that their apartment had been in a condemned building and they were moved by the city welfare department when the heat and hot water was shut off. The poor family will probably require the services of a welfare specialist to help them adjust to the shock when they are moved (hopefully) to less luxurious quarters.

Rep. H.R. Gross (R-Iowa) cites an interesting welfare case in Montgomery County, Maryland. It seems that twelve people, six men and six women, all on the dole receiving unemployment funds, have pooled their handouts and are living high on the hog. They pay rent on a six-bedroom home complete with swimming pool and a suana steam bath. Their income of \$660 a week is tax free, which isn't bad since they never have to leave the house for work. Think of the savings on transportation costs alone!

Isolated examples? Maybe. It is important to note, however, that none of the examples cited is illegal. If some freeloaders are able to turn welfare assistance into a racket, others are bound to try it. There is much talk today about the need for "tax reform". We suggest that there is also an urgent need for

(Editor's note: Sgt. Scott Cummings, a graduate of Friona High School, has served 19 months in Vietnam. He is due to return home in about two months. The following is an excerpt from a letter he wrote to his mother, Mrs. Doyle Cummings:)

What did you think of the 250,000 who were in Washington, D.C.? It really made a lot of people sick at least the ones who care about the future of America.

I don't know what the States are doing letting people like that make such a mess. Right now I'm in the silent majority. but when I get home I think I'll stir up a little mess of my

I've been here for 19 months and have seen things I wouldn't like to see again. The things I've seen are being laughed at by the minority and I don't like it a bit. There have been and will be a lot of men killed for the minority and they don't appreciate it at all.

They are making a mockery of the constitution, flag and our American heritage. I am not staying in the Army, but I am proud of what I've done and the uniform I wear. Also the country I represent.

I think the President should threaten those people like he did the NVA and the VC, then stand behind his words. This might change a lot of people's

What greater "aid and comfort to the enemy" can be rendered than to have a worldwide hull-a-baloo raised over the possibility that some noncombatants were killed in the guerrilla type warfare existing in South Vietnam?

If it is proved that the accused are guilty of murder, then they and the commander giving the order, should be punished, Frankly, the whole idea is inconceivable. There is a certain air of commercialism in the sale of the photographic evidence that raises doubts concerning its authenticity.

War has many faces-none of them pretty. Perhaps the Union General Sherman had the best definition,

"War is Hell." His opinion is not to be questioned.

After his infamous march through the state of Georgia during the American Civil War he wrote to General Halleck, President Lincoln's chief of staff, as follows, "We consumed the corn and fodder in the region of the country thirty miles on either side of a line from Atlanta to Savannah, also the sweet potatoes, hogs, sheep, and poultry, and carried off more than ten thousand horses and mules. I estimate the damage done to the State of Georgia at one hundred million dollars, at least twenty million of which inured to our benefit, and the remainder was simply waste and destruction" (vol 2 Sherman's Menoirs-pp. 223-227-8)

I can't recall Sherman being accused of slaughtering women

and children and I wager he did not. But there may have been victims of his march who would have preferred a quick death by gunfire to lingering fatal illness due to starvation and exposure.

I shall never forget a friend of mine who walked the floor and cried when he remembered the bombs he had dropped on German cities.



WHAT IS LIVESTOCK?

Livestock are animals that are bred and raised in the Western States to keep the producer broke and the buyer cra-
