WHITE MAN HANGED IN WACO THE THIRD LYNCHING IN WEEK

"LYNCHING TREE" IS ORDERED CUT DOWN

FORT WORTH, Dec. 14.—Fort Worth's "lynching tree," to which two persons have been hanged by mobs in the last year, was ordered cut down this morning by county officials. It was conveniently located on the roadside only a short distance from the county jail.

RAILROADS REQUEST ORDER BE SUSPENDED TO TRY EXPERIMENT

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, Dec. 13.—Speaking for all the railroads of the country, Alfred P. Thom, general counsel for the Association of Railway Executives, asked the interstate commerce commission today to suspend for six months its recent orders for rate reductions on grain and products and hay in the west and in the meanwhile to allow the roads to try the experiment of instituting a 10 per cent reduction on farm, range and orchard products throughout the United States except New England.

CABLE TO JAPAN CHINESE COUNTER RAILROAD OFFER

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14.—The counter proposal of China for the purchase of the Japanese-owned Shantung railroads in Shantung province has been called to Tokyo by the Japanese arms conference delegation which has been carrying on direct conversations with the Chinese delegates in an effort to settle the Shantung problem outside the conference.

CHINA ASKS ABRIGATION OF TWENTY-ONE DEMANDS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14.—The Chinese delegation today asked the powers represented in the fact-finding conference of the Washington conference that the famous 21 demands treaty of 1915 be abrogated.

ULSTER CABINET HAS DECLINED TO ENTER IRISH "FREE STATE"

BELFAST, Dec. 14.—The Ulster deputy to Prime Minister Lloyd-George's letter of December 11, which will be made public early tomorrow, definitely rejects the invitation to enter the free state. It protests against the interests being involved in Irish settlement without Ulster's consent.

DALLAS NURSE KILLS NEGRO ASSAILANT IN FEDERAL BUILDING

DALLAS, Dec. 14.—Curley Hackney, lynched at Waco last night, is believed to be the second white victim of a mob in Texas in recent years and was the third man lynched in Texas this week. A negro was lynched in Fort Worth Sunday night and another was discovered hanging from a tree near Gladewater Monday. Tom Vickery, white, was lynched in Fort Worth a year ago this month. He is charged with killing Policeman Hackney, last night's victim at Waco, in an eight-year-old fight. Ed Rouse, alleged packing house strike breaker, was seized in a hospital at Fort Worth Sunday night and hanged in the packing house district. He was under treatment for wounds received in a fight in the strike in which two white men were seriously shot. He is charged by Rouse.

CHANGED AFTER CONFESSING ASSAULT ON YOUNG GIRL

WACO, Dec. 14.—"Curley" Hackney, white, 38 years old, arrested in connection with an attack on an 8-year-old girl, was taken from the city jail last night at 10:30 o'clock and hanged three miles south of town. He had confessed, according to the police, to assaulting the girl.

FORT WORTH MAN IS SEVERELY BEATEN AND MOTHER CHOKED

FORT WORTH, Dec. 14.—Police are seeking today the man who entered the home of Jess W. Caldwell in Riverside last midnight, beat Caldwell over the head until unconscious and then choked his aged mother, choking her. She fought back and forced the intruder to flee. Caldwell now is in a hospital and semi-conscious.

JANITOR FOLLOWS WOMAN TO RESTROOM AT THE POSTOFFICE

Flance, a Private Marine Guard Will Assist Her Through Her Trouble

DALLAS, Dec. 14.—Formal charges of murder under federal statutes were filed today against Miss Jeanne La Moore, war nurse, who shot and killed Mrs. Cooky, negro, when he attacked her in the federal building here last night. Hearing probably will be given Miss La Moore late today. A large number of persons called at city detective headquarters, where the girl is held technically under arrest, offering to aid in making good. This is said to be the first murder charge ever filed in federal court here.

NEAR AGREEMENT ON LIMITATION OF NAVAL ARMAMENT

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14.—Cotton manufacturing showed increased activity in November. The monthly report of the census bureau issued today showed 47,996 more bales of cotton were consumed in November than in October, while consumption was 134,000 bales larger than in November a year ago. Active cotton spindles showed an increase of 687,000 over November last year and 618,000 over October this year.

EXECUTIVE BOARD OF BAPTIST CONVENTION CONVENES IN DALLAS

DALLAS, Dec. 14.—The executive board, Baptist general convention of Texas, and a number of special convention committees, including one on American naval armament, are here today for sessions which will continue through tomorrow.

AXTELL FARMER KILLED ANOTHER FARMER HELD

WACO, TEXAS, Dec. 14.—W. G. Dyer, 45, a farmer, was shot and killed at Axtell, 13 miles northeast of here today. J. E. Gordon, also a farmer, surrendered to officers here last night, and is being held pending examining trial on a complaint charging murder.

FREELING ARGUES THAT RED RIVER IS NAVIGABLE STREAM

Special to The Times. WASHINGTON, Dec. 14.—Freezing temperatures and other claims involving the bed of the Red river are being argued before the supreme court today by Attorney General Freezing of Oklahoma. It is his contention that the Red river is navigable and that since Texas rights stop at the south bank of the stream, all property north of that becomes part of the state of Oklahoma.

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SLAUGHTER BURIED AT LITTLE ROCK, FAMILY PROTESTS

LITTLE ROCK, ARK., Dec. 14.—The body of Tom Slaughter, slain yesterday at Arkansas, was buried in the presence of thousands of curious spectators yesterday afternoon, but his family, who are protesting against the burial, have announced receipt of a long distance telephone message from G. D. O'Brien of Dallas, Texas, a brother-in-law, who is protesting against the funeral service here and denouncing a woman known here as Mrs. Myrtle Slaughter, supposed to be the dead man's wife, of Eldorado, Arkansas.

DISORDER FOLLOWS EFFORTS TO REOPEN W. VA. COAL MINE

WHEELING, W. VA., Dec. 14.—Efforts to open the Panama coal mine at Moundsville, near here, as an "open shop" were attended today by scenes of disorder when police were called to force back a crowd of alleged union sympathizers from the property. A number of women were in the crowd and stones were thrown, but no one was hurt. A number of shots were said to have been fired in the vicinity of the mine during the night.

RAIL LABOR BOARD REVISES OVERTIME RULE FOR WORKERS

MAINTENANCE OF WAY MEN AF-
FECTED BY NEW
REGULATION

NO OVERTIME RATE FOR LESS THAN TEN HOURS

Retain Provisions Recognizing Eight
Hours as Constituting a
Day's Work

CHICAGO, Dec. 14.—Blasting
extra pay provisions for the first
two hours of overtime after the
regular eight hours day's work
from rules governing maintenance
of way employees, the United States
railroad labor board has set up a
schedule of ten hours a day as the
regular hourly wage for common
laborers, in new rules announced
last night to replace the national
agreement made under government
control.

The principle of "eight consecu-
tive hours shall constitute a day's
work" is retained, however, and
time and one-half pay is granted
after ten hours' work.

The new provisions make possi-
ble a ten-hour day without penal-
izing the railroads which were com-
pelled under the federal agreement
to pay time and one-half after eight
hours.

Straight time will be allowed em-
ployees traveling in other than out-
fit cars for work hours only, re-
ceiving half time for other hours,
instead of full time, as under the
national agreement. Men who work
through meal time hereafter will be
paid straight time instead of time
and one-half, being allowed twenty
minutes extra with pay to eat their
lunches at the first opportunity.

All arbitrary rules fixing the be-
ginning and the ending of the regu-
lar work day are eliminated, these
hours to be fixed by agreement be-
tween local officials and the men,
based on the service requirements
of that section of the country.

The board has now completed
consideration of rules covering ap-
proximately one million railroad
employees, about half the number
employed on the railroads of the
country.

Characterizing the new mainte-
nance of way rules as mere revisi-
ons to eliminate many of the con-
fusing aspects of the national agree-
ment, S. M. Felton, president of the
Chicago Great Western railroad and
chairman of the western committee
of public relations of the associa-
tion of railway executives, asserted
in a statement tonight that the
board's action may or may not ensue
from their application is mere
guesswork until they have been
put out.

"It should be remembered, how-
ever," the statement said, "that
these new rules unless otherwise
agreed upon will be applied to all
railroads throughout the country,
and it was against these effects
produced by the universal applica-
tion of rules regardless of varying
local conditions that the carrier's
fight was largely directed."

PLEADS EIGHT YEARS GREAT SUFFERING AS HER JUSTIFICATION

WOMAN TALKS FREELY OF
THE MURDER OF DR.
GLICKSTEIN

PHYSICIAN IS KILLED IN NEW YORK OFFICE

Pleads Inability to Break Away
From Strange Influence
of the Man

NEW YORK, Dec. 14.—Pleading
eight years of suffering as her jus-
tification, Mrs. Charles Raizen
today faced arraignment in Brook-
lyn court on charges of killing Dr.
Abram Glickstein aged 48 in his
Bedford avenue office last Saturday.

Surrendered to the police by law-
yers representing her father and
husband last night Mrs. Raizen
who is 29 years old and the wife of
a toy manufacturer to whom she
was married last May, told her
story to District Attorney Harry
Lewis.

With dry eyes and an air of self-
control superior to that of any of
her auditors she revealed the secrets
of a life which she said had been
made nearly unbearable by the
physician whose life she ended
with a bullet.

She had known Glickstein, she
said, most of her life. He was her
family's general practitioner in the
lower east side of Manhattan where
she, then Lillian Schaffer, and her
parents, as well as Glickstein, lived.

He had her implicit trust, she told
the district attorney, and exercised
a strange but powerful influence
over her—a sort of magnetic influ-
ence as she described it.

Relationships Ended
Mrs. Raizen said she struggled in
vain to break the hold the physician
had on her life. A year ago she
thought she had succeeded. The re-
lationship, which she said had al-
ways been against her will, ended
a year ago and she thought she was
free.

Then, on the eve of her marriage
to Raizen, she said, Glickstein re-
newed his advances and attacked
her in the office, where on Saturday
with the memory of her injuries
torturing her, she ended his life.

She escaped that time, she said,
went ahead with her trousseau and
was married. On her honeymoon,
she said, she confessed all to her
husband and he tried to console
her—told her to try and forget it.
But to forget, she declared, was
impossible. The shadowed past be-
came a violent, tormenting obses-
sion that undermined her health.

Finally on the advice of another
physician she went to Florida and
in Jacksonville, still unable to find
peace, she bought the fatal pistol.
Then she came north, sought out
the object of her fears and shot him
through the heart.

Phoned Her Father
Leaving the house in which
Glickstein was dying, she took a
train to Manhattan, called her father
on the telephone and told him
what she had done.

The recital ended, Mrs. Raizen
left the district attorney's office
with two policemen who took her
to a police station, where she was
formally booked on a homicide
charge and where she spent the
night.

Before the arraignment, Aaron W.
Levy, one of the two attorneys who
accompanied her to the prosecutor's
office last night, indicated that the
defense would be based upon the
contention that she was mentally
unbalanced.

The physician who advised the
southern trip, Dr. Samuel A. Tan-
nenbaum, came to the defense of his

patient with the statement that he
mentally was "not normal."
"Her act was undoubtedly that of
an insane woman," he said. "I had
hoped the change of environment
brought about by her trip to Flori-
da would help her, but apparently it
did not."

INQUIRES FOR GUN WITH
NOISELESS ATTACHMENT
JACKSONVILLE, FLA., Dec. 14.—
Mrs. Charles Raizen, held in
New York city in connection with
the death of Dr. Abram Glick-
stein, wrote a local hardware con-
cern last month for information as
to the cost of a revolver "with a
noiseless attachment," according to
the local police, who have the com-
munication in their possession. A
pistol was purchased from the con-
cern here November 22.

UNIDENTIFIED MAN THOUGHT VICTIM OF OLD ITALIAN FEUD

IS SHOT AND KILLED IN ITALIAN DISTRICT IN KANSAS CITY

FEUD IS SAID TO HAVE HAD ITS START IN 1918

Victim is Said to Have Been Wounded Several Times During Past Year

KANSAS CITY, Dec. 14.—No trace of an unidentified man who late yesterday shot and killed Anthony Restiva in an Italian section of the city here had been found by the police early today. The police are proceeding in the search for the assassin on the theory that the slayer was an avenger in a family feud of long standing which already has cost several lives.

Restiva was sitting at a table in the rear of a drug store in the Italian district yesterday talking with several companions. A man entered. Walking to within about ten feet of the table, the man suddenly whipped a sawed off shotgun from beneath his raincoat and fired at Restiva. The assassin turned and fled.

Police were called and they conducted a hurried search throughout the neighborhood. In an alley near the drug store they found a shotgun containing two empty shells.

The police questioned many witnesses. They were non-committal. For the most part they declared they did not know the murderer and could not give a description. "Life is too sweet to know how he looked," declared one of the witnesses in answer to the questions of the police.

Restiva formerly conducted a grocery store here. A former partner was shot to death about 18 months ago.

Figured in Dallas Killing.

Restiva figured in what police have termed the Ruggero-Campanella feud of Dallas and Kansas City.

The feud is said to have started in 1918 when Sam Restiva, a relative of Anthony Restiva, was shot and killed by Vitto Campanella Jr., son of a Dallas grocer and butcher. At the time Campanella told the police Sam Restiva had demanded money from him and that he had killed him in self-defense.

At the time of the first killing a cousin of Anthony Restiva, Frank LaPorte, was serving a term in the Texas penitentiary. He was paroled soon after the shooting and came to Kansas City to live.

Then the Campanellas moved to Kansas City. After their arrival they received a black hand letter demanding \$5,000 and threatening their lives if the money was not forthcoming. They appealed to the police. A few days later LaPorte was arrested and a sawed off shotgun was found hidden beneath his coat. His parole was revoked and he was returned to the Texas penitentiary. After completing his term he again returned to Kansas City.

In August, 1920, the Campanellas made a second visit to Kansas City. Restiva's wife and daughter were standing in front of their home a motor car sped by and the occupants opened fire on them. The Campanellas returned fire. Anthony Restiva was wounded. Police learned that Restiva's companion in the motor car was LaPorte and he was arrested.

Police File Charges.
Warrants charging Restiva and LaPorte with assault with intent to kill were sworn to by the police. Restiva's wife and daughter turned sought to obtain a warrant against the Campanellas, but this was refused by the prosecuting attorney until the charges against Restiva and LaPorte had been heard.

The feud in Kansas City subsided. Then it broke out again in Dallas in September, 1920, where the Ruggeros operated a butcher shop. Vitto Campanella Jr. entered the butcher shop and was fatally wounded by Joe Ruggero, who had Kansas City connections.

The Campanella Sr. announced he would "kill Ruggero at Ruggero's home in Oak Cliff at 8 o'clock tonight." Ruggero, who asserted he feared the Campanella threat, surrendered to the police, confessed to the shooting and claimed he had shot in self-defense. Joe Ruggero, a few weeks later, was shot to death in his shop after he had been lured to the front door at night by an anonymous telephone call.

Anthony Restiva's time came yesterday. Whether his death is a revival of the feud is a question that is baffling the police.

Persons in the crowd who gathered at the drug store following the shooting informed the police they had seen a man leaving the store immediately following the shooting. He was described as being about 25 years old, five feet six inches tall, weighing about 140 pounds and wearing a light raincoat.

According to the police, Restiva had been shot at several times during the past year.

INTERNAL REVENUE COLLECTOR OUTLINES CHANGES INVOLVED IN THE REVISED INCOME TAX LAW

DALLAS, TEXAS, Dec. 14.—The following statement is issued by the Collector of Internal Revenue George C. Hopkins, of the second district of Texas:

"Enactment of new revenue legislation has brought to the offices of collectors of internal revenue a flood of inquiries regarding various provisions. The revenue act of 1921 became effective Nov. 23, 1921, unless otherwise provided for."

"To avoid error in the preparation of their returns and later difficulties with the bureau of internal revenue, taxpayers are advised to carefully note the changes and when they become effective."

"The excess profits tax is repealed as of Jan. 1, 1922. The rates for 1921 are unchanged, and range from 1 per cent on the amount of

net income between \$5,000 and \$9,999 to 45 per cent on the amount of income in excess of \$1,000,000. For the calendar year 1922 the surtax tax rates range from 1 per cent on the amount of net income between \$4,000 and \$10,000 to 60 per cent on the amount by which the net income exceeds \$200,000.

Exemptions Allowed
"The exemption allowed for a dependent is increased from \$200 to \$400. Married persons living with husband or wife and heads of families are allowed a personal exemption of \$2,500 (instead of \$2,000) unless the net income is in excess of \$5,000, in which case the personal exemption is only \$2,000. The act provides that in no case shall the reduction of the personal exemption from \$2,500 to \$2,000 operate to increase the tax which would be payable if the exemption were \$2,500 by

more than the amount of the net income in excess of \$5,000. This is to overcome the disparity in the case of two taxpayers, one of whom is just within the lower \$2,000 exemption and the other just within the higher \$2,500 exemption.

"Single persons and married persons not living with husband or wife, are allowed an exemption of \$1,000. Non-resident aliens are allowed a single personal exemption of \$1,000. Persons having gross incomes for 1921 of \$5,000 or over are required to make a return, regardless of the amount of net income."

Tax on Stockholders
"Provision is made for the repeal as of Jan. 1, 1922 of the tax on stockholders of a personal service corporation as such. After that date such corporations are to be taxed in the same manner as other corporations."

"The income tax on corporations for the calendar year 1922 and thereafter is increased from 10 to 12 1/2 per cent. The \$2,000 exemption heretofore allowed corporations is to be granted only to those corporations whose net income is \$25,000 or less."

"Many persons are under the impression that the taxes on ice cream, soft drinks, etc., monthly returns

of which are required, have been repealed with the enactment of the new act. These taxes remain in force until the end of the calendar year 1921.

"No change is made in the tax on admissions, except that after Jan. 1, 1922, there will be no tax where admission is 10 cents or less. Effective Jan. 1, 1922, the following taxes are also abolished: on musical instruments, sporting goods, chewing gum, portable electric fans, thermos bottles, fur articles, pleasure boats and pleasure canoes (unless sold for more than \$100), toilet articles, medicines and numerous articles of apparel."

Works of Art
"On and after January 1, 1922, the tax on various works of art is reduced from 10 per cent to 5 per cent, the tax on candy from 5 per cent to 3 per cent and the tax on carpets, rugs, trunks, valises, purses, fans,

etc., from 10 per cent of sales price in excess of specified amounts to 5 per cent of sales price in excess of specified amounts.

"The tax on parcel post packages is eliminated, effective January 1, 1922."

"The new act provides that no taxpayer shall be subjected to unnecessary examinations or investigations, and only one inspection of big books of accounts shall be made for each taxable year unless the taxpayer requests otherwise, or the commissioner notifies the taxpayer in writing that an additional inspection is necessary."

"The period for filing returns on the calendar year basis is from Jan. 1 to March 15, 1922. This year, as last, the tax may be paid in full at the time of filing returns or in four equal installments, due on or before March 15, June 15, Sept. 15 and Dec. 15."

"A Prince There Was" Is the Censor's Kind of Picture

NEW YORK, Dec. 14.—"A Prince There Was," Thomas Meighan's latest film, is a poor picture because it offers nothing new in story, interest, evolution of plot, or technical development.
A picture that represents no progress of the cinematographic art is not a worthwhile picture. Many current productions fall short if measured by this standard.
Even the acting of Meighan was far below its usual quality. His leading lady was Mildred Harris. That may not have enthused him. Mildred Harris' performance in "A Prince There Was" was of about as negative a quality as any seen on the screen in several years. A skittish automaton would have served the purpose of the play as well as she. And that would have been a novelty.
The leading lady might have learned a trick or two about facial expression if she had watched the work of "Peaches" Jackson, the little girl in the picture.
"Peaches" appeared with Meighan in "The Prince Chap" several years ago. As this writer recalls that picture it was of far greater merit than "A Prince There Was."
There are one or two flashes of humor in the subtleties. That is because they are lifted from the dialogue of the original stage play.

TWO MURDER CASES AFFIRMED BY COURT CRIMINAL APPEALS

AUSTIN, TEXAS, Dec. 14.—The court of criminal appeals affirmed two death penalties this morning. One was that of George F. Hornsby, sentenced to death in Bell county for the murder of J. N. Weatherby, and the other affirmed case was that of O. J. Johnson, sentenced to death in Newton county for murder.

ARGUES CASE REVOKING JEWELL REDWINE PAROLE

He seeks a rehearing in the case. The court recently held that Governor Neff had the power to revoke Redwine's parole, regardless whether he had not violated its provisions. Senator Burckett in his argument will contend that a contract made by one governor of the state cannot be broken unless there is reason to do so. Redwine was paroled by Governor Hobby after serving six months of his 18-year term for murder.

hands with several of you in hell. I did it and I guess I'll pay. A rope then was placed around the neck of the doomed man by the leader of the mob and he was asked if he wished to make a dying statement.

"I would like one thing, fellows. If there is a sixshooter in the crowd please don't use it on my body. Here, tie my hands behind me so that I won't fight the rope. May God bless you all."

He was then led limping along behind several of the leaders to a clump of trees where, after a few minutes, one was selected and the other of the ropes placed over a limb. While the rope was being drawn through and the slack taken up, Hackney said:

"Here, boys, let's do the thing right, put the jolly old noose under my left ear."

"Come to the front," said one of the bystanders remarked to him: "You certainly are the gamest condemned man I ever heard of."

"Sure I am," replied Hackney. "There never was a gamer sucker than I. I'm not afraid to die. I've seen it before too many times."

He was then placed sitting on a high gate and with several men pulling on the rope, he was swung off his feet, touching the ground for half a minute until more men could jump to aid those in pulling the rope over the limb and swinging the body clear.

In the final death struggle his limbs breaking loose from their fetters, he waved and jerked. Just before the crowd turned to see the body hanging in the daylight, some one fired a shot at the body and instantly a fusil-

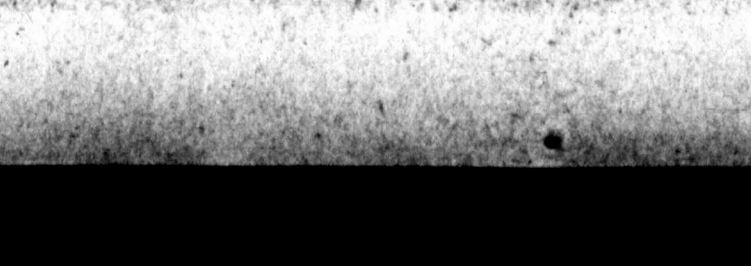

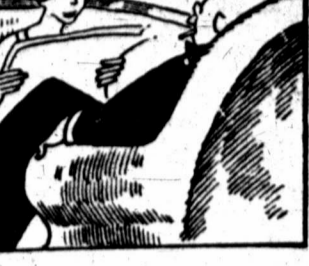

DR. CHRISTIAN BLAMES WRONG KIND OF FOOD FOR NEARLY ALL ILLS

"HOW TO LIVE 100 YEARS" IS SUBJECT

Annual Election of Officers of Club is Announced for December 23

Members of the Wichita club were told Wednesday that the average age of 100 years is not as far off as they often think it is, but that it is not a matter of chance, but one of habit. Dr. Christian said that the failure to eliminate "junk" from the diet was the cause of nearly all diseases, and that the diet should be made up of natural foods, which would be more nourishing if eaten first-hand.

Dr. Christian closed with a reference to his efforts to secure national legislation to increase knowledge of dietetics, saying that the government should pay at least as much attention to feeding and helping human beings as it now does to live stock.

Announcement was made that the annual election of officers would be held Wednesday, December 23, and that plans were under way for a general good time on that occasion.

Dr. Christian blamed food—the wrong kind of food—for everything that ails physical man, and he cited plentiful statistics to back up his statements. He told of how, at the age of 32, he had a severe stomach and was said to have but a short time to live; he is now more than twice as old, and spoke confidently of his expectation to live to the century mark.

"Our citizenship and our government depend upon the mental and physical health of the individual," said Dr. Christian, "and the individual's health is determined very largely by what he puts into his stomach. It seems a strange thing, when you consider that the purpose of life is to attain happiness, that men are so prone to do things to defeat happiness.

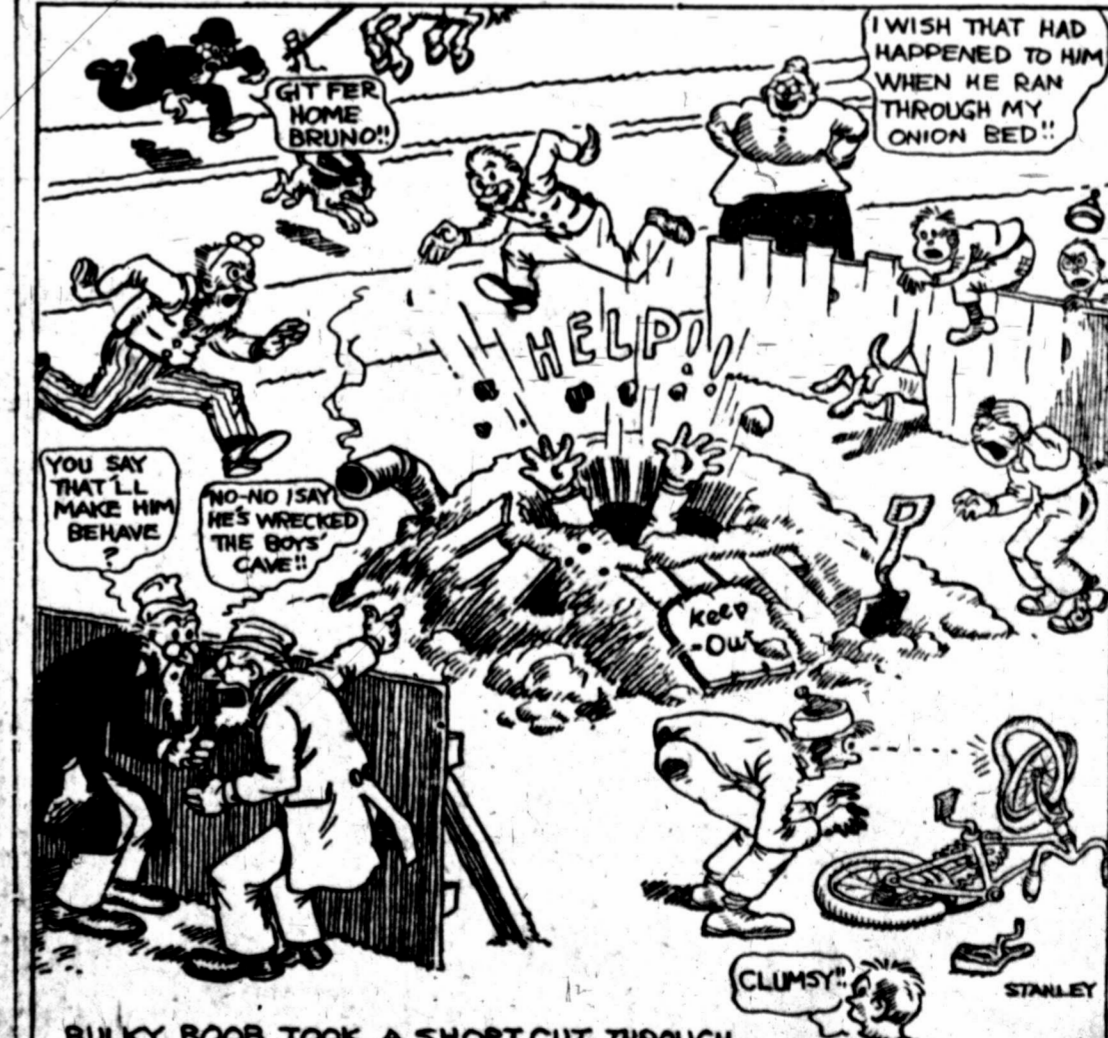

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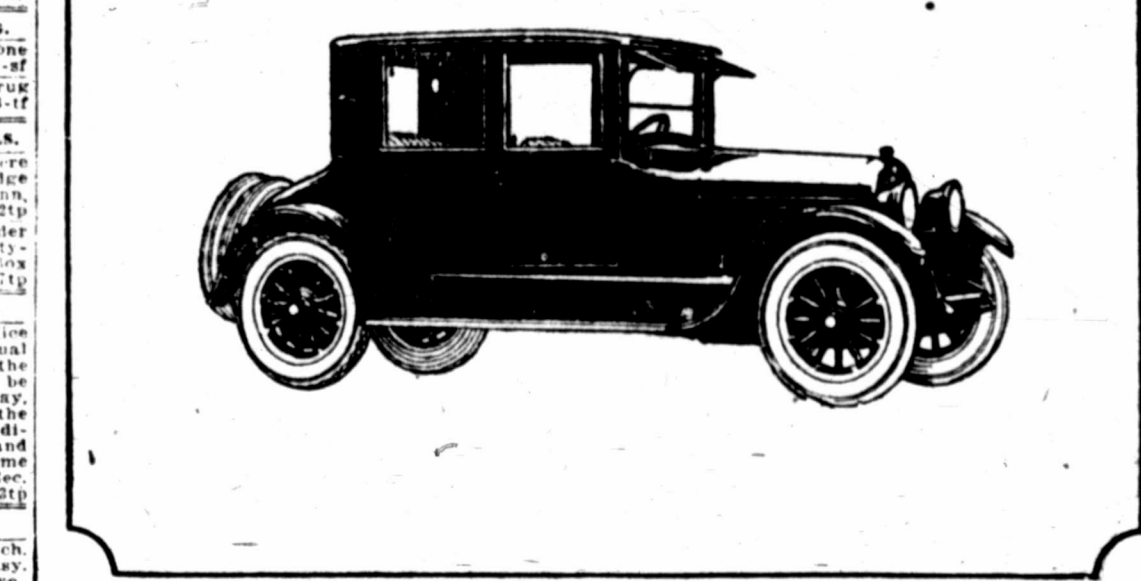
