

ARMISTICE DAY IS THANKSGIVING DAY, SAYS GEORGE CULP

"Today is a day of thanksgiving. But the greatest question in my mind now is, are the people really grateful for what the armistice did?" said the Honorable George Culp of Gainesville in his Armistice Day address before a well filled auditorium at the First Baptist Church Sunday afternoon.

"It was after America had entered the war and the Hindenburg line was slowly being shattered that the German people realized they were being misled in following the advice of a prominent German statesman. He told the people to sign an armistice, declaring that the agents in America's industry and even in America's law making bodies could then do their work and start the American people fighting among themselves.

War Between Christians. "The greatest war of all time was between Christian nations. The greatest war was between people who read the same Bible and believed in the same God, and it was brought about by one man who claimed to ride by divine right. International law put down this man's attempts to conquer the world.

In addition to the address of the afternoon, the Woman's Choral Club, directed by Mrs. Louella B. Thompson, sang "Great Is Thy Love" by Bohm; Mrs. E. L. Fulton gave a reading, "In Flanders Field," and Miss Vivian Hallow rendered a violin solo, "Lullaby Boy."

SECRETARY HAS OUT REVISION PLANS REDUCED RANGE OF INCOME WOULD CUT NEXT YEAR Plan is Contingency Proposed WASHINGTON (The Associated Press) Applying revised range of personal income tax to next year, as recommended by Secretary Mellon, outlining his plan in a letter to the House committee, Secretary Mellon declared upon the non-passing of the bill, that the year and for the next year a revenue bill would give a total of more than \$1 billion in additional revenue. A soldier's secretary asserted positions tax increase rather than a soldier's secretary would prefer a reduction of the tax on the income of the soldier's secretary. In the tax revenue bill, Mr. Mellon proposed a 25 per cent increase on income over \$10,000 and a 10 per cent increase on income over \$5,000. The proposed surtax rates, which would be in effect from the long run, would be lower than those now in effect. The bill would give the soldier's secretary a deduction of 10 per cent of the income of the soldier's secretary. Experiments have been made in well adapted quinine.

SECRETARY MELLON HAS OUTLINED TAX REVISION PROGRAM

PLANS REDUCTION IN ENTIRE RANGE OF PERSONAL INCOMES. WOULD CUT TAX BILL OF NEXT YEAR \$323,000,000

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11. (AP)—Federal tax revision under a program applying reductions to the entire range of personal incomes and estimated to cut the nation's tax bill next year by \$323,000,000 will be recommended to congress by Secretary Mellon.

Outlining his proposed program in a letter to acting Chairman Green of the house ways and means committee, published today Secretary Mellon declared that contingent upon the non-passage of a soldiers' bonus bill there should be for this year and for the next four or five years a revenue surplus above ordinary budget expenditures, including the fixed debt charges of some thing more than \$300,000,000. This he said gives a reasonable margin for tax revision and reduction.

A soldiers' bonus measure, the secretary asserted, not only would postpone tax reduction for many years, but would mean an increase rather than a decrease in taxes. "The treasury," he said, adheres to the theory that the country would prefer a substantial reduction of taxation to the increased taxes that would necessarily follow from a soldiers' bonus.

In the tax revision which he suggested be made effective next January 1, Mr. Mellon recommended that taxes on earned incomes be reduced 15 per cent and the rate of normal taxes on incomes from 4 per cent and 3 per cent to 3 per cent and 2 per cent, respectively. He proposed that the surtax rates be reduced by commencing application at \$10,000 instead of \$5,000 and scaling them progressively upwards to 15 per cent of incomes of \$100,000.

Proposed changes in the earned income and normal tax rates would mean a loss of revenue, the secretary estimated, of \$197,000,000, the saving to tax payers falling largely in the lower income brackets. The proposed scaling down of the surtax rates, he predicted, would in the long run mean higher rather than lower revenues from this source because of the stimulus it would give productive business by the diversion of capital from tax-exempt investments.

Important along proposed revisions which would prove taxation increases were limitations of the deduction of capital losses to 15-1-1-1 per cent of the loss and limitation of the deduction from gross income for interest paid during the year and for losses not of a business character to the amount of the sum of these items exceeds tax exempt income of the taxpayer.

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PRESIDENT BEGINS WORK ON MESSAGE TO NEXT CONGRESS

REALIZES IMPORTANCE OF HIS FIRST PRONOUNCEMENT OF POLICIES. DAILY APPOINTMENTS TO BE LIMITED DURING TIME

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12. (AP)—President Coolidge began actual work today on his message to congress, and upon the results of his efforts even his closest friends acknowledge will depend to a considerable degree his political future.

Mr. Coolidge is known to realize as much as do his friends the importance of his first message and his first pronouncement of policies and for that reason he expects to devote himself assiduously to work upon the document during the three weeks that intervene before the convening of congress.

By agreement with his secretary, C. Bascom Simpson, the executive will limit his daily appointments only to those of necessity and let nothing interfere with his work upon the message.

The ground work necessary to the drafting of the message already has been done. Six days a week for three months Mr. Coolidge has been conferring with officials and private citizens respecting the problems before the government. He has talked with experts in international affairs, with railroad executives and labor leaders, bankers, editors, politicians, and with plain ordinary citizens. In nearly every case the one who conferred with the president had the same experience—the president's views and then was closely questioned by the chief executive.

With this information at hand he set down today to write the message. The principal subjects to be treated in the message have become fairly well known to those who have followed the course of the president's mind and the nature of his conference during the past three months. They embrace agricultural relief, taxation, transportation, merchant marine, government expenditures, immigration, reclamation and international affairs, including the world court and the recently negotiated conventions with Mexico.

Three subjects would seem at this time likely to receive major consideration. They are agricultural relief, taxation and transportation. With respect to assistance to the farmers the chief executive is expected by some to urge legislation to promote marketing and probably ask creation of an agency or authorization for an existing agency to sell American farm products abroad.

The executive's tax proposals most probably will follow the outline of those announced today by the treasury department with such minor modifications as republican leaders believe are advisable. The present immigration law ex-

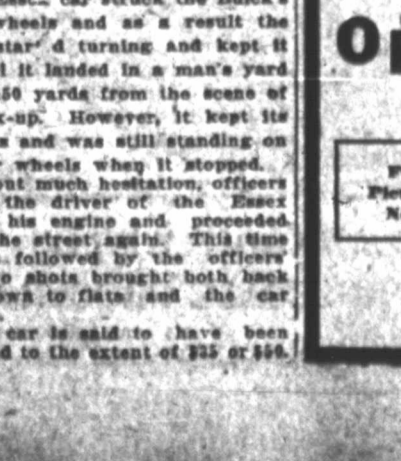
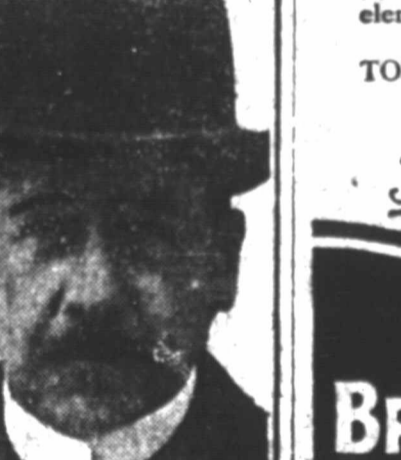
SIX PERSONS ARE HELD FOR MURDER IN BUFFALO "DRY" AGENT IS KILLED

BUFFALO, N. Y., Nov. 12. (AP)—Six persons, one a woman, were held without bail today in connection with the killing of George A. Stewart, federal dry enforcement agent, in a cabaret Sunday. Salvatore Panavia, part owner of the establishment, and his brother, Ralph, a waiter, alleged by the police to have fired nine shots into Stewart's body, are still being sought.

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HARRY COOPER IS GIVEN TITLE OF SARAZEN OF THE LONE STAR STATE



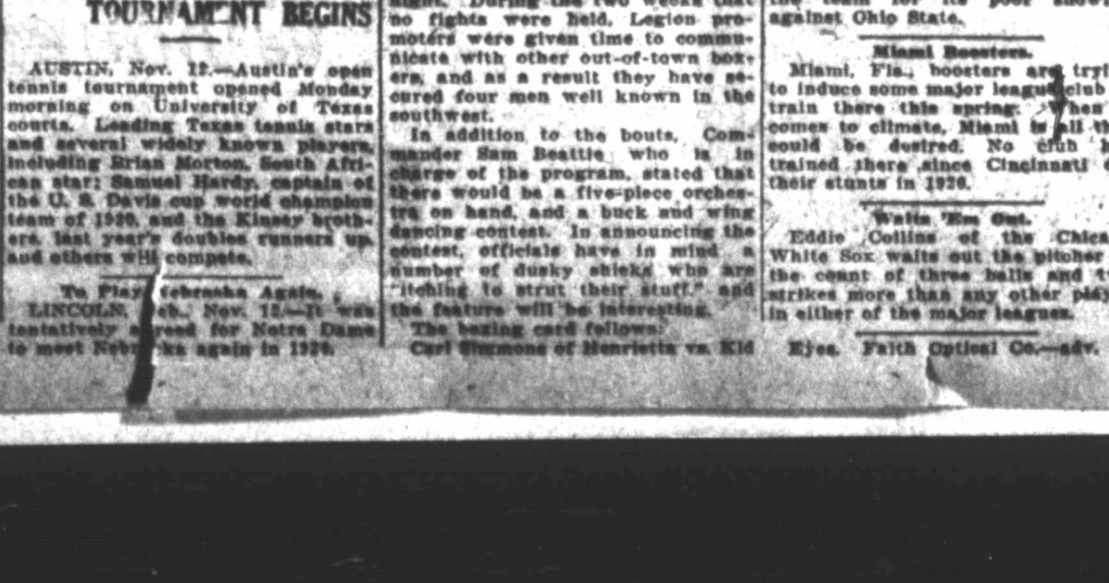

By NEA Service: DALLAS, Nov. 12.—It is not likely that the high-voltage golf prop from the Lone Star State, the Sarazens and the Kitzwoods—who annually tour the south and the southwest in the winter, chasing district cash prizes, will have anything their own way when the season opens.

Number of Tests Are Drilling in Neighborhood of the Discovery Well.

SAN ANGELO, Nov. 12.—The Santa Rita discovery well of the Texas Oil & Land Company, recently included in the sale of a 16-section tract in the county of Brewster.

The well is continuously on the pump day and night, except at intervals for boiler repairs, to get new leathers in the plunger or for similar repairs or adjustments that require but little time.

Drilling has been resumed at 2,786 feet. The No. 2 Santa Rita, or the second of the two wells, is expected to be completed in the next few days.

MALNUTRITION HAS AN EVIL EFFECT UPON CHILD LIFE

"Notwithstanding the confident boasting of evolution to the contrary, the tendency of the human race has been continually downward, through the successive generations since the fall of Adam," said Pastor George W. Spies at the Labor Temple on Sunday night.

"Had Adam originally possessed no greater physical power than man now have," continued the speaker, "the race ere this would have become extinct. Disease has been transmitted from parents to children, generation after generation, until today even infants in the cradle are suffering from afflictions caused by the sins of their parents."

"Moses, the first historian, gives quite a definite account of social and individual life during the early days of the world's history, but we find no record that an infant was born blind, deaf, crippled, or imbecile. Not an instance is recorded of natural death in infancy, childhood, or early manhood. It was so rare for a child to die before his father that such an occurrence was considered worthy of record; and so we read: 'Haran died before his father Terah.' Genesis 11:28."

"Obituary notices in the book of Genesis run thus: 'And all the days that Adam lived were nine hundred and thirty years; and he died.' 'And all the days of Seth were nine hundred and twelve years; and he died.' The average length of life during the first ten generations (not counting Enosh who was translated without dying) was 891 years. The average length of life during the next eleven generations dropped to less than one-third of the former, or to less than 315 years."

"Today, if one reaches the century mark, the fact is published to the world. And as to defective children, in 1912, in the peaceful cities of America, not less than 14,490,000 children were afflicted with organic heart disease, tuberculosis, defective teeth, defective hearing, defective eye sight, and other afflictions that cause ill health. How different is this from the record in Genesis! Thus are the results of the sins and the ignorance of parents visited upon our children."

"One of the leading causes of this deficiency in childhood is doubtless malnutrition.
