



The present indication of the truth of the old proverb is that China is gradually but slowly achieving international justice after a century or more of pillage of the most high-handed

England, for the sake of profit forced opium upon the Chinese; France wanted to make money off her so she did a few things on the side; the kalser could not stand to see all this going on so he did some first-class second-story and porch-climbing work and along about the same time Japan outdid the whole ch of them. In fact Japan's job was so thorough that the Chinese barely had left the right and ability to protest against such treatment.

Her natural resources were in the hands of foreigners, her ports all were either owned or controlled by foreigners, her railroads, her shipping. her postoffice, even her government was in the hands of foreigners experts, who knew what they wanted and proceeded to get it without delay. Not content taking all of the best clices from around the edges the foreigners promptly arranged and proceeded to execute the arrangements of taking over great portions of the Chinese empire, or republic, as the case happened to be at the particular time of the steal.

With patience never before equalled nationally the Chinese stood it all, stolidly insisting that they were not being fairly treated. But the international rape of China continued unabated until the recent conference at Washington which seems to be well on the road of establishing an international code of morals governing the action of foreign govern-

All foreign troops are to be withdrawn by agreement, except those now in China by special treaty de those attached to legations. The ever popular and profitable practice of opium smuggling will be stopped immediately by the Chinese themselves; she will run her own postoffice and customs departments, with the aid of foreign experts, and in general be treated as a grown-up in the family of nations and not as though she were Wordsworth "Idiot Child" grown older.

The apparent readiness on the part of the representatives of the interested nations now meeting in Washington to agree to this honest and fair, though extremely trady treatment, of China is an indication of improvement in the international conscience. It is another proof of the impelling force of public opinion properly directed. The very fact that the plans are so near agreement makes one hopeful of the future international deafings.

AUTOMOBILES AND CHURCH ATTENDANCE (Houston Post.)

For a long time the ministers were rather unanious in blaming the automobile in cutting down attendance at church. They saw the car as a serious ival of the church services, and were disturbed by it. it was one of the world diversions the church had contend against on Sunday.

But the ministers are not so much alarmed today as they were formerly, and numbers of them are finding the automobile an ally rather than an enemy of the church, according to the American Motorist, an automobile magazine, which has conducted an inquiry ong the ministers of many cities as to their experiences with the automobile and church attendance From the replies, the magasine concludes that with the present wide use of the automobile, church at-

tendance is scoring a net gain. There is reason to believe that this is true. It is fact, of course, that Sunday is the great motoring day of the week. The lure of the road calls strongly on that day. Church members as well as others often yield to the call and absent themselves from services. But on the other hand, the automobile has made the church more accessible to the congregation. Members living at a distance find it possible to be more regular in attendance. As a convenience in transpo tation the car is as valuable to the churchgoer as to the business man going to his daily business. It is not to be doubted that hundreds of people in every city go to church on Sundays in their cars, who if they had to walk or ride on street cars, would not attend often. It is necessary to take into consideration the fact that the car today is regarded as a utility rather than a pleasure vehicle

The great fleets of cars seen parked around every church during the hours of service on Sundays give evidence of the heipfulness of the car to the church. Those who habitually go motoring at service hours on Sundays are not likely to be very loyal members of the church under any circumstances. If the car did not take them off, something else probably would. So the automobile is hardly to be blamed for human shortcomings. It is still a question of whether the church can claim their loyalty over outside diversions.

TAYLOR Variation-Parmentier.
