Vine Hoe Making Slow But Steady Progress

One of Friona's little-known manufacturing companies has been back in business in recent weeks.

The Ozz Company, owned and managed by Forrest Osborn, was producing an order of 30 dozen of his patented hoes, the Forrest Vine Hoe, for a hardware company in Delta, Colorado.

The hoe, which Osborn invented some eight years ago, is designed primarily to eliminate vines and thick stems of weeds tangling around the neck of the hoe. His hoe has a triangular face, and does away with the old "goose-neck" principle.

Osborn received Patent Number 326140 on his hoe about six years ago. He has been producing the hoe commercially at his shop just off Highway 60, in the same building with Ralph's Shop, since that time.

He estimates that he has manufactured some 6,000 of the hoes since he started. About half this number were sold by Osborn on a personal contact basis the first year, as he visited

retail stores all over the High Plains region.

He indicates that his main "hang up" in the situation is securing a big sales outlet, a project which has become even harder than was securing the patent.

"I need a national or a regional company to furnish regular orders, as it is hard to personally carry on a sales campaign. You would be on the road all the time," Osborn pointed out.

The Friona inventor said that he had interviews with sales representatives of Sears, Roebuck & Co. in Chicago, with White's Auto, and Western Auto. The Sears representative appeared interested, but said Osborn really needed more than one line for it to be profitable for the company to buy from him.

Osborn has exhibited his hoes at several conventions and (Cont. on Page 2)

Then Came The Rain

FOR OLDER BOYS

Lions Are Underway With New Ball Park

Recognizing the need for a baseball park for the older boys in Friona, the Friona Noon Lions Club adopted a project this summer of building a new park, and the project is making exceptional progress.

The Lions have been instrumental in securing a full city block of land at Third and Prospect streets for the purpose of building a baseball park, and are now proceeding full speed ahead.

Friona Wheat Growers are owners of the majority of the land, which adjoins Santa Fe Railway right-of-way on the south, and would be bounded by second and third streets and Prospect and Summit avenues if the streets were extended.

Others who owned land in the block, and have agreed to allow the land to be used for baseball include E.M. Rushing, Sloan H. Osborn and Boy Scout Troop 56. Two of these owners traded land to the Wheat Growers to get all of the land in one parcel.

For legal purposes, the land is being deeded to the City of

Friona, for as long as it is used as a park.

With most of the legal paper work done, the Lions have begun work on the ground, doing levelling work, and plan to seed it with grass in the near future, and proceed to have the park in readiness for the 1971 baseball season.

Friona had been without Pony League or American Legion teams the past couple of years, and last Summer Reeve Field was dismantled when the land sold, for an anticipated development.

This summer, however, two Friona teams have been participating in a Senior Little League, which is made up of two teams from Farwell, two from Bovina and the local teams.

Without a suitable place to play, Friona was obliged to play all of their games at either Farwell or Bovina, except when the two Friona teams met, with St. Theresa's Catholic Church giving permission for use of their diamond for these games.

Co-chairman of the baseball park project for the Noon Lions

are Cecil Maddox and Charles Waggoner.

They pointed out that several local people and concerns have been very helpful by loaning equipment for their use in preparing the land for seeding. These include Herbert Day, Dwan Menefee, the City of Friona and Parmer County.

Maddox says that the main objective will be to get the grass well established this year, and that the permanent facilities will be added later. "We may need to have a fund drive or a club project to raise money to pay for the park facilities," but that will come farther down the line," Maddox says.

Plans are to place the diamond in the northwestern corner of the block. The left field line would parallel Third Street, and the right field line would parallel Prospect Avenue. The left field foul line is projected for 350 feet, and the right field line 320 feet. Center field will be 340 feet from home plate.

Army Nurses Now Serve Fourteen-Month Duty

The United States Army Nurse Corps is now accepting applications for registered nurses to serve for a fourteen-month tour of duty according to Sgt. Euel L. Perry, U.S. Army recruiter in Clovis, N.M.

Until a change of Army policy just a few days ago, the Army recruiter added, nurses volunteered for a two-year tour of duty. However, Sgt. Perry said, the Army needs nurses critically and even short-term volunteers would help ease the situation.

Under this program the new officer in the Army Nurse Corps may be assigned to a hospital in the continental United States which needs her services as a replacement for members of its nursing complement serving overseas. Or she may volunteer for a tour of duty in Vietnam.

To qualify for a commission in the Army Nurse Corps, an applicant must be a registered nurse, male or female, between the ages of twenty and thirty-

three. He, or she, must be a graduate of a baccalaureate school of nursing or a hospital school of nursing acceptable to the Department of the Army and currently registered to practice in one of the fifty states.

Along with meeting the physical standards, female applicants must have no dependents under the age of eighteen years. There is no restriction on dependents for male nurses.

"I hope we can find lots of nurses who have been reluctant to sign up for the Army Nurse Corps under the two-year program," Sgt. Perry said. "I believe fourteen months would be just enough service to convince them the Army Nurse Corps offers more personal and professional rewards than they could ever imagine."

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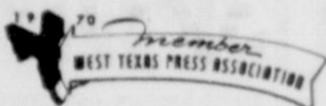

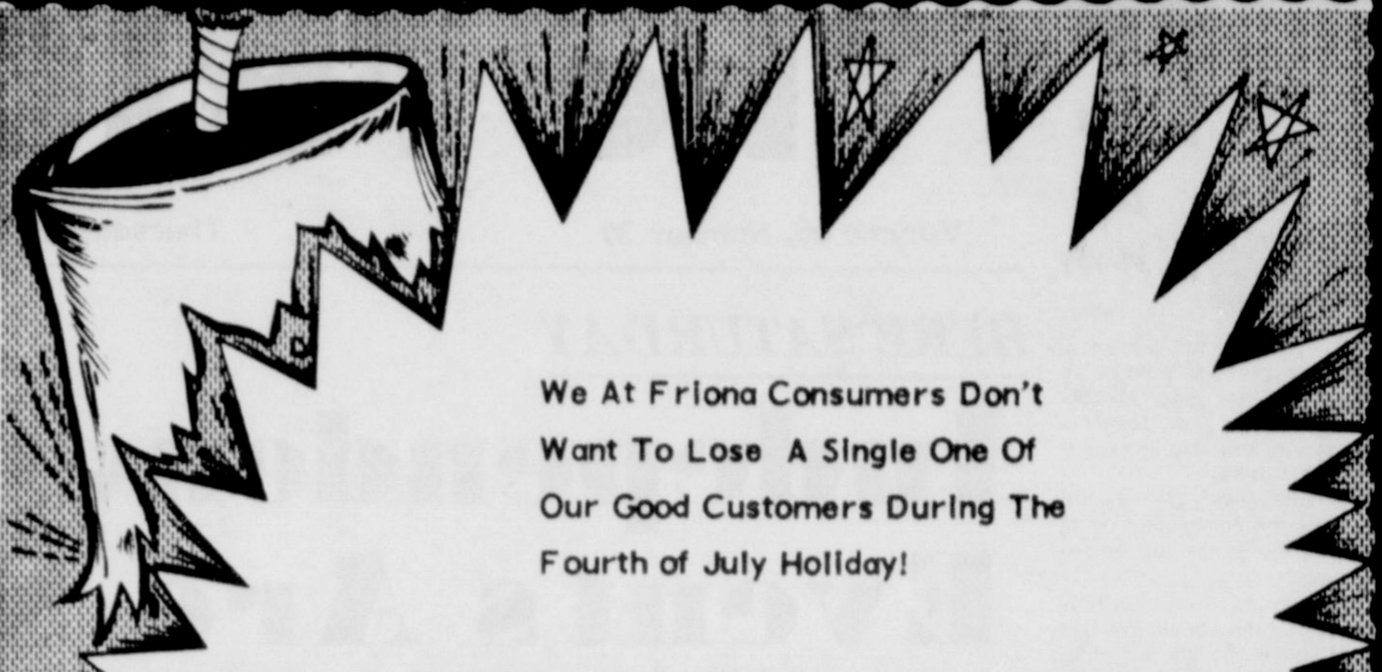

Army Nurses Now Serve Fourteen-Month Duty

The United States Army Nurse Corps is now accepting applications for registered nurses to serve for a fourteen-month tour of duty according to Sgt. Euel L. Perry, U.S. Army recruiter in Clovis, N.M.

Until a change of Army policy just a few days ago, the Army recruiter added, nurses volunteered for a two-year tour of duty. However, Sgt. Perry said, the Army needs nurses critically and even short-term volunteers would help ease the situation.

Under this program the new officer in the Army Nurse Corps may be assigned to a hospital in the continental United States which needs her services as a replacement for members of its nursing complement serving overseas. Or she may volunteer for a tour of duty in Vietnam.

To qualify for a commission in the Army Nurse Corps, an applicant must be a registered nurse, male or female, between the ages of twenty and thirty-

three. He, or she, must be a graduate of a baccalaureate school of nursing or a hospital school of nursing acceptable to the Department of the Army and currently registered to practice in one of the fifty states.

Along with meeting the physical standards, female applicants must have no dependents under the age of eighteen years. There is no restriction on dependents for male nurses.

"I hope we can find lots of nurses who have been reluctant to sign up for the Army Nurse Corps under the two-year program," Sgt. Perry said. "I believe fourteen months would be just enough service to convince them the Army Nurse Corps offers more personal and professional rewards than they could ever imagine."

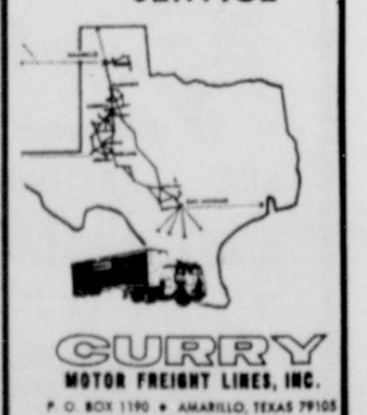

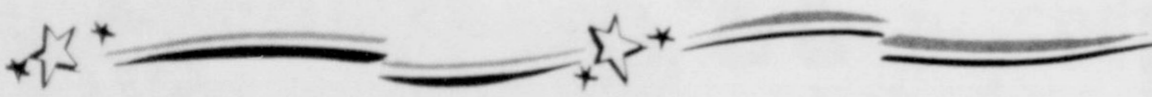

**On The Farm

Another short season for cotton looms ahead due to considerable replanting and poor growth from cool weather. "This means that close attention must be given to irrigation to make maximum use of this short season," points out Leon New, area irrigation specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Since much of this year's crop is late, the first summer irrigation should be applied no earlier than at the first white bloom. Sub-soil moisture is generally adequate in most areas, so June planted cotton will likely already have sufficient moisture to reach its yield potential.

"Let's review some points concerning cotton growth with respect to moisture usage. First, we must remember that cotton actually uses relatively small amounts of moisture during early stages of growth, followed by increased usage as the crop enters the fruiting stage. So, the critical need for moisture occurs later during the fruiting and boll development stages," says New.

Irrigating young cotton before the white bloom appears can be harmful in several ways, adds New. First, it tends to delay fruiting and encourages vegetative growth which is especially serious in a season that is already shortened. "We don't need a large plant to realize maximum yield potential."

Often overlooked is the fact that early irrigation tends to encourage shallow root growth in the upper part of the soil which may dry out later in the season. Deep root development is important to extract the stored moisture which is generally adequate over the area due to good fall rains.

"Soil moisture is most critical during the fruiting period when water use requirements are highest, and it's difficult to get over fast enough with an irrigation," points out New.

"From the profit standpoint, in most cases early irrigations may best be used on grain sorghum that is now nearing the boot stage of growth in many areas rather than on young cotton. Let's get maximum returns from irrigating cotton and not reduce yields and fiber quality by watering too early," emphasizes New.

The "white stuff" is called chalaza and is simply thick strands of white albumen which help keep the egg yolk suspended in the center of the egg. It is very similar to a paper wrap on candy kisses. It covers the egg yolk, even though it cannot be seen and is twisted on each end.

Sales Are Good**

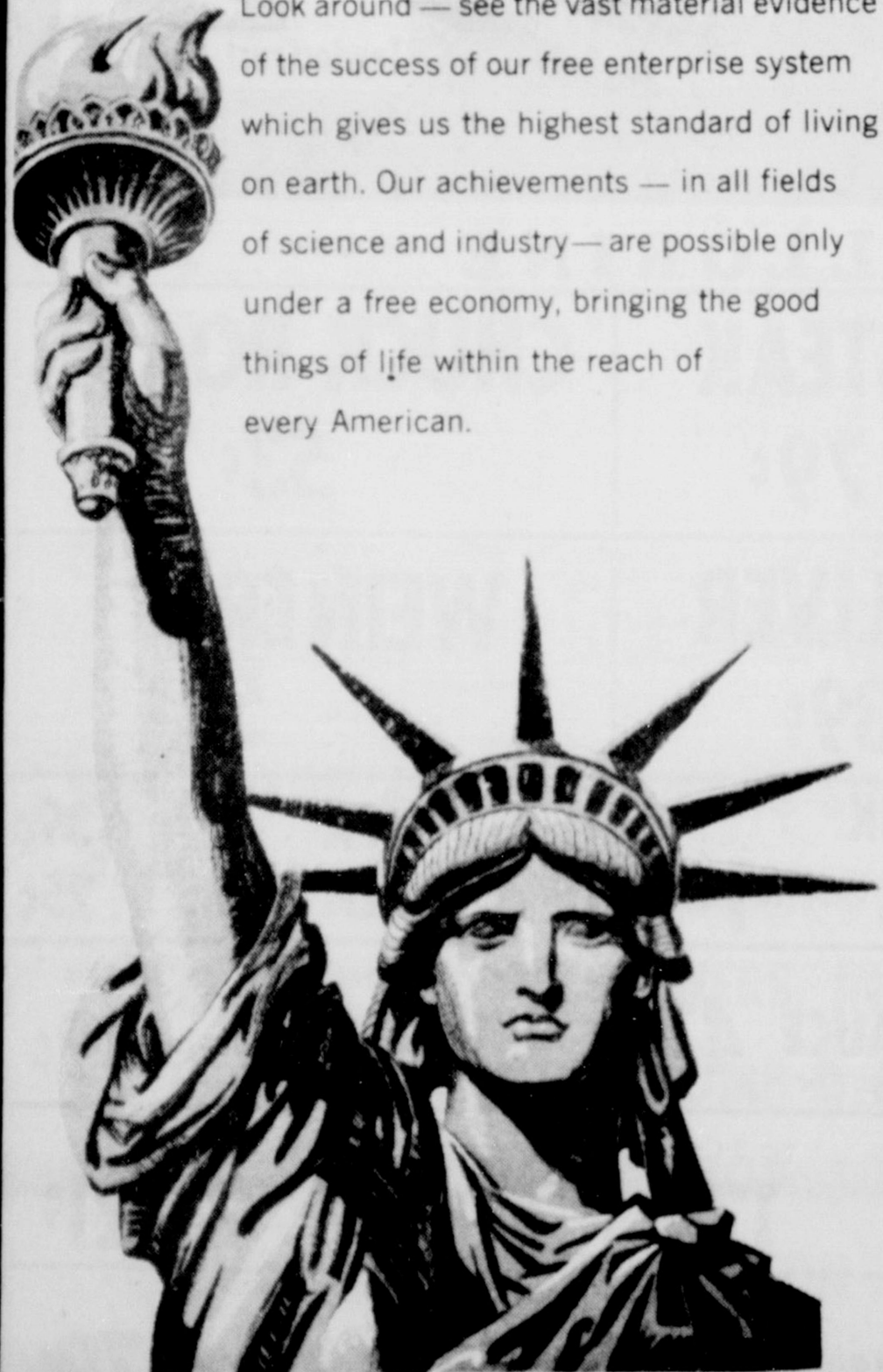

I never have really figured out why the activity of the church becomes so great and at the same time the attendance falls off. Just some peculiarities of the mysterious concept of Churchmanship, no doubt. . . .

I think it is probably true--we sometimes are just going in circles or misdirecting our energy--but whatever, we're hard at it. . . .

I like the one about the old boy who was working ever so hard with a rather large box on the back of his truck. A passerby (probably one who had missed church and was looking for a "make-up") stopped his car and offered to help. After some time the passerby stepped back and announced, "Boy, I don't think we will ever get that box off that truck."

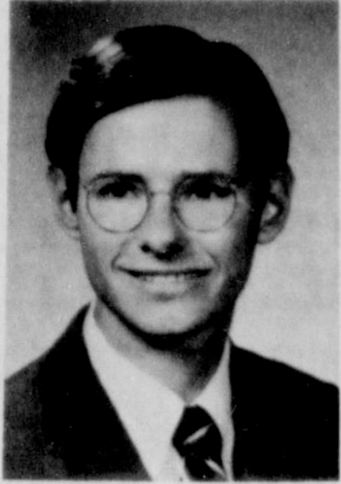

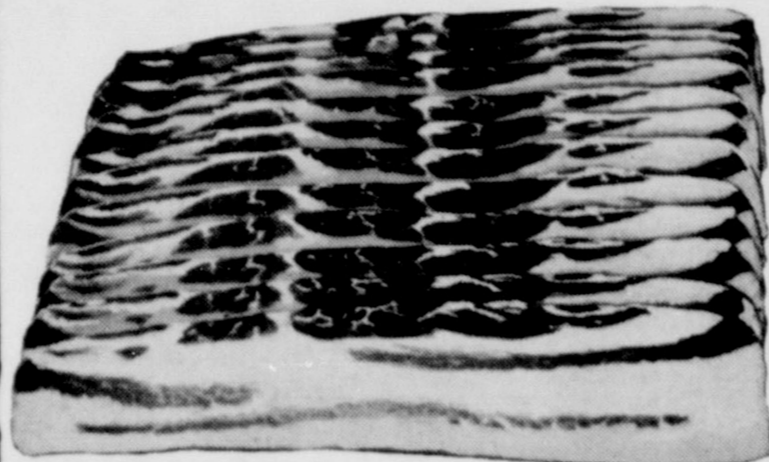
