The action of the theater owners' organization was a deserved rebuke.

"Although the New York picture passed the film as unobjectionable in itself, it is obvious that the only excuse for Beauvis to appear on the screen is the notoriety that he achieved in one of the most disgusting scandals that has been unloaded on the people in many years, and only morbid curiosity would attract audiences to see a man who lays no claim to being an artist. And a picture that has no better claim to recognition than that, had better not be

"Granting that the Beauvis film is not unworthy itself from the moral standpoint, it would be objecionable for the very reason that it seeks to exploit unsavory notorlety, and to lower the tone of the screen. The real artists of the screen should not be subjected to association with and competition from people who have no better claim to fame than Clara Smith Hamon or Fred Beauvis, and the patrons of the movies have indicated their support of the movie exhibitors in their efforts to elevate screen standards.

"Movie exhibitors throughout the country should have the continued support of the people in standing out against films exploiting notorious charaction of the movies, happily, now so well under way.
