### CAN'T BE HIDDEN.

Can you read character in a face? Can you size up a person and know whether or not he can be trusted?

Occasionally you meet some one who has the in tinctive gift of penetrating any facial mask. "That fellow," you comment, "has eyes that look right hrough you. He can see to the bottom of one's soul. He's a good judge of character."

This is a gift that can be acquired. Develop it, as one of your powers. It may save you from a heavy

You have observed the different expressions that flit across a man's face as he sees something pitiful, strange, terrible, dangerous, ridiculous or new.

Those expressions reflect emotions that have been roused. The face, in nearly every case, is the miror of the soul. Each of us is dominated by some one emotion-

uch as fear, caution, recklessness, greed, generosity, affection or trickery. When that emotion is excited in the average person, the face responds with a betraying expression. When that emotion is frequently aroused, finally becoming dominant, it is constantly irrored in the face.

No difficulty in fathoming the man with a worfied look, the man with a happy-go-lucky countance, or the man with a greedy, eager expression, You know what to expect of them.

When you look into any person's face, merely k yourself: "What emotion is this face betraying?" That gives you "his number."

Looks sometimes are deceiving. But this is the sception that proves the fule. Nine times out of 0, the face is a glaring billboard, easily read, reealing character.

The study of psychology, through analysis of cial expression, is being furthered by the movies. The film characters are constantly registering emoons, teaching people the meaning of facial expres-

We are hearing a great deal about the democrati tion of industry these days, and well we may. But, if it is to mean anything, the democratization of industry must go to the bottom. It is not to be achieved through shop committees and debating societies.

We say that each is dependent on the other, but always in an academic sort of way. Realizing that a combination of the two is necessary for collective activities, we do little to encourage

But it is with the fridfyldgal that we must begin If we persist in following a policy which forces individuals to become either capitalists or laborers. we do nothing more distinctly than create an economic division which is bound to make itself felt in

every phase of life. If a combination of labor and capital is necessary for collective business, then it must be recognized in

at least, a majority of individuals. What the majority of individuals do is bound become the social and political rule.

If a majority find themselves divided with respect to capital and labor, if they fail to experience the proper combination in their own lives, and if they get viewing things exclusively from either one side or the other, then we have nothing to hope for but ever increasing discord.

Neither is it a remedy to offer the laborer a chance to create capital in some other way than that is which he earns his living, or the capitalist a chance to work

If the combination is to be effective, it must take oot in the most logical place. The most logical place for the laborer's capital is where he works. It he worked as an individual, and for himself, there is where it would be. The most logical place for the capitalist's lab



The steps necessary to entrance into Christ, which were the identical steps they had to take to become Christians, brought them into fellowship with all other Christians. Thus the Lord added them to the church. And all were forbidden to do anything save what the Lord commanded (Deut. 28:14; 2 John 9).

Any religious organization as a whole which does not include all Christians is not the church we read about in the Bible. Whatever divides the body of Christ and destroys its unity is sinful. To cut a body so as to separate its parts is to mutilate and kill it. But this is precisely what denominationalism does. Sectarianism destroys Christian unity and fosters discord because it fences up some of God's people in one party

and some in another. Partyism is the negation of the aim of Christ. No worlder that beets are called "flaminable" (2 Pet. 2:1) and "carnal" (1 Cor. 8:8). To divide the children of God, as he does who upholds party institutions and names, is a very grave sin.

Obedience to Christ will make a Christian, but not a Methodist Christian or a Campbellite Christian. The unmixed seed of the kingflom (Luke 8:11) cannot produce such mongral breed. To make people
anything more than simply and only Christians the doctrines and commandments of men (Matt. 15:9) must be taught. But we must give up
the teachings of men if we are to go to heaven. (Matt. 15:14).

If we are married to Christ (Rom. 7:4) whose name should we
wear? You reply there is nothing in a name. But Jehovah says there
is salvation in his name (Prov. 18:10; Acts 4:12). Always the Lord has

Israel for adopting another name (Isa. 65.15) The Lord promised his
people through Christ "a new name," "an everlasting name" (Isa. 56:6;

it "that worthy name" (Jas. 2:7) and says we are to "glorify" him in

So far as that is concerned, public opinion in their own countries will

not let them.

In fairness it should be said that there is much about the Hughes plan which cails for clarification and for the working out of details in a prolonged session of experts. The Hughes plan dealt only in broad outlines and many details must be the subject of conference.

For example, Japan wants to know about naval bases in the fareast. A fleet which would be sufficient for Japan if the navies of Great Britain and the United States are always at least 3,000 miles away would not be sufficient if the United.

would not be sufficient if the United States should have a naval base in the Philippines and if Great Britain should have one at Hongkong or

elsewhere in the far east.

Great Britain wants to discuss some modifications of the Hughes plan as it affects submarines. This is all proper enough. In the end it will be recognised that it doesn't amount to much. The principle of the Hughes plan, as he stated again the Hughes plan, as he stated again and again is "mayar defensive war must be made impossible." Nothing that the naval experts or the diplomate can do will be allowed to violate this fundamental principle. As soon as they recognize this they

be less insistent upon details. If they should attempt anything designed seriously to cripple the Hughes plan, Hughes slways has it in his power to call another public session and repeat his sensation of last Saturday. Indeed it would be more of a sensation if Hughes should call a public session and reveal that anybody is trying to upset the program. Nobody can safely try that.

It is not to be denied that the interests both here and abroad which







# NAVY BUILDING YARD QUESTION IS RAISED

BRITISH SUGGESTION IS NOT UNDERSTOOD BY U. S.

OFFICIALS.

NO PROPOSAL IS MADE FOR SCRAPPING YARDS

Present Equipment Will Be Required To Care For The Repair Work.

By Associated Press WASHINGTON, Nov. 17. - The British suggestion that each of the naval powers retain at least one naval building yard capable of turning out one ship a year does not appear to be understood by American

naval officers particularly familiar with construction problems. There was no suggestion in the American limitation proposals that any yard be scrapped and as far as navy yard facilities in this country are concerned all will be needed, it said in the maintenance and repair of the retained fleet.

At present the United States has several navy yards equipped to build capital ships. It has not been contemplated here that it would be necessary under the reduction program to scrap the equipment of these shops and building docks. Some of the machinery would not be needed, of course, for repair work and would lie idle, but the bulk of the government plants in each case would be constantly in use in keeping up the 18 battleships to be retained by the United States.




