THE BOMBING OF the World Trade Center building, and the standoff with federal officials by cult leader David Koresh near Waco: two of the biggest news stories and tragedies of the year, happening on the same weekend.

What else do the two events have in common? The perpetrators of both events had a "religious" reason for their actions.

While it is shocking to many people, and almost defies belief, that so much destruction, so much possible loss of lives, can be tied to religion, regardless of how extreme the tie--the fact is that these are far from the first atrocities committed in the name of religious fervor. And sadly, they probably won't be the last.

Half a world away, Serbs are killing Muslims in Bosnia-Herzegovina. Rather than find a way to live peaceably, one religious sect has decided to just eliminate the other.

This has been going on for centuries, so it shouldn't be too shocking to those of us in the Western Hemisphere. The only difference with the events of the past two weeks is the fact that they

As Rodney King asked in Los Angeles: "Can't we ... get along? ... "

Transportation awarded the contract this week for the widening of the final section of U.S. Highway 60 in Parmer County--between Bovina and Farwell.

Amarillo Roads was the successful bidder on the project, with a bid of \$10,591,860.07. Amarillo Roads is also the contractor on the middle segment of the project (Friona to Bovina).

Awarding of the contract assures that the entirety of Highway 60 through Parmer County will be widened, without an interruption.

Given the size of the project, and the involvement of state and federal money, there was the fear that the project, although approved, might have had further funding delays that could have caused the completion of the road to run a race with the turn of the century.

A pre-construction meeting for this final segment is



a.m. Monday. The time frame on the Bovina-Farwell segment will be announced at the meeting.

Representatives of the contractors, as well as the TDHPT will be present. The public is also invited.

Rhea Bradley, resident engineer for the TDHPT, said that the first section of the road, Friona to the Deaf Smith County line, is scheduled to be completed by June, 1993, and the second phase, Friona to Bovina, by late fall.

Contractors on both segments of the multi-milliondollar project have been hindered by this winter's weather.

"It has been either wet or below freezing practically ever since before said Thanksgiving," Bradley.

Highway 60 has been one of the major goals of local civic leaders for a number of years, and the travelling public will be greatly benefitted when construction on the 30-mile segment of the busy highway is completed--perhaps by

1995. The contract on the last segment is similar to the first two, calling for building of the two new (southbound) lanes, then demolishing of the present two lanes and reconstructing them, while traffic is routed on the newly constructed lanes.



In keeping with this goal, new technology is now available which will allow the Friona EMS to provide a higher level of care to the citizens and possibly make the difference between life and death in some cases. And in obtaining this



improve outcome after cardiac arrest in areas where the cost of paramedic services are prohibitive.

The Friona EMS is dedicated to saving lives and keeping up with the latest skills and technology. We want to provide this high level of care to our community. An Automatic External Defibrillator is an expensive piece of equipment and takes extra training and skills which we are dedicated to provide. The Friona EMS Association is a non-profit organization whose goals include raising funds for this type We especially want to thank of equipment. We have recently raised a small amount of funds through our annual EMS breakfasts held during Maize Days but we fall short from reaching the goal of the purchase of an AED.

The estimated cost of the AED \$7,500. The instrument is recommended by the Texas Department of Health, the Panhandle Emergency Medical Services, Dr. Curtis of Amarillo, who is the medical control authority for our region, and locally by our own medical community. But funding is not available to purchase the instrument. We ask that the community invest in itself and help us purchase this piece of equipment. We need donations from any community person, organization or business to realize this goal. Due to other equipment needs and a limited budget, funding for this project is not predicted.

Please contact any EMS volunteer for further information. The sooner we reach our goal and obtain this equipment, the sooner we may be able to prevent a death and make a difference. This level of care has to do with cardiac arrests (heart attacks) and goes further than just cardiopulmonary resuscitation or CPR with regards to emergency cardiac care. The Friona EMS is staffed almost totally by volunteers with basic and intermediate levels of emergency medical training. Although they are highly trained to this level of care, EMT Basics and Intermediates have been unable to provide emergency cardiac care, in the way of defibrillation which was only available from a paramedic, until now.

According to the latest Textbook of Advanced Cardiac Life Support, it has been estimated that up to 1,000 cardiac arrests occur every day in the United States alone. The approach to preventing cardiac arrest and resuscitating a cardiac arrest victim must involve a team effort that begins outside the hospital with the patient, bystanders trained in CPR, and the prompt and appropriate response of trained rescue personnel. To maximize chances of survival, the delay from the onset of cardiac arrest until CPR and definitive care should be kept as short as possible, ideally to less than 4 and 8 minutes, respectively.

-- The most frequent initial problem in sudden cardiac arrest is ventricular fibrillation.

-- The most effective treatment for ventricular fibrillation is electrical defibrillation.

--The probability of successful defibrillation diminishes rapidly over time.

--Ventricular fibrillation tends to convert to death within a few minutes.

A relatively new instrument called an "Automatic External Defibrillator," or AED, is now available for use by EMS personnel other than paramedics. This instrument is a sophisticated computer which is simple to operate but automatically monitors heart activity and determines the need for defibrillation. If defibrillation is needed, the AED interacts with the rescuer and an electrical shock is given in an attempt to convert the heart rhythm problem. The use of this instrument by ambulance personnel on the scene after responding to a Crado Poir cardiac arrest helps lessen the time from initial cardiac arrest to defibrillation and increases the recently completed her first probability of survival. The speed with which defibrillation is performed is a major determinant of the success of resuscitation attempts. Also according to the Advanced science and communications major Cardiac Life Support Textbook, automatic devices should permit most small communities with volunteer emergency care providers to have enhanced lifesaving potential. --Old Irish Blessing St. Patrick's Day, March 17, has always been a fun holiday in our family. It's a chance to wear green clothes, sport cute buttons that say things like "Kiss Me, I'm Irish," and whip up some authentic dishes from Ireland.

I've never been to Ireland, but it is on my agenda. However, my study of Irish cooking indicates the food is what most people I know call down-home, country cooking.

A variety of potato dishes combine with vegetables such as cabbage, carrots and onions, and with meats such as beef, lamb, poultry and wild game. The cuisine seems to be rather simple and fulfilling.

Children always add a delightful air to St. Patrick's Day as they are eager to learn and experience new things. And St. Patrick's Day is even more special to me now that I have an adorable nephew, Patrick McKeown, a little over 18 months old.

**BUTTERMILK SCONES** 2 teaspoons baking powder 1 cup buttermilk 2-1/2 cups unbleached all-purpose flour

1 teaspoon salt

little of the buttermilk to dissolve. Mix the flour and the remaining buttermilk together, using a wooden spoon. Add the salt and the baking powder mixture and mix thoroughly. Roll out the dough on a floured board and cut into 2-inch rounds. Place on a lightly greased baking sheet and bake at 400 degrees for about 15 minutes, until lightly browned. Split the scones and spread with butter. Serve hot. Makes 12 to 16 scones.

## **Protecting Against** Cataracts

Sooner or later, if they live long enough, everyone will get cataracts, the clouding of the natural lens over the eye. In most cases, cataracts are part of the normal aging process and slowly the lens is less able to focus light to help us see.


To some extent, it is possible to protect against cataracts, or at least to delay their appearance. Basic: wear sunglasses outdoors to protect against ultraviolet light. Stop smoking; smokers are more susceptible to cataracts than non-smokers. Recent studies indicate that good nutrition and adequate levels of vitamin C and E also can help to prevent cataracts.

If your vision has gotten worse over a period of time, if colors do not seem as bright as they used to be, or if you notice glare from lights at night, these may be symptoms of a developing cataract. But there may be no symptoms at all, so regular eye examinations are recommended.

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





Everyone enjoyed studying about Presidents of the United States, and the sounds of children learning the Pledge of Allegiance rang through the halls.



**PUBLIC NOTICE** BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION MAY 1, 1993

#### **PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT**

Section 1 of Senate Joint Resolution 7 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to redistribute among other school districts ad valorem taxes levied and collected by a school district. The amendment would also allow the legislature to create county education districts with the taxable property of existing school districts in one or more counties combined. County education districts may levy, collect, and distribute ad valorem taxes as authorized by general law. The legislature would be allowed to set the rate of the ad valorem tax to be imposed in a school district or county education district or it may authorize the board of trustees of each school district or county education district to set the rate, provided that the rate of county education district ad valorem taxes may not exceed \$1.00 per \$100 valuation of taxable property, unless a higher rate is approved by the voters of the district. The amendment also provides that the amount of ad valorem taxes redistributed among school districts by the legislature and effectively redistributed within a county through county education districts may not exceed 2.75 percent of the sum of the state revenue appropriated for public schools and the revenue from local ad valorem taxes levied and collected for public schools. The term "state revenue" does not include revenue from ad valorem taxes, revenue for the provision of free textbooks, or contributions to a retirement system. Finally, the amendment provides that it does not affect the distribution of the available school fund under article VII, section 5, of the Texas Constitution.

a minimum tax rate in county education districts, and placing a cap on the ad valorem tax levied by county education districts."

#### **PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT**

Section 2 of Senate Joint Resolution 7 proposes a constitutional amendment that would provide that, except for state educational mandates imposed in compliance with the Texas Constitution or federal law, or unless enacted by a vote of at least two-thirds of the members elected to each house of the legislature, a school district may not be required to comply with an obligation requiring expenditure of school district funds unless the obligation is fully funded. The amendment also requires the legislature to provide by law a procedure for determining whether an obligation is fully funded. In the absence of such a procedure, and at the request of a school district's board of trustees, the comptroller of public accounts shall determine whether or not an obligation is fully funded. This amendment applies only to state educational mandates enacted after December 31, 1993.

the use of the permanent school fund to guarantee state revenue bonds, but would permit the legislature to provide by law for the issuance of general obligation bonds or revenue bonds of the state for the purpose of making loans to, or purchasing bonds of, school districts for the purpose of acquisition, construction, or improvement of instructional facilities, including all furnishings. The amendment also provides that the state, pursuant to general law, may forgive the payment of principal and interest on all or part of a loan made to a school district under the amendment to partially finance an instructional facility. The cap of \$750 million on the amount of bonds that could be issued under article VII, section 5(b), as amended, would be retained. The amendment would repeal the current provision of the constitution permitting the legislature to authorize bonds in excess of \$750 million by two-thirds record vote of both houses of the legislature. While any of the general obligation bonds issued under the amendment or any of the interest on those bonds is outstanding and unpaid, there would be appropriated out of the first money coming into the state treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, the amount sufficient to pay the principal and interest on the bonds that matured or became due that fiscal year.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of \$750 million in state general obligation or revenue bonds to assist school districts in partially financing facilities, authorizing the state to forgive payments of loans made to a school district for partially innancing facilities, and repeating the authorization for \$750 million in state revenue bonds guaranteed by the permanent school fund."




