


STAR City Swelters In 100-Degree Heat

Two pieces of mail we received this week cause us to tip our hats to Missouri Beef Packers.

One is the company's six-month report to shareholders, which shows net sales for 26 weeks ending last April 25 to be \$106,195,145. Net income of \$1,095,659 increased 36 per cent; and net income per share was up 35 per cent over a similar period in 1969.

This is in spite of several factors, such as a seven-week strike at MBP's Rock Port plant, points out board chairman Melvin Rolf and president J.C. Walker.

The two company executives stated in their report that Missouri Beef Packers was listed for the first time in Fortune Magazine's Directory of the 500 largest industrial corporations.

This list, which appears in Fortune's May issue, is considered to be a corporate elite, and the inclusion of MBP is a milestone in the company's development. The listing, which is compiled on the basis of total 1969 sales volume, ranked MBP as 396th among all corporations in the nation.

The company was listed as second in sales per employee, seventh in sales per dollar of invested capital and 12th among the 28 newcomers to the "500" directory.

Congratulations to Missouri Beef Packers for these noteworthy achievements.

Another piece of mail brought a reprint of an item appearing in the New York Times on Sunday, May 31, in the business and finance section.

The article pointed out that the nation's beef basket is taking a swing from the Midwest to the Southwest, with the moving of Missouri Beef Packers' headquarters to Amarillo.

It stated that cattle feeding had gone from virtually nothing 10 years ago to some three million head in 1969. The state is now third in total head slaughtered, behind Nebraska and Iowa, but ranks first in the total number of slaughtering plants, according to the Department of Agriculture.

MBP president J.C. Walker is quoted as saying "There's no doubt that this High Plains area will become the leading beef-producing center in the world."

The article traced the history of MBP, with its first Texas plant at Friona, a second plant being completed in Plainview, and a third in the Dumas-Stratford area.

MBP is the first major packer to move its headquarters to the region, it points out.

An Amarillo banker estimates in the story that \$6 billion will have been invested in Panhandle feed lots, packing plants, farms and other businesses allied with beef production by the year's end.

Walker foresees a doubling of beef production during the present decade.

This Sunday being Father's Day, we enjoyed the following item, which appeared in the June 13, 1930 issue of the Star:

"Father's Day is the first Sunday after June 15, according to the designation of Mrs. John B. Dodd of Spokane, Washington the originator of the movement. It was Mrs. Dodd's suggestion that those observing Father's Day wear a rose, a colored flower for the living father and a white flower for the dead.

"The State of Delaware in 1913 granted a charter to Charlotte K. Kirkbride and B. Carrie Sternberg and others for the celebration under the laws of that state for Father's Day for the first Sunday in June of each year.

"The custom of wearing a dandelion on Father's Day was inaugurated by members of the Melvin W. Callender Bible class of the South Avenue Methodist Episcopal Church, Wilkinsburg, Pa.

"This class adopted the dandelion for the reason that it will never be commercialized and that it is symbolic of fathers, because no matter how often trampled upon, the petals always bob up unruined and untarnished."

Post Office Slates Saturday Closing

Postmaster Wright Williams announced this week that beginning on Saturday, June 20, and every Saturday thereafter, the windows will be closed with the exception of a 30-minute period from 9-9:30 a.m. when they will open for handing out of parcel post mail.

This closing of window service will not affect delivery of mail on Saturday, however, the postmaster adds. Mail will be put up, and all rural routes and city routes will be run on their regular schedules.

Package notices will be handed out in city boxes ahead of 9 a.m. each Saturday, so that patrons will know whether or not they have a parcel.

Williams asked that any mail to be mailed out of town be placed in the outside box on Saturday, just as it is done on Sundays and holidays. Out-of-

town mail must be placed in the drop box before 5 p.m. on those days. No local mail should be placed in the sidewalk box, the postmaster added.

The Saturday closing is being implemented in order to effect a saving in time and money in the Post Office Department. "As you know, we need to conserve wherever possible, and we can do this in our office without curtailing the delivery of first class and priority mail," Williams said.

The Friona postmaster also states that it is very important that patrons get their correct addresses on their mail.

"If you are receiving mail with the wrong address, be sure to notify your correspondents of your correct address. This means box numbers, street address, and box numbers on the

routes," Williams stressed. "If you are getting your mail in a box, do not continue to use a street address, and if you have switched to a street address, don't continue placing your box number on correspondence," he said, recommending a rubber stamp as a means to aid those corresponding with Friona residents to become accustomed to their correct address.

Williams pointed out that it is important that patrons use a return address, including Friona's Zip Code, which is 79035.

"This will be more important in the future than it has been in the past, so please take time to add this to your return address on all mail. The Zip Code should be added when making a rubber stamp," the postmaster concluded.

SWPS Industrial Specialist Talks To Local Group

An economic research study which reveals those industries best adapted to the communities in its service area has been prepared for Southwestern Public Service Company by Arthur D. Little, Inc., nationally-known management consulting and research organization.

The confidential information in the study is being made available to those communities in the electric company's service area which have a going program for industrial and area development. Members of the Friona Industrial Development Group heard a presentation of the study by Elvin Schofield, for Southwestern Public Service Company and members of the area development department, at a meeting June 11.

Schofield told the local group that the study allows the electric company to sight in on target industries for this area, those which best utilize the natural, human and geographic resources of the region.

"We have developed a national advertising program including direct mail and trade paper insertions, which will be aimed at those industries which the surveys show are most com-

patible to this region. We'll start with those with the most plus factors and work through the list," Schofield said.

Emphasizing the highly competitive nature of industrial and area development, Schofield urged the local industrial development team to make use of the information but to not broadcast it because of much of the information in the study will apply to adjacent areas as well as the territory served by Southwestern Public Service Company.

"There's no sense in all of us working together to get this information, paying to have it put in usable form and then give it away. Most of the communities we serve helped compile the data that we have and we want them to be able to use it," he added.

The economic research study points out what industries should be sought by communities in the area and why. Several types of industry are available to nearly all towns in the region while there are a number for which only one or two communities have the desired elements.

The survey revealed that among the strengths of the region

are a high quality labor supply, an excellent business climate and exceptional transportation facilities for shipment in any direction.

The study indicates that continued vertical integration of the area's agricultural production is vital to continued industrial growth. Vertical integration means adding value to the raw product and shipping out of the area a finished consumer product rather than a raw material.

"We are telling the communities we serve which are interested in industrial development what we are going to do as a result of the study and offering them the opportunity to integrate their efforts with ours. We are going to offer industries on the survey list anything and everything they want to know, including plant location studies. We want to get the communities and industries which match together, because that's what industrial development is all about," Schofield concluded.

A copy of the study is available in the local office of the Southwestern Public Service Company for use by the local industrial development team.

Dear Mr. Ellis:

I'm going to write a story about a small town in Nebraska, and its small town people. Its population more or less is 650. It's a clean town and the people try to keep it so. The yards are kept clean, the junk is taken to the city dump, the buildings are kept up and painted when needed, the roadways and ditches are kept clean and mowed.

When we moved into this small community the men folks were surrounding the van and wanting to help unload. The oil truck was there almost immediately filling our tank, and when we offered to pay the man he said, not now, we'll send a bill sometime. We were given food for our supper that night and was told if we needed anything--come get it. Later when we were all settled there was a house-warming party given us to welcome us to their town.

When they knew we were moving away, there was a going-away party given in our honor. Whenever our car was on the blink, we were offered one to use. You could walk out of your home night or day and leave everything open and no one bothered anything. You could walk thru a store and feel free to

look and pick up the items you wished without being watched and followed around like you were about to walk out with something or other.

Our 2-story home rented for \$55.00 a month, and it was a good home. The grocery prices weren't so much higher that you felt you had to travel to another town to shop. The price of eggs for instance, was never more than 30 or 35 cents a dozen at anytime.

I am not condemning Friona, but I do believe if everyone tried a little harder and could think of someone else and maybe give a hand to a neighbor it would be a better community. This town had love for their teenagers also and saw to it they didn't have to hold drag races and drive up and down main street for excitement. They knew how to make a total stranger feel welcome to their town. Here I feel so unwelcome and can truly say I don't feel as much love for Friona as I did the small town I'm speaking of.

I cannot express in words my love for this little town. A body feels so alone here in Friona. I do believe if and when we retire it would have to be in a small town in Nebraska.

When we were moving and loading the van, there was a whole meal brought into my house, even for my truck drivers. Right down to the silver ware needed.

It was so wonderful to go back to this little town for a weekend. I fully agree with the writer of the letter that was printed in the Star a couple of weeks ago.

This is my true feelings and like one of your readers expressed in the Star last week--that if I didn't have the guts enough to sign my name on a letter I wouldn't write it.

I certainly hope you will print this in the Star, Mr. Ellis,--maybe it will help the town of Friona to become a better place to live.

40 YEARS AGO--JUNE 20, 1930

Friona is to have its first real talking picture in the Marvete Theatre Saturday night and it is expected that a large number of Friona people will take advantage of the opportunity to see a real talking movie.

Manager H.P. Eberling has gone to a large expense and a large amount of labor to install this up-to-date and first class photophone apparatus so that Friona might boast of as good as the best in tone moving pictures.

35 YEARS AGO--JUNE 14, 1935

(Quoted from the Clovis News-Journal): Rexford Tugwell says he is sorry he offended the Middle West with his recent speech predicting dust storms will convert this territory into a desert within 300 years, and that if we'd read all of his Albany speech, no offense would have been taken. But then, there are those who prefer the offense to a headache.

30 YEARS AGO--JUNE 14, 1940

The Friona Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring a community softball program on Tuesdays and Thursday nights of each week, the games being played on the school athletic field under the lights. Men from Rhea, Black, Bovina, Lazbuddie, Lakeview, Midway, Oklahoma Lane, Farwell and any and all other communities are being invited to participate.

25 YEARS AGO--JUNE 15, 1945

According to the geologists, vast underground rivers circulate under the flat plains of the Panhandle, and last week Ernie Neff, working at an irrigation well on the Gugenheim place 12 miles northeast of Hereford, found some evidence to back up the theory. For in the irrigation ditch Neff found a live, freshwater clam--a specimen two inches wide and three and a quarter inches long. The well on the Gugenheim place has been in operation only four or five months.

20 YEARS AGO--JUNE 16, 1950

"Friona's growing water system, now boasting of 445 services is a far reach from the modest beginning when in 1929 the city system was inaugurated with approximately 50 services," stated City Manager Roy Wilson of the Panhandle Water Works Association at its Friona meeting last week. (Editor's Note: The number of services as of June 1, 1970 in Friona stood at 1207.)

15 YEARS AGO--JUNE 17, 1955

Construction of a new Farmer County Community Hospital will be underway within 30 days. That was the disclosure made public by hospital authorities after the Monday night board meeting this week. Elmo Jones, Littlefield builder who has supervised a large number of Friona building projects in recent years, was retained on a salary basis to superintend the construction job.

10 YEARS AGO--JUNE 16, 1960

During a week of hard downpours, Farmer County received an average of from six to eight inches of moisture, according to reports from farmers in different sections of the county. Consensus of the area farmers seems to be that the crops were not damaged to any great degree, and that if the sunny weather continues, crop prospects are good.

5 YEARS AGO--JUNE 17, 1965

Slow-falling soaking rains have area farmers smiling this week. The City of Friona has measured 3.7 inches for a three-day period last Wednesday through Friday. The moisture fell just right for such young crops as cotton and maize. The fall was heavier in the Lazbuddie Community, which also received some hail damage.

lections to be performed in the production. All tickets for the evening production will be \$1.00. Everyone under 11 will be admitted free.





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

PEE WEE RACE TIGHT

Tasty-Cream Falls; Only One Unbeaten

Tasty-Cream, the league-leaders in the Pee Wee division of Friona's Summer Baseball program, was involved in two exciting games during the past week's action.

They won an important 7-6 decision on Monday from Hi-Pro Feeds, the second place team at the time, but then on Friday suffered their first loss of the season, in a 3-2 decision won by Monsanto.

Tasty-Cream's defeat on Friday trimmed the undefeated list in Friona's baseball program to just one team—Friona State Bank in the Intermediate League. It also tightened up the Pee Wee League race somewhat, as two teams now have a single loss and three have lost only two.

In the battle with Hi-Pro, Tasty-Cream came up with a big five-run third inning to make the difference in the game. Four walks set the stage for a bases-loaded hit by John Jarecki, which helped give his team a 7-4 lead after three innings. Hi-Pro scored two runs in the top of the fourth, but fell a run shy to drop the game, 7-6.

Tasty-Cream came out on the bottom end of a one-run verdict on Friday, however, when Monsanto rose to knock them from the unbeaten list and take their own third win of the season.

Monsanto won the game in the bottom of the fourth, without the benefit of a hit, and by sending just one batter officially to the plate.

David Porter was hit by a pitch, and while Brit Moore was batting, he stole second. Porter raced to third on an overthrow,

and another wild throw allowed him to score the winning run.

The win gave Monsanto a virtual tie for the league lead, although they have played one game less than Tasty Cream.

In other highlights of the Pee Wee League, the Farmer County Pump B-J Bees struck for 19 runs and trimmed Farmer County Implement, 19-9, for their third win of the season, climbing into a tie for third place with Hi-Pro Feeds.

Hi-Pro which was the victim in the 7-6 loss to Tasty Cream, came back later in the week to take a one-run win for themselves, edging Ethridge-Spring, 6-5. Ethridge-Spring had downed Farmer County Implement earlier in the week, 12-1, and stood 2-2 for the season after the week's games.

In the Intermediate League, Friona State Bank continued to appear unstoppable, rolling to an 11-3 win over Star-Hurst, their third win in as many starts.

In a game earlier in the week, Friona Feed Yard outlasted Reeve Chevrolet, 10-8. The Feeders bolted to a 5-0 lead in the first inning, taking advantage of eight bases on balls. Reeve came back with a run in the first and four in the second to tie the score at 5-all. John White's single in the second helped start the rally.

However, the Feed Yard was not to be denied, and came back for five more runs in the next three innings. They scored three times in the fifth, with Ramon Melton's triple and Jim Bob Odum's single sparking the uprising.

Horn flies are beginning to increase rapidly on cattle on the Texas High Plains as warmer weather continues to be the order of the day.

"These pests live on animals continuously and feed as much as 20 times a day," explains Dr. Bill Clymer, area entomologist, with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "A moderately heavy infestation of 5,000 flies can extract one-half pint of blood or about one percent of the blood value of a 1,000-pound animal."

In addition to the blood loss, the flies constantly irritate animals thereby causing a loss of energy. Digestive upsets are common and feed utilization and consumption decrease.

"Some authorities say that uncontrolled infestations of horn flies can cause a loss of one-half pound of flesh or one quart of milk per day," points out Clymer.

To combat horn flies during periods of peak populations, insecticides may have to be applied on a two-to-four week

basis, he adds. In addition to spraying, other methods that are effective are dusting, dipping, self-treatment dust bags, back rubbers and mineral treated salt blocks.

Numerous insecticides are available for controlling horn flies. Information on these can be obtained from the "Texas Guide For Control of External Parasites of Livestock and Poultry" available at the local county Extension office.
