Property Tax Increase Imminent

TEACHERS HIRED

School Board Hikes Rate By 15 Cents

The Friona School Board, at its regular meeting for the month of July last Saturday, voted to increase the district's tax rate for 1972, by 15 cents per \$100.00 evaluation.

The new tax rate will be \$1.65 per \$100 evaluation, raised from the previous rate of \$1.50. It is the first increase since 1964, when properties were re-evaluated at the time of the construction of the new high school complex.

Superintendent of Schools Alton Farr pointed out three major reasons for the need to increase the tax rate. First is the school district's share in paying the state-approved increase in teachers' salaries; second is the purchase of new band uniforms (A \$9,000 cash outlay) and third was a general increase in school supplies and services.

Farr pointed out that while the school's expenses had been gradually increasing year to year, the district had been able to absorb the increase through increased (new) property evaluations and revenue. However, for the ensuing school year, for the first in a number of years, the school's tax roll bids to be less than the previous year.

The school's tax evaluations for 1971-72 stand at approximately \$31,300,000 this year, as compared to \$31,535,921 a year ago, Farr pointed out. The proposed budget for 1971-72, meanwhile, has increased from \$1,030,124 to \$1,104,517.

School officials cited as the main reason for the decline in its taxable property for the coming year the fact that there were considerably less cattle in local feedlots on January 1 the past year than there were the previous year. Taxes are based on the number of cattle owned on January 1.

Purchase of band uniforms is one of the larger single items facing the school for 1971-72, is an expense which only comes around every nine or ten years. The last new band uniforms were purchased here in 1962.

In other business, the board approved the contracts of four new teachers. They are Kenneth Baker, a sixth grade science and history teacher with two years' teaching experience. He comes here from Carrizo Springs.

Also hired was Miss Lana Grogan, a junior high school science teacher who is a recent graduate of West Texas State University; Orville Allen, high school industrial arts, also a recent WTSU grad; and Jerry Shelton, a mid-term graduate of Texas Tech University, who will teach high school history and civics. Shelton is a native of Lubbock.

The board discussed the fact that there will be six home football games for Friona for the 1971 season. Season tickets will once again be sold at no advance from the general admission price (\$1.50 per game). The price for the six games will thus be \$9.00. Further details on the football season tickets will be announced at an appropriate time.

Deposits Set New Record

Bank deposits at Friona State Bank set a mid-year record for the third consecutive year, it was revealed by the June 30 statement of the bank.

Total deposits at Friona State Bank as of June 30 stood at \$10,363,772.24. This was up from the figure on the previous June 30, which was \$9,149,503.94. The increase amounted to \$1,213,968.30 or roughly 13 per cent.

Total assets at the bank also showed a nice increase, from \$10,400,580.02 on June 30 of 1970 to \$11,797,732.96 at the present statement. The increase in this department came to \$1,397,152.94.

Another category which showed growth was the loan department, which indicated a

total of \$8,195,592.01 on loan as of June 30, up by about ten per cent from the figure of \$7,460,884.87 a year earlier.

An interesting sidelight to the deposit total was the fact that of the \$10,363,772.24 total deposits, \$4,170,811.39 was in savings accounts.

"People are more savings conscious than they used to be," said Charles Allen, bank vice president, who added that the time deposit total was easily the highest it had been in the bank's history.

"Most banks across the country have continued to show increases in deposits, and in a way it's difficult to explain," continued Allen, no doubt referring to the drought conditions which have hampered much of the area.

INFLATION CITED

City Approves 10¢ Tax Raise

The Friona City Council voted to increase the city's tax base by 10¢ per \$100 evaluation at its regular meeting on Monday.

City Manager Jake Outland recommended the tax increase, the first one for the city in 11 years, after work on the 1971-72 city budget showed that the city would be in the red without additional revenue.

Outland pointed out that the proposed tax increase would amount to about \$8.00 in actual taxes on an average house in Friona.

Some of the major capital outlay items include an estimated \$51,800 for capital improvements, from \$17,000 to \$22,000 for right-of-way for the Highway 214 overpass, and salary increases for city employees, amounting to roughly five per cent, or around \$6,500. The salary item took up a major portion of the council's meeting on Monday. A preliminary recommendation on salaries had been for increases ranging from two to five per cent for the average employee.

Councilman Bob Alexander argued that all salaries should be raised at least five per cent, to enable employees to keep abreast of national inflation, which is increasing somewhere near five per cent each year.

The council also heard representatives from the city's police department asking for more raise than the preliminary recommendation. The patrolmen argued that it is hard to maintain a competent force unless the city remains competitive with neighboring cities.

In view of this request, and in light of the proposed tax hike, it was recommended that salaries of employees be raised generally five per cent, but left it open for greater raises if they were deemed necessary for individual cases.

In other business, the board voted to repay to the Carson Estate a total of \$2,346.46 for street improvements in the Carson Addition recently annexed to the city. The street improvements had been made in the late 1950s and early 1960, but the city had agreed at the time to repay Fred Carson for the street expenses whenever the property in question came into the city limits.

The council opened bids for a tractor mower for use at the cemetery, but rejected the two bids received and tabled the matter. It was decided that neither bid concerned the machinery deemed necessary for the job.

The council was brought up-to-date on the status of the right-of-way acquisition for the overpass project. It was

reported that all field work has been completed, but that the appraisal is still completing the overpass project. It was

Club Donates \$2,000 To Opportunity Plan

Modern Study Club this week donated the entire balance in its R.B. Miller, Jr., student loan fund to the local Opportunity Plan. The donation totalled \$1,950.00.

Club officials indicated there would be an additional check at a later date, which would push the total past \$2,000.

The R.B. Miller, Jr. student loan fund was established as a club project in 1954, in honor of the late R.B. Miller, Jr., a casualty of the Korean War.

Making the presentation were Irene McFarland and Melba Allen, on behalf of Modern Study Club. The check was given to Opportunity Plan, Inc. chairman Richard Collard.

"We certainly appreciate the club's generous donation," Collard stated. He indicated that the Opportunity Plan had raised

some \$1500 during its recent fund drive, so the check received this week would give the chapter a balance of around \$3500.

At the present time, the chapter has no applications pending, but Collard said he expected some during the next couple of months.

Opportunity Plan, Inc. is a lending agency whereby students who need money to further their education upon the completion of high school may apply for specially-designed loans. As the money is paid back, it can be used over and over.

Last year in its pilot year, the Friona chapter assisted six Friona young people in furthering their education. Collard stated that those interested in applying for a loan for the upcoming year should contact him at his office.

A 14-member squad of players from Raton, N.M., will arrive in Friona on Sunday evening. The tournament's first game pits Friona vs. Raton at 6 p.m. on Monday.

Then on Tuesday, teams from

Tucumanari and Las Vegas, N.M., will square off, again at 6 p.m. Winners of the first two days' games will meet at 5 p.m. Wednesday for the district title.

Ronald Smiley said this week that homes are still desperately needed for at least 22 boys. Residents have been asked to host visiting players, who will be in town for the three-day tournament.

Noted Theologian To Speak Here Thursday

A special religious program, open to all Friona residents, is scheduled at 2 p.m. Thursday at Friona's United Methodist Church.

Dr. John T. Seamonds, a professor at the Asbury Theological Seminary, Dallas, will be the speaker. Also appearing on the program will be Pat Stanton of Shallowater.

Dr. Seamonds is author of the widely-acclaimed book "On Tiptoe With Joy." He is a former missionary in India, spending 19 years in that capacity. The Methodist official is currently holding a community-

wide revival in Shallowater, and is coming to Friona for the special service by special arrangements.

Mrs. Stanton is the daughter of a Baptist preacher, and is a farmer's wife in Shallowater. Spokesmen say she has quite a testimony to give about her personal life. She was cured of a terminal disease after medical doctors had all but given up on her chances. She will quote from two works by Kathryn Kuhlmann, "I Believe In Miracles," and "God Can Do It Again."

The public is invited to attend this special service.

Maddox will be responsible for the selection and placement of students, and will correlate their practical and technical training.

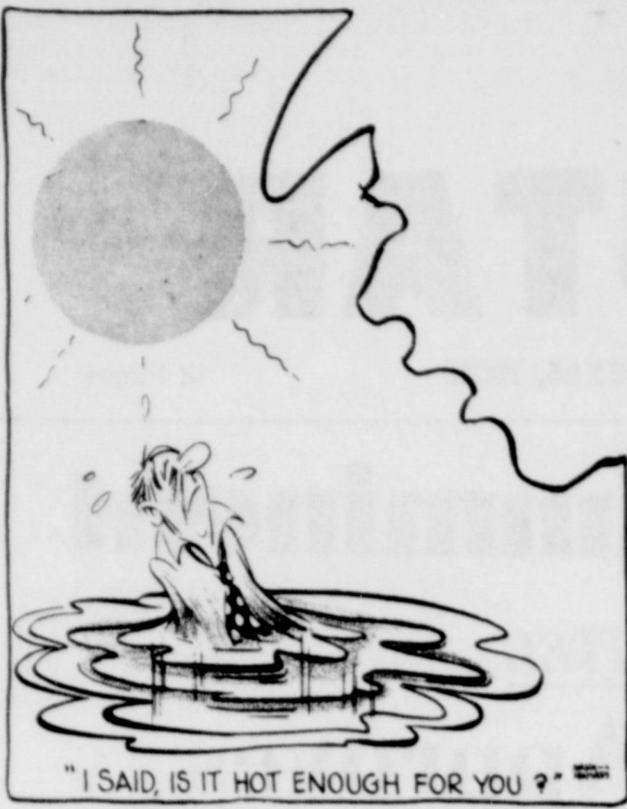

Pause and Reflect

The "Pentagon Papers" have taken the spotlight in current news coverage and are likely to remain a front page story for some time.

From a strictly personal viewpoint I should like to see more attention given to the character who took it upon himself to make public government documents of such importance.

Today's news from the Mideast informs us that several high-ranking army officers have already been executed as a result of their trying to take over, by violent means, their national government.

Perhaps we could slow down our crime rate--dope peddling included--if we took the hint and made punishment fit the crime.

Other news that tears me up is the disclosure that millions of our tax dollars have been spent and no one knows where, how, why or by whom!

One cannot avoid the feeling that hanky-panky exists in high places.

Another headline that staggers the mind is the insistence that soldiers who shoot the enemy are criminals rather than heroes. Civilian casualties are certainly the most horrid occurrences in any war and military strategists avoid them except as a last resort: however they are sometimes a vital part in man's greedy conquests.

History abounds with incidents in which entire populations were purposely wiped out by force of arms or by lingering starvation.

If Lt. Calley and his fellow officers constituted an isolated case then there would be justification for universal scorn--but they may not claim the dubious honor.

Our own southwestern United States has been the scene of some so-called "Indian battles" that were more massacres than military campaigns.

A case in point that the history books call the "Battle of Sand Creek"-----

The Cheyenne camp lay in a bend of Sand creek--six hundred Indians, mostly women, children and old men. The warriors were far to the east on a buffalo hunt.

Robert Bent (eldest son of William Bent and his Cheyenne wife) tells the story--"I saw the American flag waving and heard Chief Black Kettle tell the Indians to stand around the flag for protection--when we were within 50 yards of the Indians I saw a white flag also raised--these flags were in so conspicuous a position that they must have been seen--the soldiers started firing from two sides--five squaws begged for mercy but were shot down--a little girl five or six years old with a white flag on a stick was killed as she approached the soldiers."

The above is part of a report given the second session of the 39th Congress of the United States--Senate report #156, pages 73 to 96.

I purposely left out the most hideous part of the story. Read Dee Brown's "Bury My Heart at Wounded Knee" if you wish to learn more about Man's inhumanity to Man.

You may be sure you have not seen or read the last of the efforts to disgrace our men in uniform.

When the "bleeding hearts" cry "Peace at any price," remind them of the enormous cost involved in maintaining any form of Freedom.

AN EDITORIAL

Some Secrets We'd Like To Know

Now that we are on the subject of secret documents, there are at least three sets would like to see:

1. The agreements made by the United States with the Soviet Government to supply it with millions of pounds of atomic bomb materials. We would especially like to know who urged these agreements upon President Franklin D. Roosevelt, and what the reasoning was behind the grave action that did more than any other to set up a balance of power between the Soviet Government (and eventually the Chinese Communist Government) vis-a-vis the United States and the free world.

The United States began issuing licenses for the exportation of atomic bomb materials to Russia in 1943. This news was first reported in *The New York Times* on Dec. 8, 1949. This is a secret *The Times* might well have exposed much earlier. Dr. Anthony Kubek reported it in greater detail in 1963 in his book, *How The Far East Was Lost*, which was never reviewed in *The Times*.

2. The documents relating to the deliberate infiltration of the United Nations by Communists, American and foreign, immediately after the Charter was drafted in 1945. These papers would be widely scattered, not all in the State Department.

3. All the papers relating to Operation Keelhaul, whereby hundreds of thousands of Soviet citizens who wanted to remain in Western Europe or go to the United States were forcibly repatriated to Russia. General Dwight D. Eisenhower has been largely blamed for this, but we suspect the roots go much deeper.

Friona Flashbacks

35 YEARS AGO--JULY 17, 1936

Two political speakers were billed for Friona Saturday afternoon, representing the rival candidates for the State Senate, Clint Small and Curtis Douglass. The speaker for Mr. Small was Binford Arney of Amarillo, and the speaker for Mr. Douglass was Judge Newton P. Willis of Pampa. A heavy rain shower hampered the affair, ruining the loud speaker set-up of Judge Willis, who spoke from the bed of a truck. Mr. Arney departed for Bovina and Farwell without finishing his talk, being interrupted by the rain.

30 YEARS AGO--JULY 18, 1941

The Friona Consumers Company, Inc., now has its entire stock of merchandise moved from its old location south of the railroad, to its new location on Main Street, in the block north of the park. The new building recently erected here has been made commodious enough to admit plenty of room for the conduct of business, with filling station, wholesale supply and all. E. Roy Wilson is manager of the cooperative.

25 YEARS AGO--JULY 12, 1946

The sad news, which filled the hearts of our people with sorrow and regret reached here last week telling of the tragic death of one of our most highly esteemed young men, Beldon Lawson, who came to his death at the hand of another at Alec, Oklahoma, where he was visiting. The young man lived in Friona only since the early part of this year when he moved with his family to a farm three miles southwest of Friona.

20 YEARS AGO--JULY 12, 1951

Friona's new First Baptist Church building, of mission style architecture, was proudly displayed to the congregation last Sunday, and will hold its formal dedication this Sunday morning. Erected at a cost of \$100,000, the building features a slant-floored auditorium with a seating capacity of 540, ten classrooms, two choir rooms, a study and a nursery. The construction period has required 14 months.

15 YEARS AGO--JULY 12, 1956

Friona's head football coach for next year will be Colie Huffman, 33, announces Supt. Dillie Kelley. Huffman has been at Springlake the past three years, and is well known in Plains football circles. In his seven years of coaching, Huffman's teams have won three district championships and tied for another.

10 YEARS AGO--JULY 13, 1961

General rains, accompanied by isolated hail and some strong winds, soaked all of Parmer County during a four-day period from Friday through Monday. Amounts of moisture varied from about two inches in the extreme southern part of the county to 7.5 inches in the northern part. Only a few reports were less than three inches. Friona's official tally came to 3.55 inches.

5 YEARS AGO--JULY 14, 1966

Joe VanZandt, Parmer County Agricultural Agent for the past two years, will become Moore County Agent on August 11, he disclosed this week.

Marc Houser, formerly of Amarillo, has joined his brothers C.O. and J.V. Houser as a third partner in Houser's Grocery.

The Pentagon papers are still in the news. The statement that "people have a right to know" does not mean that others have a right to steal information.

In its own selected version *The New York Times* brought out how our government was largely responsible for the overthrow of South Vietnam's President Diem in 1963. This is just going to be a short note to thank you for having me at your Independence Day Rally. My wife and I both enjoyed it tremendously.

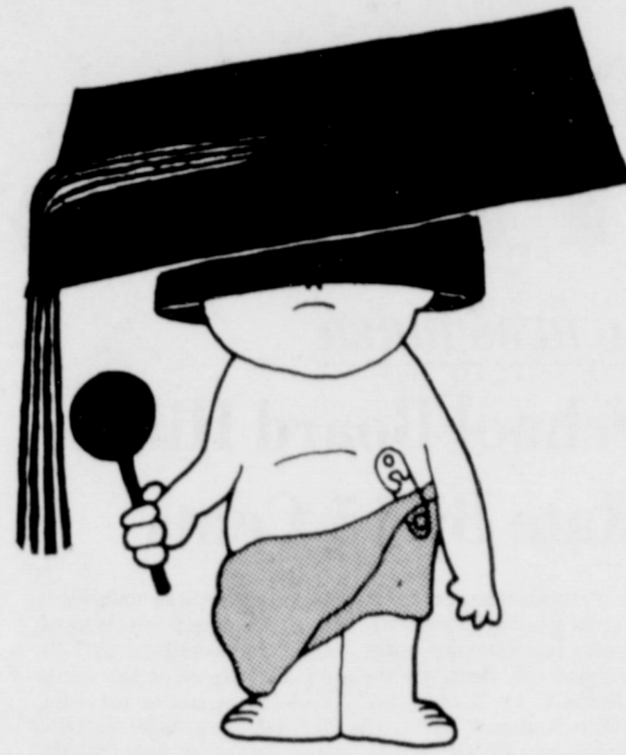

I met with a group recently, none of whom you would know, and we were busily trying to search out some meaningful way of expressing our purpose. (Understand we had a purpose, but we were simply trying to find a good method of revealing this purpose to others so that it would have meaning for them.) One of the group came out with the outstanding discovery--that he was in the wrong group. . . .

Have you ever felt "out of place"? It is somewhat better to find out your "misplacement" and move to correct it but what of the guy who never finds out he is in the wrong "place" and doesn't know to correct it--or another had situation would be the one who was in a "place," knew it was "wrong" and because of various pressures, etc., could not change. Now that would be rough.

That is more or less like the guy who is pushing on the door to get out and finds out that he was out side all the time and had actually been trying to push and get in. . . . "well, you may have to visualize the picture to get the idea there. . . ."

I knew a man once who was in his latter years in life and had lived what he considered a miserable life--I know that that was his response to most things--very cynical and most of the time in a very distasteful mood. All of this because he knew it was his responsibility in life to be a minister and he had rejected the "call" for his whole life. (Can you imagine someone wanting to be a minister? . . . Yes, you can and so can I. . . me for instance. . . I couldn't be anything else--now, no wise cracks. . . .)

A "misplaced" person is like one who sits on a couch watching time go by and it does. . . . He loses perspective and purpose. This is simply another approach to the old adage of trying to beat a square peg into a round hole--it's rough--but it can be accomplished. Albeit, not to fulfill beauty and purpose.

What I'm trying to accomplish with this mess of wordage is to say that as I see it there are two approaches, or three--ever notice how a preacher can't stop on just two points. . . .?

One might possibly be to simply make dead sure you are in your right "life position." This is to say that if you have not already made this decision, that you will research until you can feel fairly comfortable with your direction and purpose in your life. Like maybe try to spell out what you see as your goal for life and go after it. . . .

Now, you may be one of the ones who has really found his place in life, and is in it. This person is finding a great deal of satisfaction and contentment because of the fulfilling of a good purpose for his existence.

Now for another group--These are the few who are in a known "place" not of their choosing, liking, or felt purpose or satisfaction. These may even be unable to escape the web of such an existence--for these there need to be some words of hope. . . .

First of all, a move to the "right" place in life is usually much more possible than we sometimes make ourselves believe.

A real honest attempt to "better" one's position can almost always be attained. If it actually is not possible (and we must recognize this possibility) it would be healthy to remember the scriptural admonition, "good can come out for those who love the Lord." I take this to mean that for one who knows the Master, good can grow out of the most horrible situations--to me that covers many bad predicaments. One can live with it and build good out of its existence.

Have I covered everybody's position, now? You see, I am a strong believer in the worth of man and his (for you women Lib workers, that means you too) reaching his ultimate goal, with the help of God. . . . If he turns himself over to the Master's directorship--that's DIRECTORSHIP, not dictatorship--then things can be better. . . .

Don't you dare misunderstand God's love for you and his willingness to make you a "whole" person.

I am firmly convinced that he can do it and we sell ourselves short if we fail to allow him the opportunity. . . . So go with it friend, and correct your "position" in your relationship with God. . . .

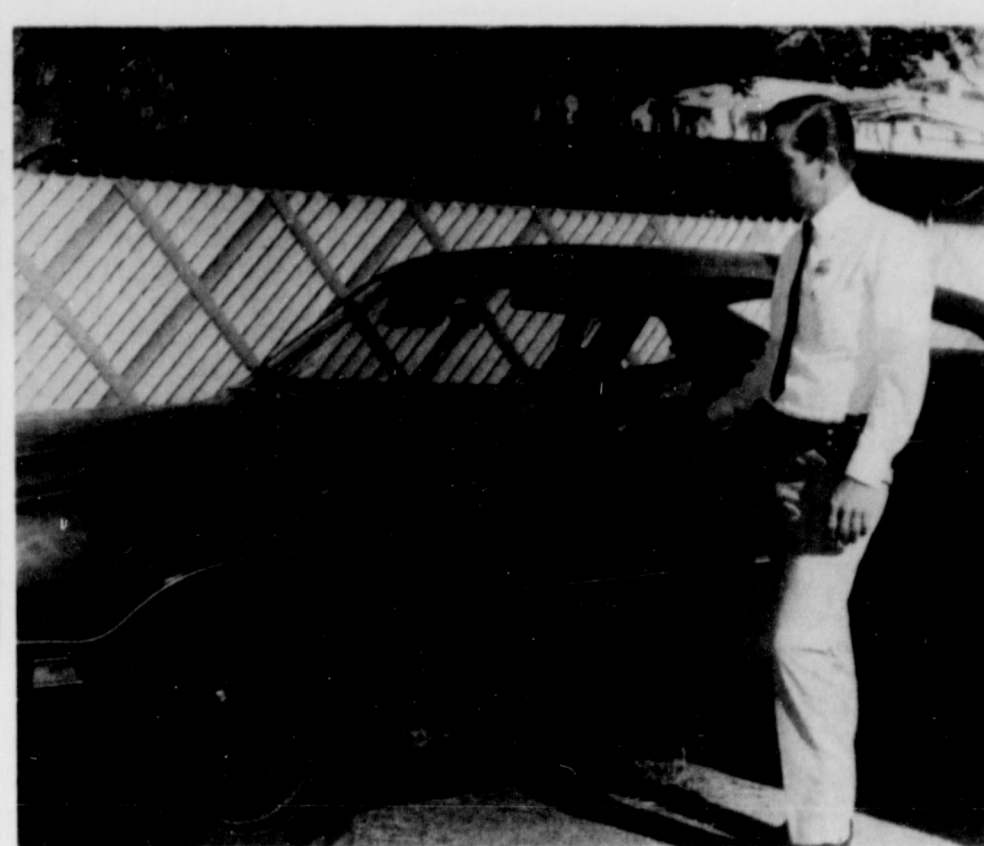

On The Farm In Parmer County MACK HEALD County Agent

In every part of the county the insect population seems to be on the increase. Greenbugs and corn leaf aphids have been building up for the last thirty days. Although the greenbugs are not as thick as in past years, I have found several fields with large populations of the aphids. Corn leaf aphids are heavy enough in some fields to cause honey dew formation on the plants. Although very similar to the greenbug, the corn leaf aphid differs by not injecting toxins in the plant during feeding as does the greenbug.

In many fields I have been in, there were sufficient numbers of predator insects to keep the corn leaf aphids under control. We are seeing their heaviest buildup now in the pre-boot stage, for they usually decline during the boot stage. Control for corn leaf aphids is difficult, as you will know, because of their living habits in the whorl of the plant. Most often, spraying for corn leaf aphids completely eliminates all beneficial insects. This only opens the door for more serious insects to move in.

The most dangerous insect we may encounter this year in grain sorghum and corn is the Banks Grass Mite. Damage to plants appears as discoloration, drying and premature death of the leaves. Lodging usually occurs during the later stages. These insects were observed in spots last year. Beneficial insects controlled them into August of last year before they had to be sprayed. These insects, however, have the ability to become resistant to all of the insecticides that we now use. This has already happened.

J.P. Sims, of Friona, Jimmie Cockerham of Bovina, and Joe Jones of Farwell believe in conservation and have done something about it. They have entered into Great Plains Conservation Contracts to get the federal government to pay up to 80% of the cost of establishing conservation practices. A

Jill Riethmayer Reports On Girls State Activities

Editor's Note: Following is a first-person report from Friona's delegate to the Girl's State Convention.

I'd like to take this opportunity to thank the American Legion Auxiliary for giving me the privilege of representing Friona at the 1971 Session of Bluebonnet Girls State. It was an experience that will be remembered the rest of my life. This year it was held on Texas Lutheran College at Seguin, Texas, June 15-25.

Several people have asked me just what Girls State is, so I will try to explain it. This is a mythical state that the girls attending organize. This year there were 487 girls from all over the state of Texas attending. They first elect city, county, and then state officials. Then the girls run their own government and it is just like the real thing. At Girls State we learned by doing and believe me, we learned.

Our 18th District had a get acquainted tea at Amarillo about a couple of weeks before we left. Previous citizens of Girls State spoke to us and tried to help prepare us.

Our 18th District chartered bus left Amarillo at 6:00 a.m. Tuesday, June 15. We arrived at Seguin at about 5:30 p.m. Our bus driver had a little difficulty finding the right road. Upon our arrival we first deposited our money in the Girls State Bank, and then we received our name tags which told us what city and what party we had been assigned to and whether we were in the House or Senate. Spirit and enthusiasm is the basis of Girls State, and this is also what makes it so great. From this moment on you backed up your party and city with your life.

The first three or four days mainly consisted of lectures from various members of the staff on city, county, and state government. Also at this time we were convening in the House and Senate and this in itself was quite a learning experience. Miss Virginia Kennedy was the lady who lectured to us about government and believe me she knew what she was talking about.

On Thursday, June 17 we elected our city officials. Everybody who filed for an office had to campaign because if you didn't nobody would know who you were. The halls of our city were plastered with posters. At Girls State there were 10 cities with approximately 50 girls in each city. Each floor of a dormitory would be a city and both floors of the dormitory would make up a county. So in about two days you had to let enough people know who you were or you were bound to lose the election. In my city (The Frankfurters of Fat Freddy's Frying Pan) we elected a mayor, four councilwomen, treasurer, attorney, tax collector, police chief, fire chief, and a health inspector. Our officials carried on just like the officials of any city. Some examples are: the tax collector collected tax for our shoes as transportation, our boyfriend's pictures, letters we received, and curlers. We had lanes and stop signs in our halls. If we were in the wrong lane or speeding we got a ticket. We also had a parking meter in the shower for five minutes only. We also drew up a city charter.

The counties were the same way except in addition to the above the county Justice of the Peace married everybody to our boyfriend's pictures. We even had rings and got a certificate. Our city also had a trial with the city below us. Everything we did we learned something, but at the same time we had fun doing it.

Sunday, June 20 we had our state elections. We had two parties, the Nationalists and the Federalists. We had already had the primary elections and run-offs on Saturday so there was just one candidate per party for each office. We heard speeches from all of these and then we voted. It means so much to really be for a person and know that in the end your vote really counts. We elected ten state officials.

Some of the guest speakers we had at Girls State were: Senator John Tower, R.T. Davis, John A. Gronouski, Mrs. Goldie Bowley, and Mr. Billy B. Hester. Each of these had something interesting and important to say to us, and I thoroughly enjoyed each one of them.

At Girls State we learned pride for our country, state and city and respect for our fellowman and his ideas. Every day we had a flag raising and flag lowering. Before the ceremony started the cities would line up and sing city and party songs. It was like a giant pep rally. Then we would sing Girls State songs. Singing at Girls State just seemed to have a certain sparkle in it. When you have 487 girls singing from their heart the only word to describe it is "beautiful."

The director is Miss Fran- "Goff". Each citizen there learned to love and respect her. At first you might be scared to death of her, but later you find out she's really a great person, but you had better do what she says to do.

For me this was the most wonderful ten days of my life. I wish that every girl could go at least for one day because in one day she would learn so much.

Again I would like to thank the American Legion Auxiliary. I know I haven't really been able to explain what Girls State is, but no one but a Girls State citizen would really know how it is and how inadequate I feel the words "thank you" are. I would like to end with this thought: Nothing great, important, or lasting was ever achieved by saying, "I Can't." We can, and we must. Remember, Youth is the Heart of America!

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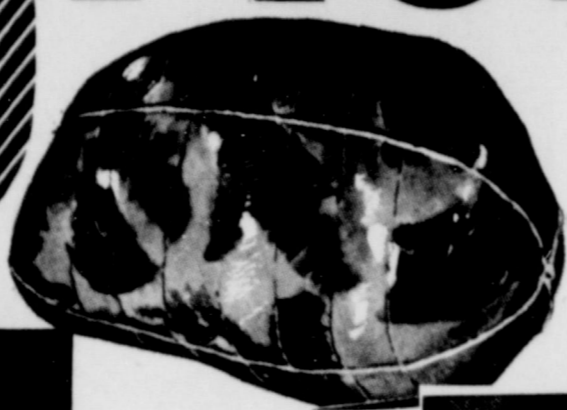
