The proposed fire station could be so constructed to allow two vehicles per bay, and still leave adequate loading room.

The new station would have adequate storage facilities for the department's equipment, including lockers for the firemen. There would be a place for a hose dryer and washer. There shower, and a meeting room, where the department would conduct the training sessions it holds twice monthly.

The proposed station would give the firemen "elbow room" during emergencies. It also would allow for additional grow-

"At some time in the future, the state may require us to own a 750-gallon pumper truck (the department's largest truck presently is a 500-gallon pump er)," Shirley says. With the new station, this piece of equipment could be added easily. "However, if we had to add it today, we would really be in a fix," the fire chief says.

Proposition I would allow the city to borrow \$50,000, with which to purchase land and build the new station, which has been proposed by the leaders of the department as an all-steel building.

It will be one of two propositions to be voted on by city voters in the regular city election April 1. Absentee voting is now underway at the City

Pause and Reflect

In past years we have noted the arrival of St. Patrick's Day with references to the wit and humor of the Irish,

This year of 1972, we are sadly aware that there is not much to be happy about in the Emerald Isle. The regretable religious war that is tearing that country apart is merely the current eruption of the dormant volcano of sectional and doctrinal hatred that has plagued ireland for

As early as 1780 the fueds over who would get the best farming lands soon developed into sectarian battles.

Good land is scarce on this mountainous island; so little land in fact, that in 1841 there were 135,134 families of Irish farmers who had less than one (1) acre each upon which to make a living!

This small parcel was rented by peasants from landlords for about the same yearly cash rent that would be required to completely purchase an acre of our western prairie land

during the same year. We can understand the fighting spirit and the willingness to perform hard work when we realize that during this period (1840s) 40% of Irish homes consisted of one room mud huts that had no windows and no chimneys,

In the province of Donegal there were 9000 of these poor people but only 10 beds, 93 chairs, and 243 stools!

An excess of population, improper farming methods and depleted soil had been a way of life for too long a time. Just prior to 1850 there were three crop failures in four

The potato, which formed the basic diet of the very poor, vanished.

Starvation followed by fevers killed a million or more

Seven hundred thousand were on public work relief. When this program became bankrupt it threw roughly three million people on 100% charity.

Across the Atlantic Ocean the new land of America beck-

Carrying their meager possessions, thousands crowded into seaport towns hooling to work enough to earn passage to our new world.

Crowded, unsafe, filthy vessels fought storms and seasons and many died trying to escape the abject poverty of their

During the hundred years between 1820 and 1920 over four million of these hardy souls came to America.

Their success in the United States has been due to hard work, an earnest desire to be independent, and their famous sense of humor.

As we think of the Irish tomorrow, let's also remember how wonderfully happy they were to become a part of America. Maybe it would be a good idea to imagine ourselves as they were a hundred and fifty years ago, and to realize that Patriotism is another word for Appreciation.




It succeeds in any soil, in full sun, and matures so quickly that you'll need to sow seeds every 2 weeks in order to have flowers all summer.

Why not grow perennial flowers from seeds? If sown in spring the little plants will be ready to move into permanent locations well before frost. A good many kinds will have flower or two the first year.

Any high analysis soluble fertilizer may be used as a "starter" solution to pour around plants when they are moved from one size container to another or from container to

House plants can be grown from seeds at any time of year. Asparagus fern, gloxinias, cinerarias, begonias and cacti are among those readily produced in this manner.

A general crop meeting is going to be held at the Hub Community Center on March 23, 1972. Starting time will be at 2:00 p.m. Several Extension specialists will give the program on water use, milo disease and major insects.

Mr. Leon New, Irrigation Sp. ecialist, will give an up-to-date report on water use and irrigation methods on milo, corn and cotton. Dr. Bill Clymer, Area Entomologist, will present a program on the various damaging insects affecting the crops grown in Parmer County. This will include a report on the Banks Grass Mite that is such a threat to milo and corn. Wrapping up the program will be Dr. Bob Metzer, Area Plant Pathologist, Dr. Metzer will speak on the milo and corn diseases that were seen in this county last year.

Remember this meeting will be on March 23, at 2:00 p.m. in the Hub Community Center.

We are still under a scabies quarantine in this area. Before cattle can be moved they must be inspected either by a veterinarian or a livestock inspector. The inspectors working this area are Bob Henderson, Muleshoe-Phone 272-4949; James Calaway, Bovina-Phone 238-6641; Linwood Guthrie, Farwell-Phone 825-2066.

Very few additional cases have been found in the Panhandle in the last few weeks.

The greenbug, arch enemy of High Plains sorghum producers, may not be a problem in a few years because of work being done by Texas Agricultural Experiment Station researchers at Lubbock.

Dr. Jerry Johnson and Dr. George Teetes experimented this past season with the comparisons of resistant and sus ceptible types of sorghum with some interesting results.

The most striking character istic of the greenbug resistant types is their tolerance, their ability to support large greenbug populations without signifi

cant death of leaf tissue. The studies this past year in-

dicated that greenbugs prefer to feed on the common commercial sorghums if possible. If they were forced to move to the resistant varieties, the rate of reproduction dropped sharply. The main problem with these resistant varieties is that they are inferior to the susceptible varieties from a commercial

production standpoint. Naturally resistant varieties are one of the best methods of insect control, because the pest populations are reduced without the extra cost of insecticides or possible damage to the environ-

Under a grant from the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board, Johnson and Teetes are transferring greenbug resistance to sorghum varieties that are suitable for commercial production. But the scientists emphasize that breeding work of this type is time-consuming. They say the resistant varieties may not be ready for general use for at least four to five more years.

When this time arrives, these improved varieties can help solve a problem that has been costing High Plains producers millions of dollars in chemicals and yield losses per year since
