

Harry P. Burleigh, executive director of the Texas Water Development Board, says in a report published recently that several recent actions will materially, and advantageously, affect future Texas water programs.

To begin with, Burleigh says, Texas voters emphatically indicated to the legislature in the May 18 election a desire for an immediate start on the massive task of cleaning up Texas streams and keeping them that way.

Burleigh referred to the passage of Proposition No. 4, which provided for bond sales of up to \$100,000,000 for expenditures leading to cleaner Texas streams.

In addition, Proposition No. 4 raised the maximum allowable interest rate on bonds issued by the Water Development Board for development of needed water projects from four per cent to six per cent.

The new and higher allowable interest rate is expected to make possible the marketing of Water Development Board bonds on a competitive basis below the six per cent maximum interest rate and thus provide needed funds.

Of equal significance, Burleigh says, are a number of actions taken by the recently adjourned Texas Legislature with respect to practical support for Texas water programs and Texas administrative agencies concerned with these programs.

The Legislature took two main actions of special significance: actions that will quite probably enable Texas to continue an orderly development of intra-state water use programs, regardless of dwindling congressional funds for this need.

First, the legislature authorized the Water Development Board to sell an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds, previously constitutionally authorized by the electorate, to support continued state financing and construction of needed Texas water supply projects.

The Board has already financed—and committed to finance—43 projects of this nature at a cost of \$112 million. With the new funding capacity plus a residual of \$85 million from earlier bond authorization, the state has approximately \$285 million to continue financing integrals of the broadly based overall state-wide water programs.

Secondly, the recent legislature removed restrictions on the Board's dollar investment in water supply projects. Heretofore, Board financing was limited to projects costing no more than \$30 million. The Board can now help finance water supply projects of a size that heretofore often required reliance upon federal financing—a money source that, as noted, has steadily dwindled under present federal policies.

Cooperation by the state and federal agencies on water matters of mutual interest should continue, however, according to the Water Development Board official.

Close rapport has been exhibited in recent months among the Texas electorate, the legislature, and state-level administrative agencies concerned with our water matters, and this should enable federal-state cooperation in water matters to proceed in an orderly manner and at a rate that the times demand, Burleigh predicts.

The City of Friona has applied for federal funds in the improvement and enlargement of its sewer plant. The action by the voters last May vested the Texas Water Development Board with management of the \$100 million Water Quality Enhancement Fund.

Creation of the fund makes Texas towns and cities eligible for increased federal participation in the construction of sewage treatment facilities, and reduces costs to local entities.

The city of Friona began taking steps toward application for the participation shortly after the passage of the new constitutional amendment.

More Rain For Friona

There were also reports of an inch or more by farmers in the area. The additional moisture is welcomed by the farmers, who said that last week's rain, good as it was, just served as a "starter" in wetting things, and that more rain is needed.

County's Bond Totals Given

Frank A. Spring, County Bond Chairman, announced today that sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Parmer County during June were \$4,899. Sales for the first six months totaled \$39,566 for 40 per cent of the 1971 goal of \$100,000.

During the month Texans purchased \$15,781,727 in Savings Bonds compared to \$13,658,647 (includes Freedom Shares) during June 1970. Year-to-date sales totaled \$101,916,420—56

per cent of the 1971 goal of \$181.9 million.

Nationwide, new purchases of Series E and H Savings Bonds during June amounted to \$486 million, 9 per cent above 1970. Sales the first six months of 1971 were \$2,785 million—18 per cent above a year earlier. Exchanges of Series E for new Series H Bonds amounting to \$127 million were reported for the six-month period of 1971, compared to \$123 million exchanged during 1970.

COUNT SHOWS

Over 10,000 Autos Through Friona Daily

If you have had an idea that a lot of cars come in and out of Friona in a day's time, you're absolutely right.

But even if you had already believed the traffic was heavy, you might be surprised to find out just how heavy it is.

An official traffic count map, published by the Texas Highway Department, shows that there are a total of 10,260 automobiles through Friona each day.

A traffic map was left with Chamber of Commerce manager Billy Jones, and he released the following information.

Highway 60, as might be expected, is the most travelled road, but the extent to which Highway 214 is used may be surprising to some.

The highest count was heaviest on Highway 60 southwest,

with a total of 2820 automobiles per day. The count going north-east, toward Black, was 2730.

Highway 214 south showed a daily auto count of 2180, proving the need for the improvements on this road. Of the total going south, the map showed that 910 vehicles took Farm Road 2397 to the east, with 1270 continuing south.

Highway 214 north tallied 880 vehicles per day, Farm Road 1731 (west) indicated 750 autos, and Loop 270 (Fifth Street) recorded an average of 900 vehicles.

As you can tell, that's a pretty steady stream of automobiles (cars, trucks, pickups, etc.). But if you live in Friona, it's probably not too surprising.



60-Unit Apartment Complex All Filled

All 60 units of the Friona Apartments, 1300 N. Walnut are full.

The apartments, which began renting March 1 of this year, were filled up last Wednesday, less than five months after they were first opened to the public.

The units began filling slowly at first, and were about half full by the first of summer. However, with the changing season, end of school, etc., business picked up until they were filled for the first time on July 21.

Mrs. Harvey Huckabee states that most of the tenants are employed locally, but that some are working in Hereford but could not locate housing there.

The filling of the apartments has not visibly affected other rental property, as it still is a scarce item in town, and now even more so.

AN EDITORIAL

Farming Ranks High As Hazardous Work

For many years farming has ranked as the third most hazardous occupation. Only mining, including quarrying and petroleum drilling, and construction have higher death rates. In general the death rate from accidents has followed national trends, decreasing steadily since the turn of the century. But where the rate on farms was once below the national average, in recent years it has been higher. And the difference appears to be increasing.

National Farm Safety Week, July 25-31, is an opportune time to examine the record to learn where farm safety falls down. National Safety Council statistics show that motor vehicle, home and public accidents--the three largest accident categories nationally--hit farm residents about as hard as the rest of the country.

It is in work safety that farming lags behind. Work accidents are second only to motor vehicle accidents among farm residents, comprising 31 per cent of the total. Other industries have developed safety procedures that have made work safer. Accounting for 45 per cent of the nation's accident toll. These same procedures, put to work on the farm, can bring farm safety back into line with the national record.

A farmer must be a craftsman. He often is called on to be a carpenter, an electrician, a mechanic. He uses fuels, chemicals, fertilizers, and many different kinds of machines.

To work safely he must know and follow the safe practices developed in many different industries. In most industries, employees' mistakes are noticed and corrected immediately. But much of farm work is done away from direct observation and supervision. Too often, an unsafe act, unseen and unrecognized, becomes a habit instead of being corrected promptly. These bad habits must be discovered and replaced with proper methods.

National Farm Safety Week is not a week in which to be more careful, then to be forgotten next year. Instead it is a time to examine work habits, to compare methods with those proved effective in other industries, and to seek out better and safer ways to do our jobs.

Accident prevention is a year-round job. An official "week" is simply a reminder that emphasizes the importance of that job. Every week should be Farm Safety Week.

Considerable publicity has been given to Venezuelan equine encephalomyelitis and its impact upon Texas', and potentially the nation's horse industry. Since mosquitoes are considered to be the prime vectors of this serious disease which attacks horses and, in a milder form humans, Federal, State and local officials are marshaling their forces in determined efforts to provide large-scale mosquito control where these pests are a problem.

Area control programs consisting of larviciding, spraying and fogging can effectively reduce mosquito populations. Individual homeowners can help greatly to destroy mosquitoes and possibly prevent the spread of VEE by eliminating mosquito breeding areas on or near their own premises.

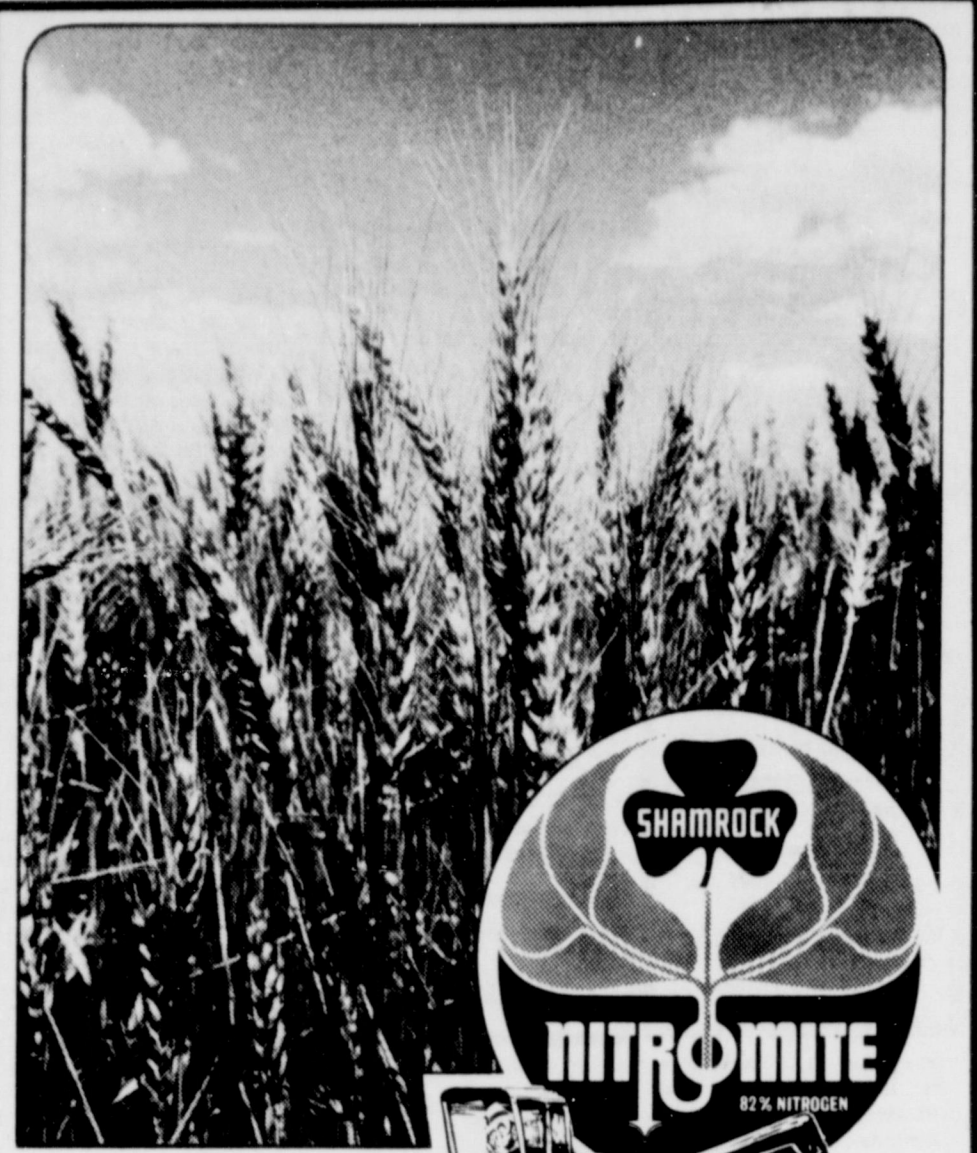
Mosquitoes cannot hatch un-

less they are in water, so all standing water around houses should be eliminated or treated. Mosquitoes frequently breed in commonly overlooked containers such as old tires, tin cans, jars, tubs, birdbaths, unused fishponds, evaporative coolers, or even on a flat roof where water accumulates. Also, septic tanks are ideal breeding places unless they are kept tightly covered. Standing puddles can be treated with a household insecticide or a small quantity of kerosene or diesel fuel, but avoid treating animal's drinking water.

Spraying shrubbery, eaves of the house and around windows and doors with malathion will help control hiding mosquitoes and prevent them from entering homes. If there are places around your home where mosquitoes breed you may be raising the very mosquito which could bite you or your horses to transmit VEE.

The crop insect situation throughout the county is not building quite as rapidly as was expected. However, it is still a major threat and should be closely watched. Corn aphids and greenbugs are not building up their population as they have in years past. Banks grass mites are working in both corn and grain sorghum earlier than last year. They should be watched closer and prevented from building into damaging numbers. These insects can do more damage than the greenbug if a complete outbreak of them occurs.

Pamphlet Describes Farm Drouth Help

What kinds of federal assistance are available to farmers, ranchers, farm workers, small business men, and others hit by the severe drouth in parts of Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico? Answers, in general terms, have been consolidated in a 16-page pamphlet prepared in English and Spanish by the President's Interagency Drouth Committee, Dallas. It's called "Guide to Federal Emergency Drouth Help Available, with separate versions for each state. Copies of the pamphlet are available at county offices that handle U.S. Department of Agriculture drouth assistance programs and information, including County Extension Agent, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS), Farmers Home Administration (FHA), and Soil Conservation Service (SCS). State and regional offices of Small Business Administration, Internal Revenue Service and Department of Labor also have copies for individuals who ask for it.

"Information on federal assistance in the pamphlet has to be general because all programs are not effective in all counties of the state," points out George Hastings, chairman of the Interagency Drouth Committee. Specific types of assistance have to be requested, county by county, depending on need, Hastings said.

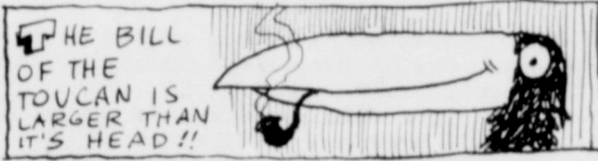
Lafuente's double was the key hit in the two-run rally in the seventh, which just added frosting to the cake.

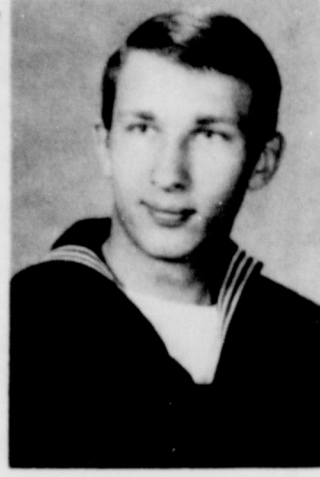
Library Board Gets New Officers
