## Water Measurements Underway In County

High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 Technical Division staff are making annual depth-to-water neasurements to determine the effect of 1992 pumpage on county Water District service area.
Measurements are taken in the district's network of more than 1,000 privately-owned observation well network. These wells are spaced at a density of about one well per nine square miles throughout the Water District.
Water District staff members take the measurement by lowering a steel tape to the depth of the current tatic water level inside the observation well. The ower ten to fifteen feet of the tape is coated with bue carpenters' chalk.
When the chalked tape comes in contact with the water, it subtracted from the of blue. This section of wetted tape is subracted from the total amount of tape lowered into the well to
After the depth-to-water level measurement is taken, the data is recorded and a vinyl sticker showing the well number, the depth-to-water measurement, and the date the well was measured is affixed to equipment at the well site.
Water District staff members are currently taking water level neasurements in the northern portion of the district, and will ork their way south. Blue and white district vehicles are level measurement with landowners and/or operators.
The observation wells are measured each year, and the data collected is compared with that of previous years to determine any changes in the ground water evels of the Ogallala Aquifer
This data is used to construct maps showing changes in vater levels and the saturated thickness of the aquifer within the Maps show
Maps showing the location and well number of observation wells in each county or portion of a county served by the district are traditionally published in
Along with the maps, tables listing the observation wells in each county and the depth-to-water measurements for one year,
