### METHODIST MEN FORM NEW CLUB AT MEETING TUESDAY

Organization of the Methodist Men's club, composed of over 200 representative men of the city, a stirring address by Rev. Herman W. Knickerbocker, preacher, prospector and adventurer who had gone through the trials and tribulations of collective life and enthusiasm that angers well for the promotion of higher ideals in the city, stood out as the prominent feature of a big fellowship meeting held in the First Methodist church, 20 1/2 S. Tuesday night.

The meeting was the first of a series to be conducted throughout the year by Rev. H. D. Knickerbocker, pastor of the church, in an effort to establish among his congregation and among the city at large a better feeling of comradeship.

Claude Miller was elected president of the new organization, and Edgar F. Haney was named as secretary in a brief business session held at the close of the regular program.

Hubert Harrison, general manager of the chamber of commerce, outlined the keynote of the session in an address which brought out the necessity of applying Christianity to every day business.

"A time will come every man's life," he said, "when he realizes that he is not all powerful and that strength and inspiration must be obtained from some source higher than that afforded by earthly mortals. We need Christianity in our business more than ever before and gatherings such as this where we can absorb Christian fellowship along with optimism and fun, are events whose value cannot be over-emphasized."

Mayor Walter D. Cline was scheduled to speak, but was unable to fill the engagement.

It took Rev. H. D. Knickerbocker 15 minutes to introduce his brother, who was the principal speaker of the evening, and it required an equal period of time for the latter to square up accounts when he finally took the floor. The two programs made a heroic application of the principles of brotherly love, for the personal remarks addressed to each other would have certainly been considered as a waged between men not bound by the strongest ties.

Rev. Herman Knickerbocker's talk was followed with intense interest by the big audience of men. Through vivid word pictures, delivered with many dramatic touches, he carried his hearers to the Pacific coast where in the own of Los Angeles he embarked on the journey that eventually led to the fields of California, then to the mining sections of Arizona, old Mexico and Nevada, and finally back to the ministerial field in Texas.

His accounts of personal adventure, the tales of how he had, through successive speculation and speculation, accumulated a fortune spearing into the hundreds of thousands and his stories of camp life in the boom towns of Tonopah and Goldfield were etched in brilliant colors. The fields of Godness of Chance had been kind to him, he said, and that adversity had followed fast on its heels.

Wealth, luxury and ease, succeeded in turn by poverty, privation and pain, had worked for him a checkered career—a career that has finally taught that true success is measured only by the standards of Christianity and that abiding faith and trust in those things typified by the church are essential to the attainment of the highest ideals, he said.

Announcement that four vice-presidents would be elected at the next meeting, to be held the second Tuesday in March, and that a drive to secure 400 members would soon be launched, were made by Rev. H. D. Knickerbocker at the close of the session.

Two vocal solos by R. E. Shepherd and some chorus "singing" by the entire audience enlivened the evening's proceedings considerably.

A committee composed of Joe Means, Dr. L. Lacey and Raymond Weldon was named to plan for a dance in the next few weeks, while another meeting with Dr. T. J. Strong as chairman was appointed to work out plans for staging boxing and wrestling bouts under legion management.

Belief that more attention should be paid to the social and athletic features was expressed by practically the entire membership.

Other matters coming up for attention included a report on the recent legion minstrel which is said to have netted some \$400 for the post. A vote of thanks to several local parties for services rendered in the minstrel presentation was passed and extended.

Bob Nixon, post adjutant, was appointed to represent the legion on the executive committee of the city basketball league.

Short talks by C. H. Clark, G. C. Wood and Rev. Herman Knickerbocker constituted the program at the weekly luncheon of the Wichita club Wednesday noon. A committee of about 20 members of the club was named to represent the organization in the chamber of commerce membership drive next week.

# The American Makes the Best Lover

So Says Mrs. Clare Sheridan, Internationally Famous Sculptor and Author, Marvelling at the American's Chivalry, Generosity, Amiability and High Character!



**T**HE American male is nature's perfect lover and the world's most indulgent husband.

With such a summing-up has Mrs. Clare Sheridan, the English sculptor, tagged the American gentleman as she has found him. She intends no left-handed compliment to Americans so described. Nor does she mean to subject the English gentleman to any odious comparisons. She has simply been vastly interested in American men in their relationships with their women. For six months and more she has watched American men at work and at play. Now she delivers her mind of the truth as she sees it without reference to what may be implied in her words.

"The American man," she says, "is invariably chivalrous to women. He doesn't merely extend his courtesies to those women whom he knows and likes and wants to impress. He is obliging to all women. Coming from a country where the women are subordinated to the careers, ambitions and desires of men, I was immediately and naturally struck with this extreme anxiety to please his women—and women generally—that seemed to animate all American men of any sort of culture. I was introduced to this phase of the American man's character, in fact, before I actually landed on American soil.

"I met a young naval officer on the ship on which I was coming over. He was the sort of man who would have been badly spoiled by women in England. Yet he gave up his whole day to me when we landed—undertook to see me and my baggage safely through the ordeal of the custom house, and when something arose that I had to attend personally, took my child aside and amused him.

"This act of kindness impressed me greatly—but if it had been an isolated case I should merely have thought of this naval officer as an unusually considerate and generous person. As it is, I think of him as typically American. For things like that have happened to me continuously in America. Men who never expected to see me again were always considerate of my comfort—were always helping me to meet the petty difficulties

which are inevitable to one who is rushing around from place to place trying to do a great many things in a short space of time. This attitude, if my observation has been true, is the attitude the American man habitually maintains toward—not a particular woman—but toward all women. As I have said before—if I should ever decide to marry again, I should certainly choose an American."

Mrs. Sheridan, of course, as she is careful to explain, is not basing her estimate of Americans simply upon their willingness to extend small courtesies to women. She feels that she has got something of a look at the essential male character as turned out in these states. And judging as one who has had some experience in appraising men, she thinks that this practice of courtesy is a gesture indicating a deep sense of the American man's obligation to his womenfolk.

This feeling of obligation being so deep-rooted is naturally carried through into all his acts and postures—but is particularly evident when he falls into the role of lover or husband. Hence the visitor from England—particularly if she be as observant as Mrs. Sheridan—witnesses the rare phenomenon of a man fondly accommodating his own life to the life of the woman he loves. In England if it is the woman of the family who fetches and carries and who is eventually sacrificed if need be! Not so here. The man hops up stairs and down, gives her money, hangs jewels about her neck, sticks nose by his stifling job while she races off to California or Italy—and then pleads with her to think up some other small wish that he may have the supreme pleasure of gratifying it.

And yet—enthralled as he is by his women—Mrs. Sheridan thinks the American man is by no means soft. It occurs to her that accepting this obligation to women in a high-minded spirit, the American man turns it into character.

Whether he be Jew or Gentile, Teuton or Slav, Nord or Mediterranean, he is outstandingly and unmistakably American. Mrs. Sheridan sees America in his jaw, in the set of his cheek bones

and in a certain glint of his eye that seems to express his particular ability for discerning things in a flash.

She illustrates her point about the American jaw by referring to two busts she has made. One is a bust of Mr. Asquith, celebrated as an ex-Premier of England, the husband of Margot and the father of Princess Bibesco of Rumania. The other is a New York newspaper man who is a considerably lesser figure, as men are rated. The Asquith jaw is not strong. The New York jaw fairly leaps at you. Without knowing any intimate details of her American subject's life, Mrs. Sheridan believes that if all were known his career would represent a greater triumph over discouraging circumstance than that of Mr. Asquith.

Mrs. Sheridan remembers other American faces—Bernard M. Baruch, the capitalist; Ray Baker, of the U. S. Treasury Department; William Travers Jerome, one of her American kinsmen—and thinks they could never be mistaken for anything else.

In her own right Mrs. Sheridan is all sorts of an interesting person. A kinswoman of Winston Churchill, her husband was a descendant of Richard Brinsley Sheridan, the famous playwright; an English gentlewoman by birth, training and appearance, she yields first to the creative glow of the artist. She has made herself known as a sculptor, and being a sculptor affirms herself a citizen of the world.

She became an international figure when she molded the features of Lenin and Trotsky, and then described her experiences in a book, "From Mayfair to Moscow." After speaking disparagingly the way she was entertained by several personages in Manhattan's haut-monde, Mrs. Sheridan has returned from Mexico to New York to face the aristocrats she criticised.

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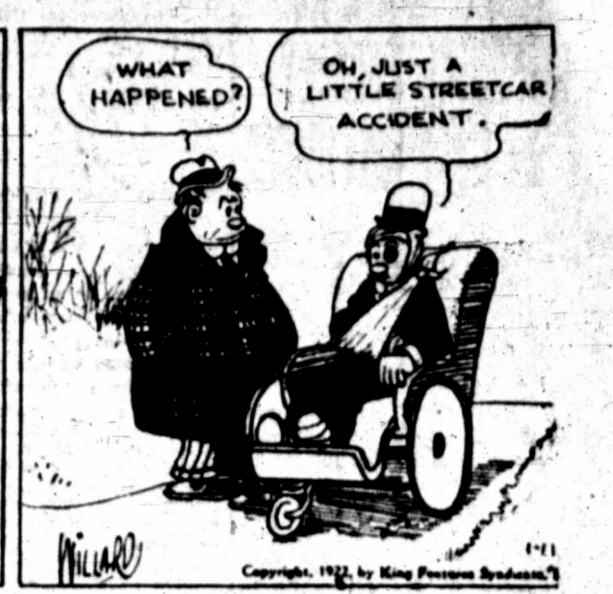
