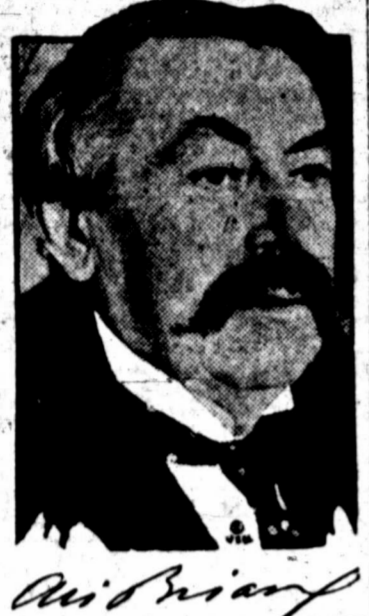


EXTRA NOW UNDER MARTIAL LAW

PREMIER BRIAND OF FRANCE HAS RESIGNED

By Associated Press. PARIS, Jan. 12.—Premier Briand submitted his resignation to President Millerand at the Elysee palace today after making a lengthy statement before the chamber of deputies, justifying his attitude at the Cannes conference.



ACCEPTS RESIGNATION OF BRIAND AND CABINET

M. Briand, after making his announcement, left the chamber alone. The members of the cabinet followed as soon as they had recovered from their surprise. A group of deputies and government officials gathered in excited discussion of the seriousness of the situation, seeking a way out of the difficulty.

PARIS, Jan. 12.—President Millerand today accepted the resignation of Premier Briand and his cabinet and indicated he would not ask any one to form a new ministry before tomorrow.

LIKE BOMBHELL EFFECT ON THE ARMS CONFERENCE WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—The resignation of Premier Aristide Briand of France was received with almost bombshell effect at the arms conference circles, the action being considered likely to have a great effect on decisions already reached or about to be reached.

GENERAL AMNESTY IS GRANTED POLITICAL PRISONERS IN IRELAND

DUBLIN, Jan. 12.—Withdrawal of the general amnesty for political prisoners in Ireland will be begun immediately, it was announced officially today that the first contingent, comprising nearly 200 of the prisoners, would leave Dublin tomorrow for England.

GERMAN DELEGATION BEFORE THE COUNCIL

Commission Unable to Agree on Postponement of Reparations Payment. By Associated Press. BRUSSELS, Jan. 12.—The German delegation headed by Dr. Walter Rathenau was received by the allied supreme council this morning, the reparations commission having reported that last night's conference with the Germans had been without result.

DR. RATHENAU APPEARS BEFORE THE COMMISSION

CANNES, FRANCE, Jan. 12.—Dr. Walter Rathenau, head of the German delegation, was before the reparations commission for three hours last night to explain Germany's request for postponement of reparations payments. He made no new offer on behalf of his government, merely restating the general conditions previously made known and protesting the good faith of his government.

WHOLESALE PRICE FOR EGGS FOUR CENTS HIGHER ON KANSAS CITY MARKET KANSAS CITY, Jan. 12.—The wholesale price for eggs made a strong advance here today, selling four cents a dozen higher. First eggs sold for 29 cents and second 28 cents. The recent demoralization in the market is causing the farmers to hold up on receipts for a higher price.

PARIS POLICE USING WIRELESS EQUIPMENT PARIS, Jan. 12.—The Paris police are using wireless equipped automobiles to rid the city of bandits and highwaymen and are ready to use airplanes in time of riots or demonstrations.

TRANSPORT CROOK MAKING HEADWAY VESSEL REPORTS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—A radio gram from the transport Crook received here at 8:30 a. m. today said the crippled ship was making favorable headway. The gale reached the transport in the morning, but "last night, but did not cause it to slow perceptibly."

GENERAL FELD DIAZ IS AGAIN ACTIVE IN TWO MEXICO STATES

NOGALES, ARIZONA, Jan. 12.—Revolutionary activities declared to be headed by General Felix Diaz nephew of the former Mexican president, are increasing in the states of Vera Cruz and Oaxaca and the government is taking extraordinary measures to combat them, advisers received here yesterday stated.

PROCLAMATION BY GOVERNOR EFFECTIVE AT 5:00 THIS MORNING; COVERS TWO JUSTICE PRECINCTS

MEXIA, Jan. 12.—Temporary suppression of an extra edition of the Mexican Evening News carrying Governor Neff's proclamation, which is in effect here, carried in Austin dispatches of the Associated Press, and general order No. 1, by Brigadier General Jacob N. Winters, took command here this morning, was ordered by Captain H. H. Johnson of the general staff, General Winters said. Early this morning he and the fact that other local newspapers had not yet obtained a copy of the proclamation was given as the reason for Captain Johnson's order.

AUSTIN, Jan. 12.—By a proclamation issued today, Governor Neff declared martial law at Mexia, Texas, and the surrounding oil field country. The proclamation specifies Justice Precinct No. 4 in Limestone county and Justice Precinct No. 5 in Freestone county. The order became effective at 5 o'clock this morning.

SOLDIER BONUS TO BE COMBINED WITH ALLIED DEBT BILL

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—Senate republican leaders today were virtually in agreement on a legislative program for the present session and have under consideration a new proposal for combining the soldier bonus and allied debt refunding bills to enable cash payments to former service men by sale of bonds received from the allies.

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COLONEL EXPLAINS HOW THE MEN WERE HANGED IN FRANCE

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—Only two soldiers were hanged at Is-sur-Tille while he was in command there from March to July, 1919, Colonel Ham said today before a senate committee investigating charges that soldiers had been put to death in France without trial.

Explaining how the orders to execute the men had been carried out, Colonel Ham said they carried him such persons, that he kept them from the knowledge of his staff for a day. The post chaplain was directed to confer with the condemned men while the gallows were being erected and to remain with them constantly.

SECRETARY HUGHES AND BALFOUR HAVE OUTLINED SOLUTION

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—A series of informal proposals and alternatives looking to a compromise of the Tsingtau-Tsinanfu railway dispute has been submitted jointly by Arthur J. Balfour and Secretary Hughes in settlement of the Shanghai question and are now under consideration by the Peking and Tokio governments. Definite developments may be expected within the next few days, it was learned on high authority today.

OKLAHOMA OFFICER KILLS TWO WOMEN Was Hunting Alleged Whiskey Car And Shot at the Wrong Parties.

ARKANSAS CITY, KANS., Jan. 12.—Mrs. Thomas, wife of a barber, and Mrs. Skinner, wife of an oil worker in the Kay county field, were shot and killed at Kaw City, Okla., last night by Deputy Sheriff Finney of that town when he shot into their car while on the lookout for an alleged liquor car. Finney had been notified by the sheriff's office at Newkirk, the county seat, to look out for the whiskey car and several men and he shot at the wrong parties after calling to the driver of the car, a young man of Kaw City, to stop. The two women were sisters-in-law.

GENERAL FELIX DIAZ IS AGAIN ACTIVE IN TWO MEXICO STATES

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FIND METALLIC CASKET WITH BODY OF A WOMAN PRESERVED IN ALCOHOL

VICKSBURG, MISS., Jan. 12.—A metallic casket in which the body of a young woman was found preserved in alcohol was discovered by a railroad repair gang near Delta, La., according to word received here last night. The casket had apparently been thrown into the Mississippi river from a nearby graveyard, trainmen said. Louisiana authorities have ordered removal of the body.

JOHN KENDRICK BANGS AGAIN CRITICALLY ILL

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Jan. 12.—John Kendrick Bangs, who had been reported recovering after an operation for intestinal trouble, has suffered a relapse and, it is again critically ill, his physician, Dr. W. B. Stewart, said today.

MIDLAND COLLEGE TO BE MOVED AND MAY LOCATE HERE

C. OF C. EFFORT TO OBTAIN SCHOOL TAKES MORE DEFINITE FORM.

ANOTHER TOWN MAKES BIG OFFER FOR SCHOOL

Committee to Take Further Action On Matter at Meeting January 10.

That Wichita Falls has an excellent chance to become the location for Midland college, a junior institution of the Christian church, now located at Midland, Texas, was the report brought back Thursday by Rev. J. Lem Keever and Prof. Lee Clark, who, as a committee from the chamber of commerce, attended the Christian conference at Fort Worth at which the removal of the school was discussed.

There will be keen competition for the school, it developed, and another west Texas town, Cisco, has offered three hundred acres of land, and 100 acres of land for the institution. It was virtually decided at Fort Worth that the school will be moved from Midland, and a meeting will be held January 19 at which the offers of the competing communities will be further considered.

The city that lands the school will be in position to have a senior college later, it developed at Fort Worth, for while the Midland institution has only junior standing at present, it is planned to make it the regular college as soon as possible.

The movement to bring this college to Wichita Falls started several weeks ago, but for obvious reasons the name of the school was not made public at that time.

Cisco's offer includes a brick administration building, a gymnasium, wooden dormitories, which are to be put in first class condition for the school, and to which a 100-acre tract will be added. The cost of this offer is less than that of Wichita Falls, and it is believed that the advantages offered by this city materially outweigh those of the other community. However, that is something of which the locating committee will have to be convinced.

A meeting of the college committee of the chamber of commerce has been called for Friday morning to consider the report.

IDENTIFY THE MAN HELD AT AMARILLO

Is Turned Over to Oklahoma Officers to Answer Murder Charge.

AMARILLO, Jan. 12.—The man arrested here Tuesday night and held in connection with the murder near Goodwell, Okla., of Antonio Puleo, believed to be a barber of Toledo, Ohio, registered at a local hotel as "A. Dillon, Toledo, Ohio," was taken to Guymon, Okla., county seat of Texas county, today by Sheriff Charles Lesman of Guymon. Dillon told officers following his arrest that his name is A. L. Davis and that his home is in Indianapolis, but later admitted that his name is Carlo Canepa and that his home is in Cleveland, Ohio.

Naturalization papers found on his person issued by federal court in Cleveland, Ohio, February 21, 1921, bore the name of Carlo Canepa and gave his residence as Cleveland.

Canepa says he is 25 years of age and has a wife and one child. His parents live in Indianapolis and he has a brother-in-law, Max Farber, living at Breckenridge, Texas, he said.

Canepa will be held by Oklahoma officers pending grand jury investigation of the murder of Puleo.

Search of Canepa's effects revealed that he had an automatic pistol in three empty chambers. Puleo's body had three bullet wounds. The car in which he drove to Amarillo had razor straps, razors and other articles indicating that the owner was a barber.

Description of the car that Canepa drove into Amarillo tallied with the description of a car which Puleo left at a Goodwell garage Monday night.

When arrested Canepa was wearing a diamond ring of peculiar design, which officers say corresponded to a ring on the finger of the dead man.

Canepa offered no explanation of his presence in this section of the country, but denied any connection with the killing of Puleo.

RETAIL FOOD PRICES DECREASED IN 1921 12 TO 18 PER CENT

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—Retail food prices in 14 principal cities in the United States decreased 12 to 18 per cent in the 12 months ending December 31 last, the bureau of labor statistics of the department of labor announced today. The bureau's figures show that prices prevailing last month in 12 of the cities from which 1921 statistics were available, had increased since that year from 32 to 59 points. During the month from November 15 to December 15, 1921, 12 of the cities reported decreases in food prices, two reported increases and the other two, Manchester, N. H., and Minneapolis, reported no change.

Mobile, Ala., and Savannah, Ga., had the highest percentage of decrease in prices for the 12 months period, each reporting an 18 per cent decline. Other declines included Dallas, 14 per cent. During the month ending December 15 Dallas reported an increase of less than five-tenths of one per cent.

New York with 59 per cent led in the increase in average retail food costs since 1913, and Dallas 45 per cent.

RE-GRAVELING OF ROAD COST COUNTY 95 CENTS A YARD

Regraveling of the first five miles of the Charlie road, sometimes known as the Friberg or the Thornberry road, cost the county the small sum of 95 cents per yard. The work of placing a new surface on the road was under the supervision of Dick Morris, foreman of road work under Commissioner J. P. Jackson.

A four and one-half inch new surface was placed over the road with gravel taken from a pit located near the course of the highway. The gravel itself cost 50 cents a yard and the loading, hauling and

placing was done at a cost of 75 cents a yard. The total cost of the five miles was \$1,515.89, according to figures received from the office of W. W. Murphy, county auditor.

VERNON TO RECEIVE BONDS FOR ELECTRIC LIGHT BONDS

VERNON, TEXAS, Jan. 12.—Bids for the sale of \$100,000 in Vernon electric light plant bonds will be opened January 26, according to an order of the city commission. Offers for the securities will be received until January 19 inclusive. At the same time \$25,000 in water works extension and street improvement bonds will be offered.

The bonds will mature serially at such times as may be fixed by the city commission.

DEEP TEST NEAR PLAINVIEW IS STILL BEING DRILLED

Work is still going on in the Bledsoe Oil company No. 1 test on the Richter farm near Plainview and is down around 2120 feet. This well caused some excitement a few months ago when a shallow sand was encountered at 230 feet which

showed considerable oil and gas and another around 1310, but both were passed up in and endeavor it encounter a deeper sand. When the Bledsoe company completed their contract it was turned over to the leaseholders who immediately formed a new company for the purpose of drilling to 2500 feet unless oil or gas was found in paying quantities before reaching that depth. The present president of the new company is A. E. Boyd, president of the Plainview chamber of commerce.

THEO. H. PRICE SAYS:

"Texas People Spend \$60,000,000 a Year Outside the State for Having the Cotton They Produce and Consume Converted Into Manufactured Cotton Goods"

An Editorial by Theo. H. Price:

Among the year's developments that are of particular interest to the cotton trade there is to be especially noticed the construction of several new cotton mills in the State of Texas and plans which contemplate a further extension of the cotton manufacturing industry in that State. According to the latest figures there were 147,922,000 active cotton spindles in the world, 35,380,000 of which are in the United States, 20,000,000 being in the North and 15,380,000 in the South.

The distribution of the 15,380,000 spindles in the Southern, or cotton-producing, States is indicated in the subjoined table:

It will be noticed that Texas has but little more than 1 per cent of the Southern spindleage. During the three cotton seasons ending the 31st of July, 1918, there was consumed in the United States and Canada an average of more than 7,000,000 bales of cotton, or 3,500,000,000 pounds annually. This is equal to about 35 pounds per capita.

Texas has a population of 4,661,000. If the per capita consumption in that State is up to the national average, as is probably the case, Texans are consuming cotton goods for the manufacture of which over 300,000 bales of cotton are required and on 99 per cent of this consumption they are paying the cost of shipping the cotton to mills outside the State, manufacturing it there and shipping it back to the very people who produced it.

This is manifestly uneconomic, and as the cost per pound of manufacturing and distributing cotton goods is roughly equal to twice the cost of the raw material these figures mean, if cotton is worth 20 cents a pound, that the citizens of Texas are spending outside of that State an average of 40 cents a pound, or nearly \$60,000,000, for having the cotton that they produce and consume converted into the cloth and other manufactured cotton goods that they require.

It is therefore plain that the wealth of the State could be greatly increased by the construction of cotton mills in which its most important product could be converted into the manufactured goods that are made out of it.

This is, however, a comparatively narrow view, for it is quite possible that the cotton goods consumed throughout the United States, and especially in a very large section of the South and Southwest, to say nothing of Mexico and South America, could be manufactured in Texas. The raw material is there, the labor is there and the capital is there, and I am sure that the enterprise necessary to combine these three essential elements is not lacking.

The history of cotton manufacturing in the States of North Carolina, South Carolina and Georgia, now the leaders in the Southern textile industry, would indicate that the manufacture of coarse or heavy cotton goods should be at first undertaken and that as the operatives become familiar with the industry and develop the necessary skill the production of finer and lighter goods will follow naturally.

This would seem to suggest the technical lines along which the development of the cotton manufacturing industry in Texas should be attempted, and with the highly intelligent white labor that is now available in the more populous communities of Texas I have little doubt that if the movement acquires sufficient impetus the mills of Texas will shortly be able to produce a very large portion of the cotton goods that are consumed in that and the neighboring States, as well as in Central America and Mexico.

The following articles can and should be made in Texas cotton mills out of Texas-produced cotton:

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FAVOR MOTOR CAR SERVICE BETWEEN CHILDRESS AND HERE

Railway motor car service between Wichita Falls and Childress may result from a movement started at Childress, following the order of discontinuance of the two local lines. Discussing the matter, the address index says: "It is probable that if Childress and Wichita Falls chambers of commerce, assisted by the chambers of other cities and towns between, would join together and request a motor car service between Childress and Wichita Falls, that it would become a reality."

"Monday a representative of this paper was in conversation with a railroad official and this matter was discussed. It is said that large motor cars can be purchased for about \$20,000 each. Three cars would be necessary to maintain good service."

"It is said that if a car would leave Wichita Falls about 8 o'clock and another leave Childress at the same hour, the service would be just what is needed between the two cities. The return trips could be made about 4 o'clock, giving an other service that would be appreciated by people residing in the oil

fields of Wichita county. It would also be a great service for traveling men."

"The car coming from Wichita Falls could carry a trailer and deliver local freight to all towns, thus giving the merchants a service at least two days ahead of the present freight schedules. This service would also do away with the trucks that are now used by the wholesale houses. It is estimated that at least 15,000 pounds of freight is now hauled by motor trucks daily into Childress and Quanah."

"The expense of operating a motor car is very small. The car is about the size of a standard passenger coach and is propelled by a motor using kerosene for fuel. A motorman and conductor, compose the crew."

"Another point that would be of value in a motor service between Childress and Wichita Falls would be the relief afforded passenger train No. 2. It would not be necessary for this train to make local stops, enabling the train to reach Fort Worth an hour earlier. The territory from Childress to Wichita Falls is the most thickly populated along the Denver road and there are several roads with which connections can be made."

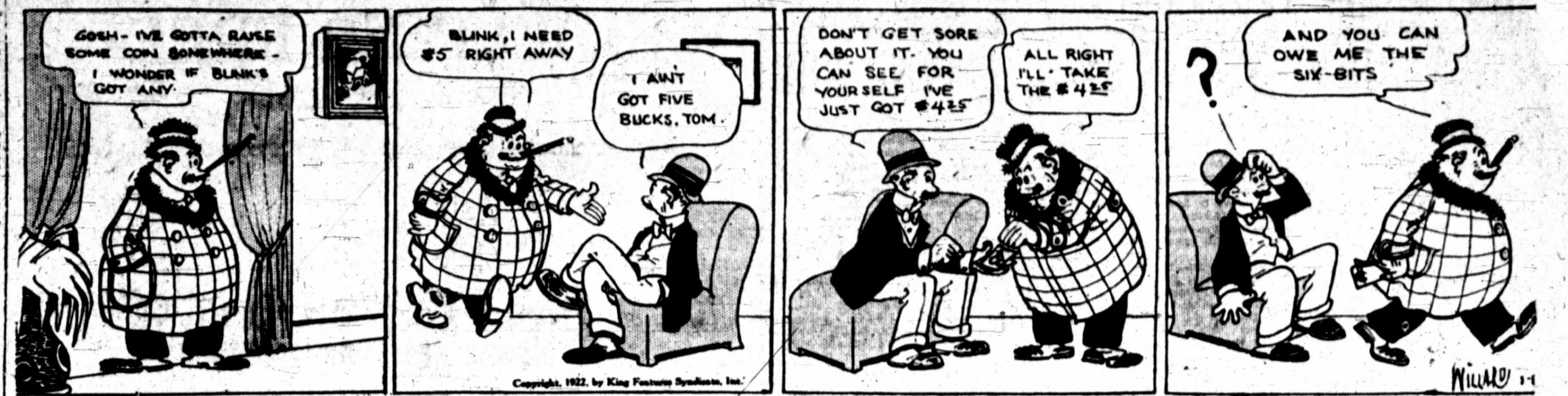
