This year the industry has considerably more than 225,000,000 sacks. In the early days of the oil industry most large wells flowed oil and gas into the air until the flow subsided naturally or was cut off by the well raving or sanding up. The gradual development of suitable control heads and fittings, the use of rotary drilling, and the introduction of mid fluid have cut down the number of wells that go wild. In fact, equipment and methods are so well developed at this time that there is little excuse for wells getting out of control, and repetition of such occurrences in the same field must be attributed to pegligence.
