The 1971 pheasant season in Parmer County will be December 11-19, a nine-day period which includes two weekends.

Announcement of the dates of the season was made this week by Tack Patterson, president of Parmer County Game Management Association. The nineday season in December has been in effect for the past several years in the county.

Patterson commented this week that the pheasant population is again considered good, but that hunting is apt to be harder than usual this year,

Reason for the "harder" hunting is expected to be that the grain sorghum crop was late in being harvested, and only a small percentage of the stalks have been shredded. Thus, th-

NEW SERVICE

DDD Ready To Start In Friona Saturday

(DDD) will go into effect in Friona at 6 a.m. Saturday, December 4, it has been announce ed by General Telephone Com-

pany of the Southwest. Frions telephone patrons will thus join those in the large metropolitan centers in being able to dial their own long distance telephone calls, without

having to consult the operator. Direct Distance Dialing. a new concept in long distance service, was ploneered by General Telephone Co. DDD permits the telephone user to dial their own station-to-station long distance calls to points in the continental United States and Canada.

The new convenience will not raise long distance rates from their present levels. In fact, customer-dialed long distance calls are always the lowest long distance rates available -- usually costing less than operatorhandled calls to the same point.

In order to dial their own long distance calls, patrons dial "1," plus the area code, then the full seven-digit number. If the call is within Friona's area code (806) they dial "1," and then, dial the party's seven-digit number, without dialing the area

If a person reaches a wrong number through the use of DDD, they need only dial "0" and report it immediately to the long distance operator, and they will not be charged with the call. Patrons can also find numbers in distant cities through the use of DDD, They need only to dial "1," then the area code, if outside this area, then the "Universal Directory Assistance

Our Constitution and Bill of Rights are so plainly written as to make one wonder at the great controversy as to their exact meaning.

Amendment #1 -- declared to be in force December 15, 1791-"Congress shall make no law respecting the establishment of a religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof, or abridging the freedom of speech or of the press, or the right of the people peaceably to assemble and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances."

The opening phrase-- "no law etc." -- is the basis of our solicy of the separation of church and state; a fundamental belief that is accepted without argument.

How shout the second phrase? "Prohibiting the free exercise thereof?

Does not the existence of a governmental mandate or decree denying public prayer to groups of citizens constitute an "abrid-

It's a big problem as we face subjugation by Godless adver-

The destruction of spiritual values is another part of the overall plot to destroy personal dignity

In the early days of our nation we had some experience with a combined church and state, the results of which were largely responsible for the addition of the first amendment

The early settlers on the Atlantic coast were for the most part members of the Established Church of England but as early as 1755 a petition was filed with the court in Chesterfield County, Vicginia, for the organization of a Presbyterian Church. At that time there were no Baptist or Methodist churches in the county although they had been licensed inother parts of the

Those favoring these new doctrines were called "dissenters" and anyone preaching or teaching these contrary faiths must ob-

Years of turmoil followed in the wake of a people speaking out for what they considered a "right of freedom.

Several preachers were imprisoned at Chesterfield's old rock all and these realers spoke through the barred windows to the faithful gathered on the court house grounds; however the government caused a high board fence to be built around the iail to discourage the meetings

The degree of severity shown toward the orthodox form of worship is demonstrated by the trial of a full-fledged minister of the established church.

The Rev. Archibald McRoberts was brought into court for having used "divers hymns and poems" that were not taken from the Psalms of David.

One cannot help but wonder what the verdict would have been had Madeline Murray O'Hair been brought before that tribunal?

We must remind our legislators that the Constitution requires that the Church be separated from the State--not abandoned by the federal government!

30 YEARS AGO -- DECEMBER 5, 1941

Friona's newest industry, the Malone Creamery and Produce Station, began operation last Friday with plans made for the installing of all equipment this week. Roy Vaughn, a former resident, is manager of the creamery, and will be in charge of purchases of eggs, cream, poultry and all kinds of produce.

25 YEARS AGO -- NOVEMBER 29, 1946 One of the biggest cattle feeding operations in this area is being carried out in Parmer County, by Triplett and Pringle, cattle feeders and buyers, of Bovina. At the present time the firm has 7,000 head of cattle grazing on wheat fields in Par-

20 YEARS AGO -- NOVEMBER 29, 1951

County commissioners stalled for the third time in recognizing the right of Precinct 1 to form its own independent road district, at its regular meeting Monday in Farwell. The commission indicated its desire to go before the state highway commission in Austin before making its final decision.

The Oregon Motorist magazine asks drivers, should the best tires go on the front or on the rear of your automobile? The magazine then goes on to say: "This question has caused considerable controversy in recent years as experts strive to decide which is truly the better procedure. Now comes the National Bureau of Standards to report that the best tires should be used on the rear wheels. Failure of rear tires is a more important cause of accidents than failure of front tires, says the Bureau after exhaustive tests."



Cranberries Make Meal

Tart-ss weet flavor and a bright red color make cranberries an excellent choice for homemade Christmas gifts. Relishes always are appreciated and cranberries go well in Spiced Cranberry Conserve, Cranberry Chutney or Cranberry Date Relish. Put aside a few jars for the family when preparing a batch of holiday food gifts.

SPICED CRANBERRY CONSERVE

- 2 cups fresh cranberries, rinsed and drained
- 1/2 cup ssugar 4 dried figs, coarsely chop-
- 1/4 teaspoon cloves
- ½ stick cinnamon
- 1 can (8 ounces) pineapple
- tidbits 1-3 cup water 1 tablespoon lemon juice

Combine cranberries, sugar, figs, dates, cloves, cinnamon, pineapple and water in a sauce pan. Bring to a boil and cook, stirring frequently, for 10 to 12 minutes. Add lemon juice and remove cinnamon stick. Spoon into hot sterilized jars. Seal at

- rinsed and drained
- 1½ cups sugar
- 1 cup water 1/2 cup tarragon or cider vinegar
- 1/2 teaspoon allspice ½ teaspoon salt

1 cup chopped dried mixed fruit. Combine all ingredients in a



Growth Of Allen's On Parallel With Friona

in Frions in May of 1948. At that time, Frions was a small (about 1,000 population) town, with hardly any pavement except for Main St. reet and Highway 60. There were very few street lights, and no mo dern sewer system such as the town has today.

The business, owned and operated by Allen Stewart and his wife Emma Lou, has grown right along with Fri

At the time Stewart opened his business, he was located in a small office in the northern part of the Reeve Chevrolet building, where Reeve's showroom now is located. Allen's was in the same building with the Frions Star at that time. which was still edited and published by the Star's founder, "Uncle John"

At the time Stewart began in bus case, without any light ("I couldn't afford it."), his watchmaker's desk and equipment.

Two years later, the company moved to somewhat more spacious quarters in the then new Friona State Bank building at Sixth and Main housing the Friona Chamber of Com merce. At that time, it was a 17x60 foot space. It had been built spec ifically for the fewelry store

With the additional space, the Ste warts began building their merchandise line, and installed their bridal service, which has served countless brides in the Friona area in the 2 years it has operated

Outgrowing that location, Stewart in 1958 built his own building, at the fewelry store's present location, at 609 Main Street

Stewart was bornin Childress. He moved with his family to a farm in the Big Square Community east of Lazbuddie in 1930. As a young man, he assisted his father in farming.

"I probably did some irrigating

earlier than most of the farmers

in the Friona area," Stewart says. With the outbreak of World War II. Stewart went into the Army, where he saw duty in the anti-aircraft section, and later in the infantry. Stewart saw action in the European battles, and had a narrow escape in a mission in which some 40 members of his group were killed. Stewart and a handful of others were cut off from their group for five days in bitter cold weather. As a result, his feet froze, and Stewart thought at the

time he might lose both feet. Following eight months of hospitalization, Stewart received a medical discharge in 1945. He was married on June 1 of that year, to Emma Lou Smith in Hereford. Later that year, Stewart entered wat-

Stewart has a Graduate of Gemo logy degree from the Gemological Institute of America. He is now the oldest graduate gemologist in the Panhandle area.

The jewelry store owner worked as a watchmaker for a jeweler in Hereford for a year before he moved

The Stewarts have seen several changes in their business in the 23 years it has been in operation. For one thing, stainless steel flatware has almost taken over the place formerly held by silver. This is due, they point out, to the modern and ornate designs that stainless patterns now have

"When stainless first came on the market, it had no design at all. These new patterns are a far cry from those earlier ones," says Mrs.

Other new products also have come on the market, such as Corning Ware, which is guaranteed against breakage.

Some stones, such as pearls, rise and fall in popularity. They will hit a period when they are "in," and then after a time, their popularity may fall off just as suddenly as it rose. "Ear clins were popular in the early 1950s. Today, pierced ears are in style," says Mrs. Stewart, pointing out another change in styles. In connection with the store's bridal service, the Stewarts point out that the biggest change here is that this has become more of a yeararound business, rather than seasonal. Formerly, everyone wanted to be married in June. Not so these

The Stewarts still carry at least one line that they inaugurated with the beginning of their merchandis-

Some of the store's original lines are no longer being manufactured. another indication of the changing of styles. These include Cambridge crystal and Syracuse china

Another facet of the business is the engraving work done by Mrs. Stewart, on items ranging from charms, I.D. bracelets, and silver trays to plaques. The company has a sizeable investment in the engraving equipment

Stewart has been an avid supporter and member of the Friona Chamber of Commerce since he has been in business here. He always takes part in retail promotion.

The Stewarts have two children, Robert A. Stewart, who will com plete his degree requirements at West Texas State University next August, and Margie Stowers. They also have a grand-daughter, Donna Lou, who belongs to Robert







PERENNIAL POSIES-A cheerful gift that gives year 'round pleasure is a bouquet of multi-colored flowers made from cotton calicoes, ginghams, and solids. Fabric petals are formed from two layers of fabric glued together with house hold cement for added stiffness. Buds are squares of fabric gathered over a loop of florist's wire.

Posies From Fabrics

bloom all year long, try your hand at making flowers from colorful cotton fabrics.

One of the simplest designs is a tulip. For a striking effect, use striped black and white pique for the outer petals and solid white pique for the in-

To form the basic sevenpetaled flower, start by cutting a 5x10-inch rectangle from each fabric. These are to be glued together—print side out

with household cement. However, to make the petals flexible, place strips of florist's wire-allowing one strip for each petal-between the fabric layers at 11/2-inch intervals before gluing. Make the

rectangle and can be used to attach the flower to the stem.

Next glue the 5-inch sides of the rectangle together to form a cylinder. Then snip out petal shapes, cutting so that each wire strip is in the center of a

Make flower centers from cotton ball fringe pompons and fabric-covered wires twist-ed in curlicue shapes to re-

semble tulip stamens. Tape the completed center to a stem made from heavy florist's wire or a coathanger and insert through the petal shaped cylinder. Then twist wires at bottom of cylinder gathering fabric around the





Buying the tree early will enable you to be selective in your choice of a fresh tree. Smith suggests checking for signs of needle shedding and brittleness to indicate excessive

This is because of a drastic slowdown in soil microbial activity that is necessary for changing the immobile ammonium to the highly-mobile nitrate form of nitrogen. This slowdown begins at 50 degrees and beautiful landscape planting. the action stons entirely at about the freezing point.

Fall care of shrubs is very important if you want them to survive the winter in healthy condition and be ready to grow next spring. Thus, several jobs must be performed to have a

Shrubs should be well wat ered ahead of a predicted cold, windy northern. This is very critical for evergreens and for new plantings which may not be well established. If the weather harvest. This means that less is dry during the fall and winter, apply water to shrubs about once every week to ten days.

Why do shrubs need water during the winter when they are dormant? Actually, they do not stay inactive all winter. This is especially true with evergreens. Whenever the temper sture gets above 40 degrees F., growth may start. They lose water constantly through transpiration especially if they are in a windy location.

Sunburn and windburn are primarily caused by loss of water. Thus, a good supply of soil moisture is as important in winter as in summer.

Evergreen shrubs in windy locations and those which have been recently transplanted may need extra protection during the winter. A screen of burlap around such plants may be helpful. Unfortunately, such protection devices are not attrac tive landscape features. A good substitute is to use an antidesiccant or anti-wilt spray. Apply in late fall about a month after the first frost, and again in mid-winter, when air temperatures are above 50 degrees

The mulch around shrubs should be renewed each fall to help conserve soil moisture, providing at least a two-inch layer. This also helps control weed growth next summer and will gradually increase the organic matter content of the soil.

Several types of mulch may be used including sawdust, wood chips, peat moss, ground bark, pine needles, chopped sugar cane or sterilized peanut hulls. Straw is undesirable because it contains weed seeds which may cause a control problem next year, Ground corn cobs may be used but should not contain grain which would attract mice, that might chew the bark from the shrubs.

Don't prune shrubs in the fall just before cold weather, Early pruning removes reserve food materials and weakens the plant, If a sharp drop intemperature occurs, the shrub may be damaged or killed by winter in-



Narrow rows can boost your sorghum yields significantly while adding very little to your production costs. According to tests conducted by DeKalb AgResearch, Inc., 20 inch rows have increased yields by as much as 30% over 40 inch rows. As seen in this picture, the narrow rows, on the left, tend to shade out weeds and retain moisture. These are two factors which encourage the higher yields. A switch to narrow rows can usually be done with a very modest investment in equipment.

File Medicare Claims Early

To avoid delay in Medicare fices and at any social security payments, patients should file claims promptly after they get their doctor bills, according to J.C. Carabajal, social security Field Representative.

"Many people let their medical bills accumulate until the end of the year and then file their claim. This tends to create a clerical backlog that can cause delays inpayments," Ca. Claims are filed on "Request

for Medicare Payment' forms available at most doctors' of-

office, Carabajal said. The booklet, "Your Medicare Handbook," tells where claim forms should be sent.

In many cases physicians submit claims for their services under Medicare themselves and are paid directly by the Carabajal said December 31.


