There were two good reasons, as we saw it, for holding the Independence Day observance on Monday evening (July 5), instead of July 4.

First, of course, July 4 fell on a Sunday, and it's not appropriate to schedule a community activity on a Sunday evening.

Second, Sunday was a real "scorcher" and the temperature stayed high well into the evening, with little or no breeze to cool things off. The weather on Monday evening was just right. The Friona Chamber of Commerce is to be congratulated on making such a wise choice!

Apparently, everyone enjoyed the Chamber's program. We've heard nothing but praise, especially for the main speaker, Bill Sarpallius, but also for the other program participants.

The crowd attending this year's program was the best since the observance was instigated in 1969 by the New Horizons Junior Study Club. The fireworks once again were beautiful, and were handled nicely by the Friona Volunteer Fire Department.

Having the program at Chiefstain Field seems to be quite an improvement; also the evening schedule, followed by fireworks has proved popular the past two years.

Friona continues to show signs of growth, as indicated by rental property, which continues to be scarce, even with the new houses being built and more property going into the rental category.

Even the 60-unit Friona Apartment complex is filling up. Many skeptics raised their eyebrows and said the apartments would never be filled. Maybe not, but on Tuesday of this week, the complex had 45 filled units, being 70.5 per cent full.

The apartment project began renting earlier this year, and had a slow acceptance, partly because of the rent structure. (The rent goes up, according to the tenant's salary). This has been changed somewhat, and it apparently has helped.

Since the end of school, the apartments began to fill up. Only about half full at that time, some 12 or 13 have been rented the past month, with five new renters coming on the July 4 weekend. According to Mr. and Mrs. Harvey Huckabee, the managers of the apartments, almost all of their one and two bedroom apartments are filled, with three-bedroom types being mainly among the 17 empty apartments.

Sales Tax Receipts Pleasant Surprise

The City of Friona last week received its second quarterly sales tax check from the state comptroller's office, and city officials were pleasantly surprised that the check compared favorably with the first one, which included the busy Christmas season.

The check received was for \$9,560.43, which was only \$53.11 less than the check received

three months earlier in the amount of \$9,613.54, including the Christmas shopping season.

The larger check than was anticipated will be sorely needed by the City's Treasury to help offset some un-anticipated expenses, not the least of which was the remodeling job to the city's swimming pool, which cost roughly \$2,000.

City Swelters In 100° Heat

Cotton was growing, and maize was curling up in the Friona area the past week, with the advent of the season's hottest temperatures.

The mercury hit an official high point of 101 degrees on Tuesday, after climbing to an even 100 on Sunday. Saturday's

Tuesday's reading of 101 degrees was the highest official temperature since June 17 of last year when the mercury hit 103 degrees. That was the only day of 1970 for the temperature to top the 100-degree mark.

week, with .08 being measured at last Thursday's reading, and .03 inch on Friday.

An area in the Black Community fared a little better in the shower department, however, measuring over an inch for the two days. Tom Lewellen reported .8 inch and .4 inch for the two days at his place, making for beneficial moisture.

The young contestants were awarded bicycles from Friona's White's Auto Store.

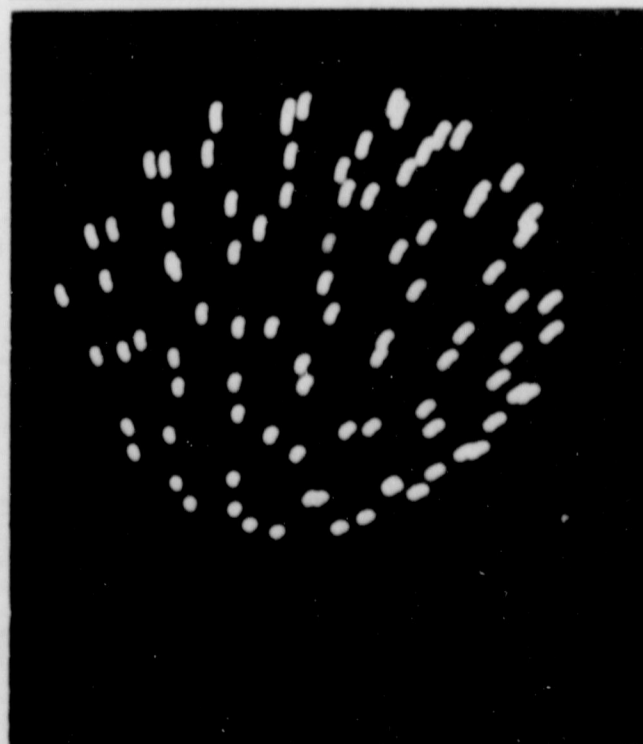

Contestants should come by the Friona Star office to register, and pick up their subscription receipt books.

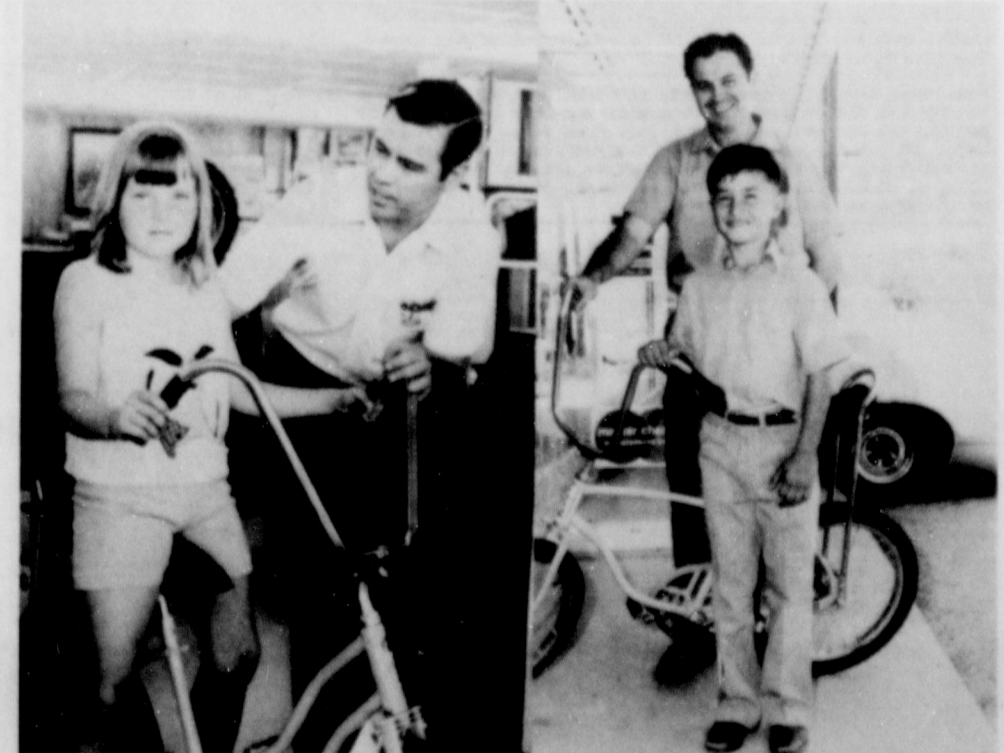

Pause and Reflect

The general attitude and tone at that crowd would have given him and his kind a reception not to be forgotten. Any member of the assembled throng can testify that Patriotism is not an idle word in West Texas. What a pity that the members of various peace conferences were not in attendance--they would soon learn wherein lies the real strength of America. And they would also find that the youth of our country are not all dissident, immoral dope fiends. The young man making the main address was certainly under thirty. The three young ladies honored for their patriotic compositions were mere children. The band was composed of students from our Junior and Senior High Schools. The color guards were Boy Scouts. The participation of American youth, on a voluntary basis, might just get the message across to the Soviets. Notice that word "voluntary." We were all volunteers--no "one party government" threatened to cut off our food stamps if we failed to attend. That should prove something. We haven't found it necessary to build an Iron Curtain to keep our populace at home. Fact is, we have had to tighten up on our immigration regulations. Does that not add up to National Pride and is not that what Patriotism is all about?

Sunday, July 4th, we were privileged to speak to the Amarillo Girl Scouts at their summer camp. While there, we heard a story you might find interesting. One of the American flags used at the camp had become frayed and the director (Joy Morton, of Friona) scheduled a regulation flag burning ceremony. One of the younger campers protested very strongly. She had heard and read all the bad things concerning the burning of American flags but was unaware of the proper disposition of worn out banners. A word of explanation sufficed and the child relaxed. Now what does this mean to us? See how the "bad" things are forced on our attention while the "good" is left untaught? We older citizens have been too lax in some areas. We have brought up a generation that takes too much for granted. Let's all try harder to teach more appreciation for the blessings we enjoy.

AN EDITORIAL

Nation Needs Return To Common Sense

We have been seized with the idea for some time now that there is more madness than method in the following:

1. The desperate pursuit of defeat for the Allies in Vietnam by some persons, papers and politicians.
2. The inspired drives to get rid of Edgar Hoover as head of the F.B.I., ignoring older men in Congress or on the Supreme Court.
3. The much-publicized wartime trials of American military officers accused of battlefield crimes.
4. The persistent deficits in our international trade balances year after year, with this year's threatening to be the worst of all.
5. The proposed increases in welfare, though the Federal budget is faced with another big deficit.
6. A running debate on ending all capital punishment, along with the discovery of 25 bodies of men murdered by someone totally undeterred by the prospect of life imprisonment.

Each of these developments follows a course that is not consistent with the history of the United States. It is not normal to seek defeat, nor to try military officers in the middle of a war, nor to drop the head of the F.B.I. because of age without concern about the ages of other top government officials, nor to argue more about the rights of killers than of those liable to be killed.

Each of these developments weakens and confuses the nation. They are by no means the only such actions. Whatever the motivations, they should not be permitted to lead us into chaos. Sound common sense and the basic logic that have made this country great must be our guide.

**Outage Was "Freak;"
No Power Shortage**

A portion of Friona had a power outage for a period of time last Sunday, but the outage was from a peculiar accident, and the city is not in any way threatened by a power "blackout," stated H.L. Outland, local manager of Southwestern Public Service Company.

The melted material dropped onto a bushing, shorting out a fuse, and caused a power outage in some areas up to an hour and one-half. The situation was remedied, and corrected to where it should not happen again, Outland stated.

"We definitely have more than enough power for the Friona area, and urge residents to run their air conditioners as much as they need them," Outland said.

Outland explained that an instruction booklet inside a tinfoil cover was heated by the high temperatures enough to melt and cause an electrical short.

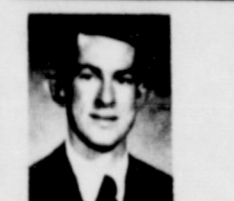

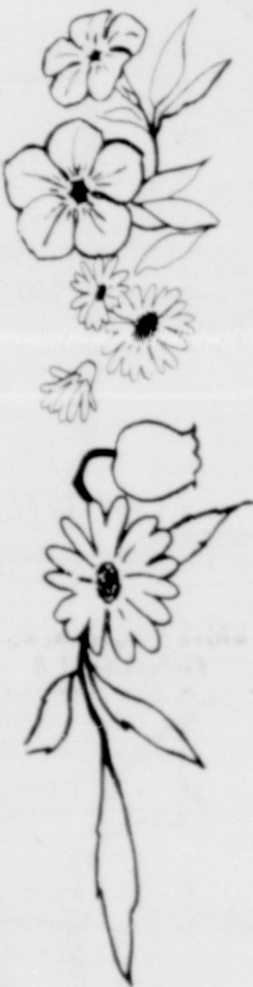
Yes, girls, we understand that you have a lot of things to do, but you will be glad if you go ahead and change your social security number now."

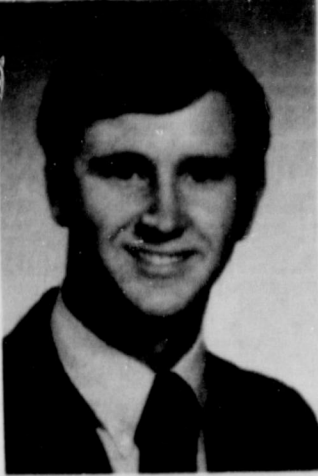

**What Does
The

While it is true that the family or home is the basic unit of our society, it is not the basis of the church inasmuch as both the church and the home can and do exist independently of each other. Of the corner stone of the church Isaiah 28:16 prophesies, "Behold I lay in Zion for the foundation a stone, a tried stone, a precious corner stone, a sure foundation." The apostle Peter quotes this prophecy and applies it to Christ and His connection to the church (1 Peter 2:6 with context).

The apostle Peter writes to the same effect in Ephesians 2:19-20, "Now therefore ye are no more strangers and foreigners, but fellow-citizens with the saints and of the household of God; and are built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Jesus Christ himself being the chief corner stone."

While the Bible regulates the conduct of the Christian in the home, the home is not the foundation of the church. That distinction belongs to Christ alone. "For other foundation can no man lay than that is laid, which is Jesus Christ" (1 Cor. 3:11).

CAT: Place 1 scoop ice cream on a small plate using pretzel sticks for whiskers, eyes, nose and ears.

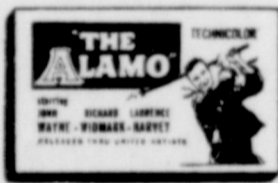

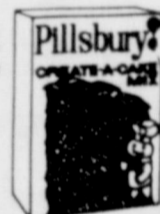
